



# **Business Wire founder increases gift** to University of Oregon Music Building

\$1 million challenge grant adds to \$4 million donation and comes on the heels of a \$12.5 million pledge for education building.

Lorry Lokey's generosity is truly amazing.

Less than a week after the announcement of Lokey's \$12.5 million gift for the College of Education building, University of Oregon President Dave Frohnmayer announced that Lokey has increased an earlier \$4 million donation for the School of Music and Dance's renovation and expansion project with a \$1 million challenge gift--for a total commitment of \$5 million to the project.

Lokey's \$1 million will come through if the school can raise \$1 million from other donors by December 31, 2006. The \$2 million will complete funding for Phase I of the project, which had been budgeted for \$15.2 million but is now projected to cost \$17.2 million because of inflation.

"I'm delighted that Lorry Lokey has surprised us yet again with his tremendous generosity and support," said Brad Foley, dean of the School of Music and Dance. "As our building planning committee has worked over the past six months with our architects to develop a design, we have struggled with a budget that has been greatly affected by five years of inflationary costs. Lorry's pledge will help us leverage other supporters as we move toward an additional goal of \$2 million to offset the inflationary costs we face."

"I've made this additional commitment to spur others to contribute so we can get this important project done," said Lokey, who recently sold his San Francisco-based Business Wire news service to Berkshire Hathaway.

Lokey likes to use his gifts to increase participation from others. \$2.5 million of his gift for the education building was a challenge gift, which must be matched with gifts from other donors by June 30, 2007. "It's very important to see others than those of us coming in with a big chunk of money participating in the university's expansion," Lokey said. "People who give \$100 or \$1,000 are just as important as those who give \$1 million."

At Lokey's request, the expanded music building will be named the MarAbel B. Frohnmayer Music Building after a 1931 music alumna who was Frohnmayer's mother.

Construction of new space is expected to begin in early 2007 and renovation work on existing facilities in spring 2008, with completion of the project expected in time for the new 2008-2009 school year. The expansion will increase the school's space by 50 percent to better accommodate the 500 music majors and 4,000 nonmajors now using facilities originally designed for 300 students.

Including his most recent gifts, Lokey has pledged a total of \$22 million to become one of the University of Oregon's top donors. Besides his gifts for education and music, he gave \$4.5 million to help fund the School of Journalism and Communication's new George S. Turnbull Center in Portland.

# Faculty-Staff Campaign yields extraordinary results

Extraordinary. That is how Annual Giving Director Carlyn Schreck described the results of the university's recent faculty-staff campaign.

"We achieved 52.5 percent participation with 1,964 contributors, including more than 730 first-time donors," said Schreck. "That's more donors than what we had over the past four years combined and well over the 30 percent average among comparable universities nationwide. I'm proud to say the people who work at the university also give to the university."

Meeting the initiative's goal of 50 percent participation releases a \$50,000 challenge gift from Schreck and Campaign Oregon Chair Randy Papé and his wife, Susie. The \$50,000 will be divided among campus units that individually achieved at least 50 percent participation.

The six-week faculty-staff campaign, which kicked off on Jan. 23, is an important part of Campaign Oregon: Transforming Lives. Though the university has led similar efforts in the past, this was the most extensive internal campaign to-date. "We wanted a peer-to-peer approach," said Schreck. "We relied on volunteers and focused on each department, giving them ownership of the project."

"The generosity of our faculty and staff is simply extraordinary," said President Dave Frohnmayer. "They give 110 percent of themselves every day on the job. To contribute their own financial resources as well is extremely heart-warming to me and sends a wonderful signal to outside donors."

Faculty and staff members have various reasons for giving. "I owe my professional life to the University of Oregon," said Ewart Baldwin, professor emeritus of geological sciences, "and I am grateful. It's been a great life in a great environment. They were good to me and I hope to be good to them." Baldwin gives to the Museum of Natural and Cultural History, the School of Music and Dance, the University Libraries, the Jordan Schnitzer Museum of Art, the Oregon Bach Festival, and the President's Fund.

"For me, it's about one person making a difference," said Johnny Earl, a custodian who was a fundraising volunteer for his department. "While growing up in the mid-60s, I saw how one person could change the lives of others. I remember seeing and hearing Martin Luther King Jr. and the civil rights marches on television. I remember watching one man make a difference. I'm giving to the library because it is the cornerstone of the university, and it touches the most diverse group of students."

Shreck, a 1995 university business graduate, gives to student scholarships. "If I can help make it possible for others to have the same kind of experience I had, I want to do it," she says.

"The faculty and staff do so much every day to make the university a special place," said Randy Papé. "The fact that so many university employees also contribute financially is impressive to potential benefactors."

Former South Korean prime minister to be Visiting Presidential Lecturer April 4

Dr. Lee Hong-Koo, prime minister of South Korea between 1994 and 1995, will be the University of Oregon's 2006 Visiting Presidential Lecturer.

Dr. Lee, a former member of the Korean National Assembly and former chairman of the New Korea Party, also has served as South Korea's ambassador to the United States (1998-2000) and the United Kingdom (1991-93). He will deliver his lecture on April 4 at 6 p.m. in 282 Lillis Hall, 955 E. 13th Ave., Eugene.

President Dave Frohnmayer inaugurated the Presidential Lecturer program in 2003. The inaugural lecturer was former U.S. Senator Paul Simon. Other lecturers include U.S. Rep. John Lewis, Watergate historian Stanley Kutler and South Korean ambassador Dr. In Ho Lee. The hallmark of a Presidential Lectureship is the idea that the visiting speaker engages with the academic community and students in small group and classroom settings as well as in a public lecture.

The lecture, entitled "The Emerging Asia Pacific Community and the American Role," is free and open to the public.

Cross-border cultural production international conference to be held April 20-22

An international conference to discuss the effects of cultural production in the U.S. and Canada will be held at the University of Oregon April 20-22.

The conference, entitled "Cross-Border Cultural Production: Economic Runaway or Globalization?" will bring together scholars, students, industry members, labor and government representatives to explore the economic, political and cultural implications of cross-border cultural production in both countries.

The film and television industries have long been recognized as playing important economic, political and cultural roles in the U.S. and Canada. However, the location of production sites for these cultural products has been a contentious issue over the past few decades. As U.S. film and television producers continue to be lured north to Canadian locations, Hollywood workers, unions and guilds and government officials have been wrestling with the issue of "runaway production." Meanwhile, the Canadian industry and government has argued that the idea of "runaway production" is overstated, while others point to the phenomenon as a case of globalization.

The conference will be funded by a grant from the Canadian Embassy, and sponsored by the School of Journalism and Communication, the Canadian Studies Consortium, the Department of English, the Labor Education Research Center, the Film and Media Group, the Oregon Film and Video Office, and the Mid-Oregon Production Arts Network (MOPAN).

There is no cost to attend the conference but registration is required. The registration deadline is April 13. # AAA faculty recognized for paleontology center project

Faculty from the university's School of Architecture and Allied Arts and Eugene-based Rowell/Brokaw Architects have been selected by the **Environmental Design Research Association** (EDRA) and the journal *Places* for one of six national 2006 exemplary project awards in architecture, planning, landscape architecture, and urban design.

The award recognizes the **Paleo Project** in Fossil, Ore. It is led by Jenny Young and John Rowell, associate professors of architecture. The project's planning stage calls for the revitalization of two important public school sites in Fossil and investment in a new paleontology center in the nearby fossil beds to help this economically depressed region of central Oregon develop as a center for ecotourism and education. The planning involved more than a year of working with the community, preparing conceptual proposals for the new center and the consolidation and revitalization of the town's public school, and arriving at an initial phasing and financial plan.

Both the new Paleo Center and the single-campus K-12 public school will be state-of-the-art facilities and future town landmarks. The project is sponsored by Wheeler County for the nonprofit Oregon Paleo Lands Institute and funded by the Oregon Department of Housing and Community Services as one of its first "Oregon Solutions" projects.

The project team also includes Greg Brokaw, principal and adjunct professor, Peter King and Chad Kirkpatrick, all of Rowell/Brokaw and all University of Oregon graduates. Other consultants include Ron Lovinger, professor of landscape architecture, and Justine Lovinger. Professor Emeritus John Reynolds consulted on energy efficiency in design.

EDRA, a national organization of design professionals, social scientists, scholars and practitioners, was founded in 1968. Places covers architecture, landscape architecture, city design and environmental art and is published by the Design History Foundation. The EDRA/Places awards will be presented on May 5 at EDRA's 37th annual meeting in Atlanta, Ga.





# **A Special Place**

North Central Oregon is still littered with some of the most diverse prehistoric plant and animal fossils in North America. Casual visitors can easily stumble upon small flakes and chunks of old mudflows and ashfalls, with fragile mammal bones, fish scales and bones, and the leaves and nuts from Oregon's first ancient forests, imbedded in stone. For example, The John Day area is unique in the world for its complete fossil record of the age of mammals and mammal environments. The Nimravid, a 4.5 ft "false sabre toothed cat" and one of the earliest true carnivores, once lived in the ancient forests of the area. It was an awesome predator. The Nimravid is found in the John Day formation and featured on the Blue Basin trail in the National Monument. Mammal fossils come from ancient stream beds, and ash beds, and paleosols( buried soils) in the region. The region's rock palisades, volcanic mud flows and ancient seafloor plains and riverbeds contain enough geological importance that it has reached a global scale. Scientists from all corners of the world have been scouring the hillsides and river banks for over a century.

The region hosts four rock formations and each one represents a unique piece of the world famous John Day Fossil Beds puzzle. Many of the sedimentary rocks in eastern Oregon contain fossil leaves or bones. Leaf fossils are especially abundant in the rocks at the far side of the athletic field at Wheeler High School in the town of Fossil. Although it is rare to find a complete animal fossil, a search conducted in riverbeds and even smaller streams may turn up chips or even teeth. read on. The main objective of the Oregon Paleo Project is simply to educate. Paleo Learning Center will be considered a "base station" in Fossil.

Educational programs will originate from Fossil and be the result of many minds working together to provide the ultimate learning experience. It will not stop at the present faculty as new participants will always be encouraged to make an impact. The concept of the Paleo Project closely involves the North Central Education District which established the Paleo Academy. "We need to let the world know "world class fossils are just three hours from Portland."

# Oregon Community Credit Union Research Fellowship - Revised 3/8/06

The University of Oregon is pleased to announce a new research award program made possible by the generous support of the Oregon Community Credit Union. This new award program, to be called the Oregon Community Credit Union Research Fellowship Program, will be initiated spring 2006 with three awards of \$10,000.00 each.

The program, modeled on the OVPR Summer Research Award program, will include an opportunity for faculty to submit a research proposal, a faculty review committee drawn from the UO research community, an annual recognition event and a website designed to disseminate research outcomes that came about with the support of this award. The award will be made for a full academic year to begin with the new academic year in September 2006. There will be a four year cycle to the award structure. **The first year (2006), the program will welcome applications to support social science research;** the second year, for the humanities and performing arts; the third year, for research related to professional programs; and the fourth year for natural and physical sciences research. Individual faculty members will need to decide to which cycle their research applies.

This program is to support non-curricular activities related to individual faculty research programs. It is open to all tenure track and tenured faculty with an appointment of .5 and greater and to non tenure track faculty with full time (1.0) appointments. Applications to support interdisciplinary research are encouraged.
