

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


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Preface: Overview of the Research

This research is intended to establish the foundation for further research in Historic Preservation.¹ My interest in Historic Preservation has begun to include the notion that the respect for and preservation of artifacts is only the easy part of the preservationist's (or architects) endeavor – the difficult part is becoming aware of, understanding and protecting those ways of life and values which the artifact symbolizes. This research will focus on the means available to enable that understanding and protection.

The research builds upon processes and products of previous course work. The final products (i.e., this document) include:

- a descriptive paper,
- a series of matrices which describe relations between
- protective and sustaining tools and the environment at different scales or levels of aggregation, and
- an annotated bibliography.

Intended by-products of the research include: a list of historic and contemporary cases which illustrate the process of preserving things in the larger sense; and a sense of where the HP research and thesis should go; and how the research can be organized so that it is clear and useful.

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¹ I believe Architecture and Historic Preservation are both conceptually large enough subjects to map each other into themselves, i.e., they are closely intertwined and complementary, not hierarchical in relation. Like wise the architecture of buildings and the architecture of landscape are assumed to be complementary, and only separable in the abstract. Finally, I am also approaching the research with the notion that other subjects such as ecology, ecosystem management, or human cultural ecology are not subsets of any particular larger subject and in fact are closely intertwined with architecture and preservation.

I. Introduction: Intention and Progression

As noted in the preface, I have approached this research from the position that that the preservation of individual artifacts such as buildings, gardens, or other singular structures is worthy in and of itself, but akin to winning battles while losing the war. I believe that the larger scale structures in which the singular entities are found are not only worthy of preservation, but must be preserved if the smaller scale, singular structures are to have a meaningful existence. I think the larger scale cultural entities (LSCEs) are not preserved for at least two kinds of reasons.

- we are often simply not aware that those larger scale structures exist;
- when their presence is understood and their preservation desired, logistical difficulties make that preservation problematic.

In this research, I have looked for ways in which preservationists can participate and contribute to the protection and existence of these larger scale structures, and expected to find:

- ways to discover and see those larger structures, and understand their values;
- a framework for defining LSCEs;
- examples of both successful and unsuccessful preservation of LSCEs;
- the specific means of preserving LSCEs.

During the process of this research – while digging through sources to see what they might say about the subject, while delving in their bibliographies for related sources – I began to find some bedrock, some issues which underlay preservation, but are often not stated explicitly.² One issue is the relation of preservation to conservation (in the broader sense). Another is the relation of preservation to human cultural ecology as well as ecology in its more accepted meaning. The moral premises and other subtexts which underlie preservation were often unspoken, but could be read between the lines.

These fundamental issues led to the expansion of the bibliography, as I began to examine the notions of place, of conservation and the history of conservation, and the nature of human culture. The annotated bibliography therefore contains many "non-preservation" sources (i.e., sources which do not directly address the preservation of artifacts).³ Yet the despite the tenuous connection between these sources and preservation, the presence of these sources is important because the large scale cultural entity is not a singular artifact, and is in some ways an invisible thing which might exist more as an idea or process than a physical thing. Which brings us to the problem of defining the large scale cultural entity....

Definitions and Other Circumlocutions

The large scale cultural entity (as I am defining it) exists at a scale larger than an individual object or artifact. It has some value to the culture at large - either to the human culture with which it co-exists, or to the ecosystem of which it is part. As noted above, it may be more akin to a process or idea, and hence somewhat invisible: what we notice is not

the thing itself, but like the wind blowing leaves, we see it manifest in the appearances, lives and activities of the things it affects.

This definition is meant include such classic preservation milieus as parks, districts, and landscapes. But it is also meant to include ways of life which have evolved as people learn to live in a certain place and time; to include intermittent and recurring phenomena, such as the vernal ponds of north central California; and even be part of larger entities – like forests, deserts and even individual bioclimatic regions. The definition is also meant to include individual sites, processes or experiences which are unique (and therefore irreplaceable) – a gold medal trout stream, a stand of plants, rock outcropping in a city park, a passenger train. In short, these are entities which help a culture understand where, when and how it relates to its place on the earth and in time.

II. The Descriptive Matrices

The matrices are intended to lend consistant form to comparisons and descriptions of the major tools used to save large scale cultural entities (LSCEs) available to the preservationist. The central organizational feature are notations of impacts of the tools (and their variants) upon classes of related objects at different scales.

For example, the state park may exist at an extremely local scale; the Darlingtonia unit of the Oregon State Park system (located near Florence) is a small land holding which fits in this scale. It resides entirely within a particular microclimate of a single watershed in a single bio-climatic region, and in a single geo-political municipality. Yet its unique character has much more than a local importance, as these *Darlingtonia* plants themselves are unique not only in this region, but

possibly do not exist in other similar bio-climatic regions.

The vernal ponds of north central California, in contrast, are not singular or unique individuals, as the Darlingtonia site is. However, they exist only seasonally, and may exist in several different watersheds located in several different geo-political municipalities and a different political climate. While the Darlingtonia site is an easily recognizable singularity (and thereby relatively easy to define and protect), the vernal ponds are not as noticeable (especially given their temporary and recurrent nature) and are more difficult to protect than the *Darlingtonia* site.⁴

In all probability, these two cultural resources *should* be protected by those tools and processes appropriate to their nature. But what are the appropriate tools? In the case of theDarlingtonia site, its limited extent and singularity made inclusion in the state park system fairly logical and effective. But the dispersed and seasonal nature of the vernal ponds, and the differing political climates in the various jurisdictions make state park status a less viable option. How then can the ponds be protected? The major tools for preserving contexts (as opposed to individual artifacts include:

Historic Districts

Land Trusts

Cultural Landscapes (especially Rural Historic Districts Other Tools: Parks, etc.

All of these tools, or approaches to conserving large scale cultural resources will be described in similar matrices, with sources noted.

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⁴ Vernal ponds form when rainy season waters collect in clay basins. As the ponds evaporate, wildflowers bloom in succesive concentric rings at the perimeter of the ponds. The exclusive domain of more than 60 native plant species found nowhere else, less than 5 percent of the original range of these pools remains intact. See Figure 1.

III. The Annotated Bibliography

In certain respects, the annotated bibliography forms the core of this research. It includes not only those sources upon which the matrices and descriptive paper depend, but also those which expand upon or form the basis for the primary sources.

Masanubo Fukukua⁵ has noted that a thorough understanding of growing food requires not only the insights of plant biologists, soil experts and agronomists, but poets as well, to describe the qualities of dew on spiderwebes sparkling in the sunlight. The sources therefore include not only scholarly work focused on preservation or landscape, but works of fiction, poetry and visual images which help describe the nature of landscape, culture or sense of place.

The format of the bibliography differs from expected research formats by including expanded bibliographic information, such as one might expect in a card catalog. I feel this information is important to include for two reasons: it describes the source materials in a succinct, standardized form, and helps refer to other related sources of information.

The annotated sources are arranged in alphabetical order, and includes sources which have not yet been annotated, but are related and worthy of inclusion. In this manner, I am trying to respect the notion that this bibliography is not a finished product, but a working document in a state of continual and incremental revision.



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Salient Issues

The problematic areas impeding the conservation of landscapes and ecosystems occur in the many realms. One of the most important comes out of the deep-seated notions of justice, particulary that of posssion is nine tenths of the law. Who owns land and what kind of tenure they hold, and what they do with it are of paramount concern. The use of land is also tied intimately to concepts of constitutionally protected property rights. Property rights in turn tie into fiduciary concerns. The use of lands also brings the spectre of public relations concerns, with the larger landcontrolling organizations traditionally regarded as having responsibility in inverse proportion to their size and percieved power, and the individual landholder having responsibilities with concomitantly lesser power.

Conservation law is also in a state of flux,⁷ and recently interpretation and enforcement has been subject to political and ideological control instead of professional.⁸ And finally public agencies tend to view their spheres of influence as proprietary, threatened and requiring protection and defense, even at the risk of not cooperating with other agencies.⁹

The combination of all these factors create a difficult milieau for conservation in general, but perhap the issues of deepest concern are those which are never reeexamined or well defined. By contrast, the information regarding management of resources (whether at singular or complex levels of aggregation) is well researched and relatively

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available. 10

Mission and Practice of Public Agencies

The farmer, poet and essayist Wendell Berry contends that organizations cannot adequetely enact relationships between humans and the world because such interaction always occurs at a personal level in specific, perceptible and substantial ways, while the organization can only interact with the environment through individuals and at an abstract level.¹¹ The interaction does occur at a community scale, because communities are composed of individuals living on or with a given, specific piece of land, and are the visible elements of a culture which has (presumably) a vital and on-going (sustainable) interaction with the landscape or ecosystem.¹² Managing the land in this kind of culturally responsive way accepts the anthropocentric and utilitiarian aspects of the land ethic within the context of maintaining resources which ensure the well-being of humans because the other (necessary) elements of the system are also assured of well-being in the most dynamic and comprehensive senses.¹³

Management

The management of cultural resources - whether a structure, a landscape or an ecosystem take place in system of human-produced




INTRODUCTION


Tools for historic preservation, landscape conservation and sustainable development have some common elements, some complementary aspects and some areas of conflict. In the matrices which follow, the tools (methods of achieving goals) will be placed in relation to each other according to how they are presented in the literature. The headings and subdivisions of the matrices are based upon my understanding of where the tool would be appropriately employed, and integrate both sociopolitical and geographic categories.


GENERAL ORGANIZATION

Protective strategies are mostly found at national and smaller levels of aggregation. This is especially notable in the sustainable development literature, which holds that sustainability is a function of locally specific attitudes, understandings and interactions.¹ Most tools or methods of protecting cultural resources are applied at specific scales. For instance, the Land Trust is most often applied at a scale which is geographically smaller than the watershed or community / city scale, but can include landscapes,

buildings and other structures. In Figure 1, most tools seem to be clustered in the middle of the matrix between the national and local scales in the regulatory realm. However, this is misleading, as most of the processes noted in that zone of Figure 1 address the protection of cultural resources only indirectly. The exceptions are the historic districts, which can include various kinds of resources, can cut across jurisdictional boundaries as well as scales.²

One of the most revolutionary aspects of the emerging sustainable development studies is the emphasis on bioregion, ecosystem, watershed and landscape as the preferred scales of definition. Yet few of the tools which apply to conservation are intended to function at those scales - and those that do are more concerned with life safety, health, or economic issues (e.g., the clean air and water acts) than with the the preservation of culturally significant or ecologically significant entities (such as open space, agricultural practice, resource use, &tc.). Furthermore, the tools specifically intended for conservation or historic preservation tend to focus upon individual artifacts or groups of artifacts, and not upon their larger physical and cultural except as a context of significance. Consequently, the artifacts may indeed be protected, but their (unprotected) context may be lost.3


The Capacity Evaluation Model





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ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY

This bibliography includes sources which assist in refining and expanding the question of how historic preservation is related to sustainable development. The sources are divided into three sections: the first lists sources which apply directly to the subject; the second lists sources which are directly related but peripheral to, or supportive of the investigation (including theoretical or historical treatises); and the third list contains sources which may not be directly applicable but are provocative in formulating ideas, questions and attitudes. In addition, each of the three sections contains sources with annotations and without annotations. The decision to annotate or not was based mostly upon whether the source was unique for reasons of comprehensivity or clarity.

Disclaimer

This bibliography is not intended to be exhaustive, but to provide a basis for further expansion. As noted in the introduction, I am trying to respect the idea that this bibliography is not a finished product, but a working document in a state of continual and incremental revision.

ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY

I. Primary Sources This section includes sources which directly address aspects of either sustainable development or historic preservation.

Middle class Euro-American anglos will probably understand its explanation of how the Semitic traditions of Judeo-Christian-Islamic religious insights can provide a context of stewardship at not only cultural scales, but landscapes and ecosystems as well.

Wendell Berry is arguably one of this eras most important conservation writers. While he is a poet, essayist and professor of literature, Berry is a farmer who uses horses to work the farm as a matter of principle and preference.

It is hard to choose any one book, essay or poem as representative or encompassing of his whole work, so I am listing all of the works with pertinent essay here. Berry is also included in the secondary and tertiary listing of sources because his writings work at many levels of specificity, though they are always provocative and stimulating. ISBN 0865474206 AC8.B4743 1990 In Berry's two essays on conservation in *Sex, Economy, Freedom and Community,* he speaks about people who are connected to their land and their community: what their attitudes are toward the land and each other. He expands upon previous essays¹ foci upon the necessity for systems of accounting and economics to recognize that externalizing costs to balance equations is not ethical and in fact harmful to the health of the land and the communities (virtually all humans) who depend on the land for their health.

In the first essay, "Conservation and Local Economy" Berry examines how the loss of the land-based local economy to the industrial / national economy has resulted in the destruction of the land and the local community. Analogies to NAFTA and the GATT are drawn. The relationship of personal choices and decisions to the economy and land is described. And finally the notion of a healthy community is defined, and community itself defined to include not only humans but the land and all the living things therein. He also details the relation between conservation / preservation of land and community within the framework of Jeffersonian participatory democracy:

"It is readily apparent that the economic forces that threaten the health of ecosystems and the survival of species are equally threatening to economic democracy and the survival of human neighborhoods." (p.15; and I bet the residents of south central LA would agree...)

In the essay "Conservation is good work," Berry talks about how conservation *is* work, and often hard work. The work includes knowing the local land and its history and health, and knowing the local human cultures history and health, too. He speaks of honoring what is there, even if not understood, and practicing humility because of what is not known.

The preface and introduction to <u>Vanishing Farmland</u> provides a concise overview of issues related to conserving agricultural and rural lands. The first two chapters set the legal / historical context, including specification of cultural and governmental concerns and attendant Constitutional limitations. Chapter 3 discusses means of agricultural land protection (and includes case studies), and chapter 4 presents and discusses a model Sul ordinance. The references include case law as well as other primary and secondary sources.

Few landscapes are under the control of single-entity owners; even National Park lands often contain in-holdings or failing that, concessionaires or other parties with vested interests. The need to address many concerns of many parties to save landscapes is crucial While many of those parties dismiss controls as unconstitutional, Redfield's book addresses a single means of addressing the issues at that most important yet abstract level. While the conclusions are at a general, non-specific level (as opposed to locally specific for a given landscape), the author does suggest that regulatory remedy be applied to specific agricultural districts rather than being universally applicable.

The main value of this book for the preservationist is its comprehensive examination of the legal issues and the model ordinance.² In this sense it provides a legal context for hands-on approaches to landscape conservation noted in Melnick, Foreman (Zonneveld) and others noted in this bibliography.

Runte's <u>National Parks</u> presents a good overview of some aspects of the conservation movement in the U.S. by focusing upon the creations and evolution of the National Parks and National Park System. Clearly brought out is the initial and still powerful notion that conservation is for either scenic values or for mixed use which primarily serves resource extraction. In the pivotal 6th and 7th chapters respectively entitled 'Complete Conservation' and 'Ecology Denied,' Runte describes how the Park Service examined ideas of preservation of ecological values, and why it continued to operate with the goal of development. Published in the mid-1980s, the text examines continued threats to individual park units by pro-development interests.

In some ways the National Parks are touchstones for attitudes toward conservation, and in particular for the attitude we have toward how we feel about preservation. While not ostensibly about either historic preservation or sustainable development, Runte's book touches upon aspects of both. 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The chapters in <u>Changing Landscapes</u> are arranged in four parts. Part I introduces the field and relates historical aspects of landscape ecology studies. The second part presents case studies which examine specific functional processes and mechanisms operating at the landscape scale. Part III explores how the structure of landscapes change according to the interactions of natural processes and human interventions. The fourth part looks at how the spatial configurations of landscapes are maintained by short- and longterm planning processes.

In the preface, Zonneveld and Forman state that "Gazing into the future is both hazardous and our responsibility. ... Society gradually ponders larger areas, such as the globe, and longer time frames, such as sustainability. We can no longer view a local ecosystem or land use in isolation from the vertical and horizontal configurations of the surrounding landscape mosaic." (p. vi.) The protection and preservation of artifacts in the realm of historic preservation is certainly a land-use pattern which affect the surrounding landscape, and in the case of urban or suburban historic districts even constitute the landscape.

One of the best aspects of this book is the definition and explanation of the different scales in which natural processes and and human activities aggregate. The foundation for the watershed and landscape as the smallest integral unit is well developed, and provides a point of departure where the HP community could focus its medium-scale efforts (i.e., medium in the sense that it contains the artifact scale, and is contained within regional / state / national scales of effort). The final chapter, "Sustainable Landscapes," discusses the minimal variables necessary for attaining ecological integrity while accommodating human aspiration over a time frame of several human generations (probably the most common temporal scale of most historic preservation effort?).

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While a book on spiritual aspects of modernism and postmodernism may seem an unlikely inclusion for a bibliography concerned with preservation, it is germane in that Spretnak traces the roots of the crisis of modernity and discusses how the wisdom traditions of various cultures can resolve the issues and form a direction for actions and practice. As HP seems to also be claiming value for cultural entities and artifacts - often despite current ignorance or disdain for those historical values, Spretnak's arguments form a context within which the preservation of historic artifacts (or landscapes) and sustainable development can mobilize, complement each other, synergize and grow.

This book complements Jerry Manders <u>In the Absence of the Sacred</u> (in this bibliography) by discussing the attitude of non-western, non-cartesian societies to their land and cultures with a comprehensive focus which Mander trades for broad scope. It critiques some of the same subjects as Mander's book, such as the nature of industrialism and the implications of unqualified patterns of growth, in detail.

The arguments are well-documented and the endnotes comprehensive. Two appendices provide overviews of deconstructive postmodernism and feminist view of decon. The section on related readings is (topically) keyed to the chapters. One of the dangers of preservation would seem to be the risk of trying to create a utopia, especially when advocating the preservation of ways of life, ecosystems, small towns, transportation systems, whatever. In the essay "A Non-Euclidean View of California..." Le Guin examines the nature of utopias and what we desire as individuals and cultures. She starts with Robert C. Elliotts *The Shape of Utopia* and notes that utopia (literally "nowhere") is not inhabitable (like myths or museums?) but is nonetheless an attempt to live in the Golden Age. LeGuin looks at pre -Anglo human culture in California, and notes that the people knew the land completely, and that knowledge is now lost. Milan Kunderas *Book of Laughter and Forgetting* is cited to show that what we fear about death (loss of historic entities?) is not the loss of the future or even the present, but the loss of the past - our memories and remembrances which help us know who we are.

LeGuin gathers such disparate threads and weaves them into this fine paragraph which seems to hold both promise, assurance and warning for both the designer and the preservationist:

"If utopia is a place that does not exist, the surely (as Lao Tzu would say) the way to get there is by the way that is not a way. And in the same vein, the nature of the utopia I am trying to describe is such that if it is to come, it must exist already."

LeGuin also refers to A.T Wrights *Islandia* (rf. in this Biblio) as an example of an ecologically -based human culture, a utopia which has implications for our own relation to the world. Other essays deal with the critical nature of language, and how we choose to use it in describing our relation to our world, thereby influencing our perception. (Again, the observation changing the nature of the observed, as Einstein might have said...)


The preservationist occupies a seat of moral judgment (see Sax's <u>Mountains without</u> <u>Handrails</u> in this bibliography) and Manders' concern here is not only with the preservation and survival of native peoples, and concurrent survival and preservation of ecosystems and systems of democracy and culture which have the potential to enable humans to live sustainably, but also the processes which endanger sustainable cultural practices and attitudes. Along with Charlene Spretnak's <u>States of Grace</u> (also in this bibliography), Mander tries to expose the attitudes which form the unsustainable development paradigm. While Spretnak provides the more comprehensive exploration of the present paradigms theoretical and philosophical roots, Mander chooses to focus broadly upon how those attitudes find application in destroying cultures.

Mander's book (and Spretnak's, to a lesser extent) is valuable to the preservationist because it succeeds in demonstrating that the struggle to protect a single structure, or a landscape, or a human and/or a natural ecosystem does not take place in a vacuum, but is part of a larger conflict between the industrial paradigm which began 300 -500 years ago, and is now running into limits of growth, and an emergent paradigm of sustainability.
