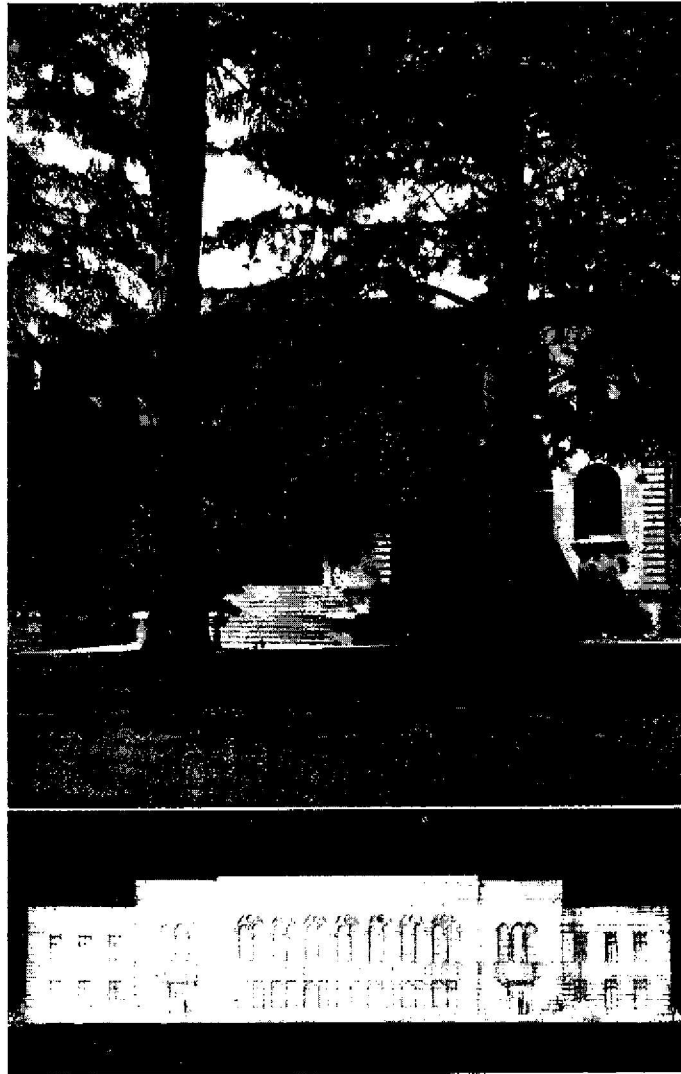

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## NEWS AND COMMENT

### **Library Approved at Last!**

Nothing short of winning a Pacific coast football championship could have created the elation and rejoicing that news of the approval of the University library project by PWA officials in Washington, D.C. brought to the campus this month.

The library situation on the campus has been a bugaboo for many years. The "Old Libe" has become more inadequate for University needs as the years have gone by. The legislature once voted \$500,000 for a new library, only to have the bill killed by gubernatorial veto. Then came the PWA. New hope, only to be beset with legal and financial entanglements. But not to be denied this new opportunity friends and people like Dean Gilbert, Burt Brown Barker, Dean Morse and a host of others, set out to overcome these difficulties, of which the news from Washington was the virtual culmination.

### **Campus Morale Improved**

The granting of funds for a new library has come at a time when not only the actual need for the building is acute but when the impetus of new construction and tangible display of progress has meant much to student, faculty and alumni morale. The last major construction project affecting the academic work on the campus was in 1924 when Condon hall was built. Since then there have been the dormitory, the art museum and McArthur court, although none of these directly affected the University proper in its stricter sense.

As far as the library itself is concerned, it will alleviate a situation that has been vastly detrimental to educational standards on the campus. Six scattered divisions as well as the main library will now be under one roof; valuable book collections will be much better protected; and library facilities and opportunities for study will be in-

creased and improved to meet the standards of modern educational methods.

Because the library is the heart of the University, used on the average once each day by every student, the new building will not only add to the material size and beauty of the campus, but will be a most important factor in improving standards and opportunities of education in Oregon.

Although final plans and contracts must be given approval before actual construction can start, the groundwork has been laid, the plans drawn, the site chosen. For this work the faculty library committee and Dean Ellis F. Lawrence of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts deserve much credit. The plans as outlined by this committee, are based on years of study both in regard to actual library needs

and in regard to future expansion of the campus as a whole. The state board needs only to effect the final papers, get their approval from Washington, D.C.—and then ground will be broken for Oregon's new and much-needed library.

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### **New Board Member**

One of the last official acts of Julius L. Meier, prior to his retirement as governor of Oregon, was to appoint his secretary, Beatrice Walton Sackett, to the State Board of Higher Education. She was appointed to fill the unexpired term of George N. McLeod of Portland, who had filed his resignation with Meier several months previously. Absence from the state was his reason for retiring from the board.

Meier's selection of Mrs. Sackett seems to be an excellent one. She is a daughter of one of Oregon's early governor's, and has served as secretary to a succession of her father's successors, retiring from this type of work on January 16 when Governor Martin took over the gubernatorial offices at Salem. Mrs. Sackett is the wife of Sheldon Sackett, astute editor of the *Salem Statesman* and publisher of the *Coos Bay Times* of Marshfield.

Because of her background in state affairs, because of her wide acquaintanceship with people of the state and state affairs, because of her natural sagaciousness and ability, and because of her fairness and intelligence, Mrs. Sackett should prove to be a most valuable and reliable member of the Oregon board of higher education.

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### **A.S.U.O. Expansion**

One of the most promising developments in student activity administration to take place on the Oregon campus in some time is the expansion program announced by the graduate manager's office this month.

This program involves the addition

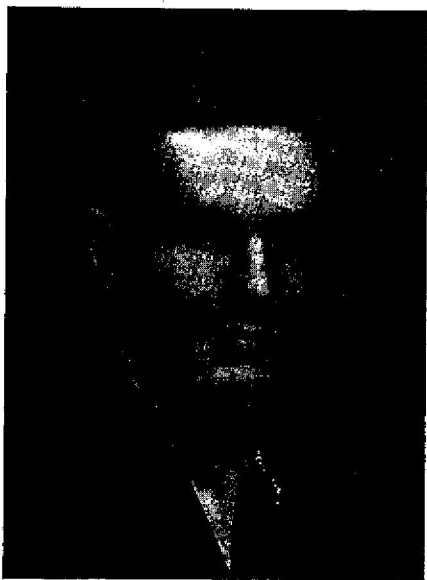
of Ralph S. Schomp, '35, as manager of general student activities under Hugh Rosson, and the placing of Tom Stoddard, former assistant to Rosson, in charge of all athletic relations of the University. Rosson, of course, retains his position as general manager of all student affairs, with Schomp and Stoddard under him.

The change presages better days and greater efficiency in the graduate manager's office.

Schomp comes to his new job fresh from an active career as an undergraduate, and brings with him an undergraduate point of view enhanced by a vital personality, imagination and drive. He has as his responsibility the direction and supervision of the *Emerald*, the *Oregana* and other student publications; the band and orchestra; the A.S.U.O. concert and lecture series; the handling of all ticket sales; supervision of class activities; canoe fete arrangements; and a myriad of lesser activities that go to make up the extra-curricular program of the student body.

By taking over these duties, Schomp relieves Stoddard of much office detail, leaving him free to devote his full time and energy to the enlargement and improvement of the athletic set-up and relations of the A.S.U.O. sports program.

The move on the part of the student governing body has been sorely needed for some time. The office of the graduate manager has been sadly undermanned for several years and though Rosson and Stoddard have done a re-

markable job under severe handicaps, the expansion will give them the opportunity that until now has held them back.

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### **Appreciative Alumni**

To many alumni, especially those who are unable to follow Oregon's football team on its trips during football season, word of the action of the members of the Pacific Coast Conference in voting to continue to allow broadcasting of football games next year is most gratifying.

During the latter part of last season and the period prior to the conference meeting there was much talk of the possibility of doing away with the

broadcasts next year. Alumni opinion was opposed, practically unanimously, to such a possible move. It is a rare alumnus, or football fan as far as that goes, who is able to see every game played by his favorite team during a season. The elimination of the broadcasts would not only be an aggravation to the fan, but would in all probability react to the detriment of the sport itself. Few persons prefer to listen to a game when actual attendance is humanly possible.

So, it is an appreciative alumni body that learns of the wise action of the conference. Undoubtedly, too, the retention of the broadcast arrangements continue to be an important factor in maintaining and stimulating interest.

### NEW LIBRARY

#### **Dreams Come True**

Oregon's dream of an adequate library for the University campus neared reality with President Roosevelt's approval of a construction loan and grant of \$350,000 from the public works administration. Announcement was made on January 16 from Washington, D.C.

Actual construction on the long-deferred project will commence following the clearing up of minor technical requirements, possibly within three months. The new library will be a three-story fireproof building, capable of housing the University's 250,000 volumes, and will mark the first major expansion of the institution's educational facilities since the erection of Condon hall in 1924.

The federal allocation brought successful termination to three years of unremitting effort on the part of Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of social science; President C. V. Boyer, Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the University, and Wayne L. Morse, dean of the law school, and others. Innumerable legal obstacles had stood in the way of approval for the project, which originally included plans for an infirmary to cost \$100,000.

#### **Site Chosen**

The site of the new library is the plot south and west of the Prince L. Campbell memorial fine arts museum on Kincaid street, according to announcement of the faculty library committee. Convenience for students and harmony with future campus construction plans determined the choice.

Plans for the building, as drawn a number of years ago by Ellis F. Lawrence, dean of architecture and allied arts, were made under a proposed appropriation of \$525,000, and will undergo revisions necessary to bring construction costs within the amount approved, which is \$175,000 below the original estimate. The addition of stack units as needed in future years will be made possible under the plans, administration officials state.

Rapid completion of the legal steps preliminary to actual construction has been promised. The state board of higher education will take up the project at its next meeting, scheduled for January 28, Willard Marks, chairman, announced. There was some indication that an earlier meeting might be called to hasten the work. The approval of contracts and the advertising and awarding of bids are expected in time for work to begin in early spring.

The approximate cost of labor and materials will be \$338,000, of which 30 per cent will be a grant. The balance of the loan will be secured by a deed of the site and a lease with an optional payment contract.

#### **Plans Progress**

University library facilities were given first recognition as hopelessly inadequate in 1926, when Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, then president of the University, sought funds for a new building from the state legislature. Both houses at Salem approved a sum of \$355,000 for construction, but financial stress and an unbalanced state budget moved Governor Patterson to veto the bill. Any hope of immediate con-

struction with state funds faded with the agreement by common consent of the legislature in 1929 to eliminate all outlays for building from the state budget.

The library continued to hold first place in the University's building program, and in 1932 the faculty committee turned its attention to the possibility of securing federal aid. The program of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation held out slight hope, but in 1933 the launching of President Roosevelt's PWA program prompted an application for the original figure of \$525,000.

### Obstacles Overcome

In November, 1933, the state advisory board for the PWA, comprised of Bert Haney, Robert Stanfield and Dr. James H. Gilbert, formally approved both the library and infirmary projects and sent them to Washington. Federal investigators questioned the power of the state board to levy fees for building purposes, an important financial consideration. The question was not finally cleared up until the special session of December, 1933, when full power to levy a building fee and to assign proceeds to the payment of bonds issued for building purposes was definitely conferred on the board. Oregon's PWA quota had, in the meantime, been exhausted.

For the second time legal questions were raised regarding the ability of a state institution to incur debt in excess of \$50,000, the constitutional limit on state indebtedness. Though the question had been settled in the McClain case involving the issue of bonds for the John Straub Memorial hall, the Washington authorities had overlooked the case's application to the projects before them.

### Projects Separated

When Wayne L. Morse visited the national capital last December, he found both projects under legal ban. He was granted a hearing, and for the first time the project plans, with the infirmary left out, reached the desk of Harold Ickes, PWA administrator. President Roosevelt's signature of approval followed within a month, and funds from unused allotments were assigned to the work.

During the months preceding acceptance, tireless efforts that kept the proposal in motion were made, in addition to University officials, by Representatives Walter M. Pierce, James W. Mott; Senators Frederick Steiwer and Charles L. McNary; Mrs. Cornelia Marvin Pierce, member of the state

board of higher education; A. C. Dixon, former Eugene resident, now lumber code authority in Washington, D.C.

### To Fill Real Need

The new library is expected to eliminate the haphazard, piecemeal housing of the University's present collection of more than 250,000 volumes. The "old libe," constructed in 1906, was meant to house 150,000 volumes, and the overflow of 100,000 volumes added since that time have been housed in annexes in six other buildings, including a general reserve in Condon hall, a bus-

ness administration reserve in Commerce hall, bound newspapers in the Press annex, architectural reading room, storage space in a residence on Onyx street and newspaper reference files in Friendly hall.

All of these departments will be brought under the one roof of the new main library. The plans call for a structure capable of housing 442,420 volumes, and for a working capacity of 365,360 volumes. In addition to capacity, the most up-to-date ideas in lighting and arrangement will be incorporated in the construction.

### STATE PLANNER

#### Parsons Heads Work

Social planning, a term that is rapidly achieving first-rank national importance, has received a large portion of its impetus in the state of Oregon through leadership provided by Dr. P.

A. Parsons, head of the University sociology department. For many years a pioneer in the field of public welfare research, Dr. Parsons has recently been recognized for his work by being named chairman of the Oregon planning council, a division of the Northwest planning commission which is a nationally organized body under Marshall Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal.

Under the guidance of Dr. Parsons, more than 300 citizens of Oregon have volunteered their services as members of 19 sub-committees. In addition to his co-ordinating function as general chairman, the sociology department head is chairman of the public welfare sub-committee. Other faculty men serving as chairmen are Dr. Alfred Powers, dean of extension division of state board of higher education, education; and Herman Kehrli, University bureau of municipal research, legislation.

#### Studies Public Welfare

When Governor Martin named his unofficial state planning committee in November, Dr. Parsons was given a prominent place in that citizen's group, being put in charge of the public welfare studies. Among the legislative enactments proposed to the present legislature by the group is the suggestion of the public welfare committee to establish a new department of public welfare, which would take control of institutions from the state board of control. The plan, though looked upon as a drastic proposal, has met the approval of such leaders as Frank Bane, director of the American Public Welfare association and adviser to Harry Hopkins, federal director of relief.

#### Active Career

Dr. Parsons was instrumental in setting up the University bureau of municipal research which, under the direction of Herman Kehrli, has aided Oregon cities in solving financial problems and in proposing tax and voting reforms during the past two years. He has been particularly concerned with the fight against the causes of poverty and crime, and for conservation of the state's natural resources.

Since he came to the University in

1920 as director of the school of social work, Dr. Parsons has been interested in state welfare problems. He served as director for five years, then as dean of the school of social work until 1929. In that year he was made dean of the school of applied social science. He came to Oregon from Syracuse university, where he was instructor and head of the same department he joined on his arrival.

In 1927 he was vice-president of the national conference of social work. In addition to his positions with various planning groups, he is a member of the Roadside council of Oregon, and a member of the Oregon child welfare commission.

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### Faculty Books

Books written by 18 University faculty members, including at least one full-length volume by each, were recently displayed at the library as an indication of the activity of instructors, aside from daily lectures. Subjects ranging from poems and music to science are dealt with and many of the works are nationally known, either as text books or for their literary value.

The display included "Campus Sonnets" by Ernest G. Moll, professor of English; "King of the Castles," an operetta in three acts by Mrs. Anne Landsbury Beck, professor of music; "The Valley of Lost Men," by Alice H. Ernst, associate professor of English; "The Craft of the Critic," by S. Stephenson Smith, associate professor of English.

"The Servant Problem and the Servant," by Mary Hallowell Perkins, professor of English; "The Novels of Ferdinand Fabre" by Ray Preston Bowen, professor and head of romance language department; "The Villian as Hero in Elizabethan Tragedy," by Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the University and head of the English department; "Philosophical Ideas in the United States," by Harvey Gates Townsend, professor of philosophy.

"Crime and the Criminal," by Philip A. Parsons, professor of sociology; "Operation of the Initiative, Referendum and Recall in Oregon," by James D. Barnett, professor of political science; "Student Life and Customs" by Henry D. Sheldon, professor of education and history; "A History of Oregon," by Robert C. 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### Newcomer O'Connell

A tall, dark haired, brown-eyed easterner, Kenneth J. O'Connell, is the latest addition to the faculty. He arrived from Wisconsin at the opening of winter term to take over the duties of Henry L. Everett who resigned because of ill health.

Legal experience as well as degrees of LL.B. and S.J.D. obtained at the University of Wisconsin in 1933 and 1934 qualify him for his new teaching role. He was formerly employed as a special assistant in the legal department of the Wisconsin tax department, then was appointed assistant counsellor for the Wisconsin emergency relief administration. He has also served as research assistant for the American Law Institute and at one time was with a private law firm in his home state. He taught for a short time under a teaching fellowship at Wisconsin.

His first regular teaching position has brought him far from his familiar environs, and when speaking of his impressions sums them up in these things—the cheapness of oranges, the greenness of Oregon grass, corduroy trousers, a general friendliness.

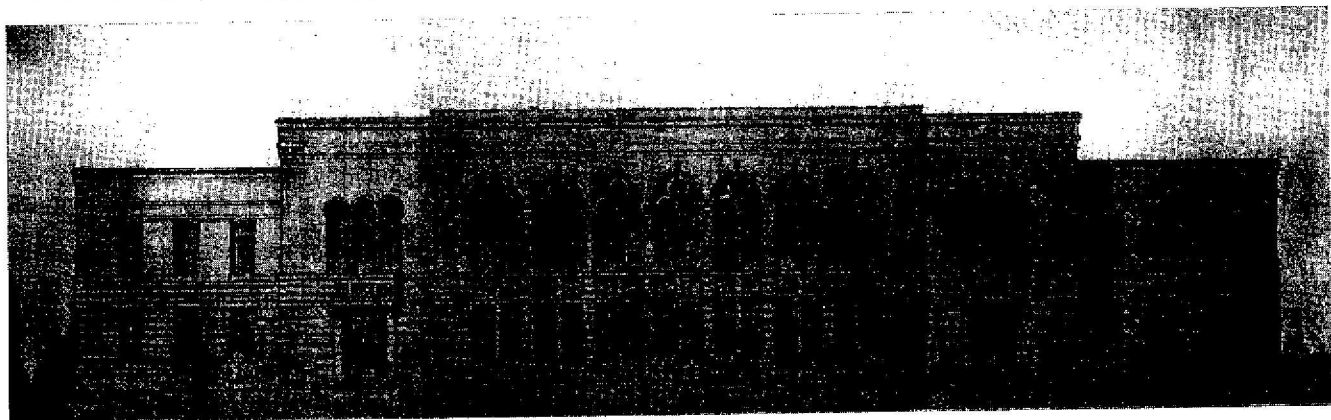

**Beaver Bites Duck**

Oregon's crafty basketball helmsman, Bill Reinhart, has been spending most of the third week of conference competition in renovating his squad, following the jarring setback received at the hands of the Oregon State Beavers on January 12. The "dark horse" Staters soundly drubbed the highly rated Webfoots, 47 to 18, booming themselves into undisputed leadership with three victories and shoving Oregon into second place with two wins and a single defeat.

In spite of the loss, Oregon followers were counting on a strong comeback in the two-game series at Moscow against Idaho, with whom the Ducks are tied for second place. Last season's combination was slow to develop, and the widely recognized quality of this season's material has led to continued optimism.

**Man-to-Man Debut**

Beaver Coach "Slats" Gill chose the opening Webfoot game and the notorious men's gym floor at Corvallis as the setting for shaking off every last vestige of his "percentage" and "zone"

Lacking all features of the rushing drive with which they won sensational second-half victories over Washington State during the previous week, the Oregon hoopsters played ragged, hesitant ball on the offense, and were repeatedly caught in flat-footed bewilderment on the defense. Orange counters flopped in from every conceivable angle, while Webfoot shots bounced away, whether howitzers or cripples. Oregon State scored repeatedly on lightning dashes under the hoop.

With Captain Bill Berg on the bench during most of the game with a leg injury, the Oregon team was unable to get a scoring combination under way, and continued to play ragged ball as a second-half rally failed utterly to materialize.

**Duck Rallies Win**

In two furious second-half rallies the Webfoot hoopmen turned to Coach Reinhart's old-time fast breaking style of play to win the opening brace of conference games over Washington State, January 4 and 5, in McArthur court. The rangy Duck crew went into the final periods of both games against 10-point leads but won by clear margins, 35 to 28 and 32 to 27.

Unusually slow in reaching playing form this season, the Duck quintet performed dismally in the first halves, but in the closing minutes displayed flashes strongly reminiscent of those famed Webfoot teams of 1924, 1925 and 1926 when championships were the order of the day.

Coach Reinhart unloosed his comeback secret at the start of the second canto of the initial game. He sent lath-like Bill Harcombe in at center to play the first varsity game of his life, and shifted his veteran center, Willie Jones, to his favorite forward post.

Washington State's half-time lead was 24 to 14, but the margin melted away before the driving onslaught of the towering Jones-Harcombe combination at close range, and the mid-floor fring of Sam Liebowitz and Bill Berg at the guard posts. The drive ended at the gun, after netting 21 points, as against four cheerless free throws chalked up by the closely guarded Cougars.

**Second Showing**

In the second contest, the Webfoots tantalized their followers by delaying their victory-bent rally until the final seven minutes, when the score stood 24 to 16 against them. At that point the entire Oregon lineup suddenly began to play driving, inspired basketball.

Harcombe on a fast break under the net scored on a lightning pass from Liebowitz. Willie Jones stole the ball in midcourt, and dribbled under the Washington State net at top speed to score another. Liebowitz a moment later swished through a high howitzer, bringing the count to 24 to 22.

Harcombe sank two foul shots, while Johnson sank one for the Cougars, and Willie Jones tied the score with a free toss. With a minute and a



half remaining, Oregon moved in front on a mid-floor heave by Liebowitz, and from that point the Webfoots ran it up to 32 before the gun.

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## FOOTBALL

### Ex-Ducks Fly High

When Oregon's gridiron great enter eastern professional football ranks, they make good. Six Webfoot stars have gone on to make their undergraduate training amount to something in a business way, and a seventh, Raymond "Butch" Morse, all-coast end for the past season, plans to maintain the tradition.

Offers from three professional teams, one of them the Chicago Cardinals which already vaunts three former Duck gridmen, are reported received by Morse, though he has made no announcement thus far beyond his decision to continue his football career.

Two Webfoots, Bill Morgan and George Christenson, captured the tackle posts on the all-American professional team for the past season, Oregon being the sole institution in the nation to place more than one former player. Morgan, who was Oregon captain in 1932, completed his second season with the New York Giants, national champions, with an exhibition of line play that rates him as possibly the greatest tackle ever developed.

Christenson has starred for several seasons with the Detroit Tigers, and last season was not only captain, but assistant coach as well. The Tigers finished a rung below the Chicago Bears in the western division. The huge linesman, while at Oregon, teamed with Austin Colbert as the much-feared "quarter-ton tackles," both of them completing their collegiate careers in 1930.

### Three From '33

Three Webfoot stalwarts from the 1933 coast conference co-champions have made their first season good with the Chicago Cardinals, coached by Paul Schissler, one-time Oregon State mentor. "Iron Mike" Mikulak maintained his reputation at fullback well enough to earn him all-American mention and the title of the professional league's best defensive fullback. Bernie Hughes and Bree Cuppoletti teamed successfully with Mikulak, each playing his old position at center and at tackle.

One other Webfoot, Johnnie Kitzmiller, Oregon all-time halfback, played one season in pro ranks. As a backfield man with the pace-setting New York Giants in 1931, he was acclaimed as the best "freshman" back in professional ball.

Seven former Webfoot heroes of the

gridiron will see action on the same field again when they don playing gear for the Rose Festival game scheduled in Portland for February 3. A squad of all-stars will oppose the New York Giants, professional league champions.

Two Duck stars of the past season, Butch Morse and Alex Eagle, and one

from the 1933 squad, Dutch Clark, will join three old-time team mates, Hughes, Mikulak and Cuppoletti as members of the all-star squad. Against them will appear another fellow-player, Morgan, who this time will be breaking up the smashing line plays of which he was once a vital part.

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### Honor Roll

Ninety-four students won places on the fall term honor roll, which requires a grade point average of at least 2.50 based on 12 or more term hours. The law school honor roll included 21 additional students.

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### Project Approved

An underground heating system for the campus will be constructed within a few months, as the result of approval given by the state emergency relief administration of an expenditure of \$46,000 for the work relief project.

The job calls for construction of two tunnels six feet wide by seven feet high. The University will contribute

\$2,000 in labor, \$2,000 in equipment, and will furnish \$12,000 in materials. The relief agency which can pay wages only will contribute \$30,000. The project will employ 100 men.

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### Music Set Is Gift

The world's finest music, ranging from complete operas to delightful, lighter compositions of the masters, is within the hearing of students and faculty, since the installation of a complete music reproduction set at the Music building in December. The gift of the Carnegie Corporation of New York, the set includes the latest Capeheart reproducing and repeating phonograph, 824 records, which include 260 musical scores, catalogues, 129 of the finest of books on music, and a filing cabinet, valued in all at more than \$2500.

The equipment reproduces from 16 to 13,824 cycles, assuring true musical tones over the entire range from the bass of the world's largest pipe organ to the topmost note of the piccolo. It

Brooke, who was picked from 14 Oregon contestants, was active as an undergraduate, having won his letter in swimming and having taken first prize in the Murray Warner essay contest.

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### Editor Goes East

Among 37 editors of college dailies in Canada and the United States to attend the organization meeting of the Intercollegiate Daily News association held at Washington, D. C., during the Christmas holidays was William Phipps, editor of the Daily Emerald. An uncensored college press is the principal aim of the organization.

High points of the conference included talks by President Roosevelt and Secretary Harold Ickes, and a hearing given to Jesse H. Cutrer, ousted from the editorship of the

Louisiana State university daily by Huey Long following an attempt to criticize the senator. In their addresses, the president and the secretary of interior urged that college newspapers be allowed to function without the interference of state politics.

Phipps was named a member of the executive committee, and was one of an official delegation to call at the White House.

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### Enrollment Holds Up

Student enrollment for winter term was expected to approximate 2,400, an increase of 17 per cent over the figure for one year ago. The increase is identical with that for fall term of this year.

A significant factor in the optimistic trend of enrollment figures is found in the grant of federal funds for student work. Under the FERA 300 students, an increase of 40 over last term, have been employed on numerous projects, ranging from landscaping to classifying of sociological data.

The federal government has allotted the University \$3,525 per month to pay for the student labor, and practically every department has taken the opportunity to carry on projects, long delayed for lack of regular funds.

Assignment of work is under the direction of Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel and a committee appointed by Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the University.

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### Digest Poll

Cooperating with the Association of College Editors and the Literary Digest, the Emerald will be one of 150 undergraduate newspapers to join in determining the attitude of American students with regard to war and peace. An individual questionnaire will be sent each student by the Literary Digest, and will be tallied in the same fashion as previous straw votes sponsored by the news weekly.

Five questions will be asked to determine personal convictions toward the bearing of arms for defense and invasion, the chances for neutrality, the building of an unexcelled naval and air force, government control of munition industries, universal conscription of men and resources, and entrance to the League of Nations.

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### Scribes Stand High

Seniors in journalism at the University of Oregon far outranked seniors and all other students in four other universities in a widely comprehensive contemporary affairs test given in November, it was indicated by returns

sent to Dean Eric W. Allen, of the journalism school, from the Cooperative Testing Service of the American Council on Education in New York.

The Oregon seniors made an average grade of 125, compared to 104 for seniors in the other universities.

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### Famed Musicians Booked

Three internationally famous musicians will appear on the campus during the winter term under the sponsorship of the Associated Students. An extensive program of lectures and concerts by university organizations is also listed for the winter months.

Jascha Heifetz, greatest living violin technician, is to open the A. S. U. O. series with a concert on Saturday evening, January 19. Josef Hoffmann, noted pianist, will follow with a concert on Sunday, February 10.

A return engagement of Roland Hayes, world-acclaimed negro tenor, has been announced for Thursday evening, February 28. Hayes' concert here last winter drew one of the largest crowds ever to attend a musical event in Eugene.

The lecture series will be headed by Will Durant, author, traveler and lecturer, who will speak on Thursday, February 14. Negotiations are under way to secure a number of others.

Free concerts by the University of Oregon symphony orchestra, band and polyphonic choir will be presented on dates to be announced later.
