



### University signs lease agreement to expand Portland programs

The University of Oregon announced May 4 that it has signed an agreement with White Stag Block, LLC, managed by Venerable Group, Inc., that will allow the university to relocate and expand its <a href="Portland Center">Portland Center</a> to the historic White Stag block.

"We are delighted to be expanding our Portland Center as demand has exceeded the capacity of our current center," said university President Dave Frohnmayer. "This new space will bring together our programs in a signature building in Old Town that will best serve our students, our alumni, and the people of Portland."

The university agreed to an 18-year lease for the White Stag building, located in Old Town Portland, and portions of two other historic buildings also situated on the White Stag block. With more than 66,000 square feet of available space, the new Portland Center will unite university academic programs in one place and allow the university to host lectures and other events. The center will include six classrooms, new event space for functions including up to 250 people, a new library presence for its architecture and journalism programs, a shared computer laboratory, and a new university book store/Duck Shop that will feature a café. It also will house administrative offices for 75 to 100 employees, including the university's study abroad program, AHA International.

"Ducks always make good neighbors," said Portland Mayor Tom Potter. "I'm glad the University of Oregon has committed to expanding their excellent programs in Portland. The university's commitment to maintaining a strong and expanded Portland presence is welcome news for Old Town and for our entire region."

Three buildings will be developed as a single complex in the downtown waterfront district, with each keeping its signature look. "Venerable plans to make an investment of approximately \$30 million in the White Stag block," said Art DeMuro, president of Venerable Properties. "All of this is made possible by the University of Oregon's need to consolidate and expand its programs in a distinctive place."

Earlier this year, the Portland Development Commission agreed to invest in developing the White Stag block. "Along with the relocation of the fire station, the University of Oregon's decision to renovate and reinvent the White Stag block sets the foundation for Old Town's renaissance as a magnet for activity and diversity for downtown Portland," said Bruce Warner, the commission's executive director.

The university's <u>journalism</u>, <u>architecture and allied arts</u>, and <u>law programs</u> are in strong demand among Portland-area professionals and prospective students. The School of

Journalism and Communication's <u>George S. Turnbull Portland Center</u> opened its doors earlier this year and began offering its Eugene-based students a Senior Experience, combining half-day internships with late afternoon classes in Portland this spring. Roundtable discussions bringing together working communications professionals to discuss the issues of the day are offered on a regular basis, and graduate seminars in strategic communication will begin this fall.

"The opening of the Turnbull Center earlier this year is a first step toward the realization of a long-held vision for the school," Tim Gleason, dean of the School of Journalism and Communication, says. "In Portland, we've seen a number of new and exciting ways in which we can serve students, working communications professionals and the Portland community. The design of the expanded Turnbull Center on the White Stag block is underway; once it is complete, the possibilities will increase exponentially."

The School of Architecture and Allied Arts has offered architecture and urban design courses in Portland for more than 25 years. Since 1998, its graduate program in architecture has been a centerpiece of the university's Portland Center. The school is known for the excellence of its cultural and fine arts, digital arts, historic preservation, planning, policy, and environmental design programs. The program in architecture includes more than 75 graduate and undergraduate students studying and working in Portland. Faculty and student urban design and planning projects are underway this spring throughout the whole of the West Coast.

"The School of Architecture and Allied Arts is ready for this exciting move into larger quarters as it aligns with our goals to more boldly and broadly engage our programs with Portland opportunities," said Frances Bronet, the school's dean. "We appreciate the partnership with the private sector which has joined with us to advance the university's objectives. Demand for access to the larger professional and cultural community is strongly felt by all of our school's disciplines."

The university anticipates opening the new Portland Center in January 2008.

The <u>Oregon Executive MBA Program</u> is a joint program of the University of Oregon, Portland State University, and Oregon State University. That program just moved to new facilities located at 200 SW Market Street and is not included in the planned move of the university's Portland operations.

The University of Oregon's current Portland facilities are located in a building it owns at 722 S.W. Second Avenue and elsewhere in the city in leased space.



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### Three professors win teaching awards

Crystal apples—symbols of teaching excellence—were awarded to three of the university's top teachers on May 11 and 12. The faculty members also will receive a one-time salary increase.

Ronald Beghetto, assistant professor of teaching and learning in the area of Teacher Education at the <u>College of Education</u>, received a 2006 Ersted Award for Distinguished Teaching. Regina Psaki, professor of Italian in the <u>Department of Romance Languages</u>, received the 2006 Thomas F. Herman Faculty Achievement Award for Distinguished Teaching. Tom Lininger, assistant professor of law in the <u>School of Law</u>, also received a 2006 Ersted Award for Distinguished Teaching.

The Ersted award recognizes excellence in teaching by faculty members early in their teaching careers. The Herman Award is given to faculty members who have demonstrated long-standing excellence in teaching at the university. Winners of each award are chosen on the recommendation of faculty members and students, and will receive a \$2,000 stipend added to their base salary.

University President Dave Frohnmayer delivered the crystal apples personally to each winner.

"The faculty members who win our Ersted and Herman Teaching Awards set the standards for our future," said Frohnmayer. "They exemplify our commitment to extraordinary teaching. Ronald Beghetto, Regina Psaki and Tom Lininger are absolutely dedicated to their students, their scholarship, and their calling as teachers. I am proud to be their colleague."

Beghetto's students marvel at the way he teaches his courses. They write that his courses are "a life changing experience," and that he is able to bring the world of the classroom to life through his interesting case examples and his remarkable learning exercises. Students also praise his warm personality, commenting on his ready availability for consultation and guidance. Beghetto embodies the very qualities he teaches, including personnel integrity, a sense of humor, a genuine desire to help students learn, as well as an appreciation for theory and research as a guide to professional practice.

<u>Psaki</u> also embodies the qualities of a good teacher, mentor, and scholar. A specialist in medieval Italian literature, Psaki teaches a broad range of graduate and undergraduate level courses. Her peers praise the excellence of her classroom teaching as a highly effective combination of insightful, detailed reading that opens difficult texts to wider questions of perspective and interpretation. She is recognized for her complete and unremitting dedication to the academic life of the department of Romance languages and a "laudable"

and "unfailing" commitment to her students.

Lininger is known as a teaching innovator and a demanding instructor who carefully hones the reasoning skills of his students and inspires critical thought. His classes are filled with "humor and passion" and he is described in student evaluations as simply outstanding. Lininger's national scholarly eminence, combined with his engaging teaching techniques, enables student participation in policy discussions and permits them to gain direct experience with law topics and issues.

The winners of the teaching awards will be recognized at spring commencement, set for 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 17, at McArthur Court.

### BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION

Joe A. Stone, Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, and W.E. Miner Professor of Economics, received a B.A. in 1970 from the University of Texas at El Paso, M.A. and Ph.D. from Michigan State in 1974 and 1977. He joined the UO faculty in 1979, and served as Senior Economist for International Trade on the Council of Economic Advisers during the Reagan administration.

### RESEARCH INTERESTS

Joe Stone has primary interests in labor and international economics. Current and recent projects include studies of the rising share of non-marital births in the US and the role of education, the influence of taxes and the composition of expenditures on state economic growth, performance incentives and student outcomes, the effectiveness of public and private schools and influences on the composition of public schools, the role of financial aid in college attendance, cyclical wage and employment adjustment in local labor markets, and the determinants of "intra-industry" international trade.

### **TEACHING**

Professor Stone is currently on an administrative assignment, but normally teaches classes in international trade and labor economics and large-lecture sections of introductory economics.

<u>Joe Stone</u>, dean of the <u>College of Arts and Sciences</u> since 1998, will step down as dean on June 30.

<u>Wendy Larson</u>, currently residing at Stanford University as a Stanford Humanities Center Fellow for 2005-06, has been <u>associate dean for the humanities</u> in the College of Arts and Sciences since 2002. Larson will become the college's interim dean on July 1.

Stone, a nationally recognized labor economist, will return to his role in the college as the W. F. Miner Chair in Economics.

"During his 13 years of leadership of the college, both as dean and associate dean, Joe has moved the arts and sciences forward in sometimes difficult financial times, providing leadership in the hiring of exceptional faculty and improving the college's overall quality," said Lorraine Davis, vice president for academic affairs. "As associate dean, Wendy also has demonstrated strong leadership ability. Her desire to build progressively on the college's high quality educational foundation is exemplified by her productivity as a scholar and her strong support of academic excellence."

Larson, a professor of East Asian languages and literature, holds a bachelor's and a master's degree from the University of Oregon and took her doctorate from the University of California at Berkeley.

<u>Linda Brady</u>, incoming senior vice president and provost, will have discussions within the college later this spring with regard to the next steps to be taken in the search for a permanent dean.

### RSS feeds added to the university's homepage

Visitors to the University of Oregon's homepage, <u>www.uoregon.edu</u>, now can find an easier way to keep track of university news and events.

A new link in the lower right corner of the homepage will take visitors to a page offering separate RSS, or Really Simple Syndication, feeds for the latest news about university people, programs, and activities, as well as for calendar listings of current and future events on the Eugene campus.

Visitors who have installed RSS news reader software such as NewsCrawler on Windows computers or NetNewsWire on Macintosh computers will be able to subscribe to these RSS feeds by clicking on links to them on the university's RSS feeds page. Platform-independent news readers such as NewsGator are available on the web. Currently, the UO Computing Center only supports RSS access through web browsers Opera and Firefox.

Firefox, which is the university's preferred web browser because it offers full functionality for the changing Flash-based features on the university's homepage, also allows visitors to create "live bookmarks" of RSS feeds. Firefox can be downloaded at no charge from <a href="https://www.mozilla.com/firefox">www.mozilla.com/firefox</a>.

Subscribers to the university's RSS feeds will receive updated news and event information as soon as it is posted on the homepage, rather than having to visit the page multiple times to check for changes and additions.





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# USGS Re-establishes the National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council

Reston, VA – The U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) announced today the re-establishment of the National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council (NEPEC) and the appointment of 12 scientists to the panel. The Council, which is conducting its initial meeting May 4-5 in Menlo Park, Calif., will advise the director of the USGS on earthquake prediction, forecasting and hazard assessment.

Earthquakes are one of the most costly natural hazards facing the nation, posing a significant risk to 75 million Americans in 39 states. As part of the multi-agency National Earthquake Hazards Reduction Program (NEHRP), the USGS has the lead federal responsibility to provide notification of earthquakes in order to enhance public safety and to reduce losses through effective forecasts based on the best possible scientific information.

NEPEC was re-chartered based on advice from the congressionally authorized Scientific Earthquake Studies

Advisory Committee, which provides oversight and guidance to the USGS Earthquake Hazards Program. The committee's 2005 report called for a re-chartered NEPEC, "to serve as the forum to review predictions and resolve scientific debate prior to public controversy or misrepresentation, so decision makers are not misled by unfounded short-term earthquake predictions." NEPEC was first established in 1976, formally authorized by Congress in the 1980 reauthorization of NEHRP, and remained active through the early 1990s.

"I am delighted that we are re-establishing the National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council," said P. Patrick Leahy of the USGS. "The Council is made up of well-respected scientists, and under the leadership of Chairman James Dietrich, will be counted on to provide objective, credible analysis and opinions."

NEPEC members include: James Dieterich, University of California, Riverside, chair; David Applegate, USGS, vice chair; Goran Ekström, Harvard University; William Ellsworth, USGS; David Jackson, University of California, Los Angeles; Barbara Romanowicz, University of California, Berkeley; Bruce Shaw, Columbia University; Wayne Thatcher, USGS; Jeroen Tromp, California Institute of Technology; Ray Weldon, University of Oregon; Robert Wesson, USGS; and, Mary Lou Zoback, USGS. Michael Blanpied, USGS, will serve as executive secretary.

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

Ray Weldon named to National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council

<u>Ray Weldon</u>, professor of <u>geological sciences</u>, is one of 12 U.S. scientists named to the U.S. Geological Survey's (USGS) <u>National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council</u>.

The council will advise the USGS director on earthquake prediction, forecasting, and hazard assessment. <u>USGS</u> is the lead federal agency charged with providing notification of earthquakes in order to enhance public safety and reduce losses through effective forecasts based on the best possible scientific information.

Weldon, who heads the university's <u>Neotectonics Research Group</u>, also serves on the working group for California Earthquake Probabilities. The group is producing the California seismic map that will be released in 2007, and will establish the methodology for the next National Hazard Map, due to be released in 2008. These maps are used for many purposes, including setting building codes and insurance rates.

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



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Ruhl Lecture



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
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Thursday, May 25, 4:00 p.m. Ann Marie Lipinski, senior vice president and editor of the Chicago Tribune.

For nearly half a century, Pulitzer Prize-winner Robert W. Ruhl was one of Oregon's respected newspaper journalists. Ruhl, who died in 1967, was editor and publisher of the *Medford Mail Tribune*.

He performed his duties with a high sense of responsibility to the public and with uncompromising ethics. In one instance, he wrote a series of editorials against a government reform group that was inciting unrest in the area. The paper's editorials won the 1934 Pulitzer Prize for disinterested and meritorious public service.



The concept of an annual Ruhl Symposium grew out of this directive. The Symposium brings to campus a distinguished American journalist who delivers a public lecture on an issue of significance for contemporary journalism. A fellowship program is a complementary part of the Symposium. Each year, the fellowship brings accomplished journalists to the School. During their visits, they lecture, write, and talk to students and faculty.

The Ruhl Lecturers and Fellows have helped the School of Journalism and Communication achieve Mrs. Ruhl's expressed hope that the Symposium would contribute to "the development of students into dedicated journalists. I feel it is especially important today that we restore in this field of journalism a greater sense of ethics, responsibility, and dedication."






Dr. Larson replaces Professor Russ Tomlin, who served in the position from 1996 to 2002 and will return to the linguistics classroom after a research sabbatical. Larson has been teaching modern Chinese language, literature, and film at the university for

over sixteen years, a tenure which includes research leaves in Denmark, Beijing, and Berkeley.

Educated at UO and UC Berkeley, she has published many articles, books and translations on topics ranging from the modernist Chinese novel to the concubine in literature. Her most recent book, *Women and Writing in Modern China*, was published by Stanford University Press in 1998.

"Wendy has been a prominent member of the UO faculty since 1985," says Dean Joe Stone. "She's served the university in a variety of capacities, as an advisor and board member to the Humanities Center, the Women's Studies Program, the Center for Asian and Pacific Studies, and the Asian Studies Program, among other groups on campus. The college and the humanities are fortunate to have her leadership."

Though Larson says that her undergraduate days at the university seem "like a lifetime ago," she believes the campus has become a home to her continued academic and professional growth. "I'm happy to have the opportunity to dedicate my energies to this new role," she says.

# University of Oregon names Dr. Linda P. Brady senior vice president, provost

North Carolina State dean to serve as the university's chief academic officer

EUGENE--(Dec. 5, 2005)--Dr. Linda P. Brady, dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at North Carolina State University, has been chosen to serve as the next senior vice president and provost at the University of Oregon. She will assume her new duties July 1.

Dave Frohnmayer, University of Oregon president, selected Dr. Brady to replace Dr. John Moseley, who will retire on June 30, 2006, after serving as provost for 12 years.

"I am very pleased Dr. Brady has accepted my offer to serve as the university's next provost," said Frohnmayer. "Her academic qualifications, administrative experience and leadership skills make her exceptionally well qualified to assume this important position. Dr. Brady will, as the chief academic officer, lead our efforts to further enhance our stature as one of the premier public research universities in the country."

"I am honored to have been selected for this important position," said Brady. "The University of Oregon is recognized as an excellent AAU (Association of American Universities) public research university, and I am thrilled to have the opportunity to help lead this flagship institution. As the senior vice president and provost, I will work tirelessly to promote academic excellence and the academic vision for the university. This is a time of great challenge, and great opportunity, in public higher education, and I look forward to working with my new colleagues to help strengthen the university's teaching, research and service mission," she added.

Dr. Brady has served as dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences and professor of political science at North Carolina State since July 1, 2001. A noted scholar in the field of international negotiations and arms control, she led the Sam Nunn School of International Affairs at the Georgia Institute of Technology from 1993 to 2001, where she also served as a professor of international affairs. She has been a distinguished professor of national security at the United States Military Academy and a senior fellow in international security and arms control at The Carter Center of Emory University. From 1978 to 1985, Dr. Brady held several positions in the U.S. Department of State and the Department of Defense. She served as a political analyst in the state department's Office of Disarmament and Arms Control and was special assistant for mutual and balanced force reductions in the defense department during the Carter administration.

A native of New York City and the first member of her family to attend college, Dr. Brady graduated from Douglass College, the women's division of Rutgers University, in 1969 with a degree in political science. She received her master's degree in political science from Rutgers in 1970, and her doctorate in political science from The Ohio State University in 1974. She has published in the fields of American foreign policy, international negotiation and arms control. Her current research focuses on the role of negotiation in war termination.



#### What is RSS?

RSS stands for "Really Simple Syndication". RSS feeds are free content feeds from websites that contain article headlines, summaries, and links back to full-text articles on the web.

#### What tools do I need to use RSS?

To subscribe to an RSS feed you will need two things, an RSS reader (also known as a news reader or aggregator) and the URL (web address) of the RSS feed you wish to subscribe to.

Some commonly used news readers are Feed Demon, NewsCrawler, and Awasu for Windows. NetNewsWire, Newsfire, and Shrook can be used for Macs. For those who like web-based readers there's Bloglines, My Yahoo!, and NewsGator. Currently, the UO Computing Center only supports RSS access through web browsers Opera and Firefox (see "What Are Those Little RSS or XML Tags on Web Pages?" below).

#### How Do I Subscribe to the UO's RSS feeds?

Once you have an RSS reader installed, right-click (or control + click on Mac) the link below of the news feed you want to subscribe to and copy the URL. Then paste the URL into the reader as a new feed (your reader will have instructions on how to do this).

#### What are Live Bookmarks?

Mozilla Firefox has a feature called Live Bookmarks that allows you to see the item titles ("headlines") of an RSS feed in your
bookmarks. Instead of constantly checking webpages for changes and additions, a Live Bookmark delivers updates to you as
soon as they are available.

#### How do I add RSS feeds as Live Bookmarks in Firefox?

To add an RSS feed as a Live Bookmark, look for one of these icons or to the right of the address bar in Firefox 1.5 (earlier versions will have the icon in the lower right corner of the browser window). Click the icon and select a feed from the list that appears. The Add Bookmark dialog will appear allowing you to choose where to save the RSS feed bookmark. Go to the RSS feed in your bookmarks to see all the latest headlines for that feed. Select a headline to jump to a story.

During the regular term, those hours are: Monday-Thursday 9 ammidnight; Friday 9am - 7 pm; Saturday 11 am - 7 pm; and Sunday 11 am - midnight. For service outside of these hours, try the **L-net virtual reference service**.

If you are using a shared computer in a library or lab, or do not wish to download and install Instant Messenger software on your computer, you may use web-based chat services at <u>AIM</u> <u>Express</u> or <u>MSN Web Messenger</u>. These allow you to create a screen name and to chat, without downloading any software.

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# **Borrowing Policy**

Faculty, staff and students who are currently employed or enrolled at the University of Oregon may borrow materials from the collections of the UO Libraries. People who live in Oregon and who are over 16 may borrow from the UO Libraries through the **Oregon Card Program**. Current faculty, staff, and students from Orbis Cascade Alliance schools and Northwest Christian College have borrowing privileges through reciprocal lending agreements. This statement informs borrowers of their privileges and responsibilities. Borrowers agree to abide by library policies when they use the collections.

#### LOAN PRIVILEGES

- **General Material** includes most books and software in the circulating collections.
  - o UO graduate students and UO faculty may check out general material for six months.
  - Honors College seniors and other departmental honors seniors working on term long research projects may check out general materials for one term.
  - All other borrowers may check out materials for three weeks.
- **Restricted Materials** have loan periods which vary from two hours to 14 days. Restrictions may apply to some borrowers. All borrowers are subject to overdue fines. Restricted items accrue fines until they are returned to the service desks from which they were checked out.
- Reserve Materials have shortened loan periods (between two hours and seven days). Some material may be used only in the library. A maximum of three reserve items may be checked out to one borrower. Material must be returned by the due date/time specified, and overdue fines apply to faculty, students, and all other borrowers. Reserve items accrue fines until they are returned to the service desk from which they were checked out.
- **Non-Circulating Material** includes, but is not limited to, reference collections, rare books, and historical maps. Unbound periodicals are non-circulating at most library locations. Bound periodicals are considered restricted materials and circulate to UO faculty, students and staff.

#### Recalls:

General material will be recalled for anyone who needs an item currently checked out to another borrower. Materials are subject to recall at any time. Borrowers will be notified if materials have been recalled from them. The overdue fine for recalled material is \$3.00 per item per day.

#### Renewals:

General material may be renewed once. Borrowers may renew their own books through their <u>patron</u> <u>record</u> (library account) available in the UO Library catalog or by telephoning (541) 346-3065. If material is still needed after one renewal it must be taken to a checkout desk and checked out again (recharged).

All restricted material, reserve material, and material not checked out through the electronic circulation system must be renewed or recharged at the service desk from which it was checked out.

#### Oregon Card Program:

## Participants in the **Oregon Card Program**:

- may have up to ten items checked out at any given time
- may have up to five items checked out from specific restricted collections
- may place up to ten holds on items at any given time

Records will be blocked if card holders owe more than \$100 in fines and fees, or if they have overdue items which have been recalled for use by another borrower.

#### **BORROWERS' RESPONSIBILITIES**

Borrowers are responsible for material checked out in their names. Overdue fines are charged to encourage prompt returns and to ensure access to the collections for other borrowers.

No one may use another person's ID card or number, or library card to gain access to library resources.

It is the responsibility of each borrower to maintain a current mailing address, telephone number, and e-mail address in university records.

Borrowers should inform the Library if their I.D. cards or library cards are lost or stolen.

It is the responsibility of the borrower to note the time or date that material is due. Overdue notices are sent as a courtesy. Failure to receive these notices does not remove the borrower's obligation to return material by the due date or the recall due date, nor does it constitute grounds for reducing a borrower's fine. If a borrower plans to be out of town, s/he should return borrowed items or arrange with someone to receive notices and return recalled material. The libraries are open during intersessions to serve the needs of patrons who remain on campus: recalled items may be due any time the libraries are open.

Any borrower who fails to return library material in a timely manner or returns it in damaged condition will be charged lost book fees or repair charges, plus any accrued fines, plus a \$15.00 service charge per item.

The Library reserves the right to deny borrowing privileges based upon just cause.

The University of Oregon Libraries' general philosophy is to protect the privacy of its readers. Library staff are not authorized to release information to the public or outside agencies without clearance from the University Counsel. If the user has signed a confidentiality waiver, his/her name may be given to another borrower who is requesting the whereabouts of a specific title.

Oregon Revised Statutes, <u>Chapter 192.502 (22)</u> Other public records exempt from disclosure: "The records of a library, including circulation records, showing use of specific library material by a named person or consisting of the name of a library patron together with the address or telephone number, or both, of the patron."

# New Library Service Offers Item Check-Out at the Branch of Your Choice

UO students, faculty, and staff using the <u>UO Libraries</u> can now request that materials shelved in one branch library be delivered to another branch for check-out.

To use the service, first search for and locate the item in the <u>library catalog</u> and then click the Request Item/Place Hold button. After entering the required information, use the Choose a Pickup Location dropdown menu to select the library where you would like the item delivered. Delivery can take between 1 and 4 days, depending on the mail route. *Note:* You may not have the item "delivered" to the same library in which it is shelved; in this case, you will need to retrieve material from the shelves yourself.

General collection materials in all libraries within the UO Libraries system—Knight, Architecture and Allied Arts, Law, Science, Math, Oregon Institute of Marine Biology in Charleston, and the Portland Architecture Library—may be requested through the delivery program. In addition, items that are checked out may also be placed on hold and requested for delivery to another branch upon their return.

The new service is for UO students, faculty, and staff only.





Tide Gauge Map



Selected for their gifts to Oregon's built environment, be they professional, educational, artistic, philanthropic, or public service, AFO's Honored Citizens are feted and celebrated at a dinner in their honor featuring former AFO Board member and Master of Ceremonies Extraordinaire Jeff Gianola. Contributions to Oregon's built environment have been recognized and celebrated by the Architecture Foundation of Oregon since its first Honored Citizen dinner in 1993. Public officials, architects, landscape architects, artists and philanthropists have been spotlighted for their unique and valuable contributions to our architectural heritage. In 2005, AFO asked the question, "What really sets Oregon's built environment apart from other places?" New Yorker Magazine writer Tony Hiss answers this way: "It's a spectacular setting for human settlements, one in which rugged grandeur and easy living are both givens - as if Alaska had the climate of England." And while AFO is focused on Oregon's rich architectural environment, it is clear that as our population continues to dramatically increase, the natural environment in which we are building is as important to maintaining our treasured built environment as are urban planning and architectural design. The 2005 Honored Citizen tribute went to a renowned urban naturalist who lives and works in our midst - Mike Houck, Founding Director of The Urban Greenspaces Institute and Urban Naturalist for the Audubon Society of Portland. Dedicated to maintaining habitats for wildlife in our urban areas, Mike Houck has maintained a vigilant and vocal crusade for more than 20 years. During that time, his work has grown from a focus on environmental issues to a broader advocacy for a wide range of important urban and natural resources for the region. He has advocated for affordable housing, a rational metropolitan transportation system, the restoration of urban waterways, and a strong urban wilds system. Mike helped to found the Coalition for a Livable Future, now a 60-member organization of groups working for a sustainable metropolitan region. He was awarded a 2004 Loeb Fellowship at the Harvard School of Design to



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
