ANY BONDS TODAY?

The University of Oregon may set the pace for more than 1,000,000 students in universities and colleges all over the United States if a campaign outlined by Don Walker and Phil Lowry, law students, receives a final okay in Washington, D. C.

Gov. Charles A. Sprague of Oregon and E. Palmer Hoyt, head of Oregon defense bond sales, gave their hearty approval of the plan when it was presented to them, and they have sent it to the capital for possible acceptance in every higher institution in the nation.

The "campaign" has already been put into practical operation on the campus and definitely raises bond sales from the "charity" status to that of full value received in the way of dances, carnivals, and other attractions, which are being offered to the students.

COLLEGE AND THE DRAFT . . .

Registration for winter term showed a decrease of 13% over that of the previous year, according to figures released by Clifford Constance, assistant registrar. Slightly over 3,000 students crowded through registration lines, as women practically "held their own" with 1941 while men dropped off considerably.

NO MORE GERLINGER ASSEMBLIES . . .

"Further Assemblies in Gerlinger Banned" blazed Emerald headlines January 16. A large front page story explained that the building had been condemned for further use as an assembly hall because of the narrow stairways which could cause tragedy in case of fire or other war panic. Dances and limited other functions will still be carried on in the building.

THEY'RE STILL HERE . . .

ROTC juniors and seniors are still marching their duty on the "mud flats" in back of the Igloo. Possibilities are that these classes will remain at least until June. Meanwhile, Oregon continues instruction in Civilian Pilot Training, though how long this will last, nobody knows.

MORE HONORS . . .

Dean Wayne L. Morse of the law school received another national appointment from President Franklin D. Roosevelt last month when he was named as member of a 12-man war labor board to adjust labor disputes.

NO MORE BIG-TIME MUSIC . . .

And on top of all other national defense provisions, "big-name" bands have been banned from the University campus. They "cost too much" and take too much extra student time which might be put into studies, the committee said in handing down the decision.

Luman Gets Promotion

Robert D. Luman, '41, Etna, Cal., is one of nineteen flying instructors at Cochran Field, Macon, Georgia to be promoted from the rank of second lieutenant to first lieutenant, temporary, air forces of the army, according to press releases from the army.

Directors to Meet Here February 13-14

Directors of the University of Oregon Alumni association will meet on the campus February 13-14 for their annual winter conference, it was announced this month by Harris Ellsworth, '22, newly elected president of the association. The directors' meeting will coincide with the Dads' Day celebration.

Already many directors have signified their intention of being present for the meeting, which promises to be one of the most important in recent years, according to Alumni Secretary Elmer Fansett, '28. Exact details of the program have not as yet been completed, but several aspects of alumni relationship to the University and the University program will be discussed, Fansett said.

Dr. Donald M. Erb will discuss the University's advancement and also the campus defense program and directors will have an opportunity to ask questions or make suggestions on the University program. The sessions also will include a discussion by Orlando J. Hollis, '26, Pacific Coast conference representative, of the athletic program, with particular emphasis on the future of athletic competition during the war.

Cecil C. Snyder, '31, acting director of the news bureau, will outline some of the work of that office and also will answer questions and discuss suggestions for furthering the work of the bureau. One or more of the coaches will talk on the athletic setup and future.

Saturday night the directors will join Oregon dads as guests of the University and the athletic department at the Oregon-Oregon State basketball game.

Is Defense Key Man

Jack H. Stipe, '32, formerly of Portland and more recently with the Community Service Society in New York City, has been appointed regional field representative for the volunteer offices section of the office of civilian defense for New York, New Jersey and Delaware, according to word reaching here. The post calls for advisory work with local defense councils in those three states.

Stipe also has held several important positions in Oregon, including administrator of the Clatsop County Public Welfare commission and field representative for the Oregon State Public Welfare commission in Portland.

On the campus he was very active in politics, was president of the sophomore class, a member of Friars and the National Collegiate Players group.

IT IS often deplored that the fatherly friendship which is built up during the early years of family life is disrupted in part by the interruption of college life. The dads are far away, in many cases, and the student enters into a new environment. But a living refutation to this argument is the annual Dads' Day celebration at the Oregon campus.

Every year fathers of Oregon students receive letters from their student-offspring inviting them to appear on the campus for the annual festivities and every year hundreds of Dads arrive to inspect the campus and to get an insight into the life that their sons and daughters are now living.

Set for February 13, 14, and 15, the Dads this year will be welcomed by a beautiful hostess, the Valentine Girl. An innovation over previous years, the official sweetheart will take a definite part in welcoming all Dads.

Most fathers coming to the campus desire entertainment and have an active interest in the sports events at the University. A swimming meet at the men's pool between Oregon and Washington will probably decide the Northern Division Dual Meet Championship. This meet will take place directly after the luncheon Saturday afternoon at John Straub Memorial Hall. In the evening at McArthur Court will be played the basketball game between Oregon and Oregon State, always a highly interesting game to the visiting Dads.

A highlight of the 1942 meet of the Dads will be the biennial election at a mass meeting Saturday. Present officers are Joseph Riesch, Portland, president; William M. Tugman, Eugene, vice-president; and Ed F. Averill, Portland, secretary.

Chester Fisher Honored

A certificate of life membership in the American Society of Civil Engineers was recently presented to Chester C. Fisher, '03, Salem, at the association's annual meeting in Portland. Graduated with a B.S. degree in 1903, he also received a civil engineering degree in 1912.

Fisher has been with the United States

bureau of reclamation for 30 of the 38 years since his graduation. At present he is engineer in charge of Willamette valley irrigation investigations for the bureau. He also has established a reputation as an irrigation expert in work in the states of Idaho, Arizona, and Washington.

The Oregon graduate has spent more than five years in foreign countries including work on power investigations in Mexico and as irrigation consulting engineer for the Soviet Republic. He has been a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers for 30 years.

In 1912 Fisher married Carrie M. Kerr, and they have two children, Eugene Kerr and Edna Blanche. The latter now is a student at the University, where she is majoring in music and is a member of Phi Beta, music honorary.

Swimming Star Dies In Parachute Leap

First Lieut. James O. Reed, '39, a member of the crack Oregon swimming teams of 1934-35-36, was killed January 22 when his parachute failed to open after he had bailed out from a plane at Chanute field, Ill.

The jump was the second Reed had ever made. His first was in October, 1939, when he was on his way to a University Homecoming. That time he landed safely in the woods on the McKenzie, east of Eugene.

Reed set a national collegiate swimming record in 1935 in the individual medley, which stood until last year. He was also Pacific Coast collegiate backstroke champion.

Smith In Technical Corps

Harry C. Smith, '39, is among the Americans to volunteer for the Civilian Technical corps assigned to Great Britain, it has been learned here. This is a technical, highly specialized non-combatant group which will aid the British in setting up and keeping in repair equipment sent by America.

At present Smith is in Toronto, but expects to be sent to England in a short time. Two tough examinations, technical and physical, must be passed before the applicant is eligible for the corps. 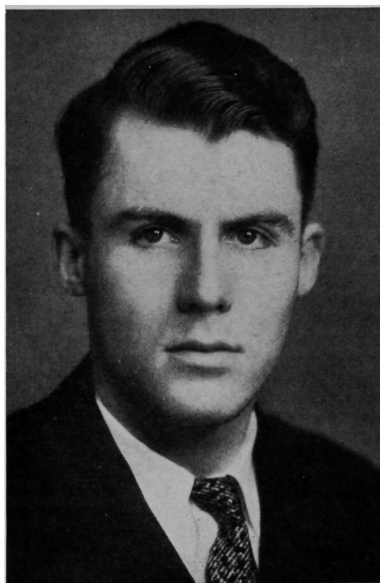

Oregon's "Men in White" Become "Men in Khaki"

"Give us doctors, more doctors, good doctors" is the plea of the government in a time of war emergency and the University of Oregon Medical school, home of some of the nation's finest men in white, is cooperating to its fullest extent. Oregon's Marquam Hill staff has gone "all out" for victory and is meeting the problems as they come. At the right is the school's diligent and resourceful leader, Dean Richard B. Dillehunt.



THE University of Oregon Medical school has gone "all out" for victory. Medicine's "men in white" are fast becoming "men in khaki" as the government constantly repeats "Give us doctors, more doctors, good doctors."

The Portland school will cooperate to the fullest extent in supplying doctors—good doctors—in the fastest time possible. But in so doing there are problems aplenty which the administration is now busy solving.

The school is adopting a plan to lop a year off the regular four-year course to provide more war-time physicians. The program calls for first-year medical students to begin their courses about June 15 instead of next autumn as is customary. Vacations will be cut to a minimum, placing the school on a 12-month calendar year.

And there's problem No. 1. According to Associate Dean David W. E. Baird, 80 per cent of Oregon's medical students depend on summer employment to help finance their school year. With vacations out, who's going to pay the student's tuition?

Dr. Baird has contacted the national chairman of the committee on medical preparedness who advises that so far no government subsidies for students have been arranged. But he's hopeful about the prospects of obtaining such federal assistance.

Standards will be kept high, Dr. Baird emphasizes. "We're combining four years' work into three to help speed up the output of doctors," he says, "but there'll be no reduction in the standards of instruction or the content of the medical course."

"THE acceleration of the medical course will help provide more physicians during the next few years for the military and civilian needs of the country. It is a move on the part of the universities, colleges and medical schools of the nation to do their part in the national emergency."

It is estimated the plan will graduate 5000 more physicians in the next three years than heretofore.

Will there be deferment of pre-med students to insure the usual enrollment in medical colleges? That's problem No. 2.

Indications are the answer will be "yes." Major C. J. Parker Jr., deputy director of the national selective service, advises Dr. Baird: "It is of paramount importance that the supply of students to medical schools

be not only maintained, but encouraged to grow and that no student or interne who gives reasonable promise of becoming an acceptable medical doctor be called to military service before attaining that status."

Draft boards, which have the final say, are cooperating in the request to defer doctors-to-be.

Problem No. 3: Will arts colleges accelerate their programs so that entering classes in medical college will be of usual size?

Fifteen Northwest colleges and universities, from which the Portland center obtains its students, have been contacted and in practically every instance they have replied that they are arranging to speed up the pre-medical curriculum.

No. 4: What will be the attitude of state licensing boards toward graduates and internes who have come through accelerated programs?

THIS matter has been taken up with the Federation of State Boards by the committee of the Association of American Medical Colleges. A national policy is being worked out and probably a suitable change will be made to accommodate the medical student going through a streamlined course.

Problem No. 5: What financial help will be required for the departments in the medical schools to go on an accelerated program?

Naturally it will require much more money to finance instruction which heretofore has been on a 9-month basis and which will be placed on a 12-month basis. And more materials and expenses will be needed each year.

The government may not have yet worked out plans for helping young medics with their finances but it has provided

MEET OUR ALUMS

Outstanding in the field of education, James K. Hall, '26, has risen in background and experience until today his word on public utilities and public finance is recognized and respected throughout the United States, says OLD OREGON Assistant Editor Ray Schrick, '43, in this article on another prominent Oregon alum. A leader in his field, Hall has constantly stressed the importance of study of the social sciences.

"NEVER before has there been such a need for men and women who are thoroughly grounded in the essentials of this (the social science) discipline. In public and in private life, as a public official, business man, or citizen, an appreciation and a good understanding of economic and social forces and processes have become so significant that the future of organized society is largely dependent upon the soundness of our individual and collective judgements as they relate to these considerations."

Nearly two years ago, James Kendall Hall, '26, addressed this message to students of the University of Oregon, a University and world that was then at peace. Today, his statement, that as an authority in the field of economics, seems even more true than ever before.

James K. Hall received his B.A. degree from Oregon in 1926, and that same year received his M.A. Three years later, at Stanford university, he fulfilled requirements for a Ph.D. Since that time, as an author, lecturer, and student of economics he has risen in background and experience till today his word on public utilities and public finance is recognized and respected throughout the United States.

We must ever increase our knowledge of economics and social science, Mr. Hall has often said, and we must keep in mind, as never before, the need of "logical thought, acute analysis, and the objectives of scholarship."

Mr. Hall was for some time instructor in citizenship at Stanford, then in 1930 began teaching at the University of Wash-

ington. In 1934, he was raised to the position of Professor of Public Utilities and Public Finance.

At the time Mr. Hall graduated from Oregon in economics, the University did not even have a College of Social Science. His economic education was received in the College of Literature, Science, and Arts, and it wasn't until 1932 that a regular College of Social Science was established.

Fishing and hunting are Mr. Hall's fondest outdoor sports. Though he spends long hours in study and the classroom, he still finds time to take a frequent trip to the mountains. In fact, travelling is almost his favorite pastime.

One of Mr. Hall's early articles on public utilities appeared in the June, 1931 issue of the National Municipal Review. This discussion was entitled "Washington's Public Ownership District Power Bill"

and reviewed the relative merits and demerits of a then-new law which would inject competition into the monopoly of rural electrification. The bill had authorized establishment of municipal corporations to compete with the monopoly companies.

Other articles which Mr. Hall has written include "Incidence of Federal Social Security Pay Roll Taxes." This discussion appeared in the Quarterly Journal of Economics in November, 1938.

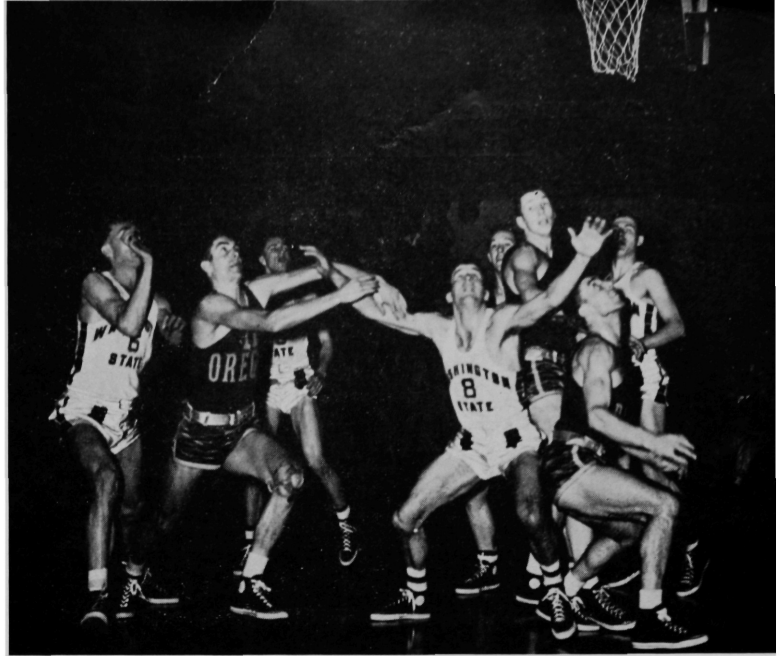

Webfoot Basketball Stock Advances

Rated out of the championship contender class and recognized by sports authorities only as the "mystery team" of the conference, Oregon's 1942 hoop aggregation has fared well in early season play, trading blows with Washington State and Washington and dumping the title-favored Beavers in a thrilling 47 to 45 battle. THE complicated coast conference football campaign of last fall, which was not settled until the last week-end of the season, has carried over into the current northern division basketball race.

After the opening three weeks of play four of the league's five teams were blanketed within a game and a half, and the fifth member, Idaho, still has an outside chance at the title.

The surprise of the 1942 race unquestionably has been Howard Hobson's University of Oregon quintet. Given little or no consideration as title contenders before conference play started, the Webfoots so far have defeated all three of the pre-season favorites, Washington, Washington State and Oregon State.

The game which established the fiery Webfoots as definite championship contenders was the 47 to 45 thriller with Oregon State on January 24, at Eugene. The Beavers, with last year's lineup back almost intact, were heavy favorites but fell before the smart and steady play of the Ducks, who clinched the spine-tingling affair on a field goal by Don Kirsch, substitute guard, in the final 22 seconds.

Prior to this game Oregon had broken even in two-game series with Washington State and Washington. In the opening series of the season, against W. S. C., the Webfoots dropped the first contest, 46-61, but came back strong the second night to win, 48 to 38. The Washington series the next week was almost an exact duplicate. The Huskies galloped home with a lop-sided 60 to 34 victory the first night, but the scrappy Oregon five convincingly turned the tables the next evening with a 54 to 35 triumph.

After a bit of shifting about in the first few games, Coach Hobson appeared to have hit upon his most effective five-man combination, which includes Bob Wren and Warren Taylor, forwards; Archie Marshik, center, and Paul Jackson and George Andrews, guards. Wren is a sophomore, the others lettermen.

Andrews, a two-year veteran, topped the

Webfoots in individual scoring for the first five games with 61 points, an average of 12.2 per game. Paul Jackson followed with 43, Archie Marshik ranked third with 37, and Taylor fourth with 29.

Just how the race will eventually wind up is a question that only time and the fates can tell. The Webfoots most certainly cannot be counted out, especially if they continue to perform as they did in the clash with O. S. C.

"HONEST JOHN" WARREN'S Oregon freshman hoop team had won four and lost one game at press time. The Ducklings ran up four straight triumphs over high school opposition before falling before the powerful McKee Bakers of Springfield, state A.A.U. "B" champions, in a wild 72-63 scoring bee.

Standout performers on the Duckling roster appear to be Sammy Crowell, former all-state guard at North Bend, who scored 26 points in the McKee contest, and Roy Seeborg, forward from Astoria and another 1941 all-state choice.

THE status of intercollegiate athletics in war time is a long way from certain at this time but University of Oregon administrative officials cleared some of the doubt with an announcement that insofar as possible, Oregon's athletic program will be continued both for the remainder of the 1941-42 school year and also in the coming years.

This by no means indicates that intercollegiate athletics will go on "as usual." There will be plenty of modification and very likely a great deal of curtailment. But with Army and Navy officials urging that more and more attention be paid to the physical training of the nation's young men, it is not probable that competitive sports will be eliminated.

The question of freshman participation with varsity teams is due to come up for discussion at a meeting of the Pacific Coast conference members sometime within the next few months. Contrary to some press reports, Oregon athletic heads and coaches are definitely in favor of this plan.

The Eugene Register-Guard has begun to publish a series of cartoons entitled "Ever Had the Urge," drawn by former football star Leonard Isberg, 41, now working in the advertising department of the Oregonian in Portland.

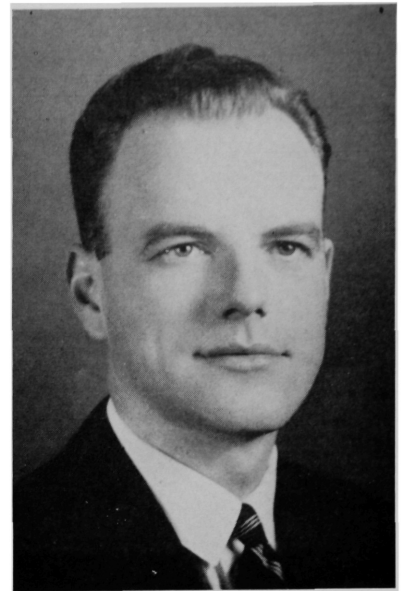

scholarships for nurses. The shortage of nurses for the national emergency is so great that army and navy leaders have implored young women to enter nurse training.

Twenty-eight beginners are enrolled in the winter quarter's nursing training according to Miss Elnora Thomson, head of the department. Twenty of them are on U. S. public health scholarships under which the government pays tuition and maintenance where necessary.

Thirty-eight "retired" graduate nurses, most of them older women who now call themselves "homemakers," have returned to the campus for a special "refresher" course. They will replace younger nurses who are called overseas for war duty.

Employees of the school have joined students in regular first aid training. Hospital disaster problems have been worked out carefully under direction of Ralf Couch, administrator of hospitals in the University center.

Windows are ready for blackout. Sandbags await the first Jap incendiary. In its physical plant the school is very nearly able to say "We're ready and waiting for what may come."

In curriculum problems the "iron out" process is on in high.

Keeping a watchful eye on this medical school metamorphosis is Dean Richard B. Dillehunt. Since last July Dean Dillehunt has served the school on a restricted schedule while he recuperated from a heart attack.

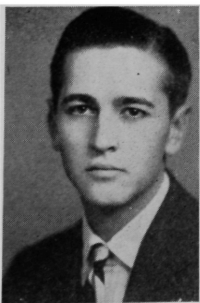
The attack came only a few days after 250 faculty members of the school honored the dean at a University Club dinner. The occasion: the dean's completion of 30 years service to the medical school.

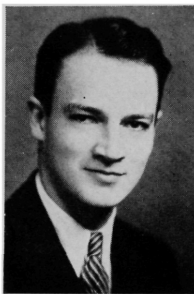

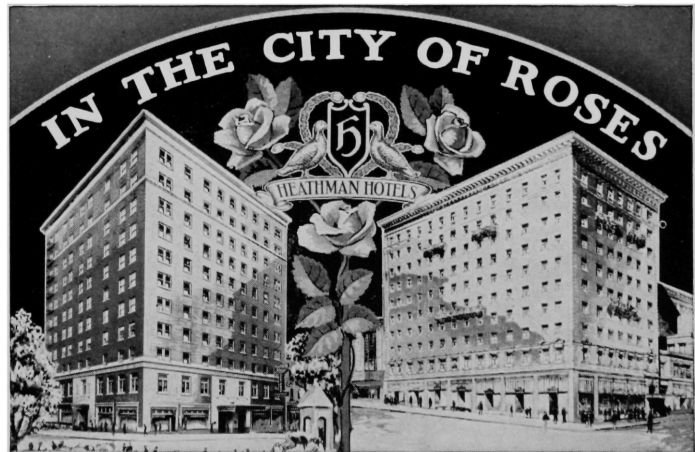
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
