UO to Host Regional Blackboard Conference Oct. 19

The University of Oregon will play host to hundreds of faculty members from across the Pacific Northwest when they attend the annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest/Washington Blackboard Users Group (WABUG) on the UO campus on October 19. The annual meeting, which will be held in the Erb Memorial Union, is cosponsored and facilitated locally by the UO Libraries' Center for Educational Technologies (CET), which administers the Blackboard course management system for the UO campus.

According to JQ Johnson, director of CET, the meeting will offer a rare opportunity for UO Blackboard users and system administrators to learn more about Blackboard while networking with colleagues to discuss e-learning techniques and instructional technology. A highlight will be the keynote address by Dr. Cable Green, director of e-learning for the Washington Community and Technical College system. In a session of special interest to Blackboard administrators, Volker Kleinschmidt, Blackboard Inc.'s highly regarded software troubleshooter, will discuss technical issues with the software.

Presentations on specific Blackboard components having relevance to the UO campus are also planned, including the Yamada "Amiga" system, Flash, iTunes U, plagiarism software, and discussion-board use. A few vendor presentations and a small trade show are also part of the program.

With more than 900 UO instructors currently using some component of Blackboard in their teaching, the conference should be of interest to many members of the campus community. Contemporary Communes Topic of Oct. 25 Presentation

For more than three centuries a few idealistic Americans have rejected the ideal of rugged individualism in favor of cooperation and have come together in intentional communities. Although they typically receive little publicity, thousands of those communities are alive and well today. Find out more about contemporary communal living by attending "Communes Live! The Quiet Presence of Intentional Communities in America (and Especially in Oregon)," a talk and slide presentation by Dr. Timothy Miller, professor of religious studies at the University of Kansas. The event is scheduled for Thurs., Oct. 25, at 3:30 p.m., in Gerlinger Lounge.

This presentation will be an illustrated survey of contemporary intentional communities, including many that are active today in Oregon. Special attention will be given to ecovillages, artists' communes, countercultural groups, and lesbian communities.

Miller has been studying intentional communities for nearly twenty-five years and is immediate past president of the International Communal Studies Association.

He is also active in the American Academy of Religion's New Religious Movements Group, which he chaired for ten years.

He is the author of *The 60s Communes: Hippies and Beyond* (1999); *The Quest for Utopia in Twentieth-Century America* (1998); *The Hippies and American Values* (1991); *American Communes, 1860-1960: A Bibliography* (1990); *Following in His Steps: A Biography of Charles M. Sheldon* (1987); and the edited works *When Prophets Die: The Postcharismatic Fate of New Religious Movements* (1991) and *America's Alternative Religions* (1995).

Sponsored by the UO Folklore Program and the UO Libraries, the event complements the significant collection of materials available on intentional communities housed at the UO Libraries Special Collections & University Archives.

Sure, maybe you've heard of DJ mashups, or video mashups, but a map mashup? That's right, in the next few weeks you'll have the opportunity to learn all about this new phenomenon by taking one of two map mashup workshops. You'll even have the chance to enter your work in a mashup competition.

So what exactly is a map mashup? Well, according to UO Maps Librarian Jon Jablonski, a map mashup "takes two disparate sources of data (say, Google Maps and the routes of your favorite hikes) and combines them into a new, more interactive web experience." So what a DJ mashup does with two of your favorite songs (combines elements of both songs to create a new piece of music), map mashups do with two of your favorite web-based maps.

The mashup workshop will be held in the Edmiston Classroom in Knight Library on Monday, Oct. 29 from 12 p.m. to 2 p.m. and again on Friday, Nov. 2 from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. All UO students are welcome to participate, regardless of level of expertise.

GIS (Geographic Information Systems) Day was founded by National Geographic in 1987 to provide an international forum for users of GIS technology to demonstrate real-world applications that are making a difference in our society. More than 80 countries will participate in GIS Day this year by hosting a variety of events.

Here at the UO, the GIS Day celebration will feature a map mashup competition, scheduled for 3 p.m., Wednesday, November 14, in the MAP Library, located in Knight Library. All UO community members--students, faculty, and staff--are welcome to enter their map mashups and display their entries. To enter, send an email to jonjab@uoregon.edu by Monday, November 12, at 5 p.m., and be prepared to display your entry on Wednesday, November 14. A panel of map experts will select the winners and award the prizes, so get your mashups ready!

In conjunction with the competition, a presentation will be given on some of the maps that have been recently donated to the UO Libraries, including a map of Eugene from 1930.

At 3:30 p.m. on November 14 in Knight Library Browsing Room a group of UO scholars who use GIS in their research will give presentations on their work on Asia in the Japanese style of Pecha Kucha (pronounced peh-chak-cha). These fast-paced, informal presentations give each researcher six minutes and forty seconds to show twenty images. And, as if experiencing this dynamic presentation style wasn't enough, snacks will be provided.

GIS Day activities are sponsored by the UO GIS Committee, UO Libraries, Department of Geography, SSIL Lab, InfoGraphics Lab, and UO student chapter of the American Society of Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing.

Knight Library will remain open around the clock during Dead Week and Finals Week this term to accommodate UO students, faculty, and staff who need extended hours for study and research.

Beginning at 7:30 a.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 27, and running until 7 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 7, Knight Library will be open continuously. All branch libraries will maintain their usual academic term hours throughout Dead Week and Finals Week.

IMPORTANT: Knight Library will be open only to current UO students, faculty, and staff during extended hours. All users will be required to show a current university ID to remain in or enter the building. Extended hours during Dead Week and Finals Week for fall 2007 are midnight to 7:30 a.m. Monday through Friday, 7 p.m. Friday to 11 a.m. Saturday, and 7 p.m. Saturday to 11 a.m. Sunday.

During these extended hours, access to photocopy machines and Learning Commons and ITC computers and printers will be available. However, other services, such as checkout of library materials, reserves and video checkout, and reference desk assistance, will not be available.
