Gifts and Pledges Received by the University During the Year 1932-33

The University of Oregon wishes to acknowledge publicly its grateful appreciation of the following gifts and pledges that have been received during the past year:

From the late W. E. Miner and his brother, H. T. Miner, a modern eight-story office building and a modern two-story annex, with a total value of \$350,000, the income from which is to endow a chair of real estate and insurance, in the School of Business Administration of the University of Oregon. The donors were men of enterprise who helped in the upbuilding of Eugene and who seek through this generous gift to further a type of business training of large importance to the University and the future development of the state.

From the Carnegie Corporation of New York for development of fine arts program at the University of Oregon, \$15,400. The purpose of this gift is to develop reliable measures of art appreciation in the fields of graphic art, literature and music, and if possible, to measure any relation which may exist between such appreciation and desirable social attitudes, and ultimately to develop better methods of cultivating desirable emotional responses to the highest forms of beauty.

From the Carnegie Corporation of New York through the American Institute of Architects, to finance Summer Session Art Center for 1933, \$6,750.

For the University Law School Library:

Robert Sharp Bean Memorial Library. This splendid law library of the late Judge Robert Sharp Bean, consisting of approximately one thousand volumes and valued at more than \$1,500, has been donated to the University of Oregon School of Law by Mrs. Robert S. Bean and Family in memory of Judge Bean.

"Judge Bean was graduated from Christian College, Monmouth, Oregon, 1873, when he received the degree of bachelor of science, and afterward took a course in the University of Oregon. By the latter institution, as also by Willamette University, he was awarded in the year 1895, the honorary degree of doctor of laws. The Alumni of the University of Oregon also honored him in the last year of his life by giving him public recognition as the oldest and most eminent living alumnus of that university, and in acknowledgment of his distinguished service for many years (1882-1920) as one of its board of regents.

"He practiced law at Eugene, 1878-1882; was elected judge of the state circuit court for the second circuit, 1882, and served until 1890, when he was elected judge of the supreme court of Oregon. He was continued in the latter position by election from time to time until 1909, serving in the meantime as chief justice, 1894-96; 1900-02; and 1905-08. He resigned May 1, 1909, to accept appointment as United States district judge for the district of Oregon, a position he continued to occupy to the end of his life.

"This, in brief, is an outline of the dates that mark milestones in his career. He was endowed with all of the essential qualities of a great judge, and his long and faithful service in the judicial capacity served to establish and confirm the reputation he earned early in life as one who was especially well fitted for the discharge of the duties of his position."
