REGISTRATION FEES

Payable at the time of registration each term (or in three installments—see calendar for dates).

Undergraduate Fee. Undergraduate students registered for seven term hours of credit or more and who are residents of Oregon pay regular fees each term, as follows: tuition, \$10.00; laboratory and course fee, \$11.50; health service fee, \$3.50; building fee, \$5.00; total, \$30.00 per term or \$90.00 per year. Undergraduate students who are not residents of Oregon pay the same fees as Oregon residents except that the tuition fee is \$50.00 instead of \$10.00, making a total of \$70.00 per term or \$210.00 per year.

Graduate Fee. Graduate students registered for seven term hours of credit or more pay a total of \$25.00 per term or \$75.00 per year in fees, including the same tuition fee, laboratory and course fee, and health service fee as undergraduates. Graduate students do not pay the non-resident fee or building fee. In order to register as a graduate student, a student must be admitted to the graduate division, or have received a bachelor's degree, or have completed all requirements for a bachelor's degree.

Part-Time Fee. Students (undergraduate or graduate, resident or non-resident), registering for six term hours of work or less pay a registration fee of \$2.00 per term hour and the health service fee of \$3.50 per term.

Auditor's Fee. Auditors pay a fee of \$1.00 per term hour. They are entitled to attend classes (not laboratory sections), but do not receive academic credit or enjoy other institutional privileges. Students enrolled in the University as full-time students may be granted the privilege of auditors without paying an additional fee. Part time students may audit courses by paying the additional auditor's fee.

Staff Members. Members of the regular staff who register for credit pay \$1.00 per term hour; they may audit courses without any fee payment.

STUDENT BODY FEE

In addition to the institutional registration fees, the Associated Students organization has an optional student body fee. The income from this fee is used to finance activities sponsored by the organization, such as the student newspaper, and athletic, forensic, dramatic and musical activities.

DEPOSITS

Every student who enrolls for academic credit is required to make a deposit of \$5.00, payable once each year at the time of first registration. This is required as a protection against loss or damage by the student of institutional property. If at any time charges against his deposit become excessive, the student may be called upon to reestablish the original amount.

REFUNDS

For regulations in regard to refunds of student fees please confer with the University Cashier. The \$5.00 deposit, less any deductions which may have been made, is refunded about three weeks after the close of the academic year. Students who discontinue their work at the University before the end of the year may receive refunds, upon petition to the Business Office, about three weeks after the close of the fall or winter term.

SPECIAL FEES

Payable under special conditions indicated:

Matriculation Fee\$5.00
This fee is paid by all undergraduate students at the time they first register in regular session.

Late Registration Fee\$1.00 to \$5.00
Students registering after the scheduled registration dates of any term pay a late registration fee of \$1.00 for the first day and \$1.00 for each additional day until a maximum charge of \$5.00 is reached. (See year calendar for dates.)

Late-Payment Fee, per day\$0.25
Students pay their regular fees either at the time of registration or in three installments, as preferred. The student is charged the late-payment penalty in case of delinquency in payment of any installment. If fees and penalties are not paid within one week after dates set for partial payments, the student's registration is cancelled.

Change of Program Fee\$0.25
The student pays this fee for each change in his official program after the program has been approved and accepted by the Registrar's Office.

Reinstatement Fee\$2.00
If for any reason a student has his registration canceled during a term for failure to comply with the regulations of the institution, but is later allowed to continue his work, he must pay the reinstatement fee.

Special Examination Fees\$1.00 to \$10.00
A student pays a fee of \$1.00 per term hour for the privilege of taking an examination for advanced credit, or any other special examination. The fee is charged for each course in which a special examination is taken. A graduate student taking his preliminary or final examination at a time when he is not registered for academic work pays a fee of \$10.00 for the privilege of taking the examination.

Transcript Fee\$1.00
This fee is charged for each transcript of credits issued after the first, which is free of charge.

Graduation Fee\$6.50
The graduation fee is paid for each degree taken. No person may be recommended for a degree until he has paid all fees and charges due the institution, including the graduation fee. The fee entitles the student to one year's membership in the Alumni Association. When a student receives a certificate at the same time that he receives a degree, an additional fee of \$2.50 is charged for the certificate.

Gymnasium-Suit Fee, per term\$2.00
Any student registered for physical education activity courses, or any student (undergraduate or graduate) or faculty member who is issued a gymnasium suit, pays a fee of \$2.00 a term. This provides for a complete gymnasium outfit (except shoes) and for laundry service and repair of the outfit.

Placement Bureau Registration Fee\$3.00
All students or graduates applying for teaching positions through the University Placement Bureau pay this fee. An additional fee of 25 cents is charged when credentials are sent to school officials at the applicant's request.

Special Course Fees in Music. Additional fees are charged for instruction in applied music, as listed on page 249 of the University Catalog. These fees are payable to the secretary of the School of Music not later than the last day for payment of the second installment of registration fees. After that date the regular late payment fee is charged.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS, 1937-38

1. PENALTY FOR LATE REGISTRATION.

Students failing to register on the regular scheduled registration days pay a late registration fee of \$1.00 for the first day and \$1.00 for each additional day until a maximum charge of \$5.00 is reached.

2. ADMISSION TO CLASS.

Instructors receive a class card for each student enrolled in their courses. They do not admit to their classes students for whom they have no class cards.

3. CHANGES IN REGISTRATION.

a. If a change in the original term registration is found to be desirable, the student applies to the Registrar for an official change card, obtains the approval of his adviser, personnel dean, and instructors, and then files the card with the Registrar.

b. A fee of \$0.25 is charged the student for each change card filed.

c. No student is permitted to add a subject later than two weeks from the date of the last regular scheduled registration day.

d. No student is permitted to drop a subject later than two weeks from the date of the last regular scheduled registration day, unless he has a passing grade at the time of withdrawal. If, in the operation of this regulation, it appears that an injustice would be done any student, the Academic Requirements Committee or its delegate has authority to make such adjustment as may seem advisable.

4. CHANGES IN CREDITS SCHEDULED.

No change may be made in the number of credit hours specified for the various courses as indicated in the official catalog, except in such courses as may be designated by a school as available for additional credit for a superior student. Such additional credit would be registered under courses numbered 305, 405, or 505, and the possible minimum and maximum hours designated.

5. MAXIMUM AND MINIMUM REGISTRATION.

a. No student is permitted to register for less than 12 nor more than 19 hours per term without the approval of the Academic Requirements Committee and his adviser. Furthermore, he may not register for more than 19 hours unless his grade point average for the preceding term is at least 3.00.

b. No student shall receive more than 17 hours credit in any term unless he has a grade point average of at least 2.50 for that term. No student shall receive more than 19 hours credit in any term unless his grade point average is at least 3.00 for that term.

6. SCHOLARSHIP REGULATIONS.

The administration of the regulations governing scholarship requirements is vested in the Scholarship Committee of the faculty. This committee has discretionary authority in the enforcement of rules governing probation, and also has authority to drop a student from the University when it appears that his work is of such character that he cannot continue with profit to himself and with credit to the institution. In general, profitable and creditable work means substantial progress toward meeting graduation requirements.

a. A lower division student is automatically placed on probation if his grade point average for any term is below 1.50. He is not released from probation until his grade point average for a subsequent term is at least 1.75.

b. An upper division student is given written warning if his grade point average falls below 2.00 in any term. He is automatically placed on probation if his grade point average for any term falls below 1.75, or his cumulative grade point average below 2.00. He is not released from probation until he has made a term grade point average of at least 2.00 and a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.00.

c. A certificate of eligibility must be obtained from the Dean of Men or Dean of Women before a student can qualify for an elective or appointive office in any student, extracurricular, or organization activity. Scholastic probation automatically removes a student from any such office, and prevents him from participating in any such activities while he is on probation (except as provided in "e" below).

d. No student who has been in residence six terms, or equivalent, is eligible to hold any elective office or to accept an appointment in a student activity unless he has attained upper division standing. The meaning of the term "elective office" is to be interpreted by the Scholarship Committee.

e. The rules of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Athletic Conference govern in all questions of athletic eligibility.

f. Students who have been suspended or expelled are denied all the privileges of the institution and of all organizations in any way connected with it, and are not permitted to attend any social gathering of students, or to reside in any fraternity, sorority, or club house, or in any of the halls of residence.

7. GRADES.

The grading system consists of four passing grades, A, B, C, D; failure, F; incomplete, Inc.; withdrawn, W. A denotes exceptional accomplishment; B, superior; C, average; D, inferior. Students ordinarily receive one of the four passing grades or failure. When the quality of the work is satisfactory but some minor yet essential requirement of the course has not been completed, for reasons acceptable to the instructor, a report of incomplete may be made and additional time granted. Students are officially withdrawn from a course on filing the proper blanks at the Registrar's Office in accordance with University regulations.

8. REMOVAL OF INCOMPLETE.

An incomplete must be removed by the close of the third term in which the student registers, following the receipt of the mark.

9. GRADE POINTS.

Grade points are computed on the basis of 4 points for each term hour of A grade, 3 points for each term hour of B, 2 points for each term hour of C, 1 point for each term hour of D, and 0 points for each term hour of F. Marks of Inc. and W. are disregarded in the computation of points. The grade point average (GPA) is the quotient of total points divided by total term hours in which grades (A, B, C, D, and F) are received. Grade points are computed on all work which the student does as an undergraduate, including transferred hours, correspondence study, and special examinations.

10. HONOR ROLL.

At the close of each term the Registrar shall issue a list containing the names of all students who for the term have completed at least 12 hours with a grade point average of 3.50 or above.

11. STUDENT CLASSIFICATION.

Students are grouped in classes on the basis of term hours earned and recorded in the Registrar's Office. Thirty-six term hours are required for sophomore standing, attainment of the junior certificate is required for junior standing, and 129 term hours are required for senior standing.

12. JUNIOR CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS.

The Junior Certificate admits to upper division standing and the opportunity to pursue a major curriculum leading to a degree. A student is expected to fulfill the requirements for the Junior Certificate during his first two years at the University. The requirements are as follows:

a. Term hours: minimum, 93.

b. Grade point average: minimum, 2.00.

c. English:

(1) A general examination in English is required upon entrance. If this examination is not passed, the course designated as Corrective English (Eng K) must be taken and passed.

(2) English Composition: 9 term hours, unless excused.

d. Physical Education: 6 terms, unless excused.

e. Military Science: 6 terms for men, unless excused.

f. General Hygiene: 3 terms for women.

g. Group requirements: A prescribed amount of work selected from three "groups" representing comprehensive fields of knowledge. The three groups are: Language and Literature, Social Science, Science. Courses that satisfy these requirements are numbered from 100 to 110 and from 200 to 210 (see list below*). The group requirements are:

(1) For students in liberal arts and sciences: The completion of at least 9 approved term hours in each of the three groups and at least 9 additional approved term hours numbered 200 to 210 in any one of the three groups.

(2) For students in professional schools: The completion of at least 9 approved term hours in each of two of the three groups.

* COURSES FOR SATISFACTION OF GROUP REQUIREMENTS (under above restrictions of course number and credits), offered during 1937-38:

I. *Language and Literature*: Latin Literature, Augustan Age; Latin Literature, Silver Age; Survey of English Literature; Appreciation of Literature; Introduction to Literature; Shakespeare; German Literature; Introduction to Germanic Literatures; French Literature; Seventeenth Century French Literature; Spanish Literature.

II. *Social Science*: General Anthropology; Principles of Economics; Introductory Geography, with or without Laboratory; History of Modern Times; World History; English History; Introduction to Philosophy; American National Government, and American State and Local Governments, and European Governments; Elementary Psychology; Background of Social Science; General Sociology, and Social Interaction.

III. *Science*: Biological Science Survey; Lower Plants, and Higher Plants, and Systematic Botany; General Chemistry; General Geology, with or without Laboratory; Introduction to Field Geology; three courses from Intermediate Algebra, College Algebra, Plane Trigonometry, Elementary Analysis I, Elementary Analysis II, Elementary Analysis III, Mathematics of Finance, Elements of Statistics, Mathematics of Life Insurance; Analytical Geometry, and Differential and Integral Calculus (Brief Course); Differential and Integral Calculus; Physical Science Survey; Essentials of Physics with Laboratory; General Physics; Descriptive Astronomy; Elementary Psychology with Laboratory; Elementary Zoology; General Zoology; Vertebrate Zoology.

13. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS.

When a student has fulfilled all the requirements for a Junior Certificate, he is classified as an upper division student and may become a candidate for a bachelor's degree. The requirements for the degree (including both lower and upper division work) are as follows:

- a. Term hours: minimum, 186, including:
 - (1) Hours in upper division courses: for students in Arts and Letters or Social Science, at least 62; for students in professional schools, at least 45.
 - (2) Hours in the major: minimum, 36, including at least 24 in upper division courses. Students who receive the bachelor's degree after one year at the University of Oregon Medical School are required to have at least 36 total hours in either Arts and Letters or Social Science.
 - (3) Hours after receipt of Junior Certificate; minimum, 45.
- b. Distribution of hours for different bachelor's degrees:
 - (1) Bachelor of Arts: 36 hours in Arts and Letters, including two years (normally 24 term hours) of college work in a foreign language.
 - (2) Bachelor of Science: 36 hours in Science or in Social Science.
 - (3) Professional bachelor's degree (B.Arch., B.S. in Ed., etc.); Fulfillment of all major requirements.
- c. Grade point average: minimum, 2.00.
- d. Residence: minimum, 45 term hours (normally the last 45). Credit earned in regular classes of the General Extension Division is considered residence credit with the University, in meeting this requirement. The first year in any Class A medical school is acceptable toward the bachelor's degree for students who have earned 138 term hours in residence at the University and met requirements for students at the University of Oregon Medical School, provided they are certified as unconditionally acceptable for continuation in the medical school attended.
- e. Dean's recommendation, certifying fulfillment of all requirements of major department or school.
- f. Restrictions:
 - (1) Correspondence study; maximum, 60 term hours.
 - (2) Law or Medicine: maximum, 48 term hours toward any degree other than professional legal or medical degrees.
 - (3) Applied Music: maximum, 12 term hours toward any degree other than that of Bachelor of Music.

14. SUBSTITUTIONS.

Substitutions for general University Requirements may be made only with the approval of the adviser and the Academic Requirements Committee through the Registrar's Office. Any adjustment of major school or departmental requirements is subject to the approval of the dean of the school in which the student is registered.

15. APPLICATION FOR DEGREE.

A candidate for a degree must file an application for graduation not later than the first week of the term preceding the term in which he expects to graduate.

16. GRADUATION EXERCISES.

While a student may graduate in September, January, or June, formal commencement exercises are held only in June. No student is permitted to graduate or to participate in commencement exercises unless his graduation requirements have been fully met, including any financial indebtedness to the University.

17. SPECIAL EXAMINATION FOR ADVANCED CREDIT.

A student in good standing who wishes credit for work done other than in an accredited educational institution may petition for advanced credit examination under the following conditions:

- a. The application for such examination shall be presented on a form obtainable from the Registrar, and must be recommended by the dean of the school and the head of the department concerned.
- b. In no case may such examinations be based on work done in high school prior to high school graduation, or in an elementary foreign language which is the mother tongue of the applicant, or in courses not listed in the University catalog.
- c. Grades earned in special examinations shall be submitted and recorded in the same way as for regularly registered courses except that credits and grade points will be recorded only when the grade earned in the examination is C or higher.
- d. No student may take an examination for advanced standing in a term in which he is to receive a degree.
- e. All special examinations must be authorized by the Academic Requirements Committee in advance, and no examination may be taken until the applicant has received a permit from the Registrar's Office for which a fee of \$1.00 per term hour will be charged.

18. REGULAR STANDING FOR SPECIAL STUDENTS.

A student who has been admitted as a special may obtain regular standing and be accepted as a candidate for a degree under the following conditions:

- a. He must have the recommendation of the dean of the school in which he is registered and of the head of his major department.
- b. He must have completed in an organized curriculum not less than 45 term hours with a grade point average of at least 2.50.
- c. He must have satisfied the regular requirements in English Composition.
- d. He must satisfactorily pass such psychological and placement examinations as may be prescribed.
- e. The final decision as to the admission of the applicant to regular status shall be made by the Academic Requirements Committee. It is understood that only cases of exceptional merit will be approved.

19. ATTENDANCE.

a. Each instructor reports to the Personnel Deans every case of absences which in his judgment needs special attention. The student concerned must at once make the required adjustment with the instructor. In case a student's registration is cancelled for any reason, he may regain his former status only by making the required adjustments and paying the reinstatement fee of \$2.00.

b. No student organization shall be absent from the campus, for the purpose of touring the state or meeting other outside appointments, during examination week.

20. WITHDRAWAL FROM SCHOOL.

Any student in good standing is entitled to honorable dismissal at any time. A student desiring to withdraw from the University should file in the Registrar's Office the proper application, signed by his adviser, the Dean of Men or Dean of Women, and showing his present grades in all courses for which he is registered.

STUDENT AUTOMOBILE RULES

Legislation of the State Board of Higher Education:

"That the use of automobiles by students be regulated to the end that such use shall not in any way be a detriment to the maintenance of the highest standards of scholarship, social life, and general welfare of the institutions and the individual members thereof, and that the administration of this regulation be under the jurisdiction of the Chancellor."

Regulations

1. All motor vehicles in the possession or control of students must be registered with the enforcement officer who will issue a sticker which must at all times be attached to the windshield.

2. No student may drive a motor vehicle, either his own or that of another person, unless said student shall have registered himself at the automobile office.

3. Every acquisition of, change of title of, or change of license number of a motor vehicle must be reported immediately to the automobile office and a new sticker obtained and placed on windshield.

4. All state and city traffic regulations must be observed at all times.

5. Permission to drive a motor vehicle will be withdrawn in every case where it plays a detrimental part in a student's scholarship, conduct, social life, or general welfare.

The following are a few of the state and/or city traffic regulations:

1. Carrying students on outside of car, on running boards, fenders, or back, is prohibited.

2. Not more than three persons may occupy the front seat.

3. A resident of this state shall not use herein a motor vehicle licensed under the laws of another state.

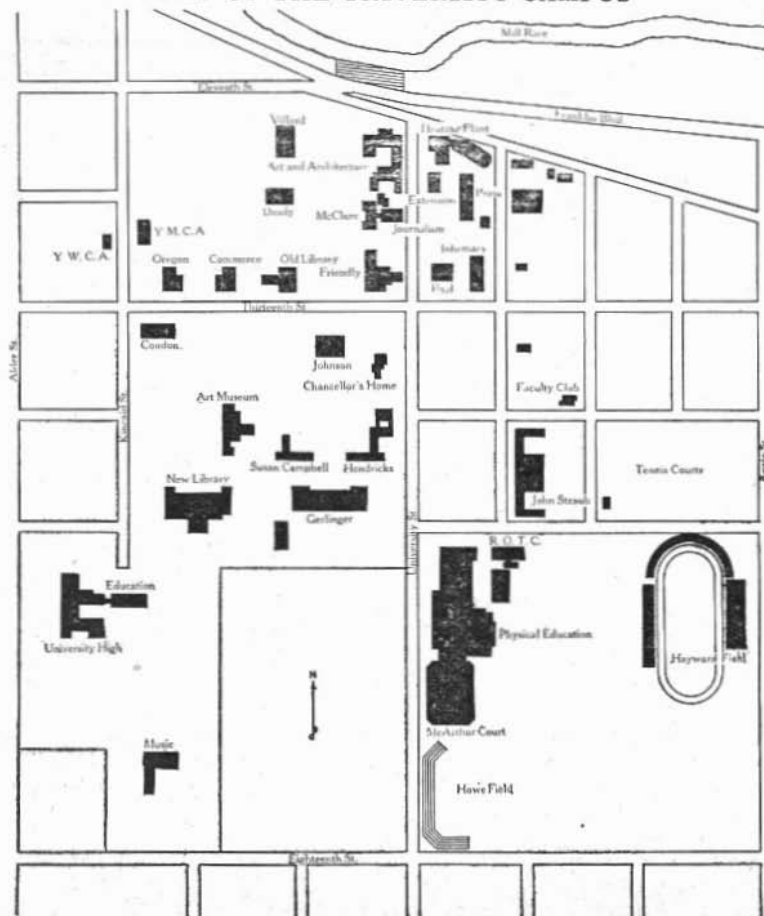
4. Unnecessary noise—such as running engine with cutout open, or sounding of horn for other than warning signals—is prohibited.

5. Indicated speeds: Passing school grounds, 15 miles; business district, 20; residence district, 25; highway, 45. At no time shall any person drive at a speed greater than will permit the driver to exercise proper control of the vehicle at all times and under all conditions.
