## DUCKS ROMP ON OWN TURF

Oregon's newly turfed Hayward field will present a preview scene for the 1937 Homecoming when Prink Callison's Webfoots and the Stanford Redskins meet in Eugene Saturday afternoon, October 2, to celebrate the finale of the long "out-of-the-mud" campaign.

In addition to being one of the outstanding football games of the northwest this coming season, the Oregon-Stanford contest will mark the start of a new era in home games. Backed by a hustling group of Eugene business-men boosters, the Oregon athletic department anticipates a crowd of 10,000, mainly alumni, for the first big game of the season.

Final work in grassing the historic campus gridiron was completed last month when WPA workmen spread turf over the sidelines and end zones. The regular playing area, turfed and seeded last spring, has been ready for play since July. Experts who have inspected the field claim it is one of the finest jobs of turfing on the coast.

A short and snappy dedication program has been planned by athletic officials and members of the Eugene boosters' committee. Bill Hayward, veteran track coach and trainer for whom the field is named; University, city and state officials, all will take part.

The game itself promises to be a thriller. Last year the rival coast conference elevens staged a bitter 7 to 7 tie contest at Palo Alto and this year, both squads considerably improved, should produce an equally crowd-pleasing game.

Tiny Thornhill's Redskins, dropped from the top rung of the conference ladder last fall after three straight championship seasons, are expected to be very much in the running again this year. Led by such stars as Bill Paulman, great

kicking and passing fullback, and Joe Vigna, who scored the lone touchdown against Oregon on a 46-yard run last year, Stanford is certain to be one of the coast's flashiest offensive units.

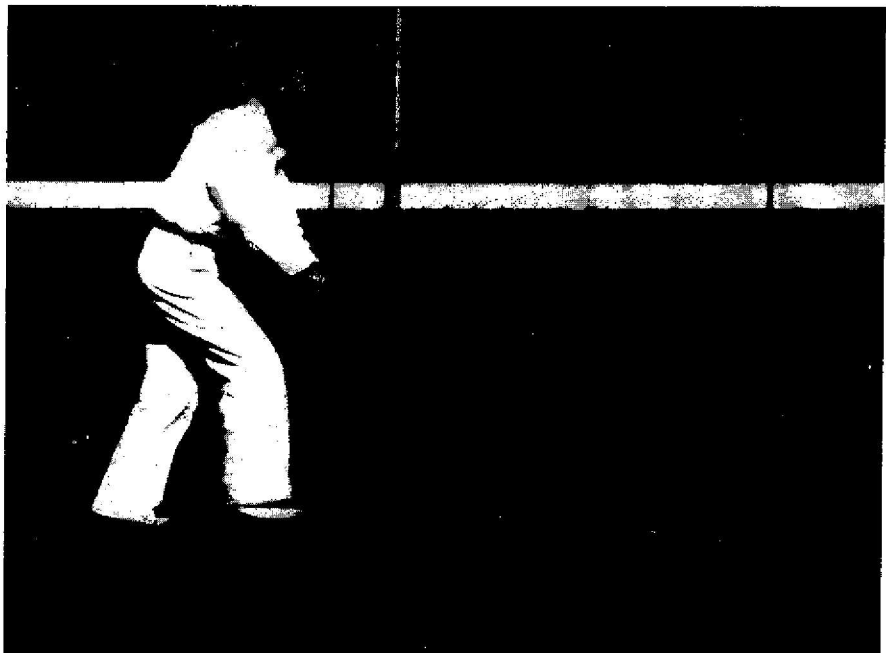
Oregon also hit the skids last fall, dropping from the first division of the conference standings for the first time since Callison took over the coaching reins. Like Stanford, the Webfoots appear certain to bounce back into championship contention.

Sophomore stars, in the persons of Bob Smith, Paul Rowe, Frank Emmons, Jay Graybeal, Steve Anderson, Ted Gebhardt, and Bill Rach, along with Dale Lasselle, Jimmy Nicholson, Arleigh Bentley, Hank Nilsen and Don Kennedy, will give Callison and Back-

field Coach Mike Mikulak the most promising ball-carrying material in many seasons.

Not since championship days of 1933 has Oregon had such passers as Smith, Anderson, Lasselle and Gebhardt, open-field runners as Nicholson, Graybeal and Lasselle, and line-plungers such as Rowe, Emmons and Rach.

The Stanford-Oregon contest will offer not only an outstanding early season contest between two of the most improved teams on the coast but serve as a second "Homecoming" on the Eugene campus. Large delegations of football followers from Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Roseburg, Marshfield, Salem and Portland have already signified intentions of being on hand.

**Cramer Wins Doctorate**

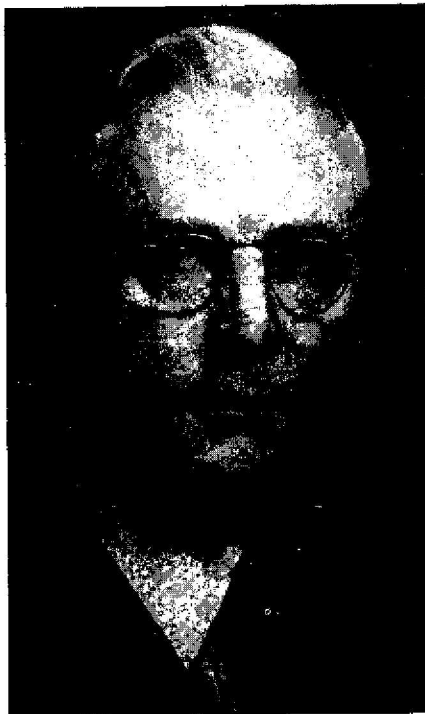
John F. Cramer, M.Ed. '32, was the first city school superintendent in the state to earn a Doctor of Education degree when he completed the last requirements this summer.

**Dr. Harris Honored**

Election to the presidency of the Oregon State Dental Association for 1937-38 was the latest recognition accorded Dr. Madison C. Harris, '98, who is practicing dentistry in Eugene.

After graduating from the University in 1898, Harris went to Chicago where he was awarded his D.D.S. degree from Northwestern University in 1904. Dr. Harris then returned to Eugene where he has been practicing since.

Dr. Harris was appointed to the state board of dental examiners in 1933 and served until 1937. In 1936 he was made a Fellow of the American College of Dentistry, an honor accorded few dentists.

For eight years Harris was chairman of the Lane county Republican central committee, serving from 1926 until 1934. He was also city councilman in Eugene for four years and during that time he served as chairman of the judiciary committee.

**Heads Housing Plan**

Frank B. Dorman, '24, has been appointed manager of the largest government-operated housing project in the nation. He will manage the Williamsburg houses in Brooklyn where 12 blocks of tenements were razed to make way for 20 new concrete and brick buildings.

The \$13,500,000 project will house more than 5,000 residents and will have a business district of more than 50 stores. Since 1933 Dorman has been with the New York City housing authority which operates 122 apartments and 574 Harlem river houses.

## CAMPUS AND FACULTY

### Morse Returns to Campus

"We can build at the University of Oregon a school of law and public administration to train men in law, political science, economics and the sciences to take places in government work," Dean Wayne L. Morse told members of a Eugene luncheon club that met this summer. Morse said that we are to enter an era of "more government" and the government needs trained men.

Dean Morse returned to Eugene this summer from Washington, D. C., where he headed a nation-wide survey of release procedures. The project is an effort to analyze present parole systems and make recommendations for their correction.

The results will be made public July 1, 1938, in an 1800 page, five-volume report. Morse will be editor-in-chief of the publications.

Morse has also recently been selected as a member of the special advisory committee of the Osborne Association, Inc. on delinquent juveniles. The committee will direct and supervise a nation-wide study of state and federal institutions caring for juvenile delinquents.

Warren C. Hyde, for the past year director of training for the League of Oregon Cities and supervisor of the local government survey underway by the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University, assumed his new position as assistant city manager of East Cleveland, Ohio, July 1.

The Oregon Mothers' cash scholarship for the school year of 1937-38 has been awarded to three outstanding high school students of the state.

The scholarship will be split between Benson Mates, Portland; Donna Elaine Row, Eugene, and Aida Adelaide Brun of Klamath Falls. This is the first time that upstate students have ever shared in the award, previously it has been confined to Portland.

A traveling prize scholarship of \$1000 has been awarded to Arthur Riehl, '32, (B. of Arch. '34). The award is offered by Ion Lewis, well-known Portland architect, in the interest of benefiting Oregon architecture. Riehl received his master's degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1936, after having won a scholarship to the school. He is at present employed in an architectural firm in New York.

¶ Dr. A. R. Moore of the University psychology department has been elected president of the Oregon chapter Sigma Xi society.

### Leighton New P. E. Head

Dr. Ralph W. Leighton, professor of education, will assume the position of Dean of the Physical Education school September 30 when John F. Bovard, formerly dean, will leave for the University of California. Dr. Leighton's appointment was confirmed by the state board of higher education July 27.

Leighton has had wide experience including athletic coaching, participation in football and other sports.

Before coming to the University in 1928, Leighton was professor of education at the College of Idaho. While there he was line coach for Anse Cornell, now athletic manager for the University. Since coming to Eugene, Leighton has taken a keen interest in athletics at the University and has acted as football scout under Coach J. J. McEwan.

Dr. Leighton graduated from the College of Idaho and also attended the University of Iowa. Before entering collegiate work he was a teacher and administrator in public schools. At the University Leighton was awarded the degree of doctor of philosophy in 1931. Since that time he has served as executive secretary of the research division of the University in addition to his duties as professor of education.

### Summer School Enrollment Up

Seven hundred thirty-four students enrolled in the six-week summer session at Eugene. Dan E. Clark, summer school director, announced in his report. This represents a 5% increase over the 1936 enrollment despite the fact that fees had been boosted and the coaching school, a usual strong attraction was held at Oregon State college.

Twenty-three states contributed a total of 176 students, California led with 54, followed closely by Washington with 27, and Canada with 10. Alaska, Cuba, and Hawaii were also represented.

The Portland summer session attendance fell below 1936 peak. This is due to the fact that 1936 had the benefit of the National Education association convention in Portland.

Eugene post session enrolled 228 as compared to 219 in 1936.

"We want every Oregon student, alumnus, dad and mother to come and bring their friends," said Barney Hall, student body president and chairman of the rally, in issuing the blanket invitation to the University's friends.

# SOPHOMORE BLOOD LIVENS OUTLOOK

A liberal injection of sophomore blood by Coach Prink Callison into the University of Oregon's 1937 varsity football squad forecasts a rejuvenated Webfoot eleven that may prove a colorful, dangerous coast conference title threat this fall.

Dropped from the first division of the coast circuit for the first time last fall, Callison's 1937 eleven may bounce right back up again should the youthful talent on hand develop as hoped.

A capable group of 17 returning lettermen will find stiff competition for their berths from the wholesale addition of the crack 1936 freshman squad, rated as one of the finest in Oregon history. Most of the newcomers will bid for backfield posts inadequately filled last season.

Mark down for future reference the names of Bob Smith, Paul Rowe, Frank Emmons, Jay Graybeal, Bill Rach, Ted Gebhardt, Steve Anderson, Matt Pavallunas, and Dennis Donovan, young ball-carriers billed for plenty of action in their first year in varsity suits. They will share backfield duties with veterans Jimmy Nicholson, Dale Lasselle, Arleigh Bentley, Henry Nilsen, Don Kennedy, and Dave Gammon.

In the line Callison has top-notch performers returning in Vern Moore and Denny Braid, centers; Captain Tony Amato, Nello Giovanini, Joe Huston, Chan Berry, guards; Bill Foskett, Bill Estes, Chuck Bracher, Cliff Morris, tackles, and John Yerby, Lenard Robertson, and Lief Jacobsen, ends.

## 14 Linemen Back

Rated as outstanding sophomore linemen are Erling Jacobsen, center; Ronnie Husk, and Cece Walden, guards; Ellroy Jensen and Russ Inskeep, tackles, and Larry Lance, Rod Speetzen, and Victor Reginato, ends.

Running over prospects by positions, the Webfoots appear strongest at center, guards, ends and both halfback spots. The quarterback and fullback berths are certain to be stronger than in 1936, leaving the tackle posts, particularly the left, uncertain.

Vernon Moore, 187 pound two-year letterman; Denny Braid, two-year reserve, and Erling Jacobsen, 180-pounder from the freshman ranks, will take care of the center of the line. Captain Tony Amato and either Joe Huston or Nello Giovanini, all tested veterans, will fill the guard slots, aided by Chan Berry, senior letterman, and Ron Husk, Cece Walden, Arkie Robison, and Melvin Passolt, sophomores.

Three two-year lettermen, a 1936 reserve, and a sophomore top the list of tackles. The vets are Bill Foskett, agile 198-pound junior, due to open at right tackle, and Chuck Bracher and Bill Estes. Cliff Morris, 215, is the reserve, and the sophomore is Ellroy Jensen, hard-smashing 190-pound Eugene lad. George Jones, Russ Inskeep, and Merle Peters are other leading candidates.

## Fight for Old Jobs

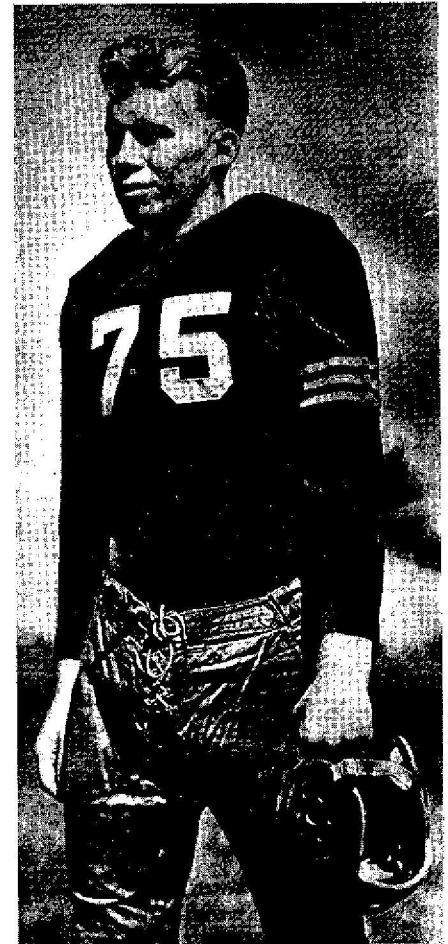
As contrasted to last year, the Webfoots are well supplied with ends, leaving End Coach Dick Reed's chief task the selection of starters. John Yerby, Lief Jacobsen, and Bud Robertson, all letter winners in 1936, will be back, but must edge out Larry Lance, Victor Reginato, and Rod Speetzen, sophomores, to make the first string.

To provide more speed and weight at the important blocking quarterback post, Callison last spring shifted Henry (Hank) Nilsen, erstwhile sophomore end, to the backfield and the stocky Astorian seems destined to remain behind the line. Arleigh Bentley, versatile senior who plays anywhere in the back-

field, and Dennis Donovan, surprise of the 1936 frosh backfield, will back up Nilsen, along with Ernie Robertson, rapidly-improving 1936 holdover.

Callison will draw upon a list of ten for his halfback roles. Jimmy Nicholson and Dale Lasselle, leading left halfbacks last year, will have to show plenty to keep out such sophomore finds as Jay Graybeal, slippery 160-pound jack rabbit; Steven Anderson, dashing passing stylist; Matt Pavallunas, stocky frosh hoop star, who turned out for the first time last spring, and Ted Gebhardt, triple threat recruit from junior college ranks.

At the right half Callison counts heavily upon hard-running Bob Smith, 180 pound Medford high product, to fill Bob Braddock's shoes. Smith, accurate southpaw passing ace, will be backed by Don Kennedy, hustling junior letterman; Bill Rach (pronounced ROCK), squad 190 pound sophomore

sprinter, and Connie Grabb, 176, sophomore.

### **Mikulak Grooms Backs**

Mike Mikulak, Oregon's former all-American fullback, points to a pair of husky sophomore line-smashers as his initial coaching contribution. They are Paul Rowe, rugged 190 pounder from Victoria, B. C., who hits like the proverbial ton of bricks, and Frank Emmons, 190 pound ex-prep sprinter from Beaverton, able to smash the line but more of a halfback type. Arleigh Bentley, when not quarterbacking, and Dave Gammon, junior letterman, will share fullback duties with Rowe and Emmons.

A tentative 1937 lineup, based on spring practice workouts, might include Yerby and Reginato, ends; Foskett and Jensen, tackles; Amato and Huston, guards; Moore, center; Nilsen or Bentley, quarterback; Nicholson and Smith, halfbacks, and either Emmons or Rowe, fullback.

Oregon's 1937 schedule will carry the Webfoots up and down the Pacific coast this fall with ten appearances. Conference opponents, in order, will be U. C. L. A., Stanford, Southern California, Oregon State, Washington State, California and Washington. Non-conference contests are scheduled with Gonzaga, the San Diego Marine Corps and the University of Arizona.

### **Frosh Squad Has 'Veterans'**

Oregon's freshman football team will appear in Portland, LaGrande, Corvallis, Eugene and possibly Klamath Falls in the course of its 1937 schedule, it was announced here today by "Honest John" Warren, coach.

The Ducklings will open their season on October 15 against an unnamed opponent and close on November 12 against the Oregon State college rooks here at Eugene. Other tilts are billed with the University of Washington Babes and Eastern Oregon Normal school.

The annual Frosh-Washington Babe game will be played under the lights of Multnomah civic stadium on Friday night, October 29. Eastern Oregon Normal will be played at LaGrande on Friday night, November 5, while the first frosh-rook game is set for Corvallis on Friday night, October 22, preceding the annual "big-game" between the rival varsity elevens.

Bjork received 276,000 votes in the nationwide poll. Bjork has signed up for next year with the Chicago Bears National professional football team.

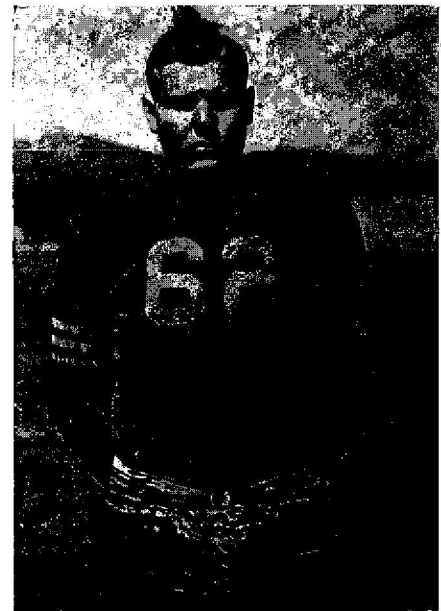
As captain of last year's team Bjork was mentioned on several All-American teams.

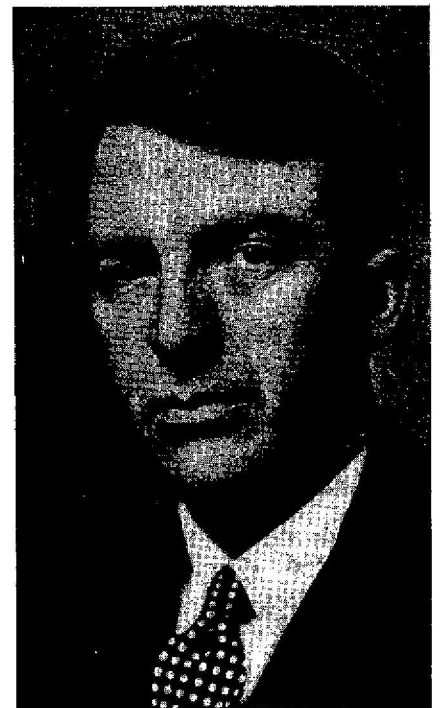
