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NOTES ON COURSE LISTS

Courses are listed in the same order as in the Catalog, which should be consulted for additional information; most courses which have not been assigned a definite time for meeting have been omitted here. Any course in the current Catalog (whether or not listed in this Schedule) may be offered in case of sufficient demand, and any course may be withdrawn in case there is not sufficient demand. Course titles have been systematically abbreviated to the length which can be recorded on students' permanent record sheets.

Prerequisites for enrolling in courses are stated in footnotes, with these standard exceptions: *c*, continuity requiring that course be taken from the beginning; *gG*, graduate credit for certain 400 courses; *i*, instructor's consent; *N*, no-grade course.

Class meetings normally begin on the hour and continue for fifty minutes. The symbol ** means "to be arranged" by the instructor. If a course includes a quiz or a laboratory section in addition to a classroom section, students must arrange with the department for that assignment also.

Registration Instructions

FALL TERM 1949-50

(Veterans should also read the separate sheet of special procedures)

1. *Obtain registration material.* New students can get material at McArthur Court (south balcony) on Sunday, September 18, between 4:00 and 7:30 p.m.; later it will be available with that for old students. Old students can get material at McArthur Court (south balcony) starting Monday, September 19, at 8:00 a.m.; later in the week all remaining material will be removed to the Registrar's Office in Emerald Hall. Registration material includes:

- Time Schedule of Classes; note the blanks for planning and recording your program for the year, as well as the class schedule information and academic regulations and calendar;
- Registration Card; this IBM card is to be filled out by you after your study program has been decided with your adviser, and is to be endorsed by various officials as indicated before filing as your official registration record;
- Other cards; these are to be filled out and filed as explained below. *Please fill out all cards in ink, and do not fold or mutilate them*—you may be penalized and required to fill out new ones.
- Photocopy of your official record sheet; this is to be left with your adviser for your major department's files.

2. *Build your study program with your adviser's approval.* Advisers may be found in their offices during the registration period; note any posted office hours or schedules for appointments. Deans and department heads arrange the assignment of advisers (see index and directory on front cover of Time Schedule; Liberal Arts majors who have or are close to upper-division standing go directly to departments). Before you meet with your adviser, study your registration material (supplemented by the Catalog if needed) and try to work out a tentative Student's Year Program which you can suggest for his expert criticism and revision. Make out the Adviser's Copy of your final program, and leave it as well as your Photocopy with him. Be sure your adviser signs or stamps your Registration Card, certifying his approval of your final program. (Also be sure your Student's Year Program shows your final decisions, since this is the only registration material you will retain at the conclusion of registration.)

3. *Enroll in courses with departments.* Fill out a Class Card for each course on your approved program, and deliver it to the appropriate department office; when you leave the Class Card there you definitely are enrolled in that course (subject only to payment of fees). As evidence that your Class Card has been accepted for your enrollment, the department should stamp your Registration Card opposite the proper course. If your approved program should have to be changed before your registration is completed, return to your adviser and the department for clear approval of the change on your Registration Card.

4. *Check with Student Affairs.* Fill out your Student Union, News Bureau, Student Affairs, and Grade Report Enclosure Cards, and deliver them to clerks in the west balcony of McArthur Court (later at the Student Affairs Office in Emerald Hall). New students will have identification photographs taken at this time. Get the proper stamp on the back of your Registration Card.

5. *Check with Registrar.* When your Registration Card has all the indicated endorsements (signatures and stamps), fill in your addresses on the Fee Card. Proceed from McArthur into the adjoining south corridor of Physical Education (later in Emerald Hall), and deliver these two cards for checking and fee assessment.

6. *Pay fees to Cashier.* Deliver your completed Fee and Registration Cards at the Cashier's window, with the exact amount of money required. (If your money should be delayed, do not stop registering—consult the Cashier, and possibly secure a temporary loan from Student Affairs.) Your cash-register receipt is your evidence that you have completed registration, and are ready for classes and other University privileges.

CHANGES IN REGISTRATION

Addition of a course after registration involves:

- Adviser's approval, and his signature on two (2) Class Cards;
- Enrolling with department; one Class Card is left there, the other is stamped by the department as receipt for your enrollment;
- Filing of second Class Card (endorsed by adviser and by department) promptly with Registrar.

Addition is permitted, under the rules, only within the first two weeks of a term; if the fully endorsed Class Card is not filed with the Registrar within the first two weeks, a fine of \$1.00 is assessed against the student's deposit.

Withdrawal from a course, cancelling a course registration, involves:

- Adviser's approval, and his signature on one (1) Withdrawal Card;
- Filing of Withdrawal Card promptly with Registrar; then it is recorded, stamped, and mailed to the department.

Withdrawal and complete cancellation of registration is permitted only within the first five weeks of a term; thereafter W is recorded for passing status, F is recorded for non-passing status in any course which is officially terminated.

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

(Paraphrased from official sources)

AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY. Each student is held responsible for knowing and obeying the published rules and regulations of the University. If the University is obliged to make any changes, they will be considered to be effective from the date of their publication. A student is required to be a good citizen of the campus at all times.

ADMINISTRATION. The maintenance of students' academic records, together with admission and registration and grades and other related procedures, is the responsibility of the Registrar's Office; petitions for special action are filed in this office and referred to the Academic Requirements or the Scholarship Committee. The administration of students' non-academic interests and the correlation of these with academic situations, and the preparation of petitions to the Scholarship Committee, are responsibilities of the Office of Student Affairs. Academic deans and schools are responsible for advising, instructing, and grading students' academic work. These and other University officials are responsible to the President, who derives his authority from the State Board of Higher Education and ultimately from the people of the State of Oregon.

ADMISSION

CREDENTIALS AND PROCEDURE. A student is admitted to the University after he has filed the proper documents to establish his satisfactory academic standing; consideration is given also to health and moral character. The required documents include an official Application for Admission and complete records of all school work beyond the eighth grade; they should be filed at least two weeks in advance of the anticipated registration date, and when filed become the permanent property of the University. When these have been examined and found satisfactory, a Notice of Admission and further instructions are sent to the applicant. Entrance is not fully cleared until all required information has been filed and all required entrance examinations and procedures completed; any student's registration may be cancelled if these requirements are not promptly and adequately cleared.

FRESHMAN STANDING. Graduation from a standard high school is required for admission as a freshman. If a nonresident of Oregon, the student must have ranked in the upper half of his high-school graduating class, or must be rated equally high ("decile 5" or above) by the University on the basis of either his grades or his score on a specified test of college ability.

ADVANCED UNDERGRADUATE STANDING. A student who has registered in any college or university or for any work of comparable grade must have earned at least a "C" average (or been granted clear withdrawal without any grades) for admission to the University. If advanced standing amounts to less than 12 hours, the above requirements for freshman standing must be met also. In general, credit may be granted on transfer for all courses taken in accredited higher institutions, evaluated under the academic regulations of the University. Work done in unaccredited institutions can not be approved for credit until the student has satisfactorily completed three full terms (about 45 term hours with at least a "C" average) in the University; then he may petition for credit in those University courses which parallel his unaccredited work.

SPECIAL STUDENT STANDING. A student who lacks the documents but who can demonstrate the quality indicated above ("decile 5" or higher on a specified test) may apply for admission as a special or unclassified student. This special application must be approved jointly by the Registrar and by the dean of the student's proposed major school. After the completion of three full terms in the University, a special student who has a satisfactory cumulative record may petition for waiver of entrance deficiencies and for change to regular status, while a special student who has not made a satisfactory record may no longer continue in the University (unless explicitly approved for continuance by his major dean).

GRADUATE STANDING. Graduation from an accredited college or university is required for admission as a graduate student. Work represented by unaccredited degrees can not be approved for credit, nor graduate standing granted on petition, until the student has completed at least one full term (about 15 term hours) in the University with a good (about a "B" average) record.

ATTENDANCE WITHOUT ADMISSION. Formal admission is not at present required for attendance in summer sessions of the University, nor for registration in regular sessions as an auditor only. Credit may not be earned in regular sessions except after completion of the appropriate admission procedures as described above.

REGISTRATION AND CHANGES

PROCEDURE. To register for University work in any term, a student obtains certain prepared documents from the Registrar, then consults a faculty member (appointed by his major dean) who serves as academic adviser and approves his study program; he is accepted by the respective department concerned for enrollment in each of his chosen courses, is cleared by Student Affairs and the Registrar for housing and other data, pays registration fees

to and files the required completed material with the Cashier. Registration is regularly scheduled for New Student Week preceding the fall term, and for the first day of the winter and the spring terms; a student currently in school may register in advance for the winter and spring terms. Late registration is not permitted after the first two weeks of a term, and carries a penalty fee. Detailed dates and instructions are published before each registration period.

ENROLLMENT CARD. A student who plans to register for any fall term (or for the winter or the spring term if that is his first term in that year) must file an Enrollment Card in advance. From this the Registrar ascertains that his records are clear for registration and prepares his registration material. (At present no such advance arrangements are required for summer sessions.)

STUDY LOAD. The normal study load is 15 or 16 hours per term. The minimum which is considered a "full load" is 12 hours and the maximum load is 19 hours; a student may not register for loads outside of those limits without the approval of the Academic Requirements Committee and his adviser. No student may receive more than 17 hours credit unless the term grade point average is at least 2.50, nor more than 19 hours credit unless the term grade point average is at least 3.00.

CHANGE OF STUDY PROGRAM. Any change from the original term study program filed at registration must be approved by a student's adviser, and the proper documents filed with the Registrar, before it becomes effective and a matter of record. *No student may receive credit for any course in which he is not officially registered, nor escape a record for every course in which he is officially registered.* No course may be added after the second week of a term. No course may be dropped from the record after the fifth week of a term; if a student is allowed to terminate his registration in a course after the fifth week, a withdrawal will be recorded if he is doing passing work, or a failure will be recorded if he is not doing passing work. Complete withdrawal from the University is recorded, under the same rules, as the concurrent withdrawal from the several courses on the study program; it must be approved also by Student Affairs.

CHANGE OF MAJOR. A student is classified by the Registrar in the major originally chosen until he files an adequate notice of change; this should be approved by the dean of the new major school. (Change of adviser is controlled by the major dean, and clearance with the Registrar is not required unless a change of major is involved also.)

GRADES AND SCHOLARSHIP

GRADING SYSTEM. The quality of a student's achievement in courses is recorded by A, B, C, or D for passing work, or F for failing work. A mark of W is recorded for clear withdrawal after the fifth week of a term (no permanent record is made if withdrawal occurs during the first five weeks of a term). A temporary mark of i may be recorded if his work was incomplete in some minor yet essential detail but was of passing quality; and the instructor wishes to allow him more time for completion; this additional time may not exceed one calendar year. In certain "no-grade" courses only marks of P and NP are recorded, for passing and not-passing work respectively. Grade points are computed on the basis of 4 points for each hour of A, 3 for each hour of B, 2 for each hour of C, 1 for each hour of D, and 0 for each hour of F grade; marks of W, i, P and NP are omitted from grade point computations. The grade point average (GPA) is the quotient of total grade points divided by total graded hours; the cumulative grade point average includes all grades earned.

HONOR ROLL. An undergraduate who earns a term grade point average of at least 3.50, based on not less than 12 graded hours, is placed on the University honor roll for that term.

SCHOLARSHIP REGULATIONS. In general, a grade point average below 2.00 is considered unsatisfactory. The Scholarship Committee reviews unsatisfactory records and studies any evidence for the probability of improved scholarship, and then decides in each case whether the student may be allowed to continue subject only to the general requirements of 2.00 GPA, or whether he may continue on a special and higher term-by-term requirement, or whether he must be disqualified for any subsequent registration in the University. (These minimum scholarship regulations normally do not affect any student who is making satisfactory progress toward meeting graduation requirements.)

CERTIFICATES AND DEGREES

CLASS STANDING. A regular lower-division student is classified as a freshman until he has earned 36 term hours, then as a sophomore until he has earned 93 term hours and completed Junior Certificate requirements (or been granted Junior Standing as a transfer student). A regular upper-division student is classified as a junior until he has earned 129 term hours, then as a senior until he has completed all requirements for the bachelor's

degree. A special student is one temporarily unclassified (see Admission). A graduate student is one who has earned an accredited bachelor's degree (see Admission). An auditor is a person who has been given permission to attend certain courses without earning academic credit or establishing a permanent record.

JUNIOR CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS. By the end of his second year in the University a student should have completed the following requirements for the Junior Certificate:

Credits: 93 term hours.

GPA: 2.00 (if 2.75 or better, he earns the Junior Certificate with Honors Privileges).

Required courses (unless excused):

- Rhetoric: 9 term hours in English Composition;
- Health Education: normally 1 term for men, 3 terms for women;
- Physical Education: 5 terms in activity courses;
- Military Science: 6 terms for men.

Group courses (his choice of approved foundation courses numbered No. 100-110 and No. 200-210, of 9 term hours each except in science where they must be 12 hours or include laboratory work; a professional school major takes one such course in each of any two groups, a Liberal Arts major takes one such course in each of the three groups and also takes a fourth course which must be numbered No. 200-210, from this list:

- I Language and literature: Survey of English Literature, Appreciation of Literature, Introduction to Literature, Shakespeare, Augustan Age of Latin Literature, Silver Age of Latin Literature, Survey of German Literature, Survey of French Literature, Survey of Spanish Literature.
- II Social science: Background of Social Science, General Anthropology, Introduction to Cultural Anthropology, Principles of Economics, Introductory Geography, World Regional Economic Geography, History of Western Civilization, History of the United States, English History, Introduction to Philosophy, 3 terms from American Governments and European Governments and International Relations, 3 terms from General Psychology and Psychology of Adjustment and Applied Psychology, Religious Foundations of Western Civilization, General Sociology.
- III Science: Biological-Science Survey, Physical-Science Survey, General Zoology, General Botany, Elementary Chemistry, General Chemistry, Analytical and Theoretical Chemistry, General Geology, 3 terms from Intermediate Algebra and Elementary Analysis and College Algebra and Plane Trigonometry and Mathematics of Finance and Analytical Geometry and Calculus, Essentials of Physics, General Physics, Elementary Meteorology and Descriptive Astronomy, 3 terms from General Psychology and Psychology of Adjustment and Applied Psychology and also General Psychology Laboratory.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE REQUIREMENTS. A student must satisfy the following minimum requirements for the usual four-year bachelor's degree (a few require five years; see Catalog):

Credits: 186 term hours total, including:

- 45 hours earned after receipt of the Junior Certificate or Junior Standing;
- 45 or 62 hours (for professional school or Liberal Arts majors respectively) in upper division courses;
- 36 hours (24 of them upper-division) in his major;
- 150 hours in graded (not in "no-grade") courses;
- not more than 48 hours in a strictly professional field (such as Dentistry, Law, or Medicine);
- not more than 12 or 24 hours (respectively for non-music majors and for music majors earning the B.A. or B.S. degree) in applied music courses;
- not more than 60 hours earned in correspondence study;
- 36 hours in language and literature courses, and including 2 years of college work in a foreign language, for the B.A. degree;
- 36 hours either in social science or in science courses (see Catalog for classification) for the B.S. degree.

GPA: 2.00.

Residence: 45 hours (normally the last 45 hours) with the University (at present 33 hours from General Extension Division classes may be counted toward this requirement).

Dean's recommendation: certification that the student has satisfied all special and additional requirements in his major.

ADVANCED DEGREE REQUIREMENTS. In general (see Catalog for detailed differences) a master's degree requires 45 hours of graduate credit (not more than 15 hours of which may be transferred from other schools), and the academic doctor's degree requires two additional years of study. A student's entire graduate program should be completed within a span of seven years, and his graduate record must average at least "B" grade in quality. A graduate student is not advanced to candidacy for an advanced degree until he has successfully taken a qualifying examination, usually within the first term or before he has earned 15 hours as a graduate student. His concluding requirement is the passing of the final examination, usually based on his thesis.

APPLICATION FOR DEGREE. A student intending to complete requirements for any degree must file an Application for a Degree with the Registrar several months in advance of the expected commencement date. No student may be granted a degree unless all academic and financial requirements have been satisfied. Degrees are awarded only in June, but a student who has completed all requirements for a degree may be given a certification of that fact at any time to temporarily substitute for the diploma.

TRANSCRIPTS. An official copy of a student's academic record earned or credited in the University will be issued on payment of the transcript fee. Unofficial copies of other documents filed with the Registrar can be furnished also.
