# TIME SCHEDULE OF CLASSES

## AND ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

### REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

**Start\*:** Inside the northwest door of McArthur Court, pick up one blank card form and go upstairs in the north balcony hall to fill it out completely. Go on through balcony and down to lower east hall, to tables where Registrar's clerks check these first cards for completeness, and retain them. Here you are issued registration material consisting of blank Study Program and Class Cards and Cashier's Card, the Dextrigraph or photostatic copy of your official record, and a Schedule of Classes (this booklet).

**Adviser:** Now go to your Faculty Adviser, probably located at a table on the main floor of the Court. (New students first fill out a card for the Dean of Men or Women, and are directed to their Adviser as they enter the south door of the Court.) He assists you in choosing courses and filling in your registration blanks, and then signs your Study Program as his OK.

**Courses:** Proceed to the department clerks in charge of each of the courses you have chosen. They take from you the proper Class Card, and place the Dept. OK on your Study Program as your official registration in that course. (**Note:** After this you cannot cancel a course registration by simply crossing the course off your Study Program, but must have the same Dept. OK placed in the "Grade" column of the Study Program.) All undergraduate men must have their Study Program OK'ed by Physical Education and Military clerks, in the lower right hand corner.

**Housing:** Go to the Housing checkers, for their OK.  
**Check:** Hand your Study Program and Dextrigraph to the Registrar's checkers. They inspect the Program for general completeness and explicitly for Adviser's OK, Dept. OK's including Physical Education and Military for men, Housing OK; they initial it as "Checked" and return it to you. They retain the Dextrigraph.

**Fees:** Go on to the Cashier's fee writers who enter your registration fees on your Cashier's Card which they retain. They send you on to the cashiers in the cage, who take your fees and also your completed Study Program. You are now registered in the University.

\* This description applies to an undergraduate registering on a regular registration day at the beginning of Fall Term. Variations in the starting place are as follows:

New Undergraduates: On Fall Term registration days go first to McArthur Court; if later, begin at the Registrar's Office in Johnson Hall.

Old Undergraduates: begin at McArthur Court if registered for the last preceding term; if not registered last term or if registering late or if you hold a University loan, go first to Johnson Hall.

Graduates, Auditors: begin at the Registrar's Office in Johnson Hall.

Only on regular registration days are the various officials and clerks grouped in McArthur Court, and late registrants must go to their respective offices around on the campus.

# ACADEMIC REGULATIONS, 1944-45

### 1. PENALTY FOR LATE REGISTRATION.

Students failing to register on the regular scheduled registration days pay a late registration fee of \$1.00 for the first day and \$1.00 for each additional day until a maximum charge of \$5.00 is reached.

### 2. ADMISSION TO CLASS.

Instructors receive a class card for each student enrolled in their courses. They do not admit to their classes students for whom they have no class cards.

### 3. CHANGES IN REGISTRATION.

a. If a change in the original term registration is found to be desirable, the student applies to the Registrar for an official change card, obtains the approval of his adviser, personnel dean, and instructors, and then files the card with the Registrar.

b. A fee of \$0.25 is charged the student for each change card filed.

c. No student is permitted to add a subject later than two weeks from the date of the last regular scheduled registration day.

d. No student is permitted to drop a subject after the fifth week of the term.

### 4. CHANGES IN CREDITS SCHEDULED.

No change may be made in the number of credit hours specified for the various courses as indicated in the official catalog, except in such courses as may be designated by a school as available for additional credit for a superior student. Such additional credit would be registered under courses numbered 305, 405, or 505, and the possible minimum and maximum hours designated.

### 5. MAXIMUM AND MINIMUM REGISTRATION.

a. No student is permitted to register for less than 12 nor more than 19 hours per term without the approval of the Academic Requirements Committee and his adviser. Furthermore, he may not register for more than 19 hours unless his grade point average for the preceding term is at least 3.00.

b. No student shall receive more than 17 hours credit in any term unless he has a grade point average of at least 2.50 for that term. No student shall receive more than 19 hours credit in any term unless his grade point average is at least 3.00 for that term.

### 6. SCHOLARSHIP REGULATIONS.

The administration of the regulations governing scholarship requirements is vested in the Scholarship Committee of the faculty. This committee has discretionary authority in the enforcement of rules governing probation, and also has authority to drop a student from the University when it appears that his work is of such character that he cannot continue with profit to himself and with credit to the institution. In general, profitable and creditable work means substantial progress toward meeting graduation requirements.

a. Any student who receives a term grade-point average below 2.00 is automatically given a warning of unsatisfactory scholarship. The Scholarship Committee will place a student on probation whenever his record calls for a more emphatic warning that he may be in danger of disqualification, but the committee is willing to allow him further time for improvement. Probation can be cleared only by specific committee action.

b. At the end of each academic year the committee will review all unsatisfactory records. A cumulative grade-point average below 1.75 will establish a probable case for disqualification, as will continued failure to achieve the 2.00 which is considered the minimum satisfactory grade-point average.

c. Students who have been suspended or disqualified are denied all the privileges of the institution and of all organizations in any way connected with it; they are not permitted to attend any social gathering of students, or to reside in any fraternity, sorority, club house, or dormitory.

d. No student may accept an elective or appointive office in any extracurricular or organization activity until he has obtained a certificate of eligibility from the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women. A student is automatically removed from any such office by failure to continue eligible for such certificate. The requirements for a certificate of eligibility are that a student:

- (1) Must be currently enrolled as a regular student in good standing (not on probation), carrying at least 12 term hours (except for a senior who may complete graduation requirements with a lighter load).
- (2) Must have completed at least 12 term hours with at least a 2.00 GPA during his last previous term in the University (except that Incompletes may be included, with not more than one term allowed for their removal).
- (3) Must have a cumulative grade-point average of at least 2.00; must have attained upper division standing if he has been in residence for six terms or equivalent.

e. The rules of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Athletic Conference govern in all questions of athletic eligibility.

**7. GRADES**

The grading system consists of four passing grades, A, B, C, D; failure, F; incomplete, Inc.; withdrawn, W. A denotes exceptional accomplishment; B, superior; C, average; D, inferior. Students ordinarily receive one of the four passing grades or failure. When the quality of the work is satisfactory but some minor yet essential requirement of the course has not been completed, for reasons acceptable to the instructor, a report of incomplete may be made and additional time granted. Students are officially withdrawn from a course on filing the proper blanks at the Registrar's Office in accordance with University regulations.

**8. REMOVAL OF INCOMPLETE.**

An incomplete must be removed within one calendar year after the receipt of the mark.

**9. GRADE POINTS.**

Grade points are computed on the basis of 4 points for each term hour of A grade, 3 points for each term hour of B, 2 points for each term hour of C, 1 point for each term hour of D, and 0 points for each term hour of F. Marks of Inc. and W. are disregarded in the computation of points. The grade point average (GPA) is the quotient of total points divided by total term hours in which grades (A, B, C, D, and F) are received. Grade points are computed on all work which the student does as an undergraduate, including transferred hours, correspondence study, and special examinations but excluding no-grade courses.

**10. HONOR ROLL.**

At the close of each term the Registrar issues a list containing the names of all students who for the term have completed at least 12 hours with a grade point average of 3.50 or above.

**11. STUDENT CLASSIFICATION.**

Students are grouped in classes on the basis of term hours earned and recorded in the Registrar's Office. Thirty-six term hours are required for sophomore standing, attainment of the junior certificate is required for junior standing, and 129 term hours (in addition to all requirements for junior standing) are required for senior standing.

**12. JUNIOR CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS.**

The Junior Certificate admits to upper division standing and the opportunity to pursue a major curriculum leading to a degree. A student is expected to fulfill the requirements for the Junior Certificate during his first two years at the University. The requirements are as follows:

- a. Term hours: minimum, 93.
- b. Grade point average: minimum, 2.00.
- c. English:
  - (1) Freshmen who receive low ratings in a placement examination given to entering students must take and pass the course designated as Corrective English (Rhet K.).
  - (2) English Composition: 9 term hours, unless excused.
- d. Physical Education: 5 terms in activity courses, unless excused.
- e. Military Science: 6 terms for men, unless excused.
- f. Health Education: 3 terms for women; 1 term for men.
- g. Group requirements: A prescribed amount of work selected from three "groups" representing comprehensive fields of knowledge. The three groups are: Language and Literature, Social Science, Science. Courses that satisfy these requirements are numbered from 100 to 110 and from 200 to 210 (see list below\*); in Science the course either must include laboratory work or carry 12 hours of credit. The group requirements are:
  - (1) For students in the College of Liberal Arts: at least 9 approved term hours in each of the three groups and at least 9 additional approved term hours numbered 200 to 210 in any one of the three groups.
  - (2) For students in professional schools: at least 9 approved hours in each of two of the three groups.

\* COURSES FOR SATISFACTION OF GROUP REQUIREMENTS (under above restrictions of course numbers and credits), offered 1944-45:

- I. *Language and Literature*: Survey of English Literature; Appreciation of Literature; Introduction to Literature; Shakespeare; German Literature; French Literature; Seventeenth Century French Literature; Spanish Literature.
- II. *Social Science*: Background of Social Science; General Anthropology; Introduction to Cultural Anthropology; Principles of Economics; Introductory Geography; History of the United States; World History; English History; Introduction to Philosophy; American Governments; General Psychology, and Psychology of Adjustment or Applied Psychology; Religious Foundations of Western Civilization; General Sociology.
- III. *Science*: Biological-Science Survey; Physical-Science Survey; General Biology, and General Zoology or General Botany; Elementary Chemistry; General Chemistry; Analytical and Theoretical Chemistry; General Geology with Laboratory; Elementary Analysis; three terms from Intermediate Algebra, College Algebra, Plane Trigonometry, Mathematics of Finance; three terms from Analytical Geometry, Differential and Integral Calculus; Essentials of Physics with Laboratory; General Physics; General Psychology with Laboratory (3 terms), and Psychology of Adjustment or Applied Psychology.

### 13. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS.

When a student has fulfilled all the requirements for a Junior Certificate, he is classified as an upper division student and may become a candidate for a bachelor's degree. The requirements for the degree (including both lower and upper division work) are as follows:

- a. Term hours: minimum, 186, including:
  - (1) Hours in upper division courses: for students in the College of Liberal Arts, at least 62; for students in professional schools, at least 45.
  - (2) Hours in the major: minimum, 36, including at least 24 in upper division courses.
  - (3) Hours after receipt of Junior Certificate; minimum, 45.
- b. Distribution of hours for different bachelor's degrees:
  - (1) Bachelor of Arts: 36 hours in language and literature departments, including two years (normally 24 hours) of college work in a foreign language.
  - (2) Bachelor of Science: 36 hours in either science or social science departments.
  - (3) Professional bachelor's degree (B. Arch., etc.): fulfillment of all major requirements.
- c. Grade point average: minimum, 2.00.
- d. Residence: minimum, 45 term hours (normally the last 45).
- e. Dean's recommendation, certifying fulfillment of all requirements of major department or school.
- f. Restrictions:
  - (1) Correspondence study: maximum, 60 term hours.
  - (2) Law or Medicine: maximum, 48 term hours toward any degree other than professional legal or medical degrees (63 of Medicine while U. O. Medical School admission requirements are 123 term hours).
  - (3) Applied Music: maximum for all students except music majors, 12 term hours; maximum for music majors toward the B.A. or B.S. degree, 24 term hours, including at least 15 term hours in Mus 390 taken during junior and senior years.
  - (4) No-grade courses: at least 150 term hours in grade courses.

### 14. SUBSTITUTIONS.

Substitutions for general University Requirements may be made only with the approval of the adviser and the Academic Requirements Committee through the Registrar's office. Any adjustment of major school or departmental requirements is subject to the approval of the dean of the school in which the student is registered.

### 15. APPLICATION FOR DEGREE.

A candidate for a degree must file an application for graduation not later than the first week of the term preceding the term in which he expects to graduate.

### 16. GRADUATION EXERCISES.

Formal commencement exercises, with the granting of degrees, are held only in June. No student is permitted to graduate or to participate in commencement exercises unless his graduation requirements have been fully met, including any financial indebtedness to the University.

### 17. SPECIAL EXAMINATION FOR ADVANCED CREDIT.

A student in good standing who wishes credit for work done other than in an accredited educational institution may petition for advanced credit examination under the following conditions:

- a. The application for such examination shall be presented on a form obtainable from the Registrar and must be recommended by the dean of the school and the head of the department concerned.
- b. In no case may such examination be based on work done in high school prior to high school graduation, or in an elementary foreign language which is the mother tongue of the applicant, or in courses not listed in the University catalog.
- c. Grades earned in special examinations shall be submitted and recorded in the same way as for regularly registered courses except that credits and grade points will be recorded only when the grade earned in the examination is C or higher.
- d. No student may take an examination for advanced standing in a term in which he is to receive a degree.
- e. All special examinations must be authorized by the Academic Requirements Committee in advance, and no examination may be taken until the applicant has received a permit from the Registrar's Office for which a fee of \$1.00 per term hour will be charged.

### 18. REGULAR STANDING FOR SPECIAL STUDENTS.

A student who has been admitted as a special may obtain regular standing and be accepted as a candidate for a degree under the following conditions:

- a. He must have the recommendation of the dean of the school in which he is registered and of the head of his major department.
- b. He must have completed in an organized curriculum not less than 45 term hours with a grade point average of at least 2.50.
- c. He must have satisfied the regular requirements in English Composition.
- d. He must satisfactorily pass such psychological and placement examinations as may be prescribed.
- e. The final decision as to the admission of the applicant to regular status shall be made by the Academic Requirements Committee. It is understood that only cases of exceptional merit will be approved.

### 19. ATTENDANCE.

- a. Each instructor reports to the Personnel Deans every case of absences which in his judgment needs special attention. The student concerned must at once make the required adjustment with the instructor. In case a student's registration is cancelled for any reason, he may regain his former status only by making the required adjustments and paying the reinstatement fee of \$2.00.
- b. No student organization shall be absent from the campus, for the purpose of touring the state or meeting other outside appointments, during examination week.

### 20. WITHDRAWAL FROM SCHOOL.

Any student in good standing is entitled to honorable dismissal at any time. A student desiring to withdraw from the University should file in the Registrar's Office the proper application, signed by his adviser, the Dean of Men or Dean of Women, and showing his present grades in all courses for which he is registered.
