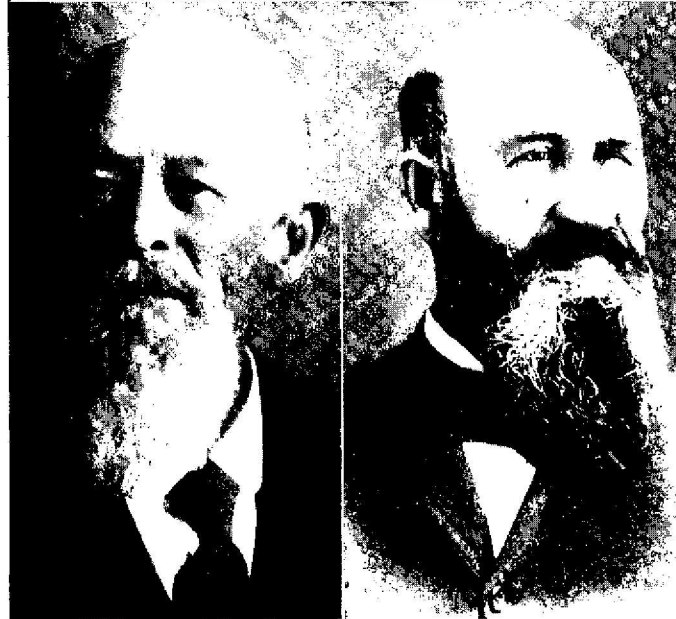
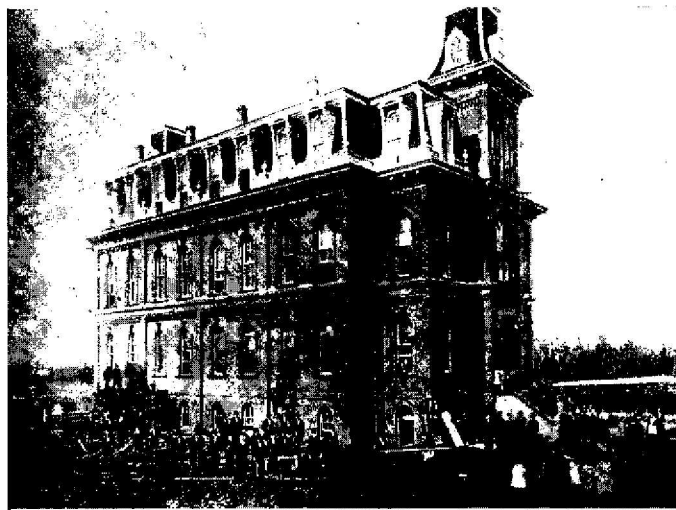

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## NEWS AND COMMENT

By the Editor

### *Chancellor Hunt*

We find our sympathies divided in this matter of obtaining a new chancellor for Oregon's system of higher education. First of all our sympathies are with those alumni and friends and faculty members who have borne under the present situation for the past several months with self-imposed silence and constantly thwarted hope. It has become a situation that borders on indignity.

The whole state knows how so many thousands feel about things as they now stand; and the whole state is of course aware that whatever apparent peace prevails is only existent because of assurance that by keeping quiet, the desired ends may sooner be brought about. But, unless something is done soon, a breaking point is sure to come.

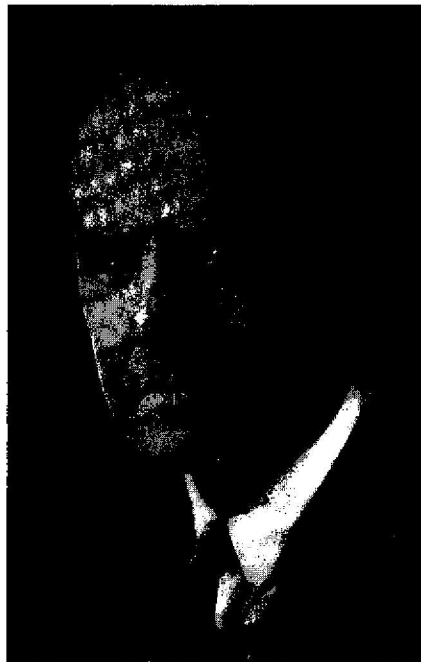
On the other hand (and if we can forget the long delay in getting started on the hunt for a new chancellor) it is not hard to sympathize with the state board of higher education. To find a man suitable to place at the helm of Oregon's higher education is no small task, but certainly not an impossible one. It is easy to understand the board's desire to be sure of their ground before selecting a man to take Dr. Kerr's place. But likewise it is easy to understand the undercurrent of suspicion and distrust that fomented with delay.

### *Unconvincing Statements*

This distrust and suspicion is only strengthened by the statements that a suitable salary for a suitable man is a stumbling block; and that the uncertainty brought about by the threat of the 20-mill tax limitation measure stands in the way of quick action. What (and of course this is only a fictitious supposition) would the board

do if Dr. Kerr should place an immediate resignation in its lap.

And so the board is faced again (and we repeat, we are sympathetic with it and its many problems) with a situation where it must act quickly and surely if it is to maintain a position of trust and respect. To turn a more or less questionable "peace" into a real and lasting co-operative system of higher education, with authorities trusted and authority well defined, alumni should be reassured by the action at the next meeting of the board, October 22. The board itself must sense that a clear and definite

statement of assurance that the board is doing all within its power and resources to obtain a successor to Dr. Kerr should be made in order to dispel suspicions of stalling, a prerequisite vital to cooperative effort. We are confident that it will act so as to protect educational harmony as well as its own prestige.

### *Complications*

There is the possibility, however, that those who anxiously await the appointment of a new chancellor underestimate the effect of the proposed 20-mill tax limitation measure on the board's ability to act in the matter. It may be that the type of man that the board seeks for the high executive post is unwilling to accept the chancellorship in Oregon under the threat of drastically reduced income for higher education as implied in the destructive measure that goes on the ballot this November.

If such is the case, then the board deserves even more sympathy in its task; being caught, as it were, between two fires. And if the tax-limitation measure is responsible for the delay, then it behooves the board to state so in no uncertain terms at the October meeting and at the same time to assure the public that while delay is necessary at present, that the matter will be fully disposed of at the first meeting of the board following elections. Surely such action would be fair to all concerned.

### *Destructive Measure*

A real threat to higher education, as well as elementary and secondary education in Oregon, is this proposed constitutional amendment limiting property taxation to 50 per cent of assessed valuations. The measure is

known as the 20-mill tax limitation amendment, and the havoc and chaos that it would bring not only to education in all forms but to every phase of state, county and city government is frightful to contemplate. What little income that would be left to the governmental agencies would be so sparsely distributed that hardly any one of them could operate with any degree of efficiency at all.

The measure provides for a total reduction of 60 per cent in operating revenues for the state, and when one considers the necessary state and local functions that could not be materially reduced (police and fire protection, old-age pensions, relief, state, county and city offices, etc.) it is not hard to visualize the destruction that would descend upon such functions as education, in all its branches. The measure makes no provision for supplementary income of any kind, and until such income can be assured, relief from property taxation is foolhardy and destructive.

### *Cart Before Horse*

It is inconceivable that the people of Oregon would vote such a measure without first providing some other form of revenue. It is inconceivable that education, society's most precious resource, which is fundamental to development of material, cultural and social resources, should be practically obliterated; at least thrown into utter chaos.

And if the above statement that national educators are loath to come to Oregon and the chancellorship of Oregon's higher educational system is true, then one can visualize, to a certain degree, the way in which the measure impresses those who are impartial and view the proposed law from its effects on education and the commonwealth.

### *Gratifying Response*

It has been pleasing to note the response of alumni to the several added features of active membership. The football seat preference privilege has been taken advantage of by hundreds of alumni, and while there may be some complaints as to seats thus obtained, it must be remembered that this is the first time that the graduate manager's office has operated under this preference plan, and in some cases slip-ups have occurred. The alumni office asks those alumni to forgive these mistakes, and promises that next year there will be an even better operation of this plan. The mass of detail passing through the graduate manager's office during a football season

is appalling, and to those who have seen this, the need for a bit of tolerance is obvious.

The alumni windshield stickers have proved instantly popular, and it is hoped that all member alumni who own cars are displaying them. It is

a friendly feeling to pass a car on the highway, see the sticker, and know that the driver was once a student at Oregon. It is easy, too, to recognize friends and classmates by keeping an eye out for the green and yellow stickers.

### Gillenwaters Runs

Ted R. Gillenwaters, '26, district attorney of Klamath county, has won the republican state senatorial nomination for the 17th district. Gillenwaters will replace Jay Upton, who received the republican nomination in the primaries, but resigned to run for United States representative from the district. Upton received his L.L.B. from the University in 1902.

### Receive Scholarships

Edward M. Hicks, '34, and Arthur Riehl, '32, both of Portland, have been awarded graduate scholarships at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The scholarships, which are awarded on the basis of high scholastic records, will enable their recipients to carry on advanced studies at the institute during the coming year.

Two similar scholarships were awarded to Waldemar A. Schmidt, and Marion W. Shellenbarger, graduates of Oregon State college, and also of Portland.

### CONFERENCES

#### *Emergency Education*

Conferences were the order of the summer on the campus this year. There was the conference on Higher Education, which brought to Eugene educational authorities from all parts of the United States, the Pacific Institute of Law, and, of national importance and interest—the Adult Education Institute, one of 13 of its kind held in various parts of the country.

In an eight-day session, beginning August 8, emergency education supervisors of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana studied, discussed, and exchanged experiences in a new field—adult “emergency education.”

The Institute was conducted under the direction of L. R. Alderman, Washington, D. C., director of the education division of the FERA, and Robert H. Hinckley, San Francisco, regional director for this work. Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the University of Oregon, and Alfred Powers, director of extension and summer sessions for the Oregon state board of higher education, were in charge of administrative details.

#### *Large Enrollment*

It was brought out at the Institute that although the Adult Education program did not get started until late last year, nearly 200,000 people took part. In Oregon alone, enrollment in 1890 classes organized in the Emergency Educational Relief program reached the amazing total of 34,410, and 1517 teachers were given employment during the past five months.

The program for the coming year laid out by the Institute is to serve a two-fold purpose: first, to bring education to the thousands who would be denied it otherwise; second, to provide work for hundreds of teachers who would otherwise be unemployed.

The assembled educational authorities “looked ahead” into the educational field, and declared that somewhere in the future educational program of the country, this work which is now classed as “emergency” must have a permanent place. If the work is turned over permanently to the federal government, it may be the first step toward federalization of all education, an idea which has never been popular, it was pointed out. If states and local districts are to recover the educational ground they have yielded during depression, they must recog-

nize these “emergency functions” as permanent and indispensable and prepare to finance them.

#### *Law*

The beautiful campus music auditorium has seen many audiences of various types, and its walls absorbed many strange professional “languages,” but entirely new to it was the audience and the “language” of the joint session of the Pacific Institute of Law and the Oregon Bar association which met here September 6, 7, and 8.

The law institute, under the direction of Wayne L. Morse, dean of the University law school, was a “pioneer” venture on the Pacific coast, and more than 800 lawyers, social scientists, and interested laymen were in attendance.

Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, of the United States supreme court, declared the venture to be of national importance, and sent a personal message to the legal assembly. In part, the message read, “One of the most encouraging signs of our time is the keen interest in the administration of justice, and the intelligent efforts that are being made to improve it. I think that the most fruitful of these endeavors will be found in the collaboration through conference of members of the bench and bar, of professors of law, and of students of the social sciences. What is needed is an intimate exchange of views by men of special studies and men of special experience, and the more direct and informal the procedure, the better.”

“I greatly regret that I cannot be present at the conference and I trust that this first meeting will prove to be a most auspicious beginning of the important work of the institute.”

#### *Legal Leaders*

Some of the legal “lights” in attendance at the institute were Herbert Goodrich, vice-president of the University of Pennsylvania, and dean of the law school there; Karl N. Llewellyn, professor of law at Columbia; E. A. Gilmore, president of the State University of Iowa, and dean of the law school; Newman F. Baker, professor of law at Northwestern university and secretary of the American Institute of Law and Criminology; Albert J. Harno, dean of the University of Illinois school of law; Max Radin, professor of law at the University of California; M. R. Kirk-

wood, dean of the law school at Stanford university and president of the American Association of Law Schools. And—closer to home—Ralph H. King, ex-president of the Oregon State Bar association; Judge James T. Brand, newly-elected president; Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the University; Charles H. Carey, corporation commissioner of Oregon; Joseph Carson, mayor of Portland; Eugene Oppenheimer, vice-president of the Oregon Bar association, and Arthur D. Platt, treasurer, and John G. Wilson, secretary.

While most of the days were filled with discussions on law, law administration, and law enforcement, Eugene remembered that “all work and no play . . .” and a varied program of social events including two balls, and a banquet entertained the visiting barristers, legal, and education authorities and experts.

Letters have been pouring in to Dean Morse declaring that the meet was “the best in years—and years.” A large number of those attending were former students at the University.

#### *Increased Enrollment*

Enrollment at the University will total approximately 2500 for this fall term, an increase of about 400 or nearly 20 percent. The number of students registered at present is 2324; another hundred has drawn material but not registered yet.

A freshman class of at least 900 is now deemed a certainty, an increase of about 50 percent over last year when the class numbered but 600. New students, including the freshmen, already total over 1,000, of whom about 100 are transfers from other schools.

The large increase is especially welcome to students themselves, since fraternities and sororities have been able to add large numbers of new members. The University, which once had 3400 students on the campus, is also able to take care of the increase as far as classrooms are concerned. Although the faculty members were already carrying maximum teaching loads, the increase in students is so spread about among schools and departments that all can be taken care of satisfactorily, University officials declared.

#### *Dr. Strong Dies*

Eugene friends, and hundreds of former students scattered throughout the country mourn the death of Dr. Frank Strong, who was president of the University from 1899 to 1902.

Dr. Strong has been chancellor of the University of Kansas for 18 years and professor of constitutional law for 14 years.

The noted educator suffered a heart attack last Thanksgiving and never fully recovered. He had recently observed his 75th birthday.

Dr. Strong was graduated from Yale university in 1884. He is the author of the *Life of Benjamin Franklin, A Forgotten Danger to the New England Colonies, Government of the American People*, and other historical books.

After leaving Eugene in 1902, he went to the University of Kansas as chancellor, retiring in 1929 to become professor of constitutional law, a position he held at death.

### Fraternity Will Build

Construction has begun on a new residence for Chi Psi fraternity, the first living organization to build a new house in several years.

The new building will go up on the site of the residence occupied by the fraternity several years ago, on Hilliard street bordering on the millrace. The old building was razed three years ago, but the University building committee would not allow a new house to be built because of uncertain conditions during the depression. Permission was granted several weeks ago.

Richard Sundeleaf of Portland is architect for the new house, which is to be in French rural style. Johnson and Pedersen of Portland have been awarded the contract for \$25,000.

### Federal Student Aid

Funds have been made available to the University to provide employment this school year for 235 students, under the federal emergency education program.

This represents an increase of 20 per cent over the total of 196 allotment last year, and is the largest allotment made to any institution of higher education in Oregon.

The sum of \$3525 per month will be distributed to the students beginning with the school year. The average pay per month per student will be \$15 on a probable basis of 35 cents per hour. This sum will be in addition to funds allotted the University regularly for work done by students.

Half of the recipients of the federal money must be students who were not in the University last January. This will permit attendance of 118 new students.

### Plant Improvements

An extensive improvement program on the campus during the summer was made possible by CWA and SERA grants totaling nearly \$30,000.

New walks and landscaping have been put in and many of the buildings painted and repaired inside and out. McClure hall, the Journalism building, History house, Extension and Home Economics building, men's dormitory and several smaller structures have been refinished and painted.

### Bouquet for Journalism

The high rating of the School of Journalism was made evident when Edwin Clyde Robbins, Jr. of Boston, Mass., arrived on the campus to study this fall. Robbins, the son of E. C. Robbins, who for many years was dean of the School of Business Administration here, passed up such institutions as Columbia, Wisconsin, Missouri, and others, and came all the way to Oregon for his preparation for a journalistic career.

### Expedition Successful

Six scientists from the University of Oregon and Stanford university made an exploratory trip into the Guano lake district, 40 miles east from Lakeview, known as one of the richest fields for archeological, anthropological and geological studies.

Making the trip were Dr. L. S. Cressman of the University, professor of sociology and a noted authority on anthropology; Major R. H. Back of the University military science department, and a skilled topographer; Howard Stafford and Fred J. Hoffstaed, both advanced students in geology on the campus, and Joel Berreman, and Carl Reynolds, advanced students from Stanford university.

### Poling Field Man

Dr. D. V. Poling, Presbyterian clergyman, and graduate of Oregon State College, has accepted a position as field man for the state board of higher education.

Dr. and Mrs. Poling have returned recently from East Orange, N. J., where Dr. Poling was pastor of a Presbyterian church. They reside in Albany.

### Study Counties

The bureau of municipal research of the University has completed a study of selected physical, financial and relief characteristics of Oregon

counties, a project that is expected to be of great value to state relief officials and others, according to Herman Kehrl, director of the bureau, and member of the University faculty.

The study was made possible by allocation of CWA funds to the bureau, and is divided into three sections as follows:

First—Transferability of general fund warrants of each county.

Second—Tables showing the trend during recent years of six important factors: population, valuation of taxable property, tax levy for county government, total average tax levy for all purposes, general fund warrant debt and total welfare expenditure.

Third—Tabulated information on 31 physical, financial and relief characteristics.

### A. S. U. O. Membership

A total of 1600 students, or 75 per cent of those enrolled at the University, voluntarily, willfully, and of their own accord paid the \$5 fee necessary to become active members of the student body.

The response by students is believed by campaign managers to be due to the great saving which may be had by students who plan to participate in any campus functions. That free admission to football games may be obtained is in itself a valuable feature of student body membership. Other assets to be gained are the rights to vote, to hold office, to receive daily a copy of the *Emerald*, and the privilege of working on both the *Emerald* and the *Oregana*, and numerous other activities.

### P. E. Extension Work

The women's physical education department of the University is offering an extension program this fall in dancing and swimming. These courses offer recreational opportunities for town and faculty women in two types of activity.

A new member of the staff of the physical education department, Mary Jane Hungerford, will teach the dancing class.

### New Quarters

Phi Gamma Delta fraternity moved from its chapter house to Sherry Ross unit of Dean Straub memorial hall in September. The fraternity took over the entire dormitory unit at the same rate as other dormitory residents.

The move was to cut down expense of operating a living organization.

# FACULTY

## New Faculty

Eleven newcomers to the University faculty began instruction at the beginning of the fall term. The new members are: Vernon Wiscarson, assistant instructor in music; Charles M. Hulton, instructor in journalism; Henry L. Everett, associate professor of law; James Carrell, instructor in English; Helen Crane, instructor in romance languages; Colonel E. V. D. Murphy, commandant of the R. O. T. C.; Alton L. Alderman, instructor in zoology; James Stovall, instructor in geography; Lester F. Beck, assistant professor of psychology, and Martha W. Wyatt, instructor in social training work.

In addition to the new members, two others have been transferred back to the University after two years at Oregon State. They are A. H. Kunz, assistant professor of chemistry, and A. E. Caswell, professor of physics. Dr. L. A. Wood, professor of economics, has returned to the campus after a year's leave of absence.

## Moore at Yale

Dr. A. R. Moore, on leave of absence from the Oregon state system of higher education, has been invited to deliver a series of lectures at Yale university and following that engagement will deliver five lectures in Chicago before the University of Illinois medical school.

Recently Dr. Moore has been doing research for the Rockefeller Foundation at Wistar Institute, Philadelphia. An authority on biology, particularly in relation to medical training, Dr. Moore will speak on recent discoveries in "Physiological Structures of Proto-plasms and Primative Organisms." He hopes to return to the University next year.

## Conklin Leaves

Dr. Edmund S. Conklin, head of the department of psychology at the University and professor in this field here since 1911, has accepted a position as head of the psychology department at the University of Indiana, Bloomington. Leave of absence for this year from the University has been granted Dr. Conklin by Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the University.

He will take the place of Dr. W. F. Book, noted psychologist, who is retiring because of ill health. Dr. Conklin moved to Bloomington with Mrs.

Conklin and their son Edmund. A daughter, Marietta, entered the University this fall.

## Dr. Sheldon Better

Word that Dr. H. D. Sheldon, former dean of the education school at the University of Oregon, who has been at the Oregon Tuberculosis hospital since January, is gradually gaining both strength and health will be welcomed by his many former students. Dr. Sheldon intends to remain at the hospital the rest of his year's leave of absence studying literature and working on his book, *The History of Education in Oregon*.

## Onthank Delegate

Karl W. Onthank, dean of the personnel administration, took a prominent part in the Hazen Foundation conference meeting, held in Estes Park, Colorado, in August. He had co-charge of the session on guidance, appeared as speaker twice, and had charge of one of the daily section meetings.

At the end of the conference he was elected one of the directors of the Hazen foundation, which is considered a signal honor.

## Dean Morse Honored

Wayne L. Morse, dean of the school of law, has been reappointed a member of the committee of seven of the Pacific Coast division of the Social Science Research Council.

Dean Morse was first named to the council when Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, one of the founders of the organization, resigned as president of the University here.

## Barkers on Trip

Vice-president of the University, Burt Brown Barker, and Mrs. Barker left late in September, on the Japanese motorship Hikawa Maru of the N. Y. K. line for Japan, where they will attend the international Red Cross conference at Tokio, beginning October 17. Dr. Barker was appointed a special delegate to the conference by John Barton Payne, chairman of the national headquarters, Washington, D. C.

## Study Fish Habits

Dr. Henry Baldwin Ward, emeritus professor of zoology in the University of Illinois, who received an honorary

doctor's degree from the University of Oregon two years ago in recognition of his outstanding work in science, accompanied by Dean O. F. Stafford, professor of chemistry at the University, recently completed a month's trip up the Columbia river and into British Columbia.

Purpose of the trip was the making of a scientific study of the habits of fish. Dr. Ward is secretary of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and also author of several books, dealing chiefly with parasitology.

## With Symphony

Two Eugene musicians will appear as soloists at Sunday matinee performances of the Portland Symphony orchestra during the winter term.

George Hopkins, professor of piano at the University school of music and acclaimed one of the outstanding pianists of the northwest, and Miss Frances Brockman, talented young violinist at the University, will be guest performers with the Portland players.

## Receives Prize

Dr. Ernst Gellhorn, formerly professor of physiology at the University and now a professor in the college of medicine of the University of Illinois, has been awarded the coveted Alvarenga prize for the year 1934.

The prize was won for a paper entitled "The Influence of Parathormone on the Neuro-muscular System." The paper, as well as the research work Dr. Gellhorn has been doing has won him wide recognition.

## Article Published

Karl W. Onthank, head of the personnel department, has recently published an article entitled, "Conference on Effect of Social Trends on Higher Education," in the *School and Society* magazine.

The article dealt with the recent conference on higher education held on this campus, and gave a brief resume of the entire proceedings, and a summary of future trends in education as forecast by the leading educators gathered here for the meet.

## VICTORY

### Real Surprise

Not often is the rating of a football team changed overnight from a cellar position contender to that of a title threat. But that is exactly what happened to Oregon's green-shirted Webfoots between the rising of the sun on October 29 and the next morning when coast Sunday newspapers heralded into the fold of "teams to be contended with" Prink Callison's small but threatening squad of young but enthusiastic warriors.

And it was a sorry Bruin outfit from UCLA that boarded the train south. Hopes had run high in Bill Spaulding's camp. Didn't UCLA have the strongest team, packed with veterans, that it has ever been able to send out on a coast conference field? Wasn't Oregon sadly weakened from its past-season co-championship by an unmerciful drainage of veteran players? Yes, it was the Bruin's day to win; and not by a last-minute aerial attack, with Oregon off guard, as in 1932.

### Too Good to Believe

But those Bruins went home bitterly downtrodden by a score of 26 to 3 by a superior Oregon team. Oregon fans went home afraid to believe what they had seen, fearful of saying what they wanted to in praise. It was too good to be true. There was little Maury VanVliet, a second-stringer last year, who had ripped an average of 9 yards in ten times with the ball. There was the sensational Frank Michek, who ripped, tore, crashed and twisted through a really fine Ucla line to the tune of 5 yards' average for 23 tries. There was Morse on a new end-around, never before tried by Callison, who couldn't be downed until he had safely advanced the ball 22 yards and across the goal line. And Parke, and Reichman, and Pepelnjak, and Terjeson and Bishop.

And the line. It was not to be denied its share in the glorious victory.

Supposedly weak in tackles, and only two veterans (Eagle and Morse) to fall back on, the line turned in a peak-season performance. They opened wide gaps for Oregon's romping backs; they turned back time after time the studied Bruin attacks.

### New Stars Overnight

And so overnight Webfoot fans forgot the mighty Mikulak, the artful Gee and the resourceful Temple. The Bernie Hughes and the Bud Pozzos of yesterday were suddenly unmourned as the Con Furys and the Bud Joneses took the center of the stage. And as for Callison, the fans had nothing but praise. Hadn't he taken a new and green team and in just two weeks' practice sent out on Multnomah field a team that looked like the co-champions of last year after a full season of playing together?

But such unstinted praise must be accompanied by a generous dash of caution. In the cold sober dawn of Monday, Callison's men must have realized that all was not well. Even if it all were true, the season was but started. There was yet vengeful Washington, scrappy Idaho and Utah and Montana, merciless Oregon State and powerful U. S. C. yet to be reckoned with. No, it was not the time for gloating. There was work yet to be done. The seats of the mighty are

wobbly and uncertain, and to let up is to topple. Injuries, though not serious, were numerous. A relentless schedule lay ahead. The squad was small and admittedly green. Breaks can go both ways, and they certainly were with Oregon against the Ucla Bruins.

### None Too Sure

And so it is with determination and not too much assurance that Callison and his men have settled down to two weeks of intensive drill. They know that when Jimmy Phelan brings his

squad (rated stronger than for many years and with a brilliant array of backs and linesmen) to Portland on the 13th, Oregon linesmen are going to face a forward wall of Husky men that virtually snort fire and with eyes that flash vengeance. That Washington game is not to be an ordinary game. Too many factors of psychology and bitter rivalry enter in. It will be war, and the vicious are too apt to be victorious.

### Huskies May Win

In six years, Washington has not crossed the Webfoot goal. Year after year, Oregon has turned back the determined onslaught of Seattle's hopes. It is fine while it lasts, but it can't last forever. Prior to the Ucla game, the boys from the north were pretty sure that "this was Washington's year." After the game, they weren't so sure. Sadly, but truly, this very fact may be the cause of an Oregon loss. So incredible was the change from the Oregon team that had strenuously fought a 13-to-0 win over the Gonzaga Bulldogs after one week of practice and the team that brilliantly defeated a highly touted Ucla aggregation, that maybe something was screwy. Maybe Oregon was playing over its head. If that is true, Lord pity the Webfoots on Multnomah field October 13.

Anyway, it's going to be the biggest and most uncertain game Portlanders and Oregonians and 10,000 Washingtonians have ever witnessed in the Northwest. And those sportswriters who attempt to predict an outcome are going to be making the biggest guesses of their writing lives.

### FROSH

#### Fast Backfield

Oregon's 1934 freshman team will pack a lot of weight on the line but will be backed by a light ball carrying combination. Such was the report of Irvin Schulz, Webfoot yearling mentor, after spending a week with sixty or more first-year candidates.

While Schulz has made no selections for first or second teams several players have stood out in the week's drill which consisted mainly of work on fundamentals. Vernon Moore, 210-pounder from Long Beach, Cal., seems to be a standout at center. Kenyon Skinner, from Los Angeles, heads the list of would-be tackles, at least in weight, with 221 pounds.

Frank (Bud) Goodin, 180-pound back from Artois, Cal., was easily the

outstanding halfback prospect shown in the workouts. He is an excellent kicker and a fine runner. Dale Lasselle, former Grant high school star, and Calvin Mognett, from Tigard, are other leading backs.

As soon as the yearlings have passed first muster on blocking, tackling and other fundamental points, Schulz plans to pick a first and second eleven to throw against the small varsity squad in scrimmage.

Six former Portland high school stars are numbered in the squad roster. They are Tony Amato, Chuck Shumura, Bob Thompson, Russell Schultz, Dale Lasselle, and Cliff Troland. Earl Groninger, formerly of Port Royal, Pa., is registered from Portland where he has made his home.

### Mikulakian Scorn

"They weren't so tough." That was Iron Mike Mikulak's estimate of the professional Chicago Bears after the recent game in Chicago, when an aggregation of college all-stars was pitted against one of the best professional teams in the country, which ended in a scoreless tie. Last year's All-American fullback was credited with the longest run of the game, and received the plaudits of newswriters for his offensive ability and defensive brilliance. Mikulak is now with the Chicago Cardinals, another pro team, this year. Maybe the pros will be tougher now that Mikulak can show them how!

### Coaching Positions

Bill Bowerman, Oregon football and track star, has recently taken over his new duties on the staff of Franklin high school, Portland. Bowerman, aside from teaching, will coach football and baseball. Bowerman was a Medford high school star before entering the University.

Another Oregon gridiron star who is coaching high school football this year, is Mark Temple, co-captain of Oregon's co-championship team last year. Temple is coaching at the high school he once attended, Pendleton.
