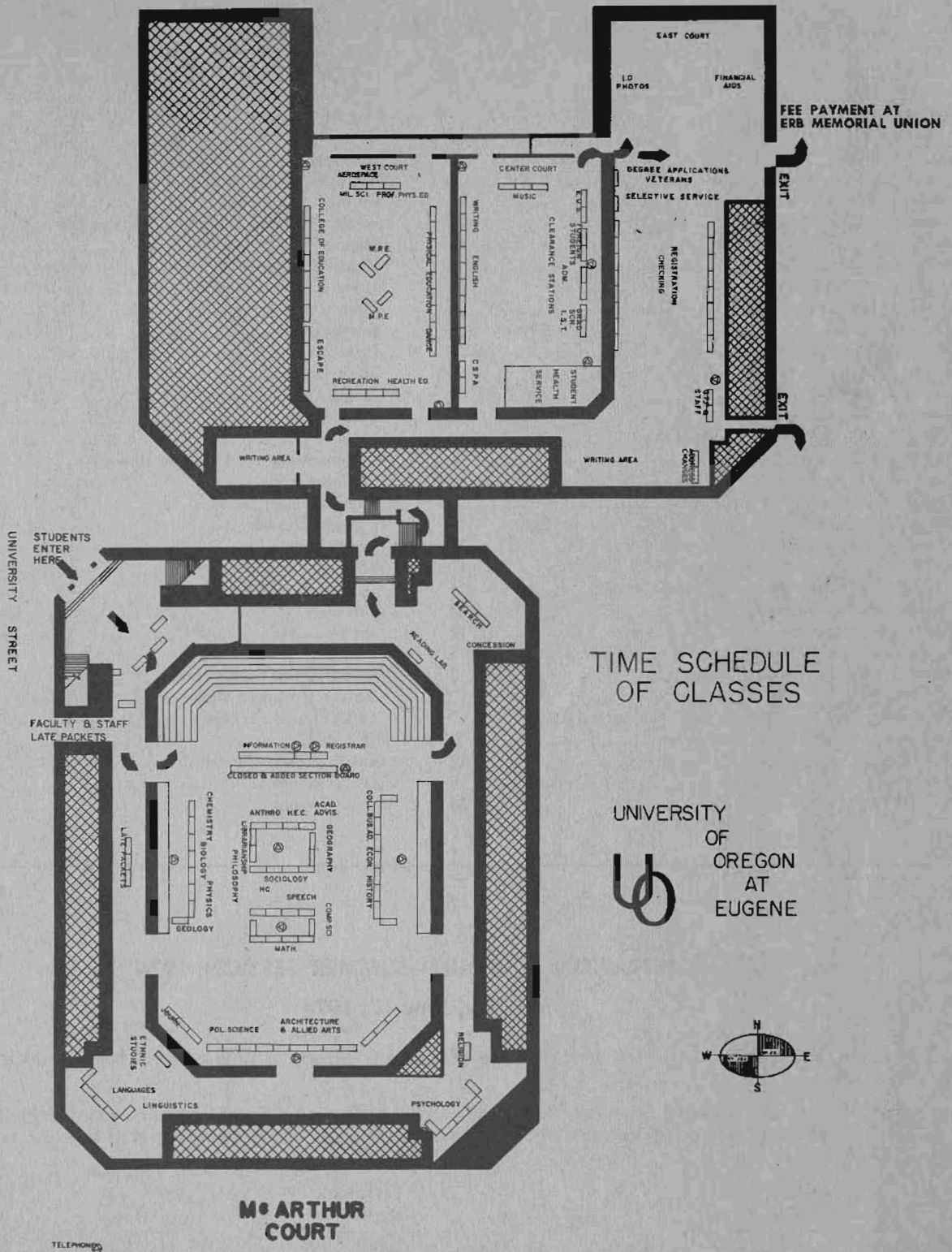

### REGISTRATION SCHEDULE—SUMMER SESSION 1974

**Monday, June 17, 1974**

Please report to McArthur Court, northwest entrance (University Street) at time specified below to pick up your registration materials.

Registration Packets will be issued by student I.D. number (Social Security Number). For even distribution of students throughout the Registration period, packets will be issued on the basis of the last 4 digits of the I.D. number, i.e., the Terminal Digits.

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURE (McArthur Court)

### 1. PRIOR TO REGISTRATION:

- a. File a Registration Request Card with the Registrar's Office at least three weeks in advance of the opening of classes.
- b. Secure advance **approval for courses** where applicable, i.e., "instructor's consent" or "variable-credits" (see course listings pages 17 through 49). Complete planned course schedule on page 53. **Retain after registration to use as a record of your study program for your class attendance.**
- c. Students newly admitted to the University of Oregon beginning Summer Session may get their Student Identification Cards (I.D.) photos taken in East Court, McArthur Court, June 17. Beginning Tuesday, June 18, I.D. Photos will be taken in Room 260, ASB. Students enrolling for the Summer Session only will **not** be issued Student Identification Cards.
- e. Report to the checking stations in East Court for final processing of your registration. Your Registration Forms and Address Update Sheets will be checked with you. Undergraduate students will be limited to 21 term hours of credit for the entire Summer Session. Students who exceed 21 term hours will have excess hours cancelled from their study load. Tuition and fees will be assessed in accordance with your indicated course load. At the time of fee assessment your Registration Form will be collected, but **you will not be considered registered until your fees are paid.** Your fee card and Registration Certificate will be returned to you.

### 2. REGISTRATION MATERIAL:

- a. Report on date and at time specified for issuance of your registration packet. Your registration packet will contain: Registration Form/Parts A and B, Registration Certificate and Fee Card. Purchase of Student Health Insurance and/or Automobile Parking Permit may be transacted at stations in the Erb Memorial Student Union.

### 3. HOW TO ENROLL IN CLASSES:

- a. Go to North Bleachers, McArthur Court, as illustrated on diagram, and secure a lap board. Number 2 pencils must be used to properly mark your Registration Form. Complete **Part A** of the Registration Form. The following items are required: name, social security number, home and local address, local telephone number and home town. If any of these items are missing or incorrect, please supply the missing information. **Write your local address and telephone number on your fee card.**
- b. Check "Closed and Added Section Board" adjacent to North Bleachers, then fill in course selections on **Part B** of your Registration Form. It is recommended that, where multi-section courses are to be selected, that you record all data pertaining to the course on **Part B** of your Registration Form with the exception of the TLN entry. Gain departmental approval for single section courses first and multi-sectioned courses last.
- c. If the section you select has a single plus (+) printed after the days listed for the course, please enroll in one of the Lab or Discussion sections which follow the lecture.
- d. Proceed to departmental tables as shown on the diagram and obtain department stamp for each course in which you wish to enroll. If you discover a conflict in your schedule and it is necessary to adjust the course selections on your Form, return to department table and request "voiding" of your course enrollment by (1) acquiring "Department Stamp" imprint in **TLN column** of course to be dropped, (2) erasing gridding and then gridding 9999. Return to North Bleachers and complete **Part B**, Registration Form.

### IMPORTANT!

- a. It is important that **Part B** be completed accurately. You will note, the TLN (Term Line Number) is the official control on this document. This section (**Part B**) represents your **OFFICIAL** registration for classes. Double check your TLN gridding to insure your registration in each course.
- b. The first horizontal line in the grid is "0."
- c. Grading option will be assumed to be "graded" if not marked.

### 4. FEE PAYMENT:

- a. Report to Cashier's Stations in the Ballroom, Erb Memorial Union (EMU), for payment of fees. Fees are to be paid at the Cashier's Station, EMU, Monday, June 17 (8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.). Beginning Tuesday, June 18, fees may be paid at the University Business Office (8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.). Beginning Monday, June 24, fees may be paid 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Late fee for courses 8 and 11 weeks duration starts Thursday, June 20.
- b. If your fees for regular session courses (1-8 and 1-11 week courses) are not paid by Friday, June 28, your course enrollment is subject to cancellation. For cancellation dates for short courses see the "Important Dates" Page 4.

### 5. VETERANS BENEFITS AND SELECTIVE SERVICE:

- a. A "Veterans Benefits and Selective Service" station will be located in the East Court (see diagram). **To receive benefits for Summer Session all veterans must report to the Veterans table.** Veterans Benefits: If you are eligible for educational benefits, you may pick up Application Form 1990. New students must turn in their Veterans Administration Certificates of Eligibility and sign up for benefits. Returning students must also sign up here. All Veterans must notify the veterans Clerk, 2nd Floor West, ASB, whenever a change of course will affect the rate of their educational allowance.
- b. Selective Service: If you wish the Registrar's Office to notify your draft board of your enrollment status, you may request that a Selective Service Form 109 or 103 may be submitted. Notification will not be sent to your draft board without your specific request.

**SPECIAL NOTES:**

- Name/Address Changes:**  
If pre-printed personal information (i.e., name, address, etc.) on Part A Registration is incorrect or missing, you may obtain "Change Forms" at the Information Table near the North Bleachers, McArthur Court. (See Page 9 for information on address requirements and instructions for completing Address Update Forms.)
- Supplemental Registration Forms:**  
If you have more than ten Term Line Numbers to mark on your Registration Form, obtain a "Supplemental Registration Form" at the Registrar's Table.
- Departmental Course Enrollment:**  
Students are encouraged to select and register for second choice sections when first choice sections are posted as closed and to complete their total registration including processing in the East Court and fee payment in the Ballroom, EMU.
- Drop/Adds:**  
Drop/Add/Change forms will be issued at the Registrar's Office beginning Tuesday, June 18. Students may initiate "Drop/Adds" and process such changes through the Registrar's Office at no charge on Tuesday, June 18 and Wednesday, June 19. Charges for drop/add will begin Thursday, June 20.

**ADVISING**

An information meeting will be held Sunday, June 16, 1974, at 7:00 p.m. in 150 Science and new students should plan to attend.

New students who have chosen a major should report on Monday, June 17, to the appropriate departmental main office for assignment to an adviser (offices are listed in the time schedule at the beginning of each department's course

offerings). Those who have not yet chosen a major should report to the Office of Academic Advising in Room 107 Friendly Hall.

Students in Elementary Education should report to the School of Education, but Secondary Education students are advised in their intended academic department. Students in Pre-Health Science fields should also report to the Pre-Health Science Coordinator in Room 107C Friendly in addition to their major department.

**PROCEDURES FOR LATE REGISTRATION/WORKSHOP REGISTRATION**

Students not completing course enrollment on Monday, June 17, in McArthur Court will follow the appropriate instructions below, beginning Tuesday, June 18. Those who do not initiate registration in McArthur Court report to the Office of the Registrar, 2nd Floor West, ASB, to pick up late registration packets on Tuesday, June 18, and follow the instructions listed below.

- Complete Part A of Registration Form.
- Report to departmental offices for approval of courses selected. (See course listings, pages 17 through 49, for location of departments.)
- Complete Part B, Registration Form.
- Report to Registrar's Office, 2nd Floor West, ASB, for checking and fee assessment.
- Report to Cashiers to pay fees. Ballroom, EMU, (8:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m.). Starting Tuesday, June 18, in Administrative Services Bldg. (8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.).

The late penalty applies to part-time and full-time students enrolled in courses which are 8 or 11 weeks duration and will start Thursday, June 20. The fine is \$5.00 the first day late and \$1.00 each day thereafter.

## FINANCIAL AID

### 1. Loans for Emergency Purposes:

For personal and educational needs students may, if they meet the criteria listed below, apply at the Office of Student Financial Aid, 270 Administrative Services Building, for a Short Term Loan not in excess of \$100.00.

#### A. Eligibility

- 1) Enrolled in a prior term at University of Oregon
- 2) Enrolled full time during current term at the University of Oregon
- 3) Must not have a presently outstanding short term loan
- 4) Must be in good standing (not on academic probation)

The approved loan will be available within a 24-hour period, or at 2:00 P.M. the following day.

### 2. National Direct (Defense) Student Loans (NDS)

Students receiving NDS loans must have their fees assessed and sign for their loan at the National Direct Loan table (EMU). Beginning Tuesday, June 18, in the Business Office, 1st Floor West, ASB. The NDSL credit card may be used to pay student's fees, but cannot be cashed unless it is used to pay fees or with presentation of fees paid receipt.

### 3. Guaranteed Student Loans (G.S.L.)

Students receiving G.S.L. checks must have their fees assessed before signing for their loans at the Office of Student Financial Aid, Room 270, Administrative Services Building. These checks can be used for fee payment.

### 4. Credit cards—Scholarships and Grants (including foreign Students)

These awards will be at the Scholarship table (EMU). Beginning Tuesday, June 18, in the Business Office, 1st Floor West, ASB.

## DEFERRED TUITION

### Deferred Tuition for purposes of Tuition and Fees Only:

Students who experience difficulty in meeting payment of tuition and fees at the time of registration may apply for a Deferred Tuition Loan in the amount of  $\frac{1}{2}$  of academic tuition and fees. Excluded from the Deferred Tuition plan are board and room, married housing, fines, penalties, program changes, deposits, and other special charges and fees.

#### A. Eligibility

- 1) Any student assessed full-time or part-time undergraduate or graduate tuition and fees will be eligible for a Deferred Tuition Loan.
- 2) The student must not have any delinquent University of Oregon accounts.

#### B. Deferred Tuition Policy:

- 1) Tuition will be payable one-half at time of registration, plus general deposit and special fees, with the balance payable July 15, 1974.
- 2) A service charge of \$3.00 will be assessed to cover administrative costs. Late charges will be assessed in the form of interest at the rate of 10% per annum on any past due amounts.
- 3) In addition to interest above, all amounts outstanding at the end of the term will be subject to collection charges and attorney fees.
- 4) In the event of a withdrawal all refunds will be applied to any outstanding balance and any un-

paid balance will be immediately due and payable in full.

Deferred Tuition Loans will be available at the Business Office Deferred Tuition Table (EMU). Beginning Tuesday, June 18, in the Business Office, 1st Floor West, ASB.

#### C. Steps to Obtain Deferred Tuition Loan:

- 1) Pick up all credit cards (NDSL, EOG, Need Grant, etc.) at the scholarship desks, EMU (if applicable).
- 2) Report to the Deferred Tuition table with official plastic I.D. card, Certificate of Registration, assessed tuition and fees card and University of Oregon credit cards.
- 3) Upon determination of eligibility the Business Office clerk will compute the amount and issue the promissory note which will be signed by the student. **In computing the student's maximum Deferred Tuition eligibility all University of Oregon credit cards will be deducted from fees assessed. One-half of the balance may be deferred. When extreme student aid needs**

**are revealed, unrestricted credit cards will be exempt from above computations.**

If a student paid his tuition and fees in part with a Deferred Tuition Loan prior to the availability of his University of Oregon credit cards and later receives his credit card, this credit will first be applied to the student's Deferred Tuition Note. If in excess of Note and service charges, the student will receive the difference in cash. When extreme student aid needs are revealed, unrestricted credit cards will be exempt from above credit application.

- 4) Student will be given the Deferred Tuition Loan for presentation to Cashier when paying tuition and fees.

#### D. Other Student Aid:

Should this Deferred Tuition Loan Program not meet your immediate needs for paying tuition and fees, check with the Office of Student Financial Aid, 270 Administrative Services Building, for other possible resources.

Students *completely withdrawing* from school will be given refunds in accordance with the above schedule. All refunds are calculated from the date the student is officially withdrawn, not from the date of last class attendance.

Students *reducing their schedule* will not be eligible for refunds unless their course load is reduced for reasons beyond their control.

For example: 1. A course is cancelled by the University.

2. The prerequisite or time of a course is incorrectly stated in the Time Schedule thereby causing a conflict with other elements of the student's schedule.

Reduction of course load because of work load or other personal reasons will not qualify as a suitable condition for refund.

Any claim for refund resulting from a reduction of course load must be filed on a "Petition for Refund" available from the Office of the Registrar at the time of the change.

Approximately six weeks should be allowed for processing tuition refunds.

\* A student completing an advanced degree must obtain authorization to continue the following term in a graduate program. This is accomplished by the student's submission of a "Permission to Re-register" form via your Major Department.

Note 1. University of Oregon bachelor degree recipients who are continuing must complete and receive formal admission to Graduate School to insure a registration packet. (See Table above.)

Note 2. Since the graduate program is under an enrollment limitation, it is the students' responsibility to inform the Graduate School and appropriate department of their intentions to attend school Fall Term 1974, by filing an "Intent to Re-Enroll" form with the Graduate School.

Note 3. Graduate students admitted for Summer Session, who intend to re-enroll Fall Term, must submit an "Intent to Re-Enroll" form with the Graduate School. Those who were not admitted to an advanced degree program but attended Summer 1974 and desire to continue Fall 1974 must submit an application to their Major Department for graduate admission to obtain registration material.

Note 4. If for any reason your registration has been interrupted for a term or more and not covered by authorized leave, you must be re-admitted by submission of the "Permission to Re-register" form to your Major Department one month prior to the beginning of the term you plan to attend.

## ADDRESS REQUIREMENTS

Each student registering at the University is required to file a home address and a "campus address" if different. In an effort to reduce the number of times that an address card must be prepared, students are requested to furnish address information that can be stored centrally.

1. If your campus or home address are currently included in the central file they will appear on the preprinted registration forms. If correct, no further filing of addresses is required.

2. If one or both of the required addresses are missing or incorrect proceed as follows:

A. Campus Address: If you are living on campus in a University dormitory, private dormitory, Cooperative, Fraternity, or Sorority, find your living unit in the listing on Part A of the registration form. Mark its code and your room number (if any) in the appropriate sections.

If you are living off-campus file an "Off-Campus Address Sheet" as described in the next paragraph.

B. Off Campus Address:

1. Obtain a blue "Off Campus Address Update Sheet" for each separate address you must file.

2. In the upper left corner are a group of boxes describing the type of addresses included on the sheet. If the address being reported is your home address only, mark the home address box. If it is also your U of O address, mark this box also. The boxes marked should fully describe the address coded on this single sheet.

3. Each sheet must also have your student body number (Social Security Number) printed and gridded in the "Student Number" block in the lower right corner of the sheet.

4. Each block used must be complete, e.g., when entering your street address in the middle block make certain that the complete address is gridded.

5. Any data block on the form which is not relevant to the

address being submitted may be omitted, e.g., if there is no telephone at this address, the "Telephone No." block can be ignored.

6. Unless you are supplying a name other than your own, e.g., father, do not use the name data block at the top of the page.

7. Each grid area consists of one to three columns alternately shaded and clear, and represents a coding area for one number or letter. There should be one mark only in a single grid area. Each grid area contains all or part of the following:

To complete the gridding, print the letter or number above the grid area and then mark the corresponding character from one of the three vertical areas immediately below.

8. If your Registration Form Part A shows an incorrect address, you may correct it by filing a new Address Update Sheet which includes the address description, your student number (Social Security Number) and only those address data areas which must be modified.

9. When completing the mailing instructions on Part A of registration form for grades and fee deposit refunds, make certain that you have on file, or are filing, addresses matching the ones you have designated.

## UNIVERSITY ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

### SCHOOL/COLLEGE AND MAJOR CLASSIFICATION

Your registration material shows your assigned school/college and major based on your designated major objective as confirmed by your department. Your adviser, as shown, has either been approved or assigned by the chief adviser of your department or school. These designations will be retained as a part of your official record until an approved request for change is filed with the Office of the Registrar.

#### I. Procedures For Accomplishing Changes Of Major:

##### A. Undergraduates

- 1) Change of major **within a school or college**:
  - a. Secure application form from Office of the Registrar.
  - b. Verify current status with the Office of the Registrar.
  - c. Consult with the Chief Adviser of the department you wish to enter and secure approval.
  - d. Leave the completed form in the Departmental Office.
  - e. You will be provided an official Notice of Action on your application.
- 2) Change of major **from one school/college to another** within the University.
  - a. Secure the application form from the Office of Admissions.
  - b. Complete form and return to the Office of Admissions.
  - c. You will be informed of the action taken by the school/college to which application was sought.

##### B. Graduates

- 1) Change of major if previously admitted to a degree or certification program:
  - a. Make appointment with Department Head of new department.
  - b. Complete "Request for Change of Graduate Major."
  - c. Secure Department approval.
  - d. Submit approved request to the Graduate School office.
  - e. You will be informed of the action taken by the school/college to which application was sought.
- 2) Change of major if enrolled in Post-Baccalaureate status—G5, G6, A6, K6:
  - a. Change to a Graduate Degree Objective.
    1. File a completed "Application for Graduate Admission in the Office of Admissions.
    2. You will be informed of the action taken.
  - b. Change of major in Post-Baccalaureate status:
    1. See application form from the Graduate School.
    2. Submit completed form to new department for action.
    3. Secure signature of chairman of previous department.
    4. Return form to Graduate School.
    5. You will be provided an official notice of action on your application.

##### C. Change of Adviser (all students):

- 1) If your record shows no adviser or you wish to change adviser without changing your major:
  - a. Forms available in department office.
  - b. Report to Departmental Chief Adviser who will assign you to a new adviser.
  - c. Appropriate changes will be noted in both the department and the Office of the Registrar.

## ACADEMIC MAJOR

Your official major is listed on your registration form. Any change in school/college or major will be governed by procedures printed on page 10.

It is not necessary that a student declare an official major during the summer session.

## COURSE NUMBERS

The alphabetic abbreviation preceding the course number designated the department. The number following the department abbreviation designates the course level. Both should be used in designating a course. Course numbers suggest the level of students for which they are intended as follows:

- 50-299—Lower Division (freshmen and sophomores)
- 300-499—Upper Division (juniors and seniors)
- 500-599—Graduates. Graduates may also take 400-499 courses for graduate credit if the courses are designated with a "G" or "M" (see below).

Course numbers identified by:

- "G"—graduate credit
- "M"—graduate credit for minors, non-majors
- "P"—graduate credit in professional field
- "R"—may be repeated for credit

## CLASS HOURS

Classes begin on the half hour and close twenty minutes after the hour, from 7:30 a.m. through the noon hour to 5:20 p.m. Exception: Evening courses (See course listings)

## CREDITS

1. Defined as "hours," term hours or quarter hours. One hour equals two-thirds of one semester hour.
2. Method of earning credits toward degree:
  - a. Term registration at University of Oregon
  - b. Transfer from other accredited institution (credit from two year schools is limited to that earned within the first 108 which apply toward a degree).
  - c. Division of Continuing Education
  - d. "Concurrent Registration" without extra fees at more than one division of State System of Higher Education. The combination of credits may not exceed 21.
  - e. By examination

(For details on Concurrent Registration or credit by Examination, contact Office of the Registrar.)

## STUDY LOAD

The maximum summer study load for an undergraduate student is 21 term hours for the entire summer session. **Students who exceed the 21 term hour limit will have excess hours cancelled from their study load.**

## FULL-TIME STUDENT STATUS

University officials are asked to determine and certify that you are a full-time student for a variety of purposes. Only U/O courses can be certified by the University. Courses taken concurrently must be certified by the school concerned except Division of Continuing Education (DCE) courses which are certified by Portland State University. The following is provided as a guide in meeting specific definitions:

## CLASS STANDING

The minimum credits for various undergraduate classifications are: 45 hours for sophomores, 90 hours for junior, 135 hours for senior. Any person with an accredited degree will be assigned graduate standing, but additional screening is required for entrance into the Graduate School.

## CHANGE OF PROGRAM

A Drop/Add/Change Form, processed according to the instructions thereon, must be filed in the Registrar's Office to effect any post-registration change in the Registration Card. See "Reminder: Important Dates" on page 4 of this Time Schedule of Classes for deadlines for filing changes from original registration. Complete withdrawal from all courses may be allowed, for good cause, by the Office of Student Services.

## COMPLETE WITHDRAWAL

A student may withdraw completely from the University for good cause upon receiving permission from the Office of Student Services. Tuition refunds will be made in accordance with the Refund Schedule, page 8.

## ACADEMIC WARNING, PROBATION, DISQUALIFICATION, REINSTATEMENT POLICIES

The Scholastic Deficiency Committee is composed of 7 faculty members and 4 ex officio members appointed by the President upon recommendation of the Committee on Committees. Two student members are appointed by the President upon recommendation of the ASUO.

The Committee administers, within the framework of faculty legislation, the undergraduate academic standards of the University as they pertain to the level of academic performance and progress toward a degree. When there is evidence of lack of satisfactory progress, the Committee may place a student on academic probation or disqualify him from further attendance at the University. The Committee will exercise this function over Summer School performance as well as performance during the regular academic year.

### 1. ACADEMIC WARNING

Academic warning is given as a courtesy action to advise a student of potential difficulty. Subsequent action is not dependent on receiving a warning notice, nor will a warning become part of the permanent record.

A student who is not on Academic Probation will be given a warning whenever any of the following conditions exist:

- a. An accumulated total of University of Oregon hours of non-passing grades earned since Fall Term 1969 reaches the level specified below:

- b. six or more hours of N are received for the term
- c. less than 65% of the course work attempted for the term has been completed with credit. (Grades and marks of A, B, C, D, P, N, I, and Y are counted as work attempted.)

Students given academic warning will be limited to a study load of 18 hours.

### 2. ACADEMIC PROBATION

A student will be placed on Academic Probation whenever any of the following conditions exist:

- a. An accumulated total of University of Oregon hours of non-passing grades earned since Fall Term 1969 reaches the level specified below:

- b. If in each of two consecutive terms either of the following conditions exist:

- a) six or more hours of N are received.
- b) less than 65% of the course work attempted has been completed with credit. (Grades and marks of A, B, C, D, P, F, N, I, and Y are counted as work attempted.)

- c. Based on the University of Oregon cumulative credit hours earned since Fall Term 1969 for student with Junior Classification or above, less than 80% of the course work completed has been passed satisfactorily. (Grades of A, B, C, D, P, F, and N are counted as work completed.) This rule will not apply until a student has accumulated 25 or more credit hours at the University of Oregon.

- d. A record at the time of initial admission or re-enrollment which would have caused a student to be placed on warning or probation under current University of Oregon regulations. Notification of such action will be given to the student at the time the action is taken.

Students placed on Academic Probation will be limited to a study load of 18 hours.

A student will be removed from Academic Probation if, during two consecutive terms in residence, at least 24 hours of credit has been accumulated without disqualification (see rules listed under "Academic Disqualification"). Part-time students (enrolled for at

least 3 hours but less than 12 hours per term) will be removed from Academic Probation if they have satisfactorily completed three consecutive terms in residence with a minimum of 3 credit hours per term. Enrollment for less than 3 hours will not be considered in determining the sequential enrollment pattern for establishing eligibility for removal from probation.

### 3. ACADEMIC DISQUALIFICATION

A student on Academic Probation will be subject to Academic Disqualification whenever any of the following conditions exist:

- a. An accumulated total of University of Oregon hours of non-passing grades earned since Fall Term 1969 reaches the level specified below:

- b. In the current term, six or more hours of N or received . . . or less than 75% of the course work ATTEMPTED has been completed with credit.
- c. Based on the University of Oregon cumulative credit hours earned since Fall Term 1969 for students with Junior classification or above, less than 80% of the course work completed has been passed satisfactorily.
- d. Whenever the academic record is such as to provide persuasive evidence that the University requirements for an undergraduate degree cannot be met within a reasonable period of time.

### 4. ACADEMIC REINSTATEMENT

Consideration of reinstatement to the University will be acted on by the Committee only after receipt of a formal petition from the student. Each request will be evaluated on individual merit of the case and on supportive evidence provided by the student. All students reinstated will be placed on probation.

The petition for reinstatement will be considered by the Committee contingent upon receipt of grade or mark changes, transcripts, petitions and all supporting documents on file in the Office of the Registrar no later than 30 calendar days prior to the first day of classes; later receipts of documents will be considered for the subsequent term.

### 5. SPECIAL NOTE: EVALUATION CRITERIA

In determining the number of non passing hours to be counted toward probation/disqualification action, all University of Oregon work completed by students Fall Term 1969 and thereafter will be included.

In all instances, the grades reported to the Registrar within the designated grade reporting period will determine the action of the Committee. The receipt of subsequent changes in grades or marks, or of late grades or marks will be reviewed by the Committee when considering actions for the next term.

## DECISIONS/EXCEPTIONS REGARDING ACADEMIC POLICIES

### ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS PETITIONS

The Committee is composed of 6 faculty members and 1 ex officio member appointed by the President upon recommendation of the Committee on Committees. One student member is appointed by the President upon recommendation of ASUO.

The Committee has the responsibility for the administration and interpretation of academic requirements for baccalaureate degrees, and for action on student petitions for exceptions to these requirements and other academic regulations. (It does not have jurisdiction over regulations governing graduate degrees.)

This Committee reviews petitions by students for adding and/or dropping courses after the last day to change courses. Petitions may be obtained from the Office of the Registrar where complete instructions for procedure are given with each petition.

## DEGREE APPLICATION

A formal Application for Degree must be filed with the Registrar by the end of the third week of the term before an anticipated graduation. If all academic records are clear by the date of the degree, it can be informally confirmed immediately while the diploma will be mailed later.

## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

##### d. Residence (U/O Work) :

Forty-five of last 60 completed must be taken at U/O—all degrees. Only U/O work completed in residence through registration at the University or at the Medical School or Dental School, Portland, may be counted toward satisfaction of this requirement. (Course work in Division of Continuing Education may not be counted as residence credit.) For students officially enrolled in the School of Nursing, residence with respect to a degree in nursing may include any work taken in any branch of the State System of Higher Education (including the Division of Continuing Education), provided that (a) the course work is required in the degree program in the School of Nursing and (b) the course work is not concurrently offered by the School of Nursing.

##### e. Graded Hours (A, B, C, D) :

Ninety of which a minimum of 45 credit hours must be earned at the University of Oregon.

##### f. U/O (Satisfactory Work) :

Eighty-five per cent of all work graded A, B, C, D, P, F, N (I, X, Y are marks and are not counted as work completed) completed at the U/O must be passed satisfactorily—all degrees. The U of O does not compute G.P.A.

**3. Specific Requirements**

- a. B.A. Only—Language and Literature 36 credit hours: including attainment of proficiency in a foreign language equivalent to that attained at the end of two years of college study of the language.

The language requirement for the B.A. degree may be met in any one of the following ways:

- 1) two years (normally 2 term hours) of college work in a foreign language;
- 2) one year of college work at the second-year or higher level, or the final term of any second year course, or any term of a third year or above course; or
- 3) examination, administered by the appropriate department, showing language competence equivalent to that attained at the end of two years of college study. The requirement may not be met by examination after the completion of a student's junior year.

Scores on the Foreign Language exam taken by all incoming freshmen indicate what level the student *might* begin on, not where he *must* begin.

- d. Music Majors: towards the B.A., B.S. degree, a maximum of 24 hours in studio instruction of which not more than 12 hours may be taken in the student's freshman and sophomore years.

**B. Doctor's Degree**

1. Credit hours: No requirement set by the Graduate School. The major department normally requires specific courses.
2. Residency: Three years of full time work beyond the bachelor's degree, of which at least one academic year (three consecutive terms of full time study (minimum of 9 credit hours per term) must be spent on the University campus. If the Master's degree was earned at the University, three consecutive terms of 9 credit hours per term must be completed subsequent to the completion of the Master's degree.
3. Graded hours: No specific requirement.
4. Grade Point Average (GPA): 3.00 cumulative in UO graded hours (A, B, C).
5. Time limit: Three calendar years for completion after advancement to candidacy for the degree.
6. Continuous enrollment: Three credit hours per term (except summer session).
7. Dissertation Registration: A minimum of 18 credit hours of Thesis (503) or 12 credit hours of Thesis and 6 credit hours of Research (501).

# Student Conduct Program

Published as Revised July 1, 1973

(Dates of Amendments in parentheses)

## I. THE CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

### A. General Policies

1. The University is dedicated not only to learning and the advancement of knowledge but also to the development of ethically sensitive and responsible persons. It seeks to achieve these goals through a sound educational program and policies governing student conduct that encourage independence and maturity.

2. The University distinguishes its responsibility for student conduct from the control functions of the wider community. When a student has been apprehended for the violation of a law of the community, the state, or the nation, the University will not request or agree to special consideration for the student because of his status as a student. The University will cooperate fully, however, with law enforcement agencies, and with other agencies in any program for the rehabilitation of the student. (*April 16, 1969*)

3. The University may apply sanctions or take other appropriate action only when student conduct directly and significantly interferes with the University's (a) primary educational responsibility of ensuring the opportunity of all members of the University community to attain their educational objectives, or (b) subsidiary responsibilities of protecting the health and safety of persons in the University community, maintaining and protecting property, keeping records, providing living accommodations and other services, and sponsoring non-classroom activities such as lectures, concerts, athletic events, and social functions.

4. Procedural fairness is basic to the proper enforcement of all University rules. In particular, no disciplinary sanction as serious as expulsion, suspension, disciplinary probation, or entry of an adverse notation on any permanent record available to persons outside the University shall be imposed unless the student has been notified in writing of the charges against him and has had an opportunity (a) to appear alone or with any other persons to advise and assist him before an appropriate committee, court, or official, (b) to know the nature and source of the evidence against him and to present evidence in his own behalf, and (c) to have his case reviewed by the University Appeals Board. (*March 4, 1970*)

5. Students shall have an opportunity to participate fully in the formulation of all policies and rules pertaining to student conduct and in the enforcement of all such rules.

6. Rules and sanctions affecting the conduct of men and women shall be based on general principles of equal treatment, including like penalties for like violations.

### B. Violations

1. No sanction or other disciplinary action shall be imposed on a student by or in the name of the University except in accordance with this code.

2. Expulsion or suspension from the University or any lesser sanction may result from the commission of any of the following offenses:

- a. Academic cheating or plagiarism. Plagiarism is defined as submitting material as the work of the submitter for evaluation by an officer of instruction or administration at the University of Oregon, in which a significant part of the material is based on work not done by the submitter, and there is no indication given by the submitter, in writing as part of or accompanying the material to be evaluated, which would reasonably be expected to inform the evaluator of the actual source of the material.

Cheating is defined as submitting material as the work of the submitter for evaluation by an officer of instruction or administration at the University of Oregon, in which a significant part of the material is based on a source or sources whose use for those purposes has been forbidden by the evaluator or by regulations properly disclosed to the submitter prior to submission of the material, and there is no indication given by the submitter, in writing as part of or accompanying the material to be evaluated, which would reasonably be expected to inform the evaluator of the use of the forbidden source or sources. Cheating also means the furnishing of material to another person for purposes of aiding the other person to cheat.

- b. Furnishing false information to the University with intent to deceive.
- c. Forgery, alteration, or misuse of University documents, records, or identification cards.
- d. Detention or physical abuse of another person in the University community or conduct which is intended to threaten imminent bodily harm of any such person.

e. Malicious destruction, damage, or misuse of property owned or controlled by the University, including library materials, or of private property on real estate or in vehicles owned or controlled by the University.

f. Theft or conversion of another's property occurring under the conditions of paragraph A-3.

g. Vandalism or kidnapping committed on other campuses.

h. Participation in hazing.

i. Lewd or indecent conduct occurring under the conditions of paragraph A-3.

j. Conduct which intentionally obstructs or disrupts the University functions stated in paragraph A.3 of the Code of Student Conduct. The following shall be admissible evidence that an offense described in this paragraph (I.B.2.j.) was committed: That the person accused of the offense failed to obey an order to disperse, to leave a University building, room or other premises, or to cease the use of loudspeakers, sound amplification, or other forms of generating noise after being given notice to do so by the President of the University or a person properly designated and identified as having authority from the President to give such notice.

k. Possession or use of firearms, air guns, pellet guns, switch blade knives, ammunition, explosives, or dangerous chemicals on institutionally owned or controlled property, except as expressly authorized by law or institutional regulation.

l. Two or more (or the repetition of) offenses listed in paragraph 3 below.

m. Failure to comply with the terms of any sanction applied under this code.

3. Disciplinary probation or any lesser sanction may result from the commission of any of the following offenses:

a. Possession, consumption by persons under 21 years of age or furnishing of alcoholic beverages to persons under 21 years of age on University-owned or controlled property in University related housing for single students, or at University sponsored or supervised functions. Possession, consumption, or furnishing of alcoholic beverages by those, or to those at least 21 years of age is permissible only in such areas that the President may designate.

b. Disorderly conduct, including disorderly conduct resulting from drunkenness, occurring under the conditions of paragraph A-3.

c. Raiding of University related living units.

d. Violation of any University rules approved by the Student Conduct Committee for the infraction of which sanctions may be imposed under this Code.

4. All rules approved by the Student Conduct Committee pursuant to Sections I.B.3.d., I.E.i. and I.E.4. shall be published, distributed, or posted in such a manner as to furnish adequate notice of their contents to students affected by such rules. The University's failure to comply with this requirement shall be a complete defense to any charge of violation of a rule of which the student has no actual knowledge.

### C. Sanctions

1. Sanctions which may be imposed for the commission of University offenses shall include the following:

- a. Expulsion from the University
- b. Suspension from the University for a definite or indefinite period of time.
- c. Restitution for damaged, stolen or misappropriated property or stolen or misappropriated money.

d. Disciplinary probation with or without loss of designated privileges for a definite period of time. The violation of the terms of disciplinary probation or the infraction of any University rule during the period of disciplinary probation may be grounds for suspension or expulsion from the University. The parents of any student who is placed on disciplinary probation, suspended or expelled may be so notified at the discretion of the court.

e. Loss of privileges:

- 1) Removal from dormitory or other University housing.
- 2) Loss of such other privileges as may be consistent with the offense committed and the rehabilitation of the student.

f. Admonition and warning.

g. Such other sanctions as may be approved by the Student Conduct Committee.

2. The sanctions of expulsion or suspension shall not be imposed except upon proper determination by the Student Court or the University Appeals Board.

3. The General Policies, Violations, and Sanctions shall be printed and made readily available to all students. The campus newspaper shall be requested by the Student Conduct Committee to publish the same at the beginning of each school year.

#### D. Group Offenses

1. Living organizations, and registered or recognized groups are responsible for compliance with this code and with University regulations on discrimination. Upon satisfactory proof that the group has encouraged or did not take reasonable steps, as a group, to prevent violations of this code or University regulations on discrimination the group may be subjected to the following sanctions:

- recommendation to the appropriate body that the group be denied the use of University facilities.
- restitution for damaged, stolen or misappropriated property or stolen or misappropriated money.
- recommendation to the appropriate body that the group's charter, recognition or registration be permanently or temporarily suspended.
- such other sanctions as may be approved by the Student Conduct Committee.

2. The determination that a group is liable to sanction under I.D.1. and of the sanction to be imposed, shall be made by the Student Court at a hearing held for that purpose. The President or principal officer of the group must be given a reasonable notice of the time and place of said hearing and of the nature of the charges. He or any other members of the group or representatives on behalf of the group are entitled to attend and be heard at the hearing.

3. Nothing herein authorizes the imposition of individual sanctions on any person other than in accordance with the Code of Student Conduct.

#### E. The Student Conduct Committee

1. The Student Conduct Committee, by faculty legislation and by delegation of the President of the University, is designated as the agency within the University which has primary responsibility for the student conduct program. The Committee shall be responsible to the faculty and the President of the University for recommending policies relating to student conduct, for formulating or approving rules and enforcement procedures within the framework of existing policies, and for recommending to the President of the University changes in the administration of any aspect of the student conduct program. (March 4, 1970)

2. The Committee shall consist of four faculty members and four student members, each appointed by the President of the University. Each member shall serve for a period of 12 months with one faculty member and one student member retiring at the end of each academic term (Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer). Members of the Committee may be reappointed. The President may appoint temporary members of the Committee to serve during a summer session or such other times as are necessary to assure full membership of the Committee.

3. The President of the University shall designate a Coordinator of Student Conduct who shall serve as Secretary of the Committee and assist the Committee in the discharge of its responsibilities. He shall coordinate the activities of all officials, committees, student groups, and tribunals responsible for student conduct.

4. All regulations or rules relating to student conduct that are established by any University official, committee or student group, and for which sanctions may be imposed in the name of the University, must be submitted to, and approved by the Committee. Fraternity, sorority or cooperative "housekeeping" rules adopted by members for the internal management of the living unit are not considered University rules for the purpose of this Code. Campus traffic regulations are likewise not considered to be University rules for the purpose of this Code.

5. The Committee may delegate jurisdiction to handle infractions of University rules to the Student Court and such other tribunals as may be established. With the consent of the President of the University, the Committee also may delegate such jurisdiction to appropriate University officials. In all instances such jurisdiction shall be defined by the Committee, ordinarily in terms of specified offenses, maximum sanctions, or designated living units. The Committee may, at its discretion, withdraw delegation of jurisdiction in any case and dispose of such case itself.

6. The Committee shall require from University officials and tribunals periodic written reports of the disposition of all student conduct cases handled under their jurisdiction. The gathering of such reports and their submission to the Committee shall be the responsibility of the Coordinator of Student Conduct. The Committee shall examine such reports for consistency with existing policies and, where necessary, review the reports with the appropriate officials or tribunals.

7. The Committee shall submit to the President and the faculty of the University each Fall a written report covering the entire student conduct program, including an evaluation of existing rules, policies, and enforcement procedures. It shall recommend changes in policy to the President and the faculty and changes in the administration of the program to the President.

#### F. University Appeals Board (March 4, 1970)

1. The University Appeals Board, by faculty legislation and by

delegation of the President of the University, is the final appeals body under the Student Conduct Code.

2. The Board shall consist of three faculty members, and three student members each appointed by the President of the University. A quorum shall consist of two students and two faculty members. Terms of membership shall be 12 months from the time of appointment. Members may be reappointed, but no member may serve more than two consecutive terms. The President of the University may appoint temporary members to the Board to serve during such times as are necessary to assure full membership of the Board. The Board shall elect its own chairman. The Board shall establish rules of procedure for itself. An affirmative vote of a majority of the Board members present shall be necessary to overrule a decision of a lower court. Inability of the Board to make an affirmative decision to overrule shall be deemed a decision to affirm.

3. In any case the Student Conduct Committee may appoint one of its members to serve as an additional non-voting member of the University Appeals Board. The presence of this member will not affect the Board's quorum.

#### G. Student Tribunals

1. The President of the University shall appoint five members to a Senior Court Panel, no more than two of them from the faculty and the rest from the student body. The appointments will be for 12 months but members may be reappointed, and the President is urged to preserve continuity of membership from year to year. Senior Court Panel members shall be selected for their knowledge of the Student Conduct Program in general and for their understanding of the operation of the student court in particular.

The Senior Court Panel will select an impartial system for choosing a court for each case and will be responsible for formulating rules of practice and procedure in hearings under this Code. Such rules are subject to review and revision by the University Appeals Board.

2. The President of the University shall appoint a Panel of Associates. The size of this panel shall be determined by the Student Conduct Committee, but no more than one-third of its members shall be from the faculty. The student members shall be recommended by the President of the Associated Students.

3. A student court shall consist of three members, at least two of whom shall be students. One member of each student court shall be chosen from the Senior Court Panel, and this member will be the Chairman of the Student Court. The remaining members of the Student Court may be chosen from either the Senior Court Panel or the Panel of Associates. The jurisdiction of the Student Court shall be determined by the Student Conduct Committee, and the procedural rules will be established by the Senior Court Panel under the supervision of the University Appeals Board.

4. A student court shall decide on all matters of fact, on the ultimate question of whether the Code has been violated, and on the sanction to be imposed, by majority vote. Decisions on procedural matters (e.g. on the admissibility of evidence) will be made by the Chairman of the Court. The Chairman will also decide which are matters of substance and which are matters of procedure, though on such decisions he may well seek the opinion of the other members of the court before ruling. A decision of the Chairman of the Court under this section can be reviewed only by appeal to the University Appeals Board.

5. The Student Conduct Committee, with the assistance of the Coordinator of Student Conduct, may establish minor tribunals composed of students. When appropriate, University officials or faculty members may serve as advisers. No minor tribunal shall have jurisdiction to impose the sanction of expulsion or suspension.

6. No tribunal shall have any function except the enforcement of University rules or the performance of other duties which may be delegated to it by the Student Conduct Committee.

#### H. Records

1. The Coordinator of Student Conduct shall be responsible to the Student Conduct Committee for the maintenance of adequate records pertaining to the student conduct program.

2. These records shall include a report on the disposition of each disciplinary case. Such reports shall be submitted to the Coordinator of Student Conduct by every official, tribunal, court, or committee authorized to impose sanctions under this Code.

3. In order to accomplish these record-keeping responsibilities, the Student Conduct Committee and the Coordinator of Student Conduct may prescribe reporting procedures to be followed by those authorized to impose sanctions under this Code.

#### I. Amendments

1. The above Code may be amended only by action of the general faculty of the University of Oregon.

## ASUO Services

### ASUO Child Care and Development Center

**Students:** Credit in Curriculum and Instruction may be arranged through the Escape program. One credit is given for attendance at Escape class meetings and training sessions and one credit per two hours of practicum at the Center. Enroll at the Escape table in the West Court after you have registered for your classes and can finalize your schedule. Proceed directly from the Escape table to the Child Care and Development Center's table to schedule your practicum sessions at the Center. Your practicum schedule takes effect the first day of classes for each term. Students who must register late should come directly to the Center at 1511 Moss Street for sign up and scheduling. Come to or call the Center (Ext. 4384 and 4388) if you have further questions.

**Parents:** If you have been accepted in the ASUO Child Care and Development Center, registration for scheduling your child's hours in the Center and your co-oping hours begin at 7:00 p.m. the day of registration. You should have had advance notification of your posted time for CCDC registration.

### ASUO Housing Office

The ASUO Housing Office, located on the third floor of the Erb Memorial Union, offers University students assistance in locating housing, advice on tenants' rights and rental agreements and assistance with problems with landlords.

The Housing Office serves students and area landlords alike by soliciting and posting information on available rentals of all types throughout the year. A list of students seeking roommates is also maintained. This information is posted on the Office window.

The Housing Office publishes a pamphlet covering landlord-tenant law in general, house-hunting tips and a variety of other information having to do with the responsibilities of tenants and landlords. The Housing Office also provides a number of short pamphlets on specific topics, model leases and inventory sheets for student use. Its publications and services are offered free to students of the University.

### ASUO Legal Services

The Associated Students of the University of Oregon (ASUO) provide free legal services for all students under the direction and control of a lawyer. The office is at room 307 EMU, phone: 686-4273. Appointments are not required, but are preferred for adequate scheduling.

### SEARCH

SEARCH provides alternatives and experimentation in education at the University. SEARCH (which is an acronym for Students Exploratory Actions Regarding Curricular Heterodoxy) was developed in 1967 to provide innovations in the regular University curricula. All SEARCH classes are given full University credit. Registration is the same as for any other class. Students and faculty are encouraged to contact the SEARCH office if interested in initiating new courses not presently offered at the University. The Director of SEARCH can be reached in room 334 EMU or by phoning campus extension 4377.

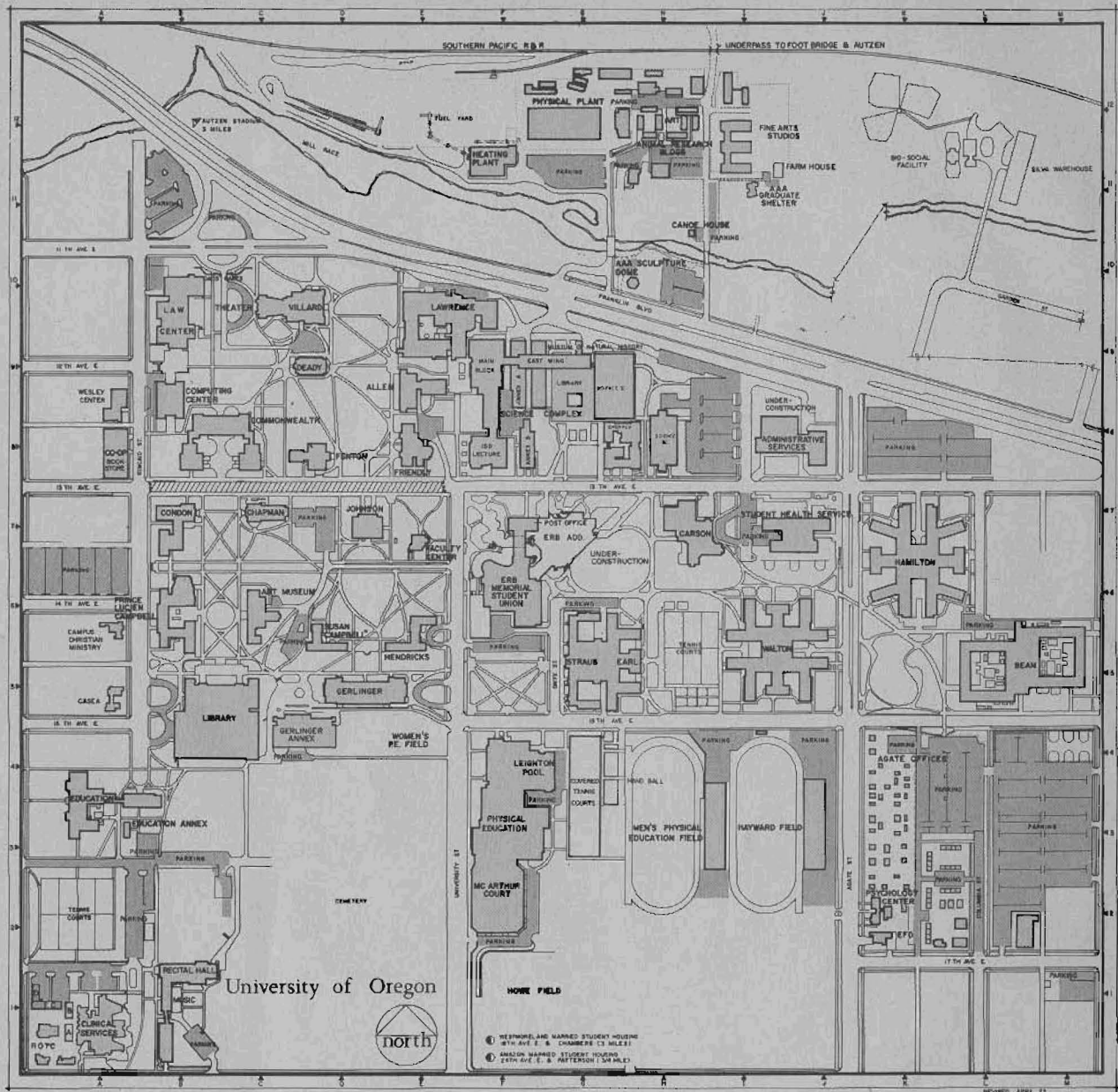
