Linguistics at Oregon

Linguistics trains the individual in analytical problem solving, hypothesis development, and testing – skills which the individual should be able to transfer to multiple other areas of human investigation. Linguistics provides an excellent foundation for careers in second language learning and teaching, and for further specialization in speech therapy, computing, journalism, law, translation, anthropology, cognitive science, psychology, neuroscience, etc. Because linguistics introduces the student to some of the approximately 6,000 languages spoken in the world and the cultural worlds these languages symbolize, it is an ideal discipline for the Twenty-First-Century individual who can no longer afford *not* to be a world citizen.

The Department of Linguistics at the University of Oregon was constituted as a separate academic unit in 1978, drawing on faculty previously in English and Romance Languages. Since that time it has granted 22 Ph.D.'s and about 55 M.A.'s, in addition to hundreds of B.A. and B.S. degrees.
