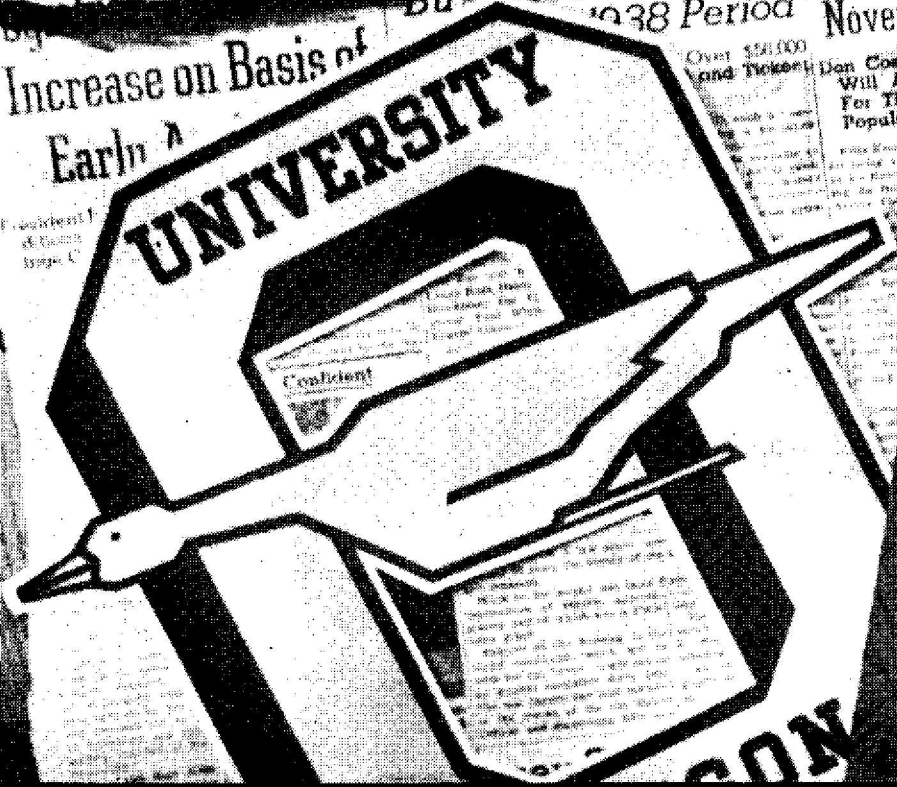

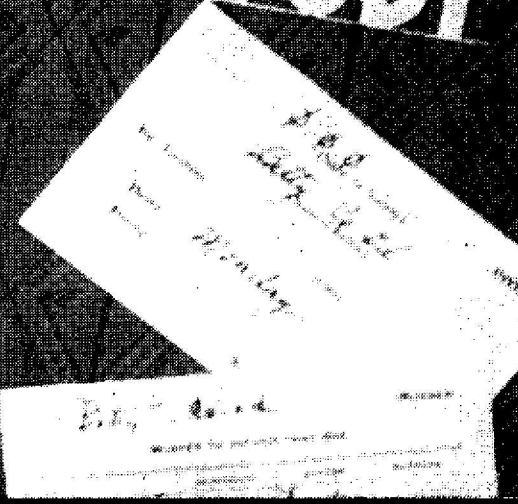

There has been a rebirth of Oregon spirit and Oregon loyalty. Starting with the student body the feeling has spread to Oregon alumni, Oregon Dads and Mothers and Oregon Friends.

The students of the campus started it out with their organizing the University of Oregon Federation to promote the interests of the University throughout the summer. The success of the big University of Oregon picnic at Jantzen Beach this summer was due to the work of students, alumni, and the Dads and Mothers. It was a "team" game that did it.

The Webfeet have taken a new lease on life. Dr. Erb, well-liked faculty member of former years, came from Stanford to become seventh president of the University. He brought with him zest and enthusiasm.

"Tex" Oliver came to Oregon as head football coach. His reputation for snappy, colorful, football which came before him was well borne out in spring practice. And those of us who saw the Oregon boys—picked as the losers by advance dope—come from behind twice to put the UCLA Bruins to rout with a 14-12 victory, saw for the first time in many years an Oregon football team

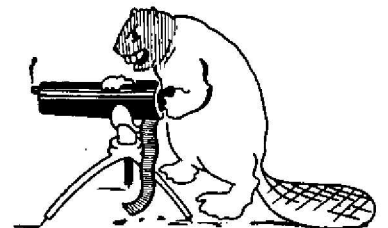

Enrollment Hits New Peak

If enrollment figures live up to the tendencies of "average" years, more than 3600 different persons will enroll in the University during the present academic year. On the seventh day of classes, figures released (see accompanying table) showed that enrollment increase for fall term was 6.4 per cent above the enrollment of the corresponding time last year. The enrollment of last fall term, which met a new all-time high, was 3140. It is apparent that the percentage of increase will settle between six and seven per cent.

Matriculates numbered 1263, showing a gain of four per cent over 1937. Old students re-registering totaled 1990 to show an eight per cent increase over the 1842 enrolled last year.

As in times past, the Sophomore class was the largest with 1233 members, and the Freshmen, Seniors, and Juniors followed in that order. This may be explained by the fact that many students complete group requirements for upper division standing at the conclusion of fall term. The professional school shows a loss of nine students. This group includes only the law students.

Physical Education and Education schools showed the most marked increase in enrollment. The Physical Education majors jumped 19.3 per cent and the Education majors totaled 168, or 19.1 per cent more than last year.

Business Administration remains the largest school in the University and in the state system of higher education with 913 majors enrolled. Their increase of 7.5 per cent is just a little more than the relative rise in enrollment of all sorts.

Journalism and Law showed the only noticeable declines in enrollment. Journalism enrolled 282 majors as compared with 1937's figure of 312. This is a net loss of 9.6 per cent. Despite this the journalism school remains fifth largest school on the campus. Non-majors in science moved from the fifth largest group last year to the fourth largest this year.

Men enrolled outnumber the women 2014 to 1239, but the women showed

an enrollment increase of 7.6 per cent as opposed to the men's enrollment increase of 5.7 per cent. Last year at the same time there were 1905 men enrolled and 1151 women.

With the optimism at the increased enrollment at the University of 6.4 per cent was the fact that there was an

8 per cent increase in the number of old students returning for work. This can only indicate the Oregon students are finding the courses they want at the University and that a high proportion finish work in their chosen fields, rather than dropping out of school or transferring to do other work.

Work Planned for Hayward Field

A \$32,000 reconstruction program has started on the athletic center of the University. Plans (see cut) call for the completion by the 1939-1940 school year of two new football practice fields, one turf and one of sawdust, just south of Hayward field and the new freshman "skinned" baseball diamond below Howe field.

On the levels behind the new physical education building will be intramural fields for softball, soccer, lacrosse and other field sports.

The Hayward grandstands are to be enlarged and rebuilt. The east grandstand will be extended to the south goal line to provide 1200 additional seats. The old west stand will be completely rebuilt and will provide 1600 more seats. The new west stand will have a high roof similar to that on the east stand and will include a new press box. All stands will be painted.

Dudley, '34, Joins Faculty

Arthur G. Dudley, '34, has joined the faculty of the school of Business Administration to teach Foreign Trade. Mr. Dudley will take the place of Prof. A. L. Lomax, '23, who is on a year's leave teaching at the University of Hawaii.

Mr. Dudley was in China following his graduation and served as manager of the Poplar Grove Farms, which was a model American dairy established in Shanghai. His plant was bombed the first day of the Chinese-Japanese hostilities. Mr. Dudley is a member of the University of Oregon chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and was married on June 19 to Margaret Stutzman.

University Buys Tract

The millrace property adjacent to the Anchorage and running north to the Willamette river has been purchased by the educational activities board of the associated students. The property has long been the scene of the Junior week-end canoe fete and future plans include the building of a permanent outdoor amphitheatre for use during the canoe fete and other outdoor activities.

Up Rainier by New Route

Donald M. Woods, '26, M.A. '31, scaled 14,408 foot Mt. Rainier by a new route up the west side—something never before attempted. The actual

ascent by this route took three days. Woods and two companions were equipped with 180 feet of rope, a small tent, and a primus stove.

Mr. Woods, now teaching at the San Jose, Cal., high school was a member of the first party that ever climbed the Three Sisters in one day—this was done in 1931. He was also a member of the Sierra club party that climbed Mt. Waddington in 1935.

Students Self-Supporting

A survey of student employment has shown that the average student at the University of Oregon earns nearly half of his way through school. Students earned more than \$25,000 during the school year. Other sources of earned income send the total student earnings to \$500,000 for the school year.

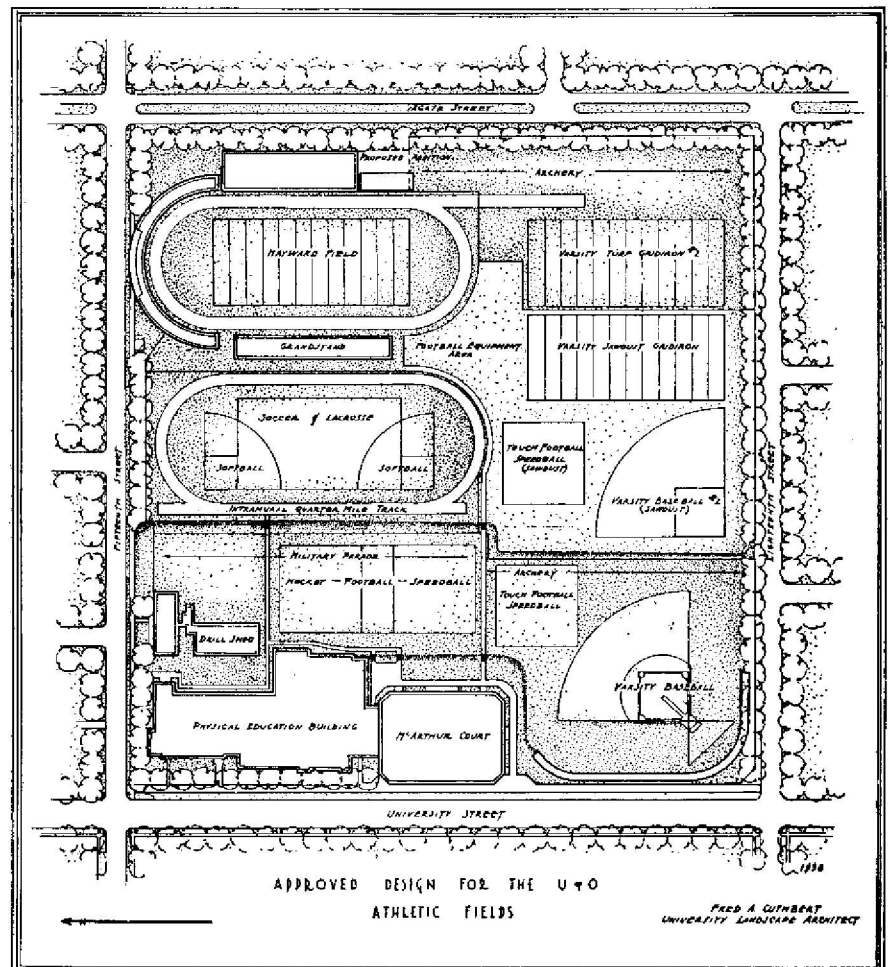
The statistics show that more than one-fourth of all students earn all of their expenses, while less than twenty-five per cent are wholly dependent.

Ducks Win Openers From WSC, UCLA

As new to Oregon as their coach, "Tex" Oliver, is the spirit and attitude of the 1938 Webfoots, who, in two conference games thus far, have disposed of Washington State's Cougars and the UCLA Bruins by scores of 10 to 2, and 14 to 12.

With unprecedented display of keen fighting spirit and a come-from-behind power, the Oregon eleven unleashed a sudden field-goal and a quick touchdown to sink the Cougars, and then followed the next week with two touchdowns against Bill Spaulding's great team from Westwood Hills, after Kenny Washington, the Negro flash, had put UCLA ahead with just minutes to play.

Power, speed, versatility and deceptive plays marked the maneuvers of the first Oliver-coached Webfoot team in their first two contests. Given a host of better than average backfield stars, Oliver and his assistant, "King" Cole, faced the problem of getting together a line which would function. Last year's line was woefully weak, but with several changes in team personnel and a "find" in Jim Cadenasso, transfer center from St. Mary's, the Oliver coaching staff surprised followers with the best defensive line Oregon has had in years.

Emmons Stands Out

Sensational plays against Washington State were Fullback Frank Emmons' 65-yard dash to the goal for the only touchdown of the game, and Gerald "Jackrabbit" Graybeal's 67-yard sprint late in the final quarter which was nullified by a clipping penalty. No less contributing to Oregon's win was the work of Jimmy Nicholson, Salem's scintillating Senator, who kicked the field goal less than three minutes after the opening whistle, added another point after Emmons' score and then flashed brilliantly in running plays throughout the game.

Washington State's two points came on a safety late in the second quarter of the game when Bob Smith, left-handed fullback from Medford, was buffeted back over the Cougar goal line after intercepting Callow's pass on the 2-yard line.

Oregon 14—UCLA 12

Under a warm sun made to order for the Bruins, the Webfoots recovered a UCLA fumble on the opening kickoff and drove the Spaulding-men deep in-

to defensive territory, where they finally checked the Oregon drives through the line. An attempted place-kick by Nicholson was low and UCLA punted to Oregon's 35.

Nicholson took a short pass from Gebhardt and raced to the Bruin 22-yard stripe. Two line plays gained little, but Gebhardt, after UCLA was penalized for off-side, sneaked around

left end to the Bruin 11. Here the Bruins came through again, Washington intercepting Nicholson's pass on the 6 and being stopped on the 13. Another similar drive in the quarter met the same fate, the UCLA dusky halfback intercepting Gebhardt's pass on the 18.

The UCLA score came suddenly in the second period with Oregon still masterfully keeping the Bruins back in

their own territory. Sommers, Bruin half, reached one hand in the air and skillfully intercepted Hankinson's pass, running to the Oregon 16 before Roy Jensen knocked him down from behind. Washington was stopped cold in two tries and a UCLA pass into the end zone gave Oregon the ball on their own 20. Bob Smith fumbled on the first play and the Bruins' McPherson recovered. A pass, Fennenbock to McPherson, went to the 3-yard line and Overlin crashed over in two plays.

Nicholson Goes Over

Nicholson scored the first Oregon touchdown in the third quarter after a determined drive brought the ball from past midfield to the 4-yard mark, the principal play a pass from Gebhardt to Nicholson. The Salem flash took the ball through center two plays later and then kicked the placement to give Oregon a 7-6 lead.

Kenny Washington soon gave the UCLAns a lead when he galloped around right end on a fake pass to the Oregon 20, after Oregon's kickoff caromed only to the 39. Two short passes to Washington from Harris paved the way for the Negro's sprint across the goal.

With a 12-7 lead against them the "Oliver Twist" men went to work with a vengeance. Through the center of the line on spinners, Emmons picked up two first downs; Gebhardt dashed around end on a reverse of the 18 for ten yards and here a timely 15-yard penalty against UCLA for unnecessary roughness gave Oregon its chance. Graybeal faded back to pass hurriedly, Gebhardt grabbing the high throw in the corner of the field for the final touchdown. Larry Lance kicked the goal for another point and the Oregon followers chalked up another victory for the Webfoots—a close, but deserved one.

Long Road Trip Ahead

Following the Stanford game in Palo Alto October 15, the Webfoots jaunt across the country to tackle Fordham in New York the following week, return to Portland the next Saturday to play USC, thence to Eugene for a Homecoming tussle against Idaho's amazing Vandals, to Berkeley for the California game, and then two more trips to Portland for the Washington fracas and the "Big Game" against Oregon State.

Minor Sports

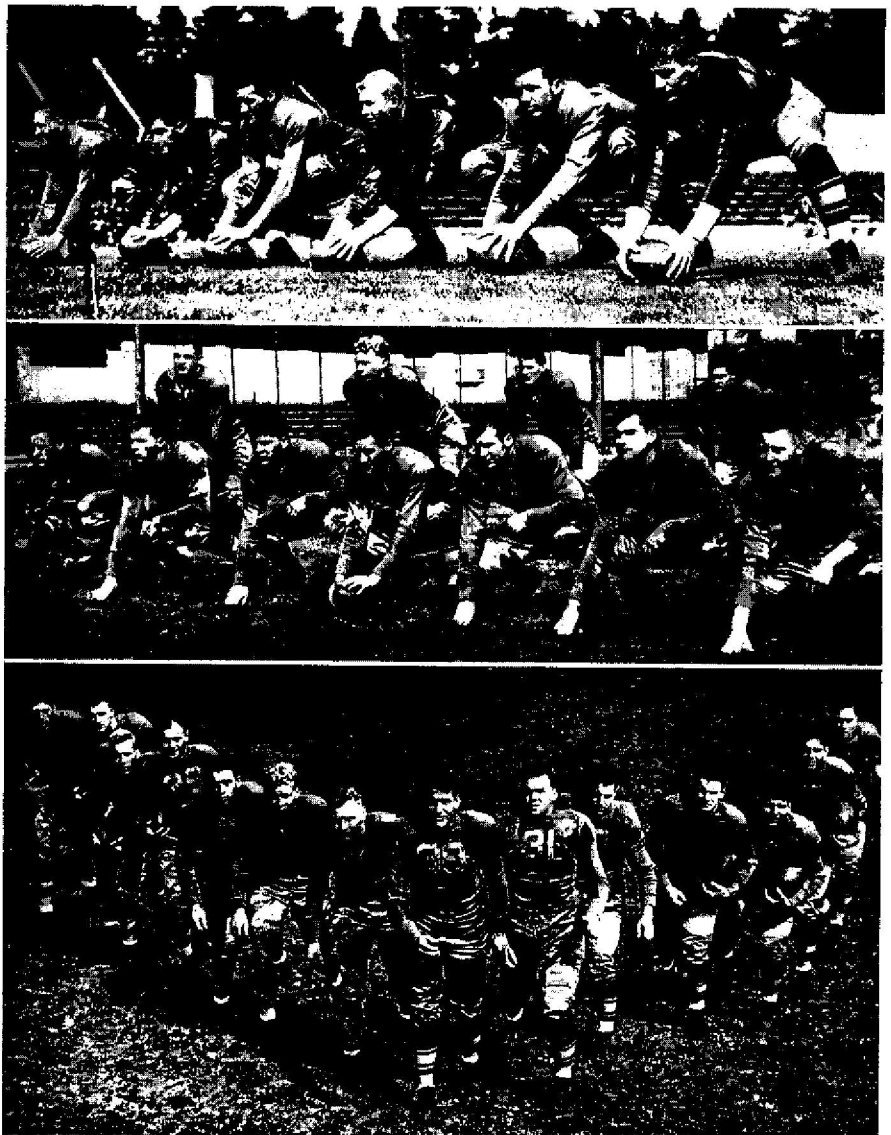
