FEES AND DEPOSITS

Fall term fees are to be paid October 12-22, 1927.

Winter term fees are to be paid January 18-28, 1928.

Spring term fees are to be paid April 11-21, 1928.

Deposits (military and room) are payable once a year.

The gymnasium suit fee is paid only once during his course by each student.

UNDERGRADUATE FEES

Registration fee\$18.75 per term

This fee covers the membership in the Associated Students, entitling the student to voting privileges, a subscription to the Emerald, free admission to all games, concerts and lectures under A. S. U. O. management; the fee also gives the student free use of the gymnasiums, swimming pools, towels, etc., and of the libraries and reading rooms, as well as medical consultation and infirmary or dispensary treatment (except that a small charge is made for the medicines used).

School of Architecture and Allied Arts\$20.00 per term

School of Business Administration 5.00 per term

School of Journalism 5.00 per term

School of Law 10.00 per term

These fees are to be paid by students majoring in the above schools instead of the course fees listed in the schedule of the school.

Music School fees—

The following fees are for applied music, one lesson and two lessons a week:

Piano—Thacher, \$35-\$60; Evans, \$35-\$60; Hopkins, \$35-\$60; Mrs. Underwood, \$30-\$55; Artau, \$25-\$45; Little, \$22.50-\$40; Mrs. Douglass, \$20-\$35.

Organ—Evans, \$35-\$60; Pierce, \$20-\$35.

Voice—Mme. McGrew, \$35-\$60; Mrs. Clark, \$35-\$60; Siefert, \$35-\$60; Carr, \$25-\$45.

Violin—Underwood, \$35-\$60; Hayden, \$20-\$35.

Cello—Little, \$30-\$55.

Wind Instruments—Ferris, \$22.50-\$40.

Military deposit \$5.00 per year

This deposit is made by every student subject to military training before equipment is issued. Provided the student returns all of the articles issued to him, in good condition, the deposit is returned at the end of the year.

Gymnasium suit fee—

Men\$ 8.00

Women 10.00

This fee is paid only once by each student during the four-year course. It entitles the student to the use of a gymnasium suit for that time, including laundry and repairs. This fee is payable at any time, but must be paid before the equipment is issued.

Non-resident fee\$50.00 per term

Required of all students who are not residents of the state of Oregon; except that (a) ex-service men pay one-half the non-resident fee, or \$25.00 a term; and (b) law students are given a reduction to the amount of the law school major fee, making the non-resident fee \$40.00 per term.

One course student fee\$8.50 per term

Students taking one course only have all privileges except membership in the A. S. U. O. and Emerald subscription.

Diploma fee\$10.00

GRADUATE FEES

Graduate fee\$8.50 per term

Graduate students are exempt from the non-resident fee, but are held for course and major fees. The graduate fee entitles the student to free use of the gymnasiums, swimming pools, etc., and of the libraries and reading rooms, as well as the health service, but does not carry with it a membership in the Associated Students or an Emerald subscription.

PRIVILEGE FEES

Late registration fee\$1.00

Cumulative fee25 per day

Students who do not file their study programs in the registrar's office before Monday, September 26, in the fall; Wednesday, January 4, in the winter; and Tuesday, March 27, in the spring, must pay a delay fee of \$1.00 with a cumulative fee of 25c for each day of additional delay. This fee must be paid before the student can register.

Late payment fee\$3.00

Cumulative fee25 per day

Students who do not pay their fees within the time set each term must pay a late payment fee of \$3.06 with a cumulative fee of 25c for each day of delay additional up to one week. After that time the student is automatically dropped from the University.

Late filing fee \$1.00 per day

All students, both undergraduate and graduate, who are in attendance during the winter and spring terms must file in person an information card at the registrar's office on the first day of the winter and spring terms; after January 3 in the winter term and March 26 in the spring term, the student will be charged \$1.00 per day delay fee.

Change of course fee \$1.00

A charge of \$1.00 will be made for each course added to the study program after it has been filed except that on the first day of the winter and the spring terms the study program may be changed without fees.

English examination penalty fee \$5.00

Students who fail to take the English examination at the regularly scheduled times, or who neglect to take it in accordance with notice given them, will be charged a fee of \$5.00.

GROUP REQUIREMENTS

Each student must complete in the lower division (during the freshman and sophomore years) at least one year-course of not less than three hours each term in three of the following four groups:

GROUP I. FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND ENGLISH.

Foreign Language. One year-course of college work in any one of the following: German, Norwegian or Swedish, French, Spanish, Italian, Greek or Latin, provided it totals not less than nine hours.

English. Any year-course in English, Written English, or Literature totalling not less than nine hours, and 9-10-20 English Poetry with Wordsworth. Written English and Shakespeare are not open to freshmen. A course taken to satisfy the written English requirement cannot be used to satisfy Group I also.

GROUP II. SOCIAL SCIENCES.

Economics. 3a,b Principles of Economics with 4 Economics of Business Organization, or any upper division course. Not open to freshmen.

Education. 51-52-53 Social Aspects of Teaching, Introduction to Education, and Educational Psychology. Not open to freshmen.

History. 61-62-63 and 64-65-66 English History, 3-4-5 European History, 41-42a,b Modern Europe, 71-72-73 American History. American History is not open to freshmen.

Philosophy. 1a,b,c Introduction to Reflective Thought, 51a,b,c Introduction to Philosophy. Course 51a,b,c not open to freshmen.

Political Science. 1-2-3 Modern Governments.

Sociology. 1a,b,c Social Origins, Primitive Society, and Psychological Foundations. Not open to freshmen.

GROUP III. MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE.

Mathematics. Three terms of work in any lower division courses.

Science. One year-course in any of the following: biology, chemistry, geology, geography, physics and psychology, provided it includes not less than one credit-hour a week of laboratory. 5a,b,c General Physics, and psychology are not open to freshmen.

GROUP IV. ARTS AND TECHNICAL TRAINING.

Architecture and Allied Arts. This group may be satisfied by nine credit hours of work in the school, provided that no one hour course be accepted unless it has been taken and passed for three consecutive terms.

Business Administration. 1a,b,c Constructive Accounting.

Household Arts. Any year-course, or group of year courses totalling not less than nine term-hours.

Music. Any year-course totalling not less than nine hours.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE TEACHING CERTIFICATE

NORMS FOR PROSPECTIVE TEACHERS

After September, 1927, the University of Oregon will recommend no graduate as a qualified candidate for a teaching position who has not completed, in addition to the professional requirements specified by the Oregon school law, the academic preparation outlined under either (A) or (B) below.

A.—For students whose major courses are included in the following list of subjects commonly taught in the high schools of the state, i. e., English, history, mathematics, Latin, French, Spanish, German, biological science (including geology), physical science (physics and chemistry), music, and physical education, the requirement is a major course of study including a major norm; or a major norm; and, in addition to either, one minor norm.

B.—For students whose major courses are not included in the above list of subjects commonly taught in the high school, the requirement is two minor norms.

Students who have started to complete norms as outlined by former legislation, may either continue with their original programs or substitute the new norms as given below:
