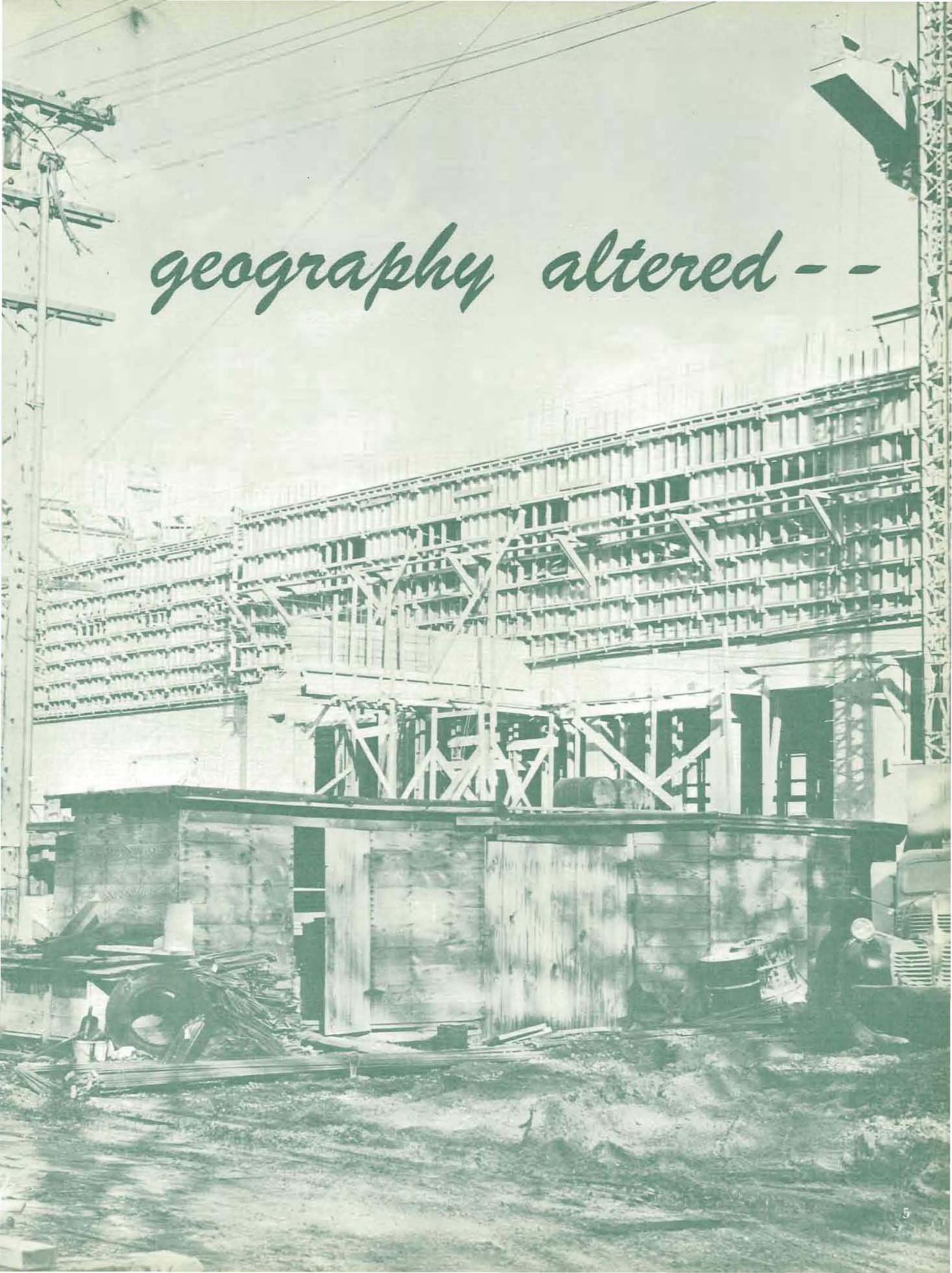

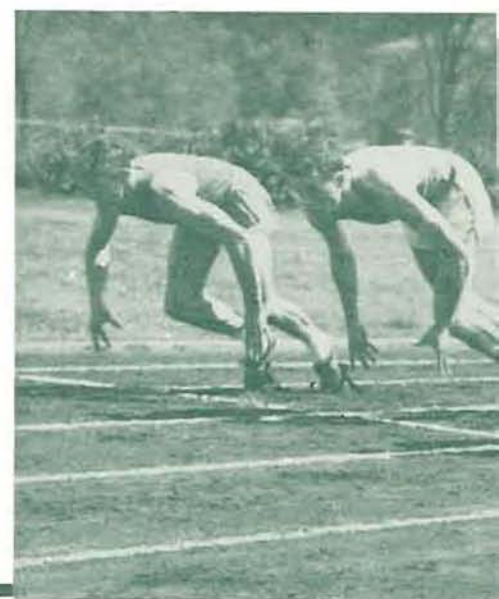

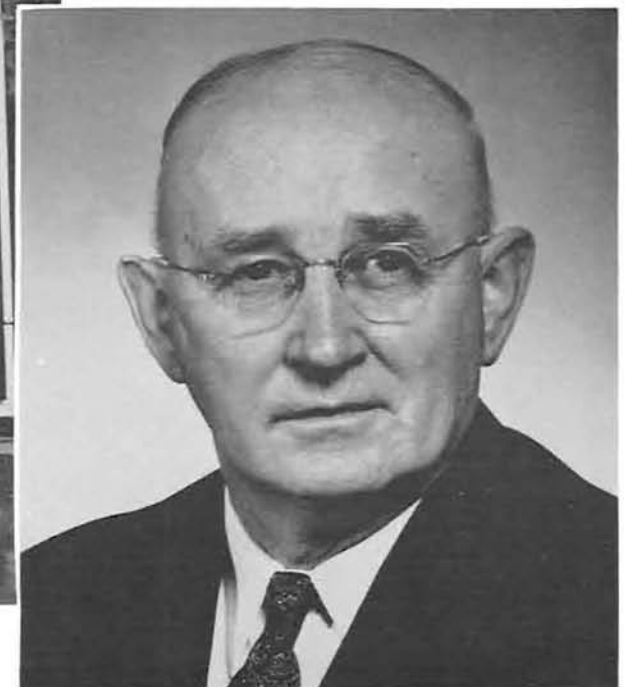

**A** NEW AND UNPLEASANT PROBLEM faced the University Administration during 1950-1951; with one generation of veterans having just been graduated, a new world crisis threatened to divest the University of its male population.

The prospect of war at least temporarily overshadowed other phases of University life.

A building program, which had greatly altered the face of the campus, was nearing completion. Yet to be finished: a new science building, the physical plant, and renovation of Friendly Hall. The Erb Memorial Student Union, constructed during the previous year, was dedicated in the memory of University President Donald M. Erb, and saw its first year of operation.

During fall term, the State Board of Higher Education outlined another building plan, which would expand particularly Oregon's athletic facilities.

In the fall of 1950 the so-called 'deferred living plan' went into effect. Under its provisions, all freshman men and women lived in campus dormitories. To meet the demands of the increased freshman population in dormitories, the University's counseling services were revamped and enlarged.

With the international situation in an uncertain condition, the University could not look forward with any certainty to the future. However, it retained the progress which had been characteristic of its post-war years.

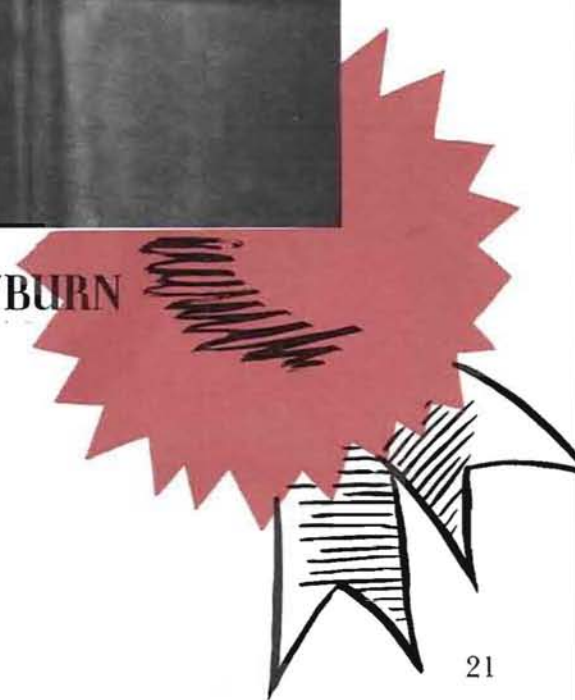

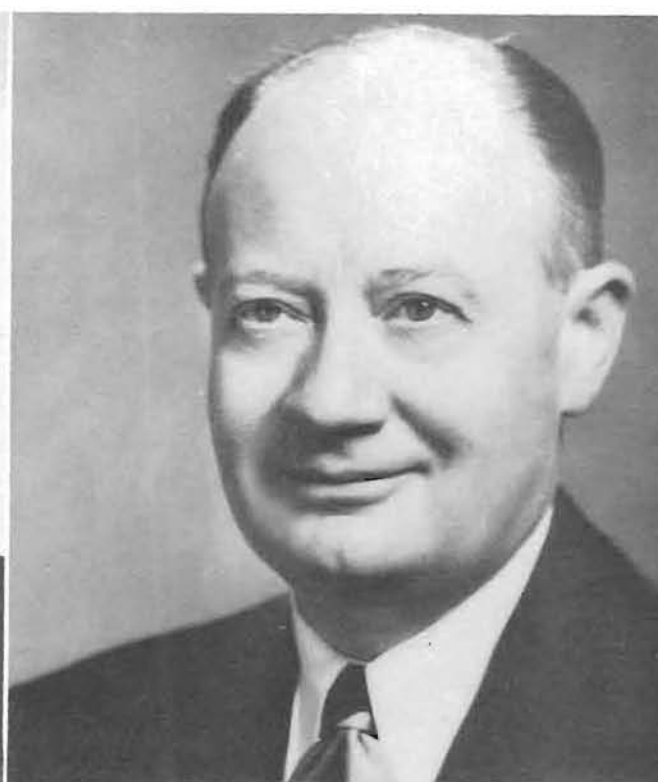
## Graduate School

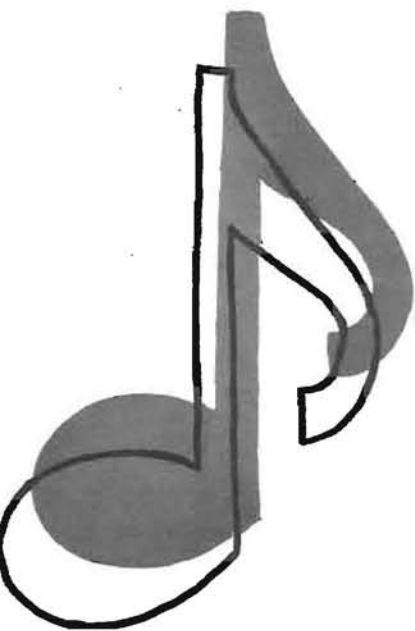
Guests viewed the events from seats on the grass. Music from the bandstand and the atmosphere of old campus brought back memories which vied with the food for attention from the diners.

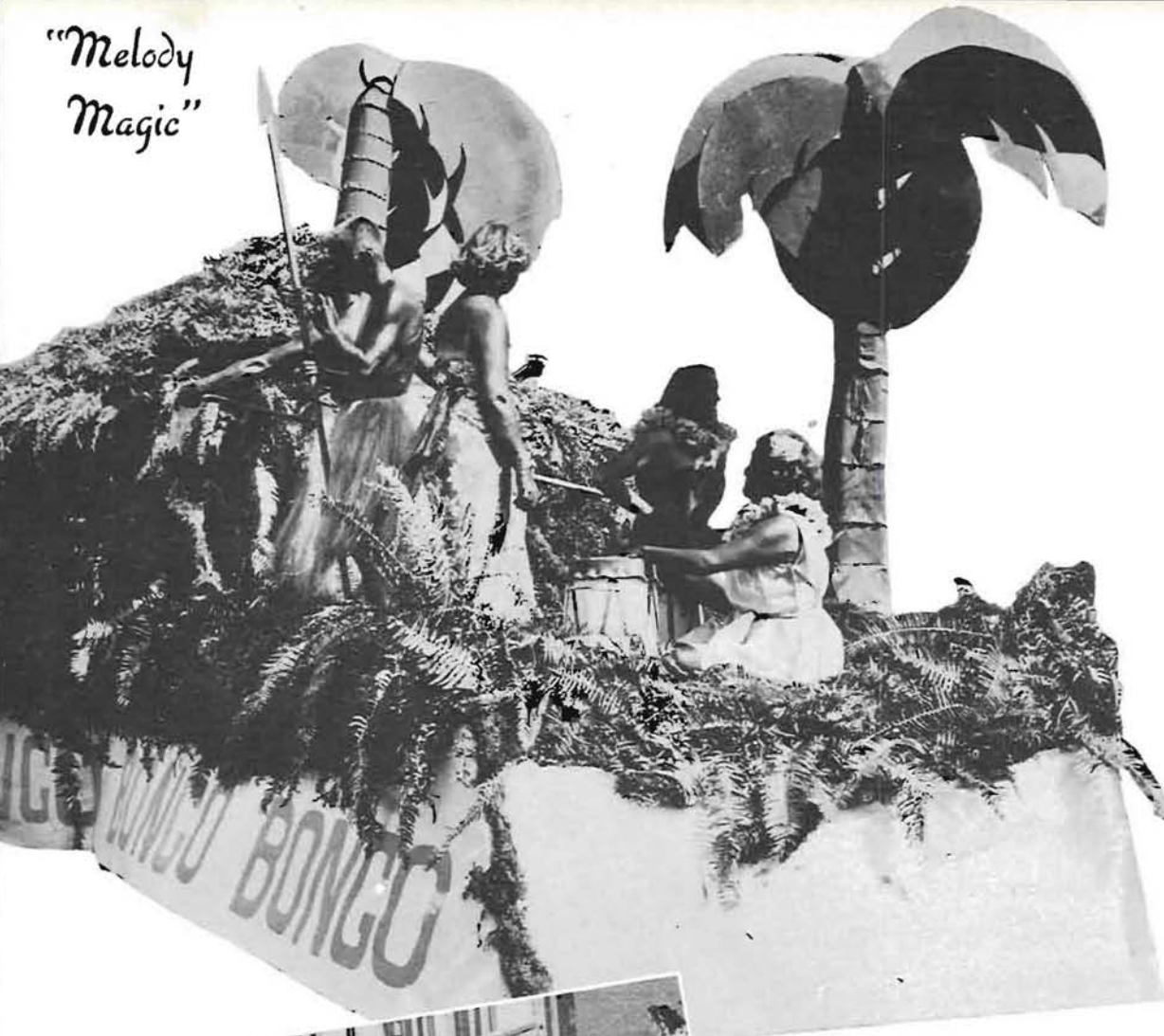

DOWN WILLAMETTE STREET and then to the University campus was the route of the 1950 Junior Weekend Float Parade, which included only floats based on song titles.

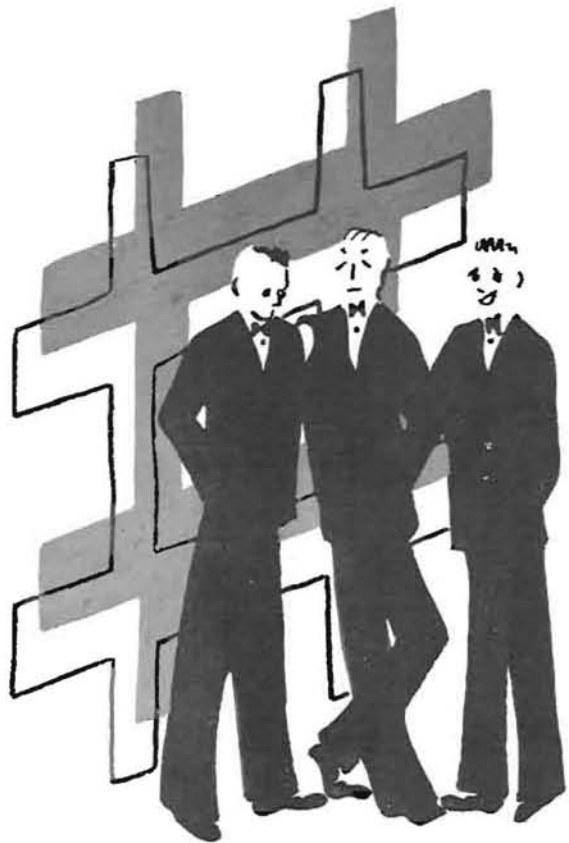

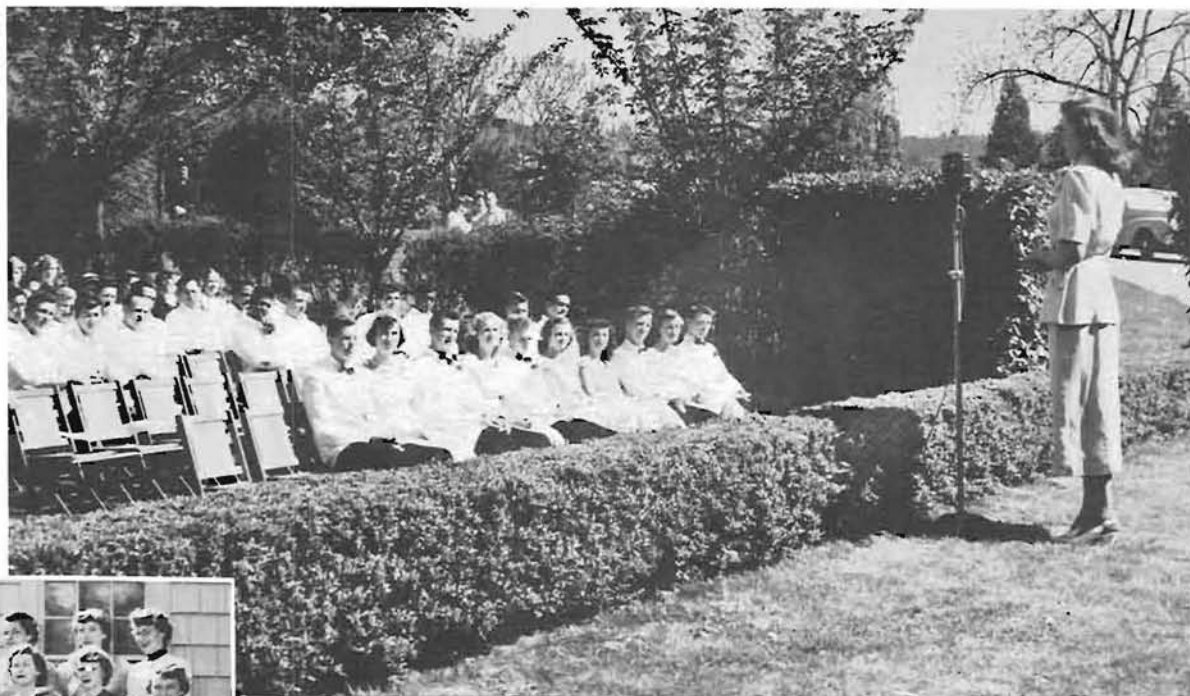

## Mothers' Weekend

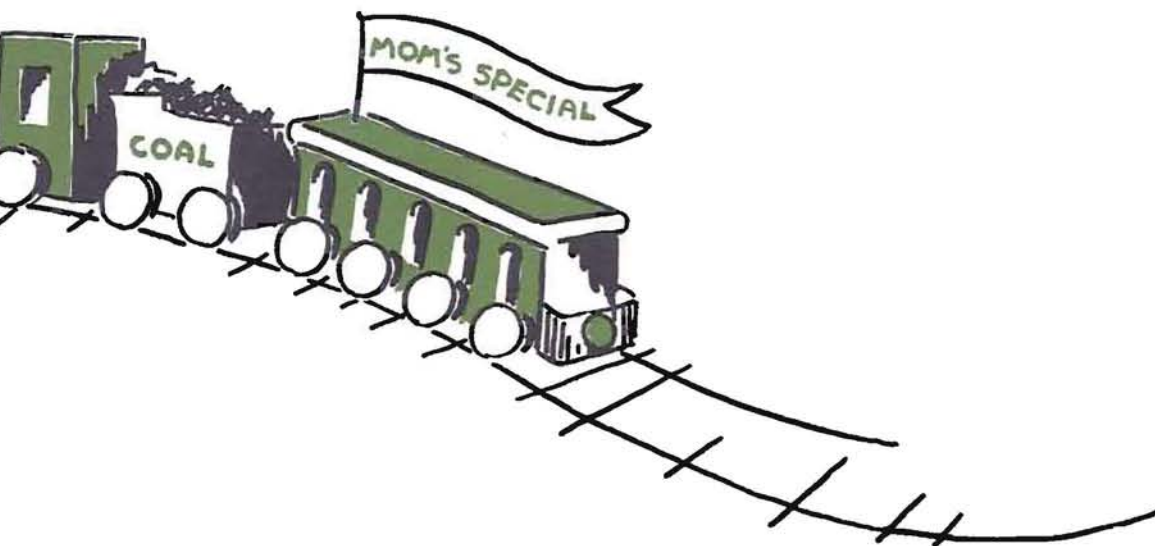

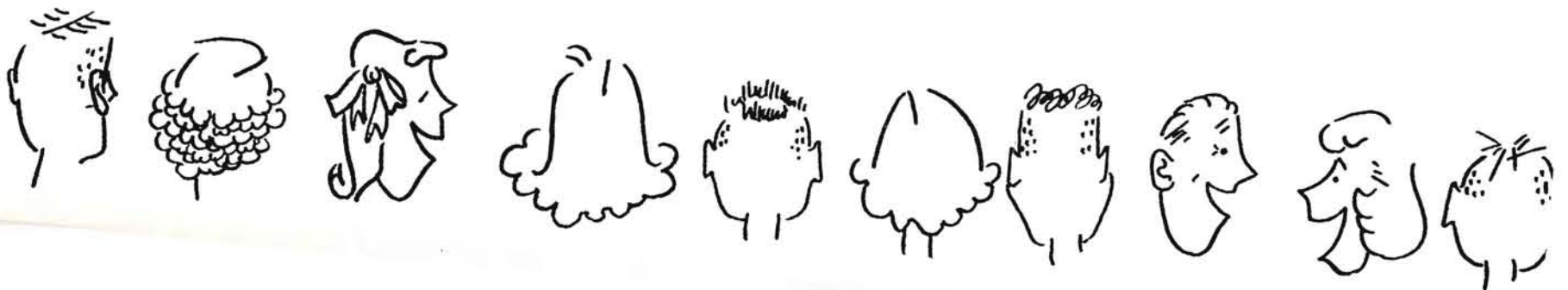

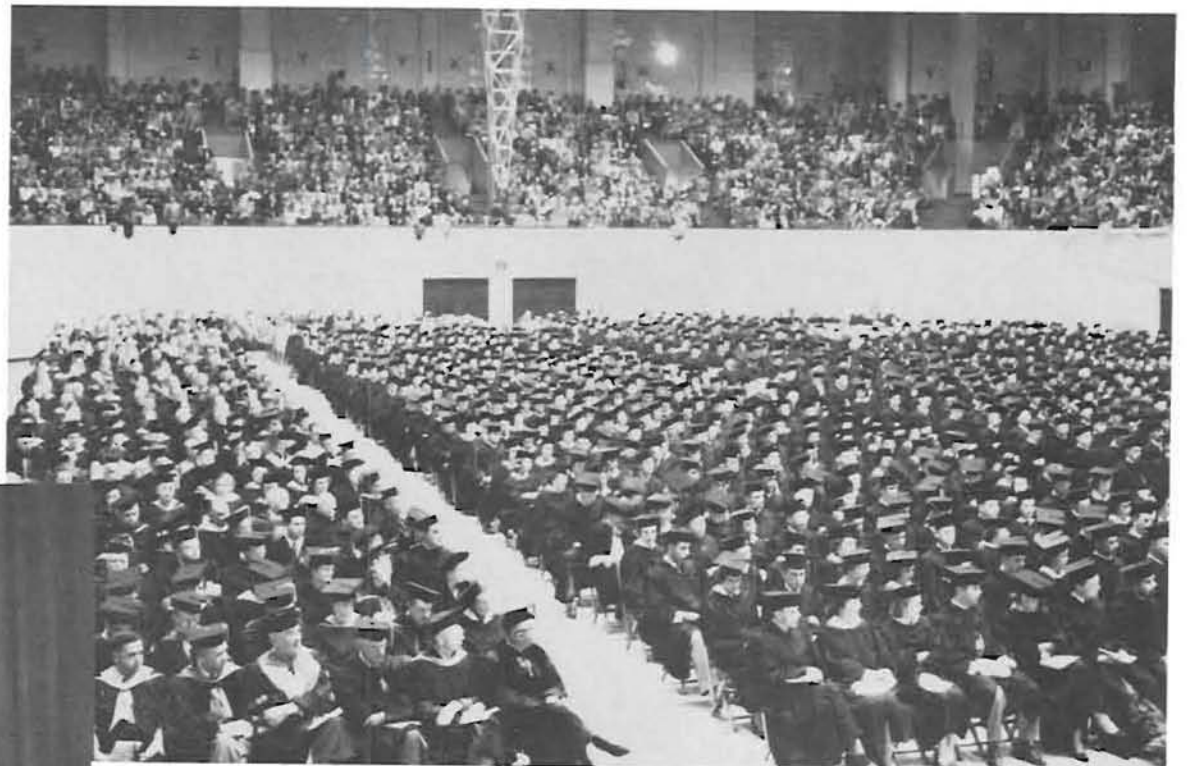

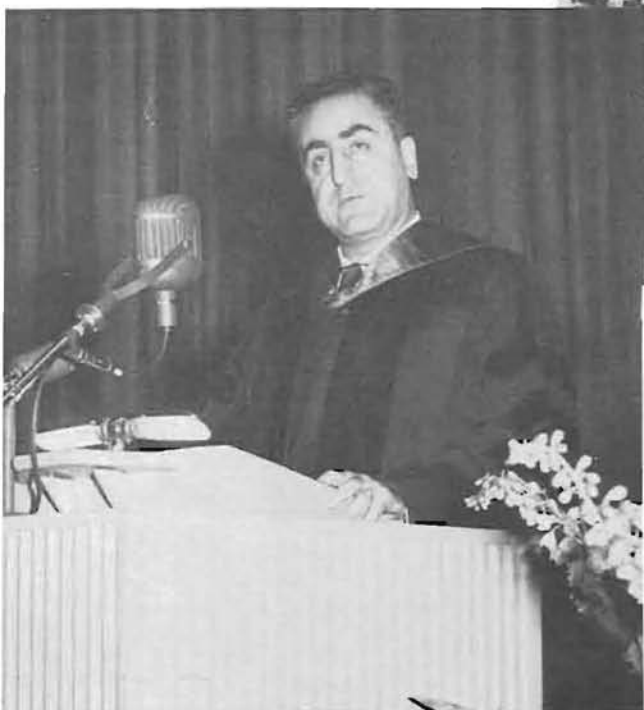

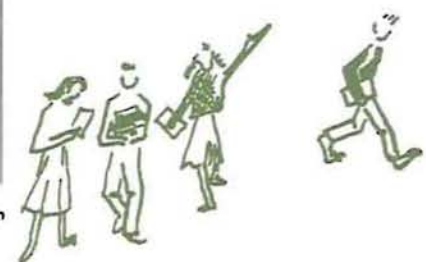

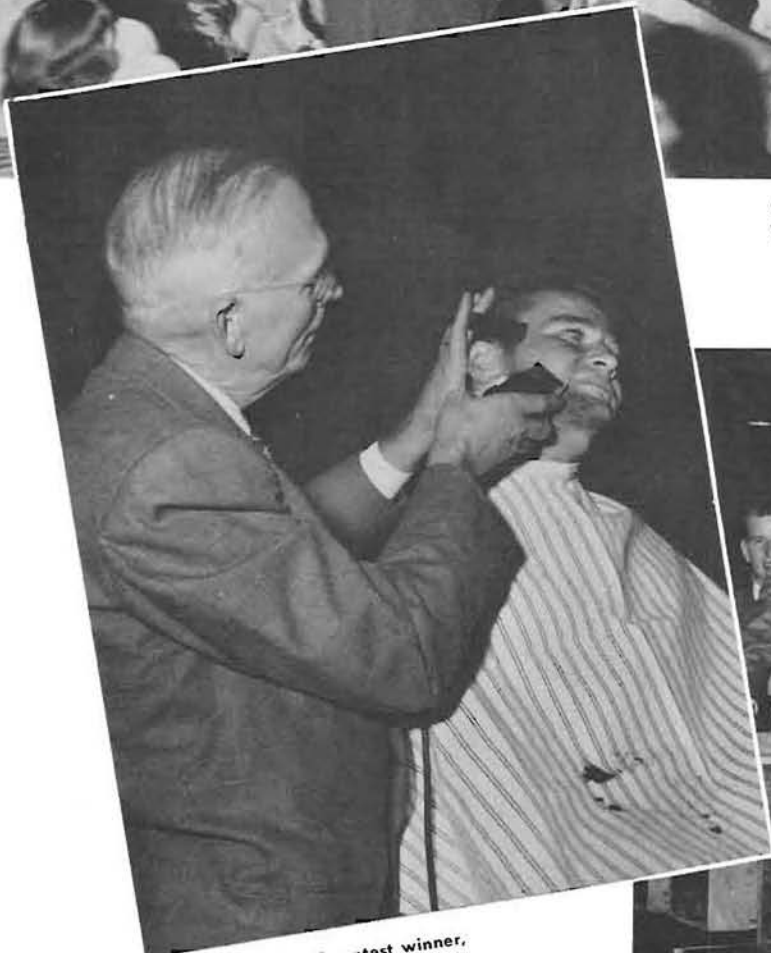

**H**OMECOMING, 1950, was a cavalcade of events built around the theme "New Union and Reunion"—and both students and alumni participated in the weekend of events.

The usual trials and tribulations surrounded the guarding of the traditional Homecoming bonfire on Howe Field. Members of the freshman class ran amok and lit the big pile of lumber prematurely. However, most of the fire "makings" were salvaged, and Homecoming Hostess Lee DeJarnette put the torch to the fire as scheduled on the night of Friday, November 3.

Friday night was rent by the sounds of the annual Noise Parade. In one of the most elaborate parades of the kind ever held at Oregon, dozens of floats decorated to coincide with the Homecoming theme made horrible "music" with fog horns, pneumatic drills, and an impressive array of other machines. Delta Gamma, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and Delta Upsilon were winners of the event, with the Kappa-Alpha Theta-Hunter Hall-Apha Hall float taking second place.

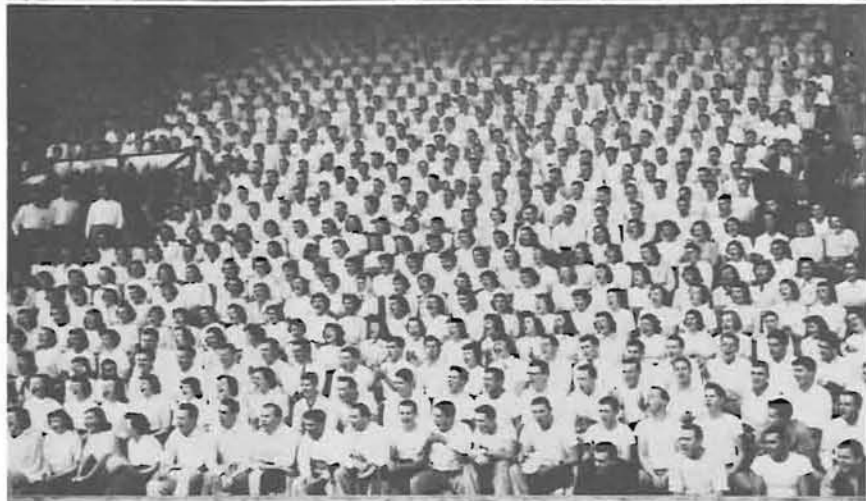

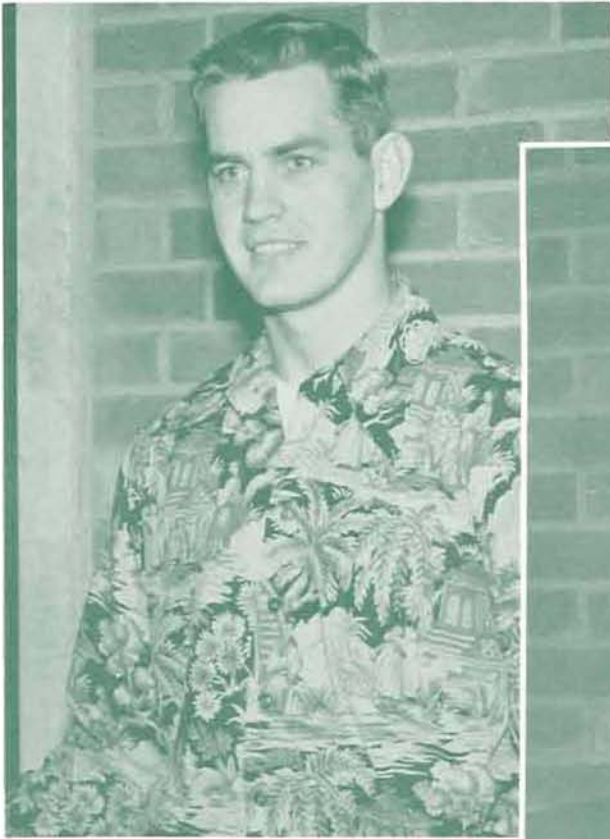

## TNE---Political Tour de Force

**I**T WAS A GRAND year for Oregon's political circus: that never-never organization, TNE, was somehow caught with its armor down, and Art Johnson fed it to the lions.

In the beginning, most of the reputations in the campus political circle were still intact. Several weeks before the spring elections, things were rather calm. TNE, or Theta Nu Epsilon, had been advertised for years as being the "group" that controlled AGS, the Greek party. But TNE simply did not exist, AGS insisted; and no one insisted more loudly than the TNE members.

But even non-existent organizations such as TNE have their troubles. TNE's trouble number one was ASUO President Art Johnson, who wanted to expose the group. The number two trouble was who to run for president in the spring elections. AGS, TNE's favorite party, was due for a good year at the polls.

And at least two different TNE members had two different ideas as to whom AGS would be told to put on the ticket as presidential candidate.

The rift over candidates grew, and not too long before elections, Alpha Tau Omega and Delta Upsilon bolted AGS, joined with Independents and other Greeks in USA, the coalition political party.

For a time, AGS was in an uproar. Any number of houses were rumored to be planning to bolt. However, confessionals were held; the "group" (TNE) met and manufactured balm; and in the end all of the remaining sheep stayed home for the spring shearing.

USA and AGS held their party primaries, and surprisingly enough, ATO Barry Mountain received the USA nomination for president.

"Mountain was assured only of an equal opportunity to run with other students seeking the number one position as an individual candidate," an ATO spokesman assured those who felt that Mountain and his house may have had political plums rather than ideals in mind when bolting AGS.

Second position on the USA ticket went to Eve Overback, Independent who was known, oddly enough, not for political savvy but for hard work in activities.

The AGS party, even with the departure of Mountain, was still not possessed of its usual unanimity. Herb Nill, a dark horse, arose to challenge Jerry Smith in the party's primaries. However, Nill lost to Smith by an extremely narrow margin, disappeared temporarily from the political scene.

Smith was coupled with Joanne Fitzmaurice on the AGS ticket. In the ASUO nominating assembly, Herb

Nill appeared again, was nominated for president on an independent ticket.

And about that time ASUO President Art Johnson made a declaration. "TNE is active here at Oregon," stated Johnson, "and more active here than at any other campus in the country." The pot was boiling.

AGS did not choose to ignore Johnson's claim, but chose to display its particular Greek brand of humor. On the afternoon of Friday, May 19, TNE signs went up on campus fraternity and sorority houses, automobiles, and Greeks. Satire seemed to be the theme of the day.

As the day wore on, however, complications set in. Complication number one: the Greeks had a street dance in front of the Chi Omega house. Complication number two: Junior Interfraternity Council members returned from a picnic, began to shout "we are TNE" while wandering about in the middle of the street. Complication number three: several hundred persons came to view the sight.

Art Johnson drove by the scene, saw the makings of a riot. Summoned by Johnson were the police, who in turn called the fire department. Director of Student Affairs Donald DuShane also attended, was hit by a water bag.

The object of the police and firemen was to break up the crowd, which was so interested by the arrival of the police and firemen that it was extremely reluctant to go home. There was very little action, (some hosing down), a lot of noise, and after awhile everyone went home. The Greeks felt that TNE had indeed been satirized.

The next day, however, the campus found out that there had been a riot on campus. "There was a riot on the Oregon campus last night," explained Art Johnson

through the Emerald, "... sponsored by the TNE group. I have proof to this effect." There was more to that effect.

The riot was forgotten after a time, although papers as far east as Chicago picked up the news. A question which faced most Oregon students was when is a riot a riot, and not merely a crowd.

The weekend of May 20-21 was rather eventful for some gentlemen who had been busily declaring that there was no TNE on campus. Faced with a mass of evidence accumulated by Johnson, University officials recognized the existence of TNE (which had previously been outlawed by the University). A list of members was provided by Johnson.

Immediately, three AGS candidates—Jerry Smith (presidential aspirant), Will Urban (senior representative candidate) and Dick McLaughlin (candidate for junior rep) bounced off the AGS ticket, leaving white spaces on election day.

AGS had no chance to recoup. Elections were held Monday, May 22. Barry Mountain took the number one spot, beating Nill by 165 votes. Eve Overback defeated Joanne Fitzmaurice, the latter being blessed by a number of presidential votes bestowed by Greek voters without a candidate.

It had been one of the wildest campaigns in University history. USA was jubilant, AGS prepared to write a new constitution, and the Board of Deans investigated the TNE situation.

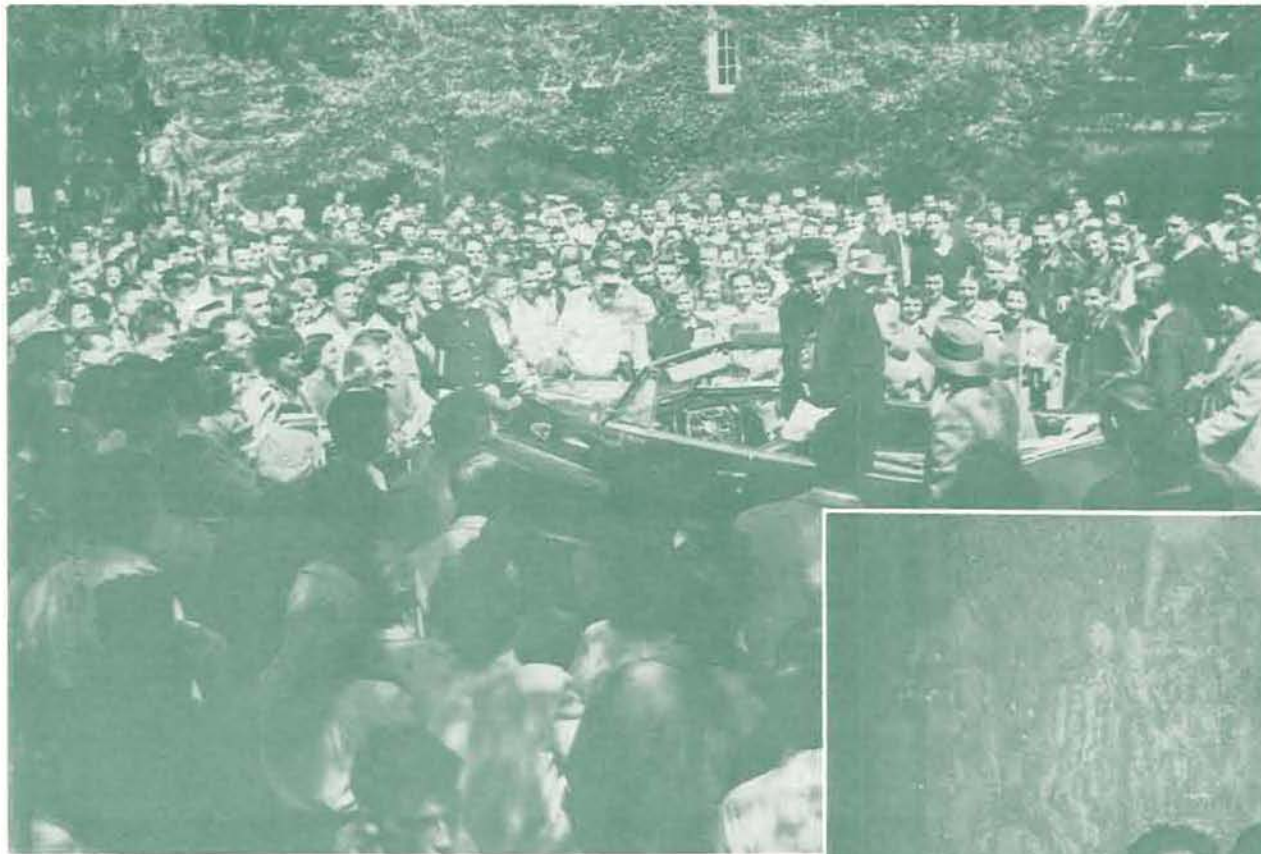
In the year's final edition of the Oregon Daily Emerald, a list of twenty-two TNE members was published, adding the final touch to the exposure. Action by the University on punishing TNE was limited; they were merely placed on probation.

As the dust settled a little, students wondered if the "group" was really dissolved, or just resting.

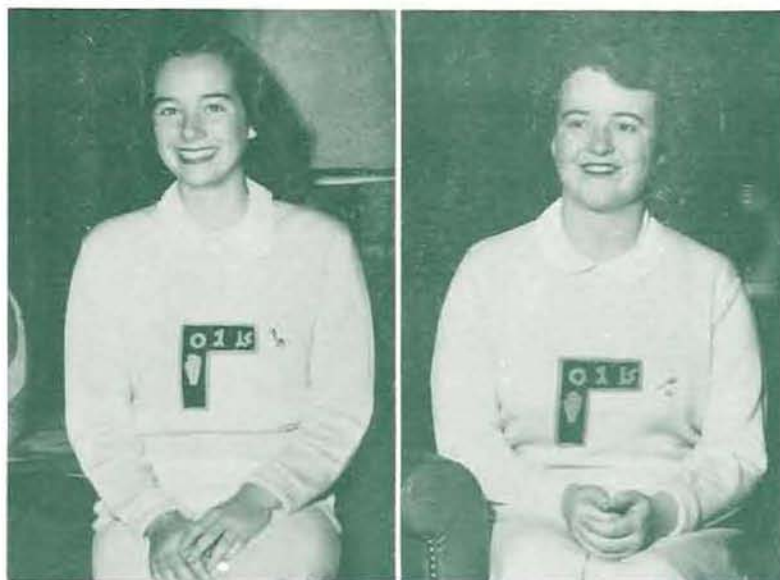

A HEAVY ACTIVITY schedule occupied the membership of Kwama, sophomore women's honorary, during 1950-1951.

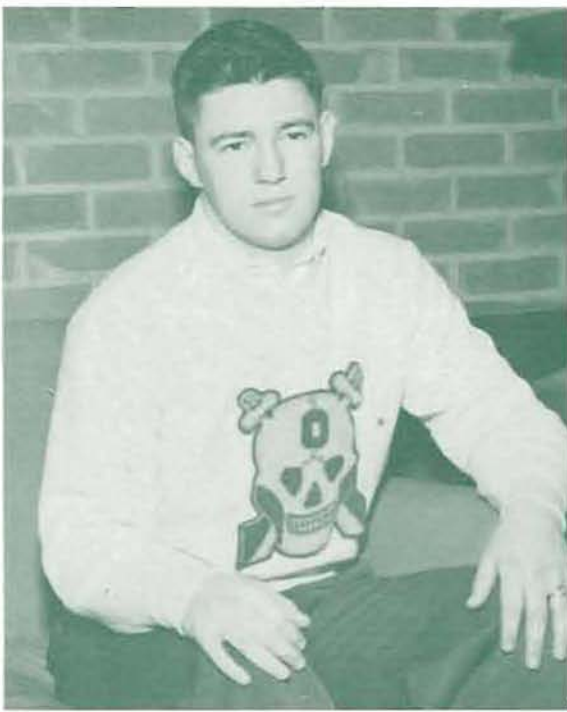
Kwama was prominent in financing scholarships. Funds for these scholarships were raised through several projects worked on by the entire membership.

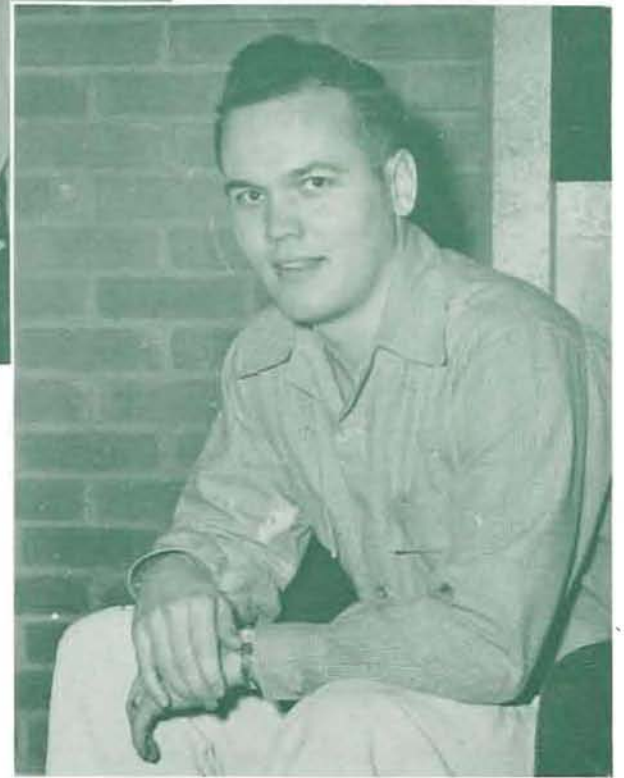

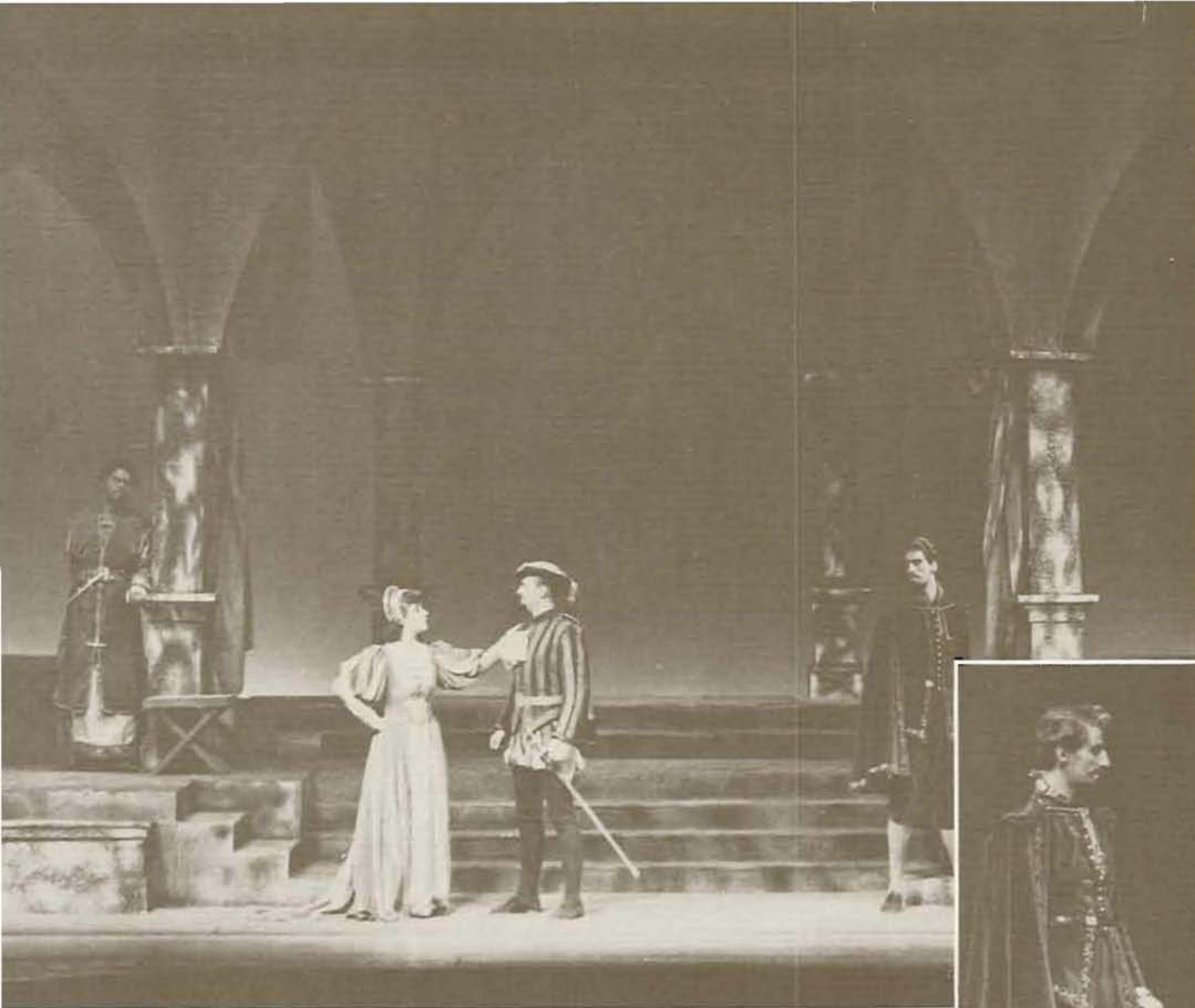

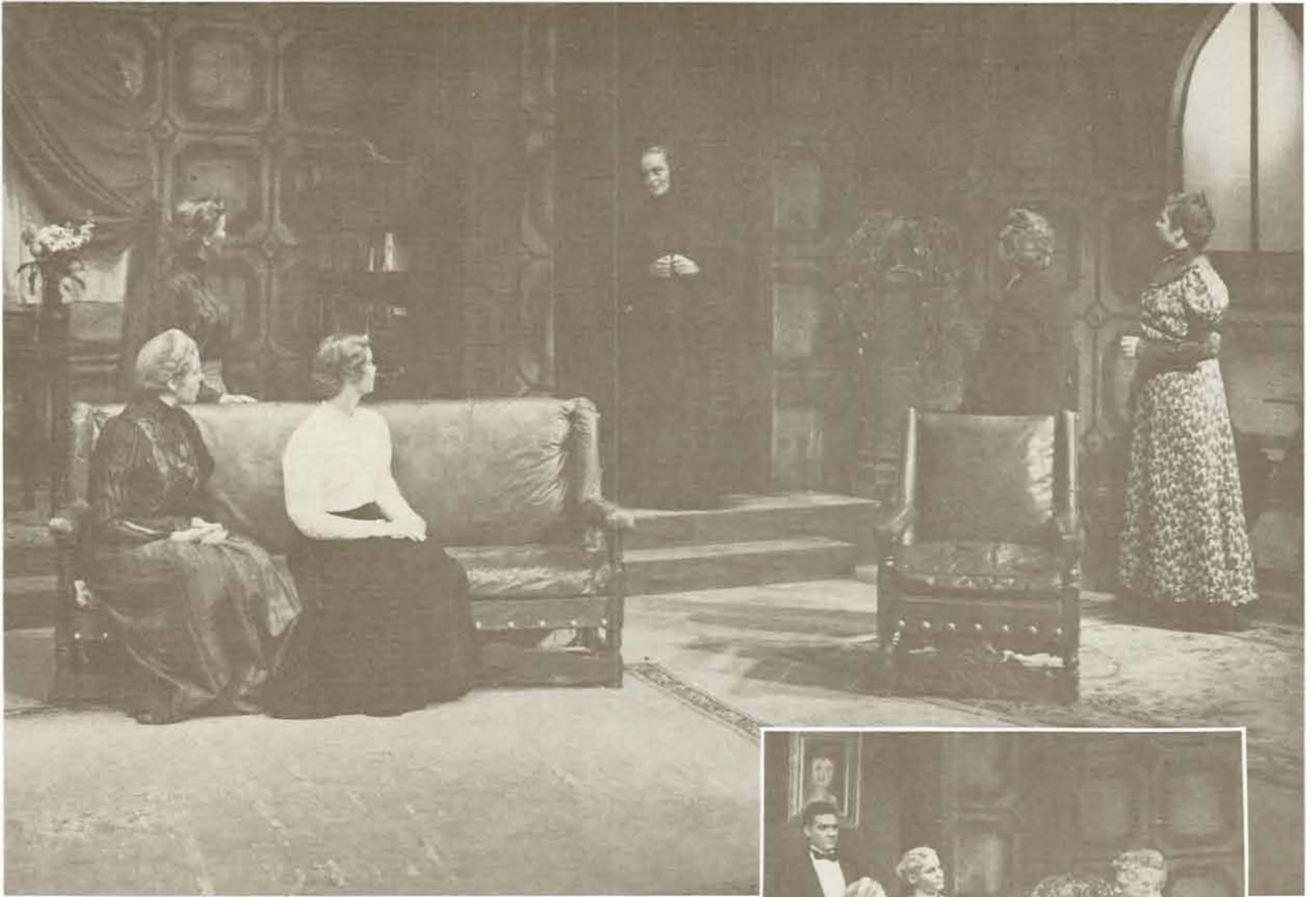

**H**UI-O-KAMAAINA is the club of "Old Timers"—students who have lived in Hawaii for four years or more.

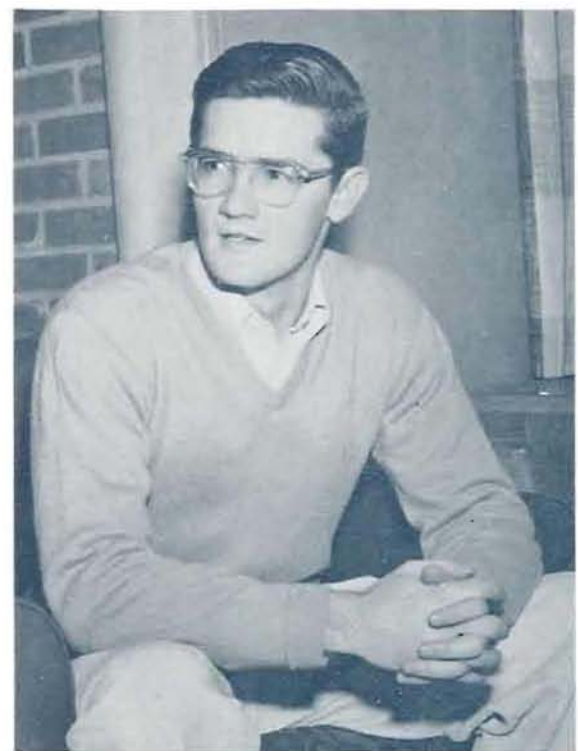
The group gave Oregon's vaudevilles and rallies a Hawaiian flavor, met frequently to talk about the islands, sing songs, and dance.

Every spring the mothers meet at Mothers' Weekend. At that time, business meetings are held, and officers for the coming year are elected.



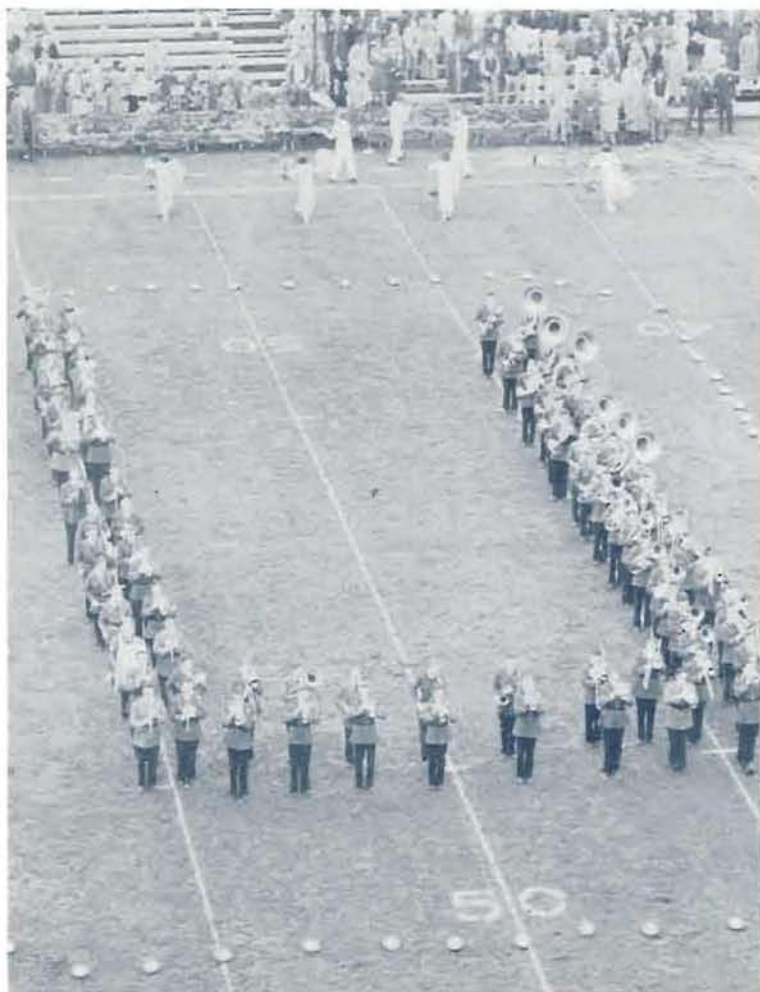

**H**EADED BY CHAIRMAN Charles G. Howard, the Student Publications Board met numerous new problems during the year—most of them connected in some way with financial crises resulting from inflation.

The board set up budgets for and supervised policies of three publications—the Oregon Daily Emerald, the Oregana, and the student directory, Piggers' Guide. In addition, during the spring of 1950, the board agreed to choose the staff of the Orenter, freshman orientation book, as a service to the University administration.

During the winter of 1951, the board was faced with a financial crisis on the business side of the Oregon Daily Emerald. As a result, a new "incentive" plan was put into effect, whereby the business manager would receive a commission in addition to his salary, as an incentive to increase the

amount of advertising. A new business manager, Martel Scroggin, was appointed to carry out this program.

Also during winter term, the board passed a resolution stating that it was responsible for all University-sponsored student publications. In this capacity, the Student Publications Board considered proposals for humor and literary magazines.

The membership of the board is appointed by the president of the University. In addition to Chairman Howard, it consists of Student Union Director Dick Williams, board secretary; three faculty members-at-large; three student members-at-large; a representative of the Office of Student Affairs; the Editors of the Emerald and Oregana; and the business managers of the two publications, serving ex-officio.

Social life on the publication began fall term with the annual open house. A great number of persons attended, signed up for work on the book. Some were seen again.

The Oregana continued to be a stamping ground for small freshman ladies in the process of becoming members of Kwama. Such as these gave the editorial offices a glow of enthusiasm and naivete which was definitely not present in the older staff members.

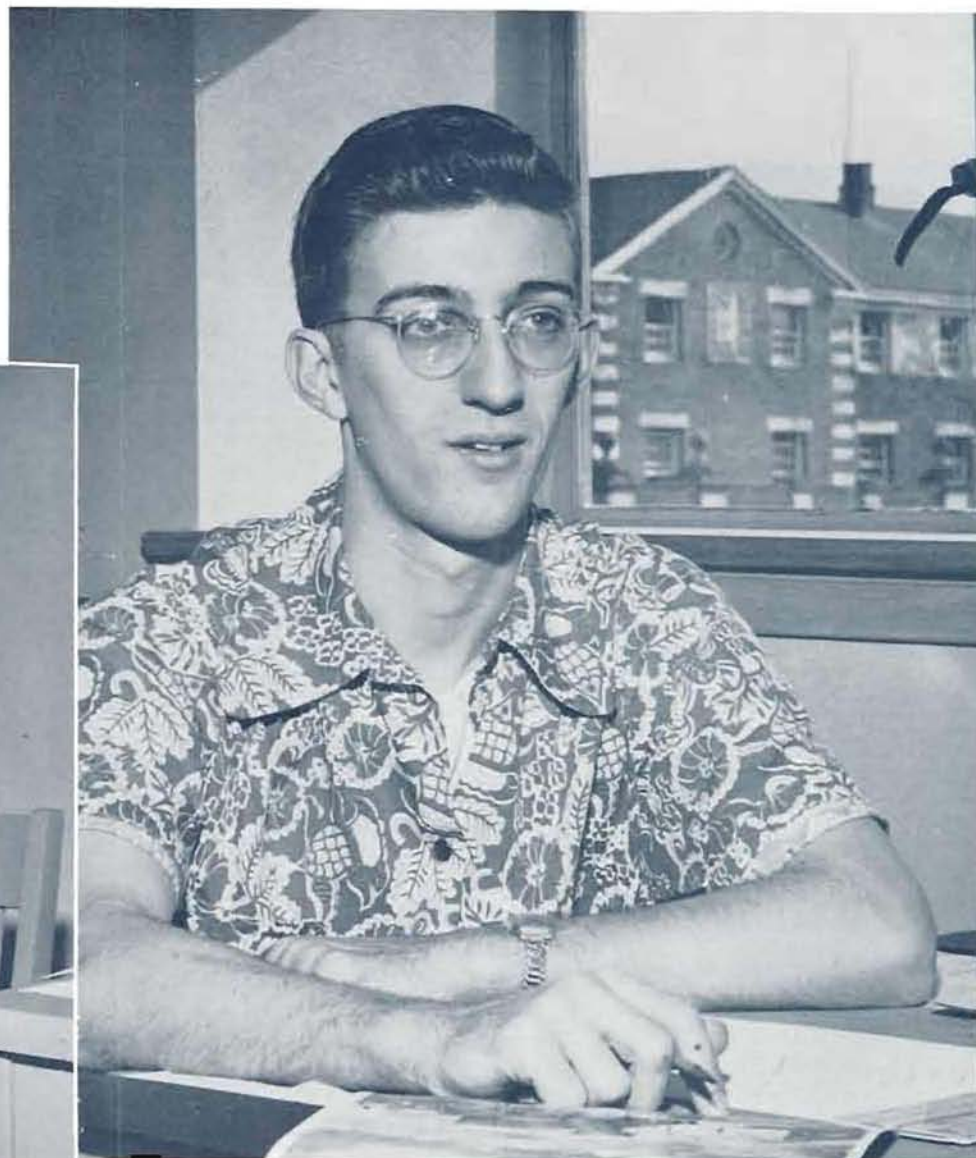

## Erb Memorial Student Union

**A**T HOMECOMING, FALL term, 1950, a twenty-five-year old dream was consummated; the Erb Memorial Student Union was dedicated to the use of the students and alumni of the University of Oregon.

It had cost over two million dollars to build and furnish the student union. Funds had come from alumni, and from the breakage fees of students, which had been signed over for the express purpose of promoting the building of a union.

The drive for a student union on the Oregon campus began in 1923, and had continued rather haphazardly until 1947, when a nation-wide search for funds was begun in earnest. Ground was broken at the Thirteenth and University site in June of 1948. The Erb Memorial Student Union, one of the most impressive such buildings in the nation, rose slowly to dominate the campus scene.

As a physical plant, the student union is tremendous. On the ground floor, the center of activity is the soda bar, which accommodates up to 350 persons. Ground-floor kitchens also serve a commuters' lunchroom, a cafeteria, and a number of private dining rooms located in the building. A favorite meeting-place on the ground floor is the Taylor Memorial Lounge.

The mezzanine of the building houses administrative offices of the union, an art gallery, the Sawyer Browsing Room, alumni offices, and the offices of "Old Ore-

gon." On the second floor, Oregon Dads' and Mothers' lounges open into the ballroom. The latter can also be utilized as a banquet hall.

On the third floor, various student agencies have their offices—including the Associated Students of the University of Oregon, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Student Union Board, and the Oregana. The third floor also includes a number of meeting rooms.

Recreation area of the union is in the basement, where facilities for ping-pong, billiards, and bowling are located. There is also a barber shop concession in the basement.

A branch Post Office opens onto the north side of the building, to complete the facilities offered by the multi-purpose building.

Student Union Director is Dick Williams. Williams superintends all areas of the union; assistants to the director personally superintend various departments.

Operating under the direction of the board is a directorate of committee heads. Committees range from publicity to cultural, and are designed to make the fullest use of the union's facilities.

Major campus dances, once held in McArthur Court, were held in the student union following its completion. A great variety of activities—ranging from square-dancing to coffee hours with campus visitors—were scheduled in the union during the year.

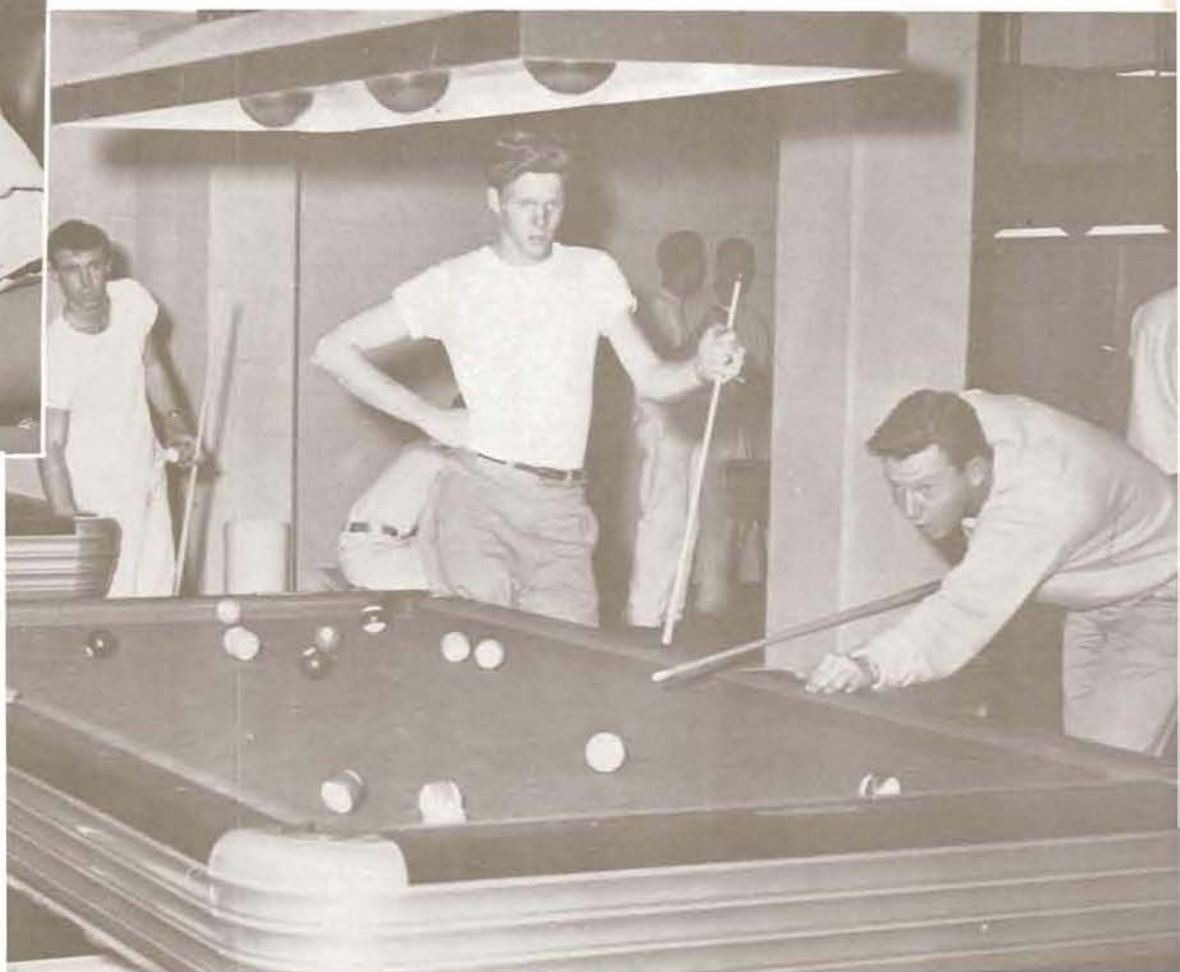

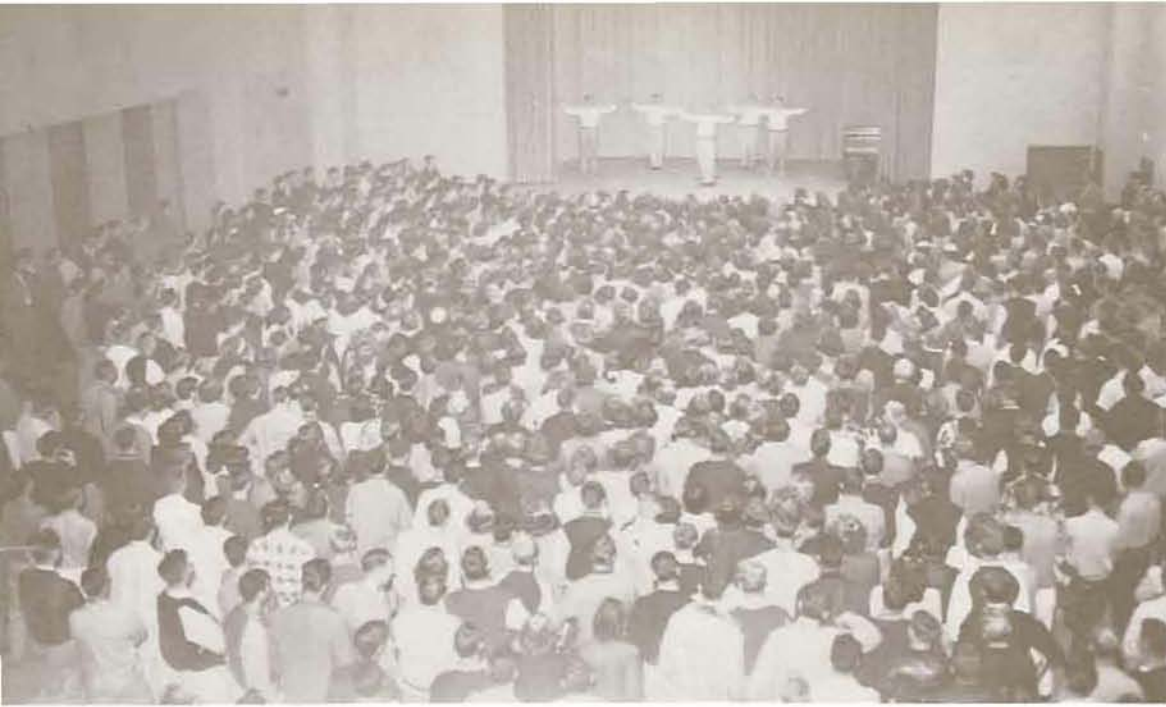

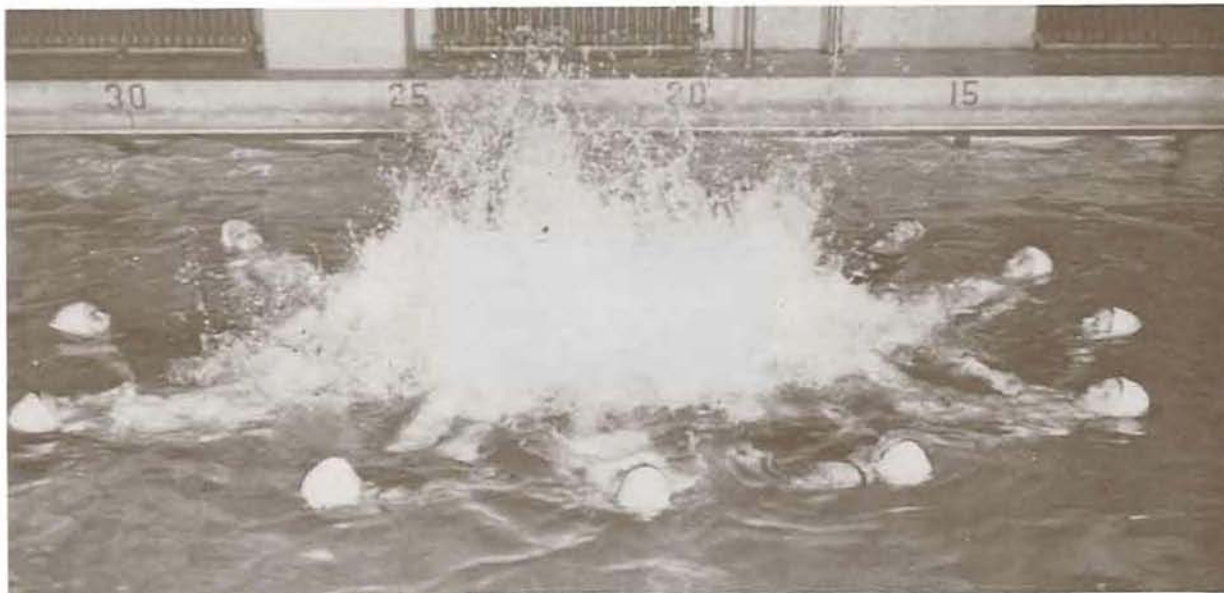

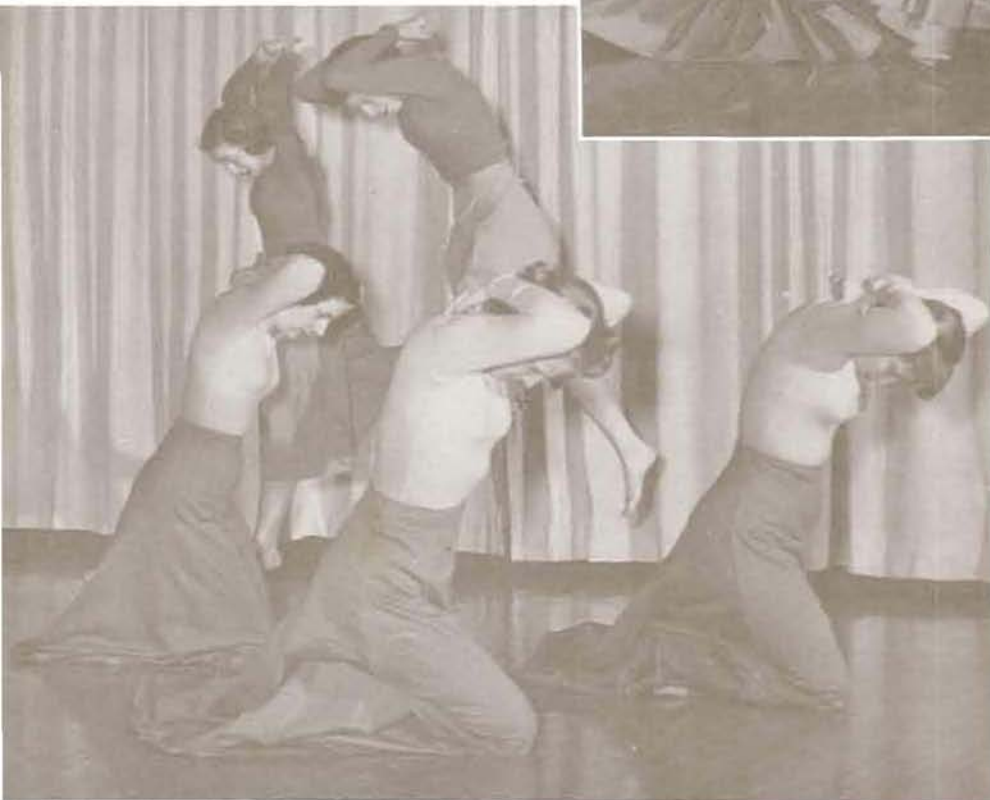

There are no officers for the group. Members practice various modern dance forms, and periodically present public recitals of interpretive work.

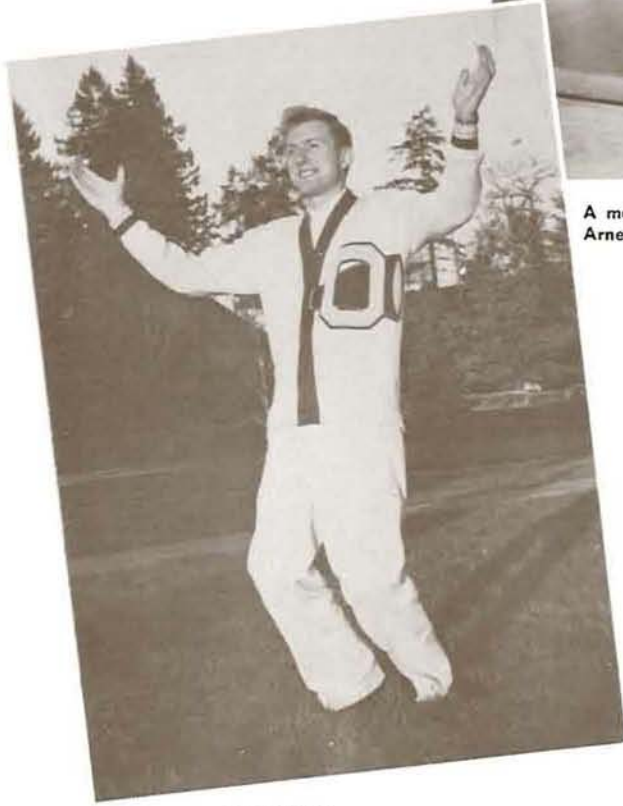

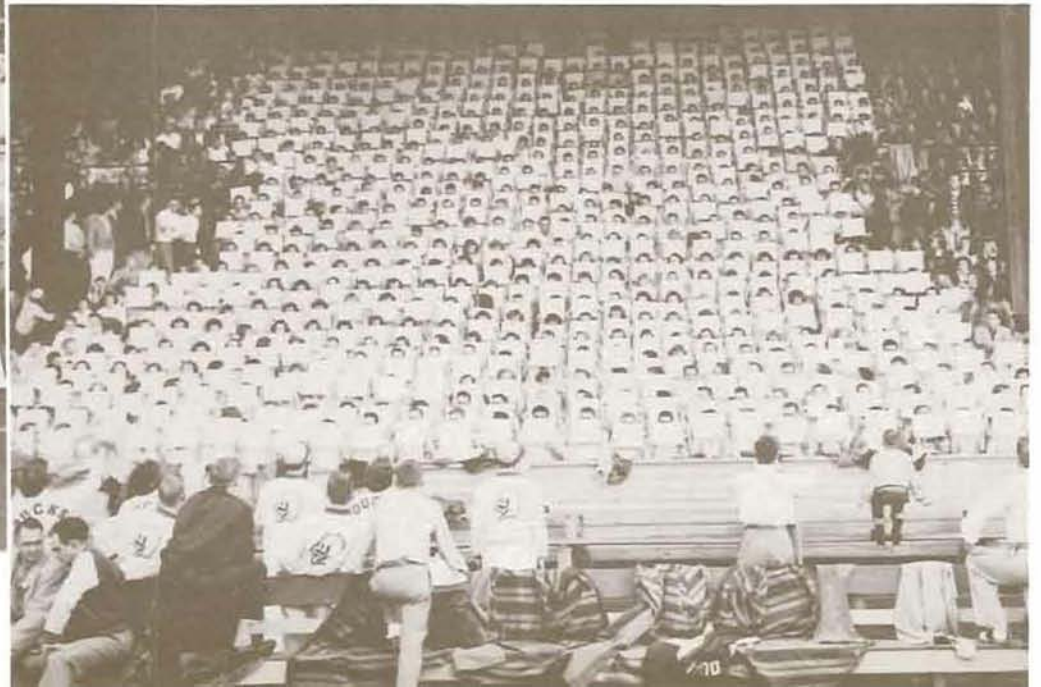

## Diamondmen Nab ND Third Place

**A** TWO-GAME WINNING SPREE against the Oregon State Beavers at the tag-end of the 1950 season hauled coach Don Kirch's Diamond Webfoots up by their jerseys and deposited them in third place in Northern Division standings.

The twin victories earned the Ducks, who had been fluctuating near the conference dungeon all season, a split with the Beavers in their four-game series. They also helped salve the egos of the parade of Oregon pitchers who had earlier been routed 20-2 at Corvallis.

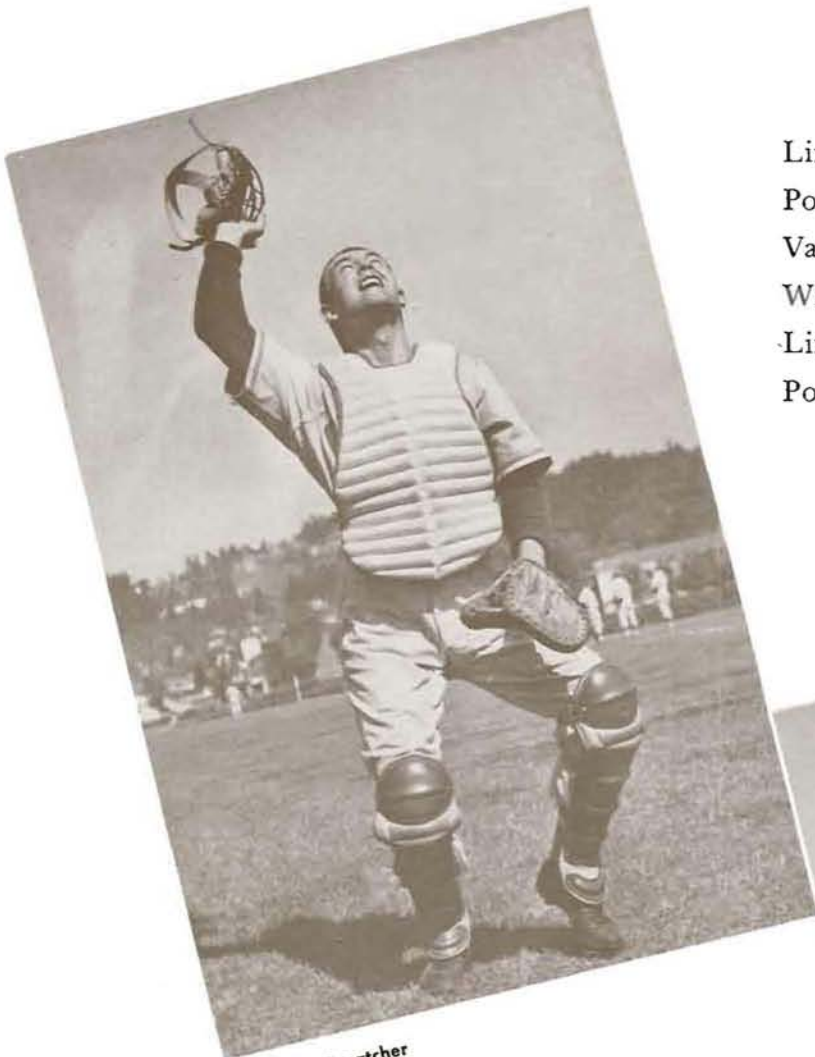
Oregon won six, lost ten in the Division chase, while winning five and dropping one exhibition game.

Wobbly at the start, the Webfoots could cull only one victory from their first six outings, but managed to round out the remainder of the schedule with a .500 percentage.

Although the Webfoots failed to distinguish themselves in Northern Division play, middle-sacker Daryle Nelson and catcher Jack Smith, who tied with Don Lundberg, Washington backstop, were named to the conference all-star nine at their respective positions.

Fast-fielding Nelson also led the loop's hitters with a .441 average.

Oregon batters produced 143 hits in 550 times at the plate for 72 runs and a .260 team batting clip.

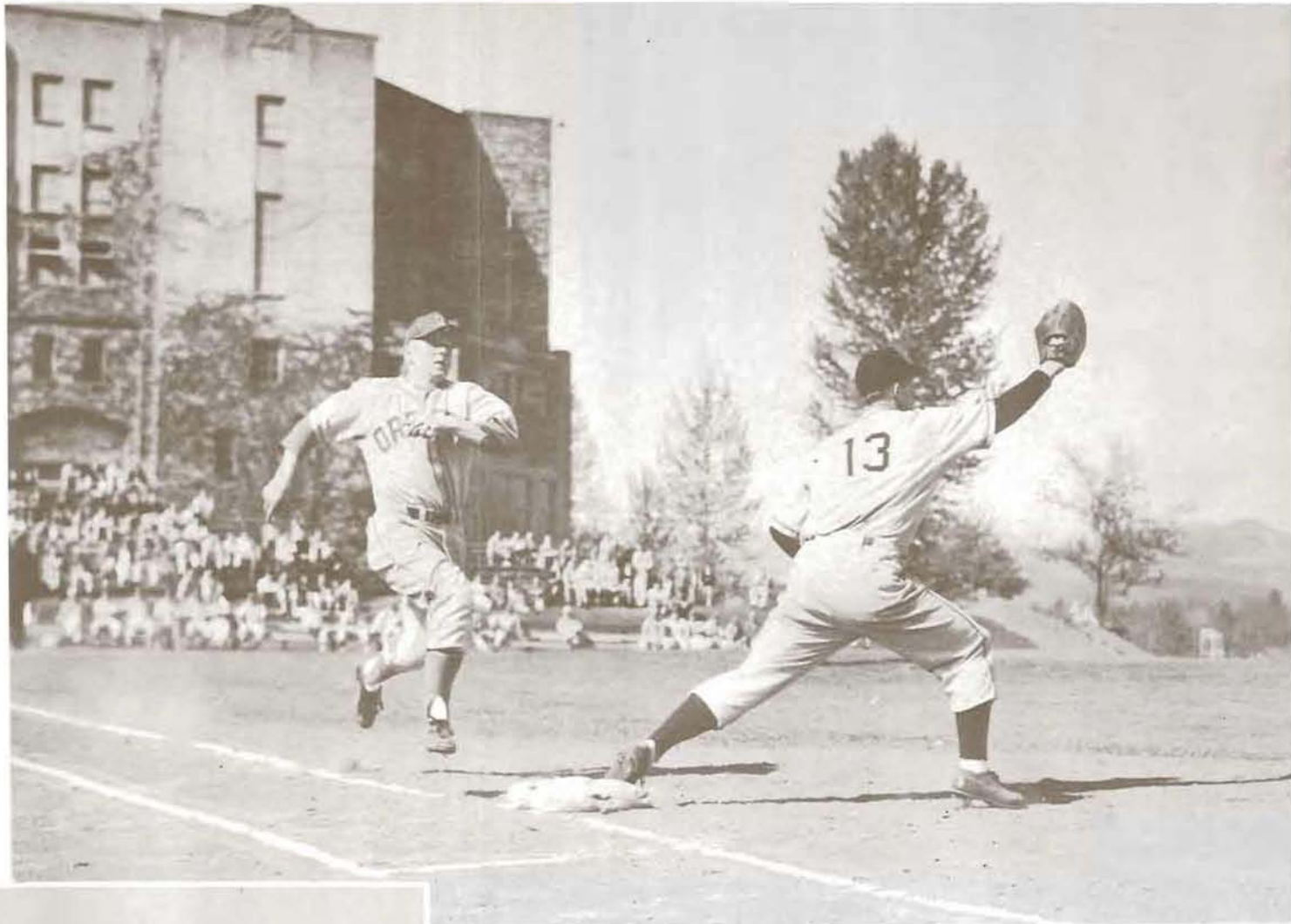

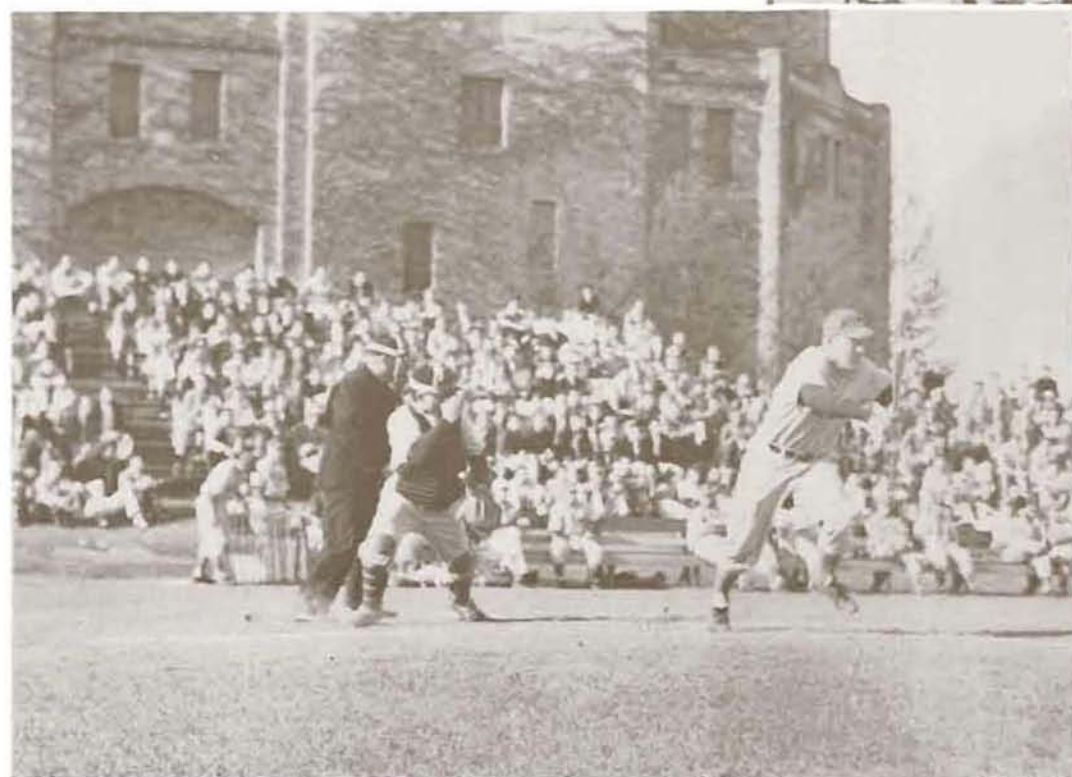

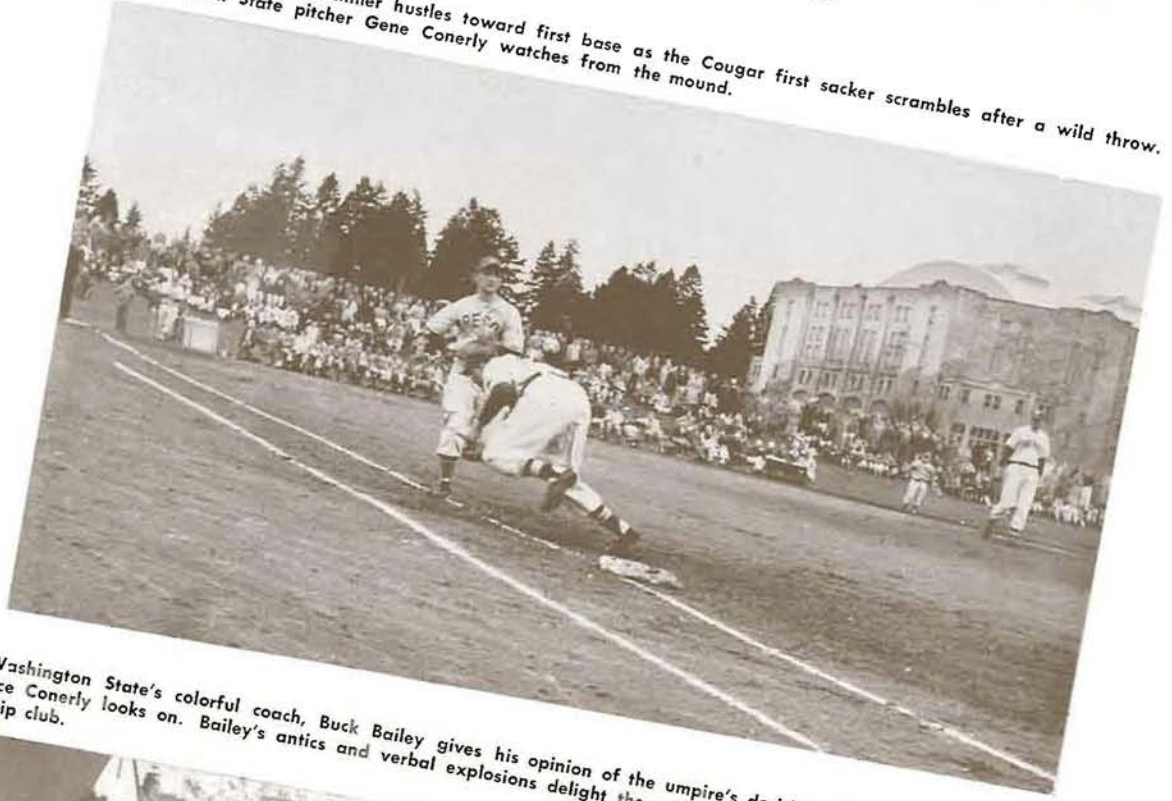

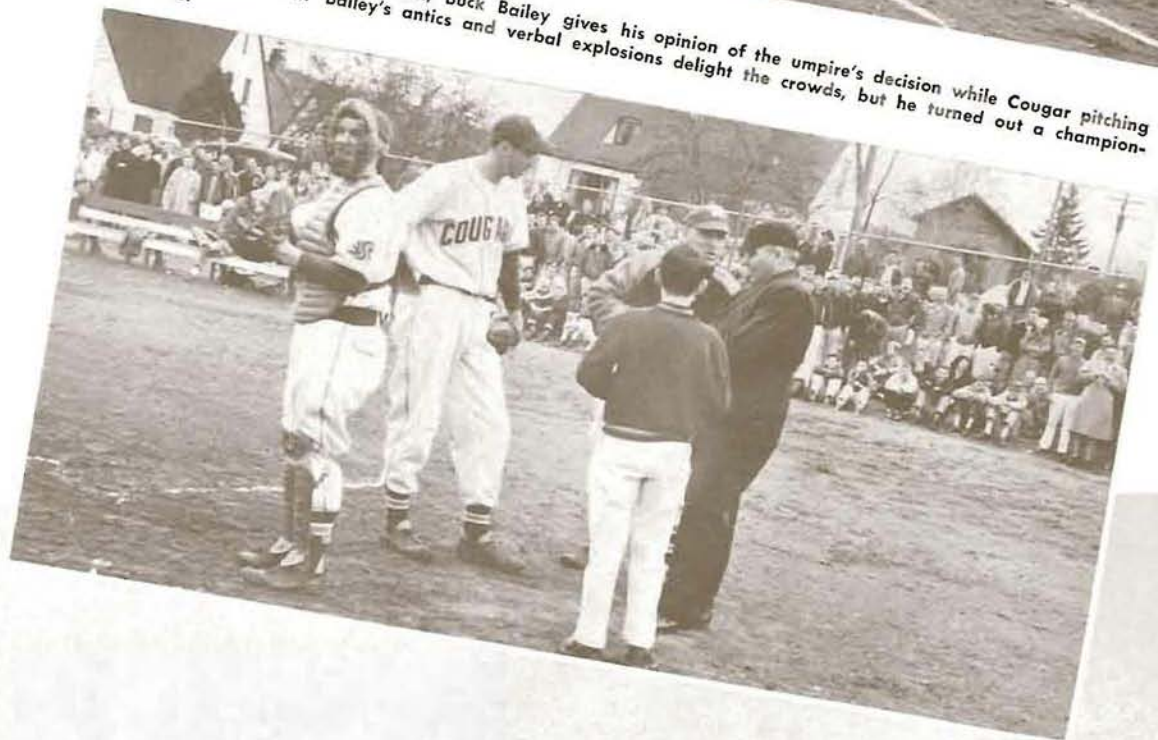

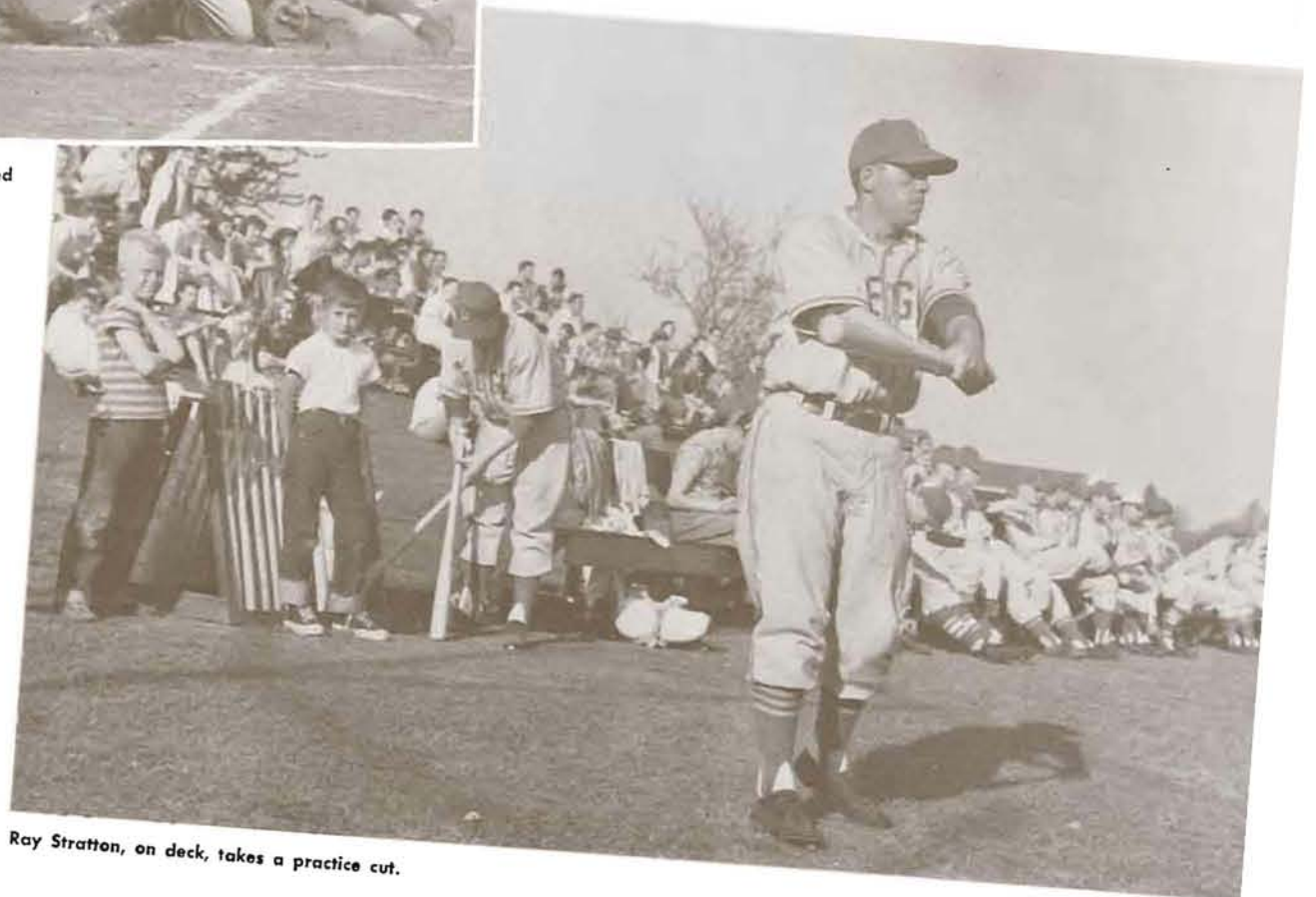

# Track

## Webfoot Thinclads Cop Northern Division Crown

COACH BILL BOWERMAN'S 1950 track team swept through the season with five wins and no losses, gaining the Northern Division championship, and fourth spot in the Pacific Coast Conference meet. After finishing a strong second in last year's league race, the Oregon cinder stars were not to be denied the title as they amassed 376 points during the year while their opponents netted 198 tallies.

The annual Oregon State relays was a one-sided affair as Oregon handed the Beaver trackmen a 10 to 2 setback. In the initial dual meet of the season the surging Ducks swamped the Idaho Vandals 87 to 43, taking 12 out of 15 first places.

On the Hayward Field oval, Oregon notched up their third consecutive win as they beat down a stubborn Cougar squad from Washington State by a  $75\frac{1}{2}$  to  $55\frac{1}{2}$  score. George Rasmussen set a new meet record of 14 feet 1 inch during the encounter with the University of Washington. The Ducks added the Huskies' scalp to their belt of victories with a 73 to 58 win.

Four records fell before the power-laden Webfoots when they whacked the Oregon State Beavers  $80\frac{1}{2}$  to  $39\frac{1}{2}$  in the final dual meet of the year. Bill Fell ran the 100-yard dash in :09:5 and the 220-yard dash in 21:6 to establish new marks for those events. Walt McClure and Dennis Sullivan also shattered records in the 880-yard run and the 220-yard low hurdles, respectively.

Oregon climaxed a perfect season as they captured the Northern Division crown in Seattle May 20. Seven Ducks took firsts in their specialties as the Eugene team garnered  $58\frac{1}{2}$  points. Bill Fell chalked up a victory in the 100-yard dash and a second in the 220-yard dash.

Other Webfoots who blazed their way to top spots were Dave Henthorne, 440-yard dash; Jack Hutchins, mile; Peter Mundle, two mile; Woodley Lewis, broad-

jump; George Rasmussen, polevault; and Chuck Missfeldt, javelin.

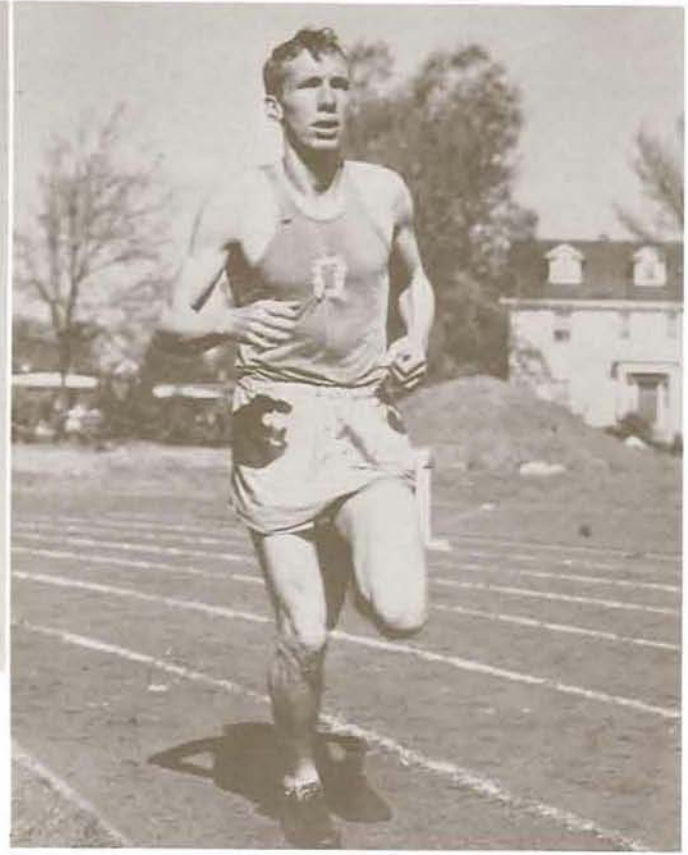
In the Pacific Coast Conference championships at Berkeley, Oregon wound up in fourth position behind Southern California, Stanford, and California. Dave Henthorne, Bill Fell, and George Rasmussen collected first place honors, with Walt McClure and Don Pickens also scoring for Oregon.

Non-conference meets entered by the Ducks included the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa, where Oregon placed second in the 440 yd. relay and Fell was runnerup in the 100-yard dash. At the same time his teammates were competing in Des Moines, George Rasmussen was in Salt Lake City, Utah, winning the polevault event at the Utah Relays with a leap of 13 feet, six inches.

Duck runners also competed in the Portland and National AAU meets. Rasmussen, after the regular season, toured with a United States track team through Europe and South Africa where he broke existing polevault records.

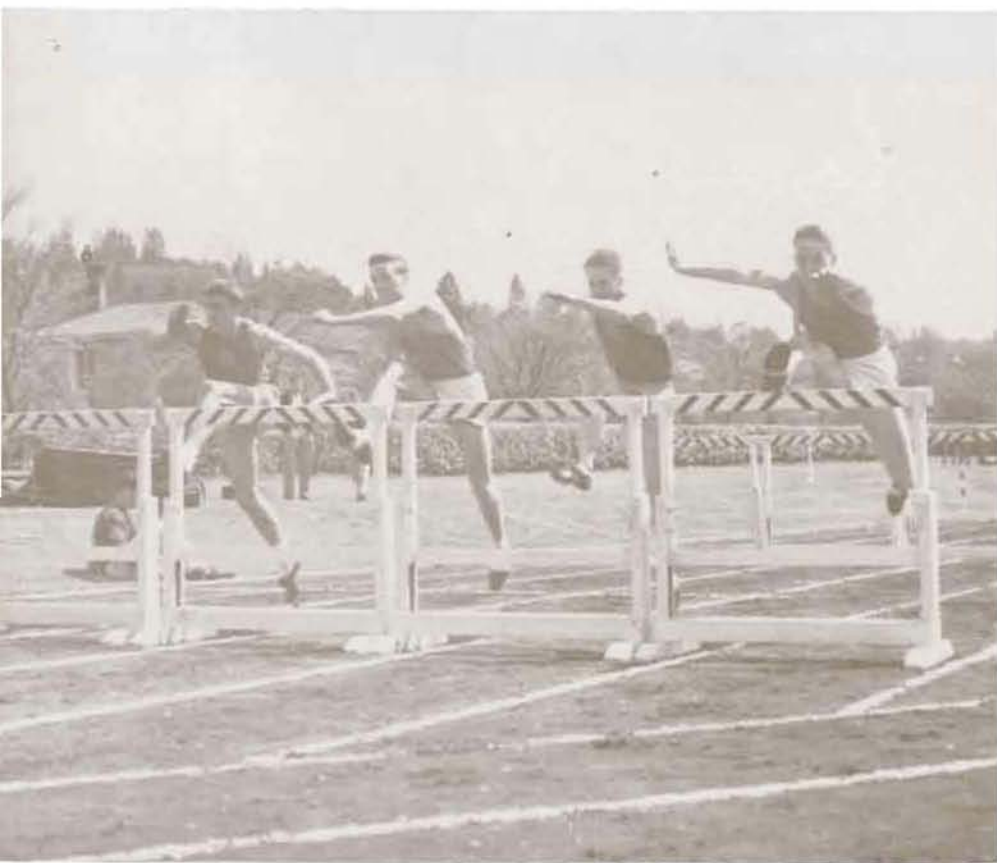

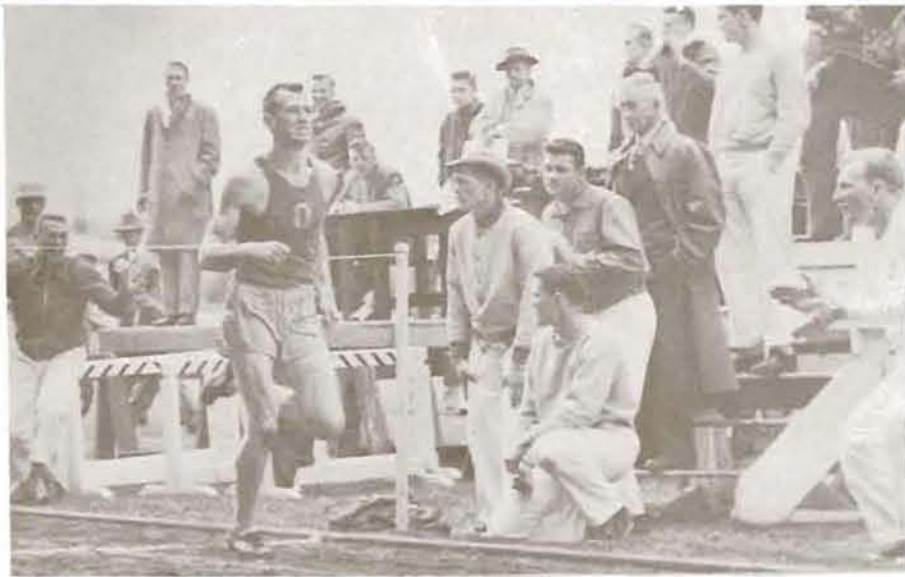

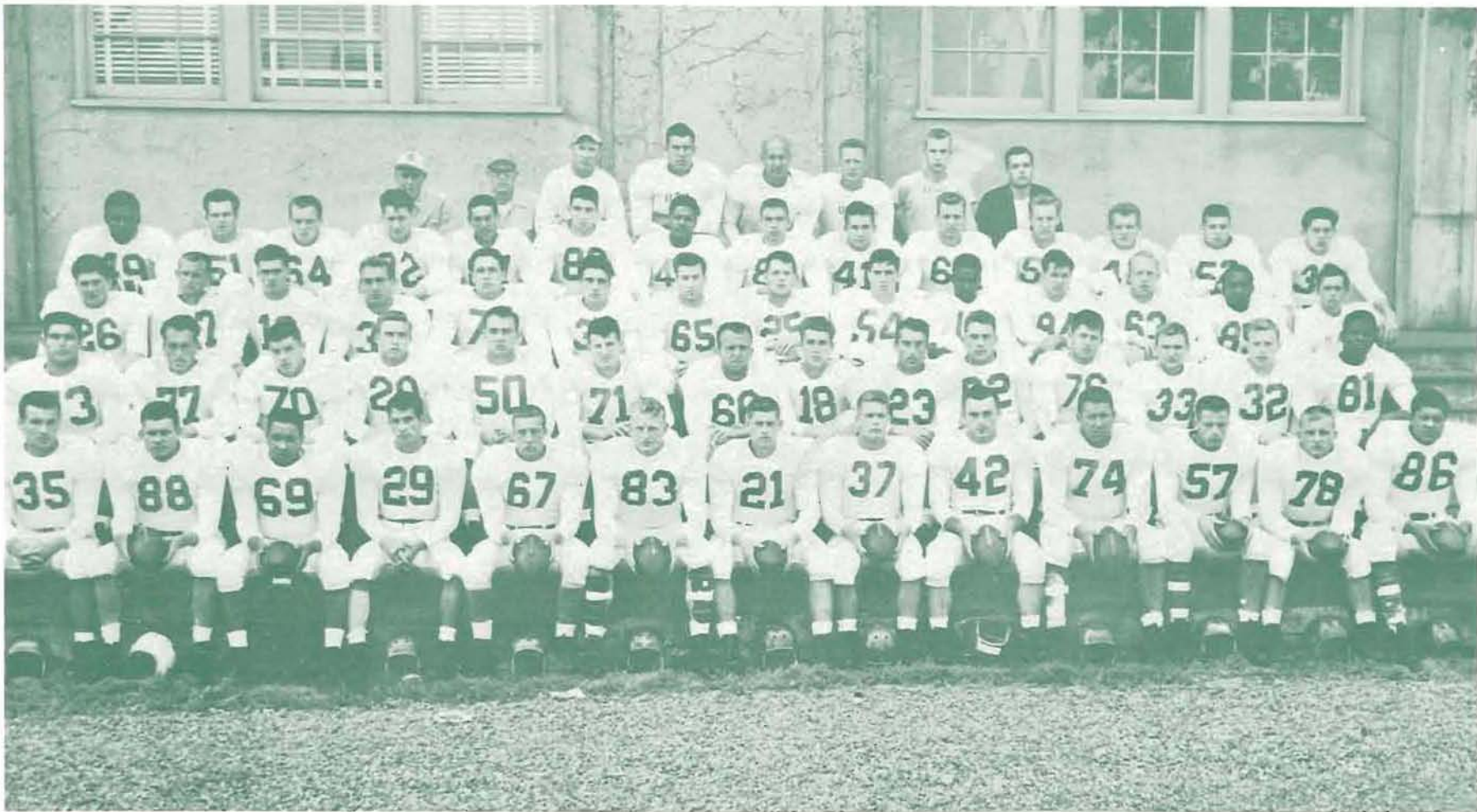

## Tough Schedule, Lack of Experience Hinder Ducks

WHEN THE 1950 FOOTBALL season came to a close, the Oregon Webfoots were perched on one of the lower rungs of the Pacific Coast Conference ladder with a seasonal record of seven defeats and one win. In non-conference tilts the Ducks lost to St. Marys and Colorado.

Lack of experienced reserve strength and a rugged schedule hindered the Jim Aiken tutored squad from producing as many victories as teams of the previous three years. It was a building year for the Eugene aggregation with sophomores like quarterback Hal Dunham, ends Emery Barnes and Monte Brethauer, and halfbacks Rod Lyman and Carl Ervin gaining their big league experience for seasons ahead.

On the Coliseum turf in Los Angeles, the Ducks met their initial foes of the season, the Bruins of UCLA. The offensive power of the Uclans was too much for the Webfoots as they lost 28 to 0.

Next on the agenda was California, the defending conference champions. The Bears downed the Oregon squad 28 to 7 in Portland. Prior to the game, speedy halfback Bill Fell broke a bone in his ankle, resulting in the loss of his services for the remainder of the year.

The light of victory finally appeared in the Webfoots' battle lamp when they edged Montana 21 to 13 on Hay-

ward Field. Oregon outrushed and outgained the losers, but the sparkling play of Montana's Tom Kingsford thrilled the partisan fans and made the game's outcome doubtful to the end.

A high-spirited Idaho team halted the Ducks winning skein before a Homecoming crowd in Moscow. The Vandals, led by a couple of lads named Brogan and Brock, ran over the Ducks, 14 to 0.

Oregon spirit prevailed at the St. Mary's contest as the Webfoot followers backed the Ducks to the dying minutes of the battle, but the Gaels from St. Marys were not to be denied as they triumphed 18 to 13. This game marked the debut of Aiken's sophomore backfield unit which made a creditable showing despite its lack of experience.

Scoring two touchdowns within the last three minutes of their fray with the Trojans from USC, the Webfoots turned a rout into a thriller before 27,000 fans in the Coliseum. At the start of the final quarter the Ducks trailed 30 to 7, but the last minute scoring spree made the final score 30 to 21.

The Cougars from Washington State marred the Homecoming celebration in Eugene by tallying twice in the last quarter and gaining a 21 to 13 victory over Jim

Aiken's aggregation. Oregon scored their two touchdowns in the closing minutes of the first half on passes.

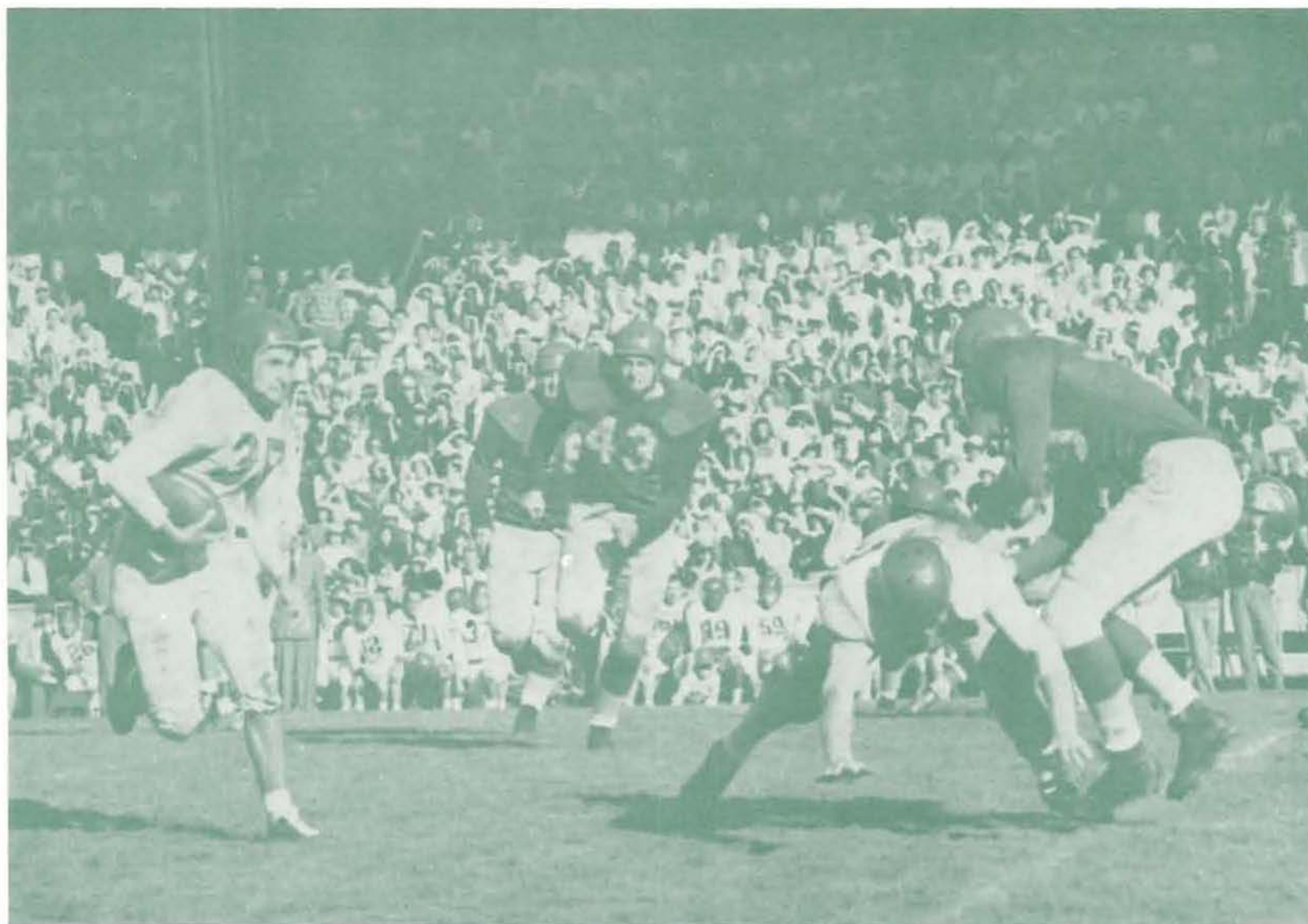
In Seattle the Ducks fell victim to the power of the University of Washington Huskies by a score of 27 to 12. Oregon threatened to score twice in the initial half before they actually pushed across the goal line. Half time score was 7 to 6 in favor of the Huskies, but the U. of W. eleven added three touchdowns to Oregon's one in the last half of the contest.

Oregon's Webfoots lost their eighth game of the season to the University of Colorado 21 to 7 in Boulder. The Buffs rolled to touchdowns twice in the second quarter on similar drives of 61 yards in 13 plays. The Ducks' lone tally resulted from a pass from Dunham to Edwards in the last minute and half of the second quarter. Oregon rallied in the closing seconds of the fracas, but the Buffalo crew stemmed the Green tide on the Colorado one yard stripe as the game ended.

Multnomah Stadium in Portland was the site of the annual civil war battle with Oregon State. The Beavers handed the Ducks a 14 to 2 defeat as 26,800 fans watched. Kip Taylor's lads scored early in the first half and once again in the fourth quarter while the Webfoots managed to account for only two points as a result of a OSC mis-play in the Beaver endzone. A rugged Oregon State line and intercepted passes stifled Oregon's scoring attempts.

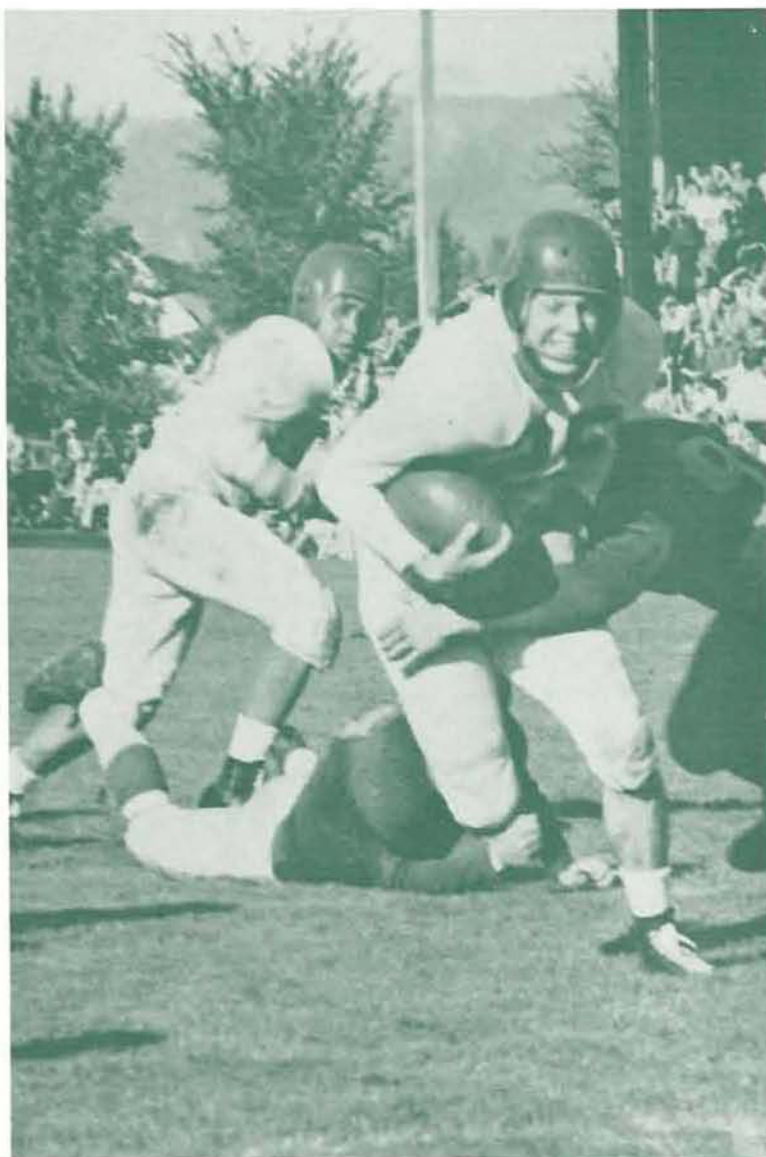

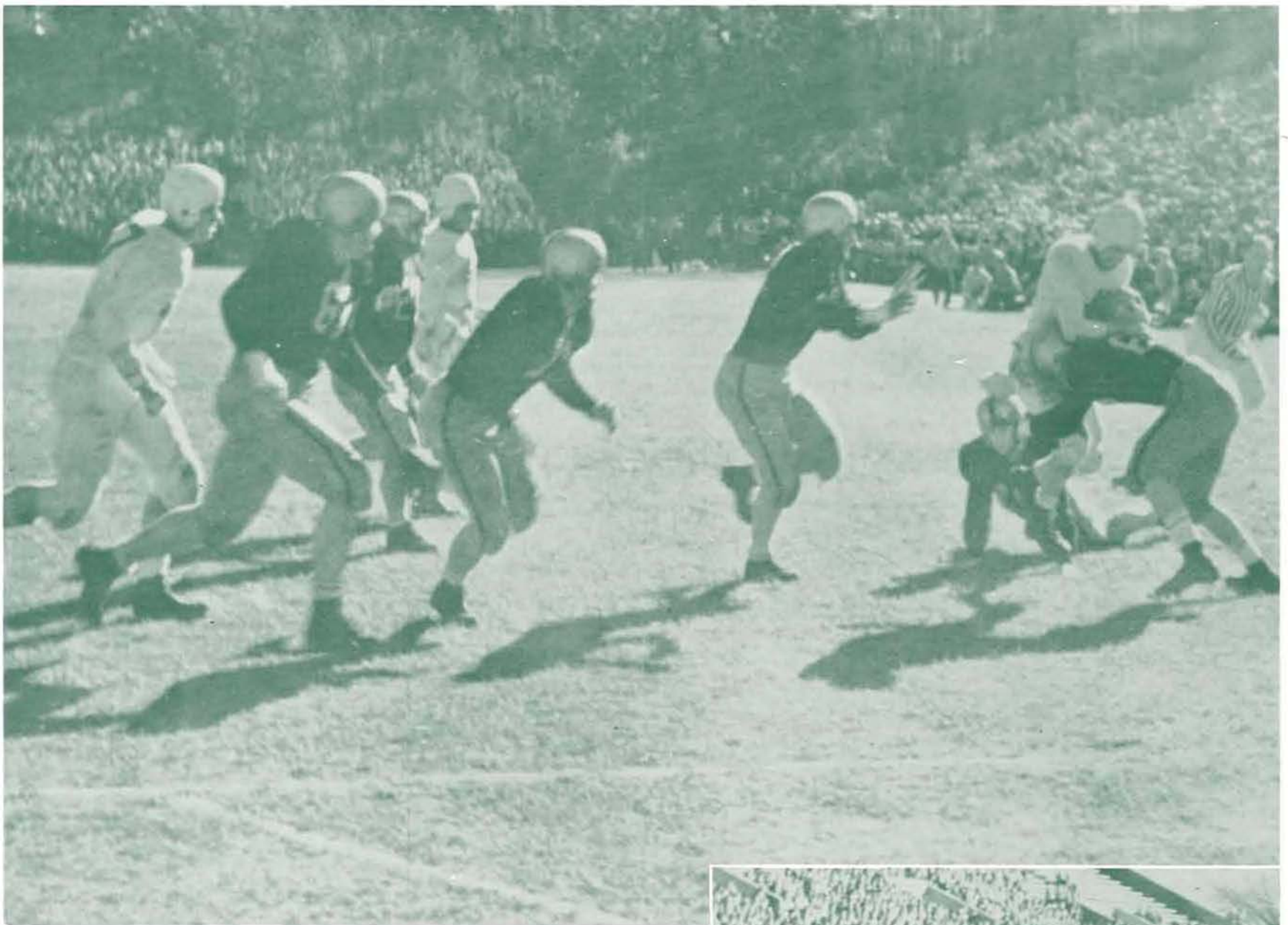

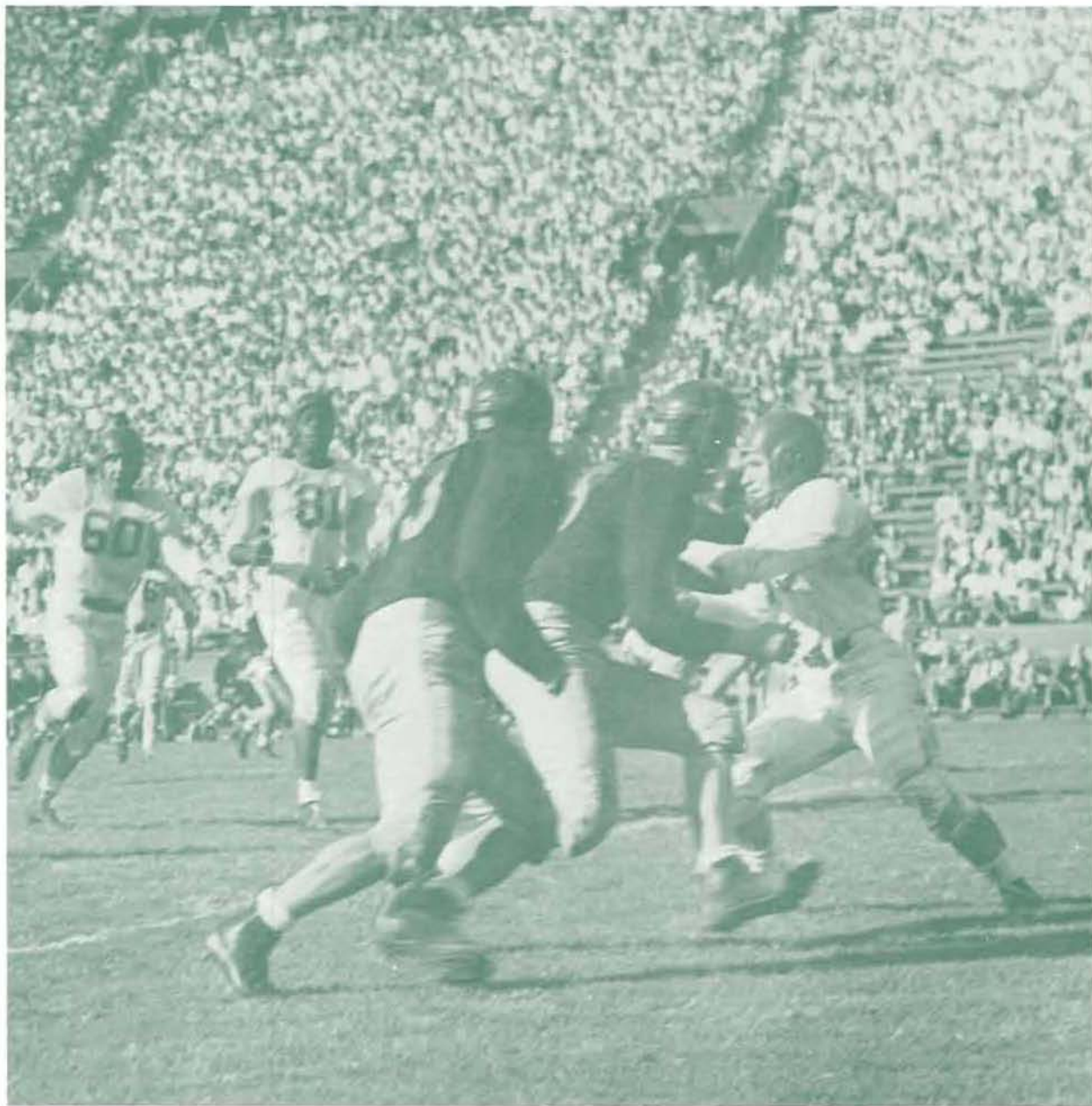

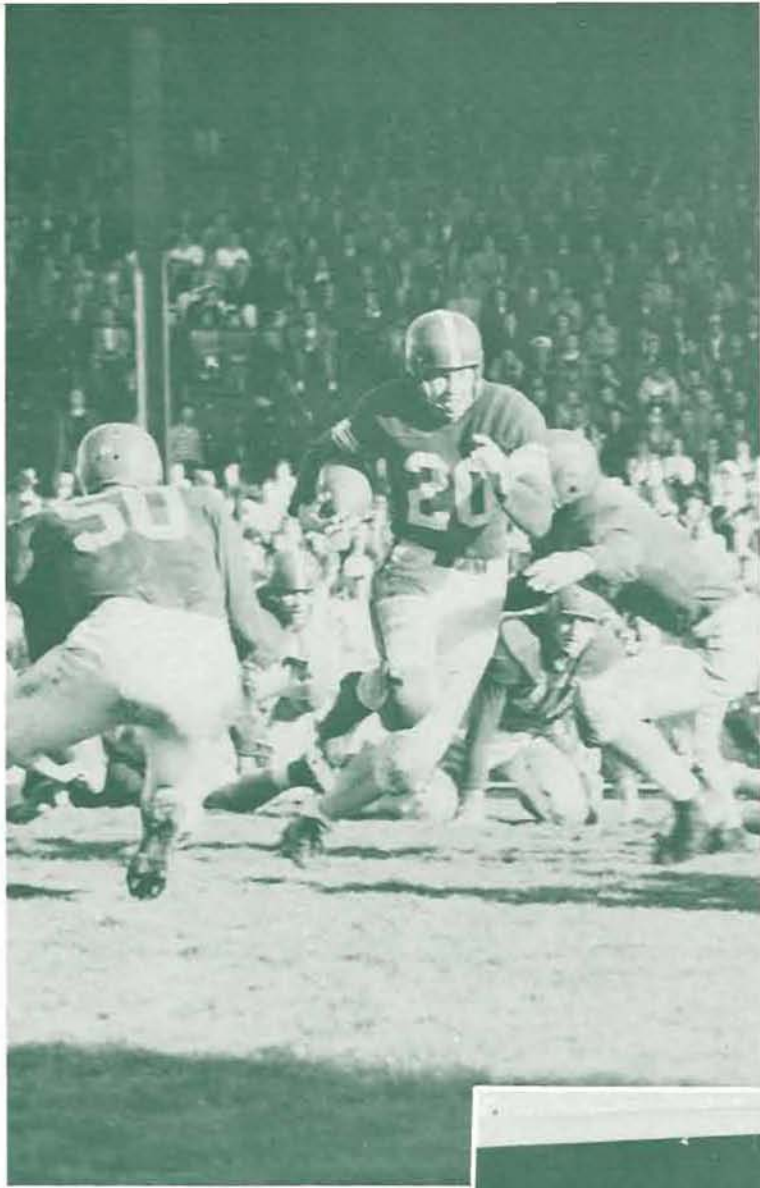

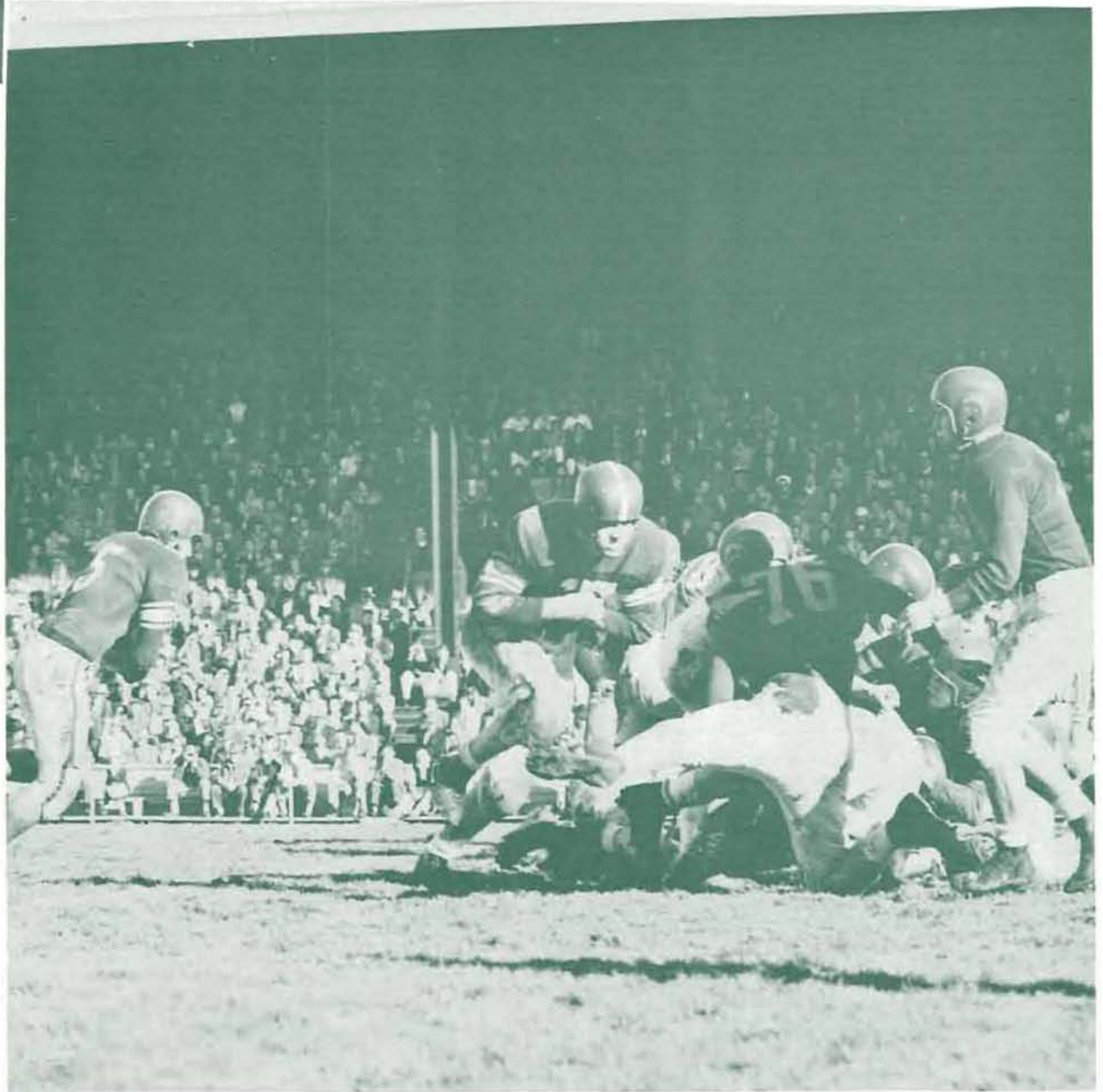

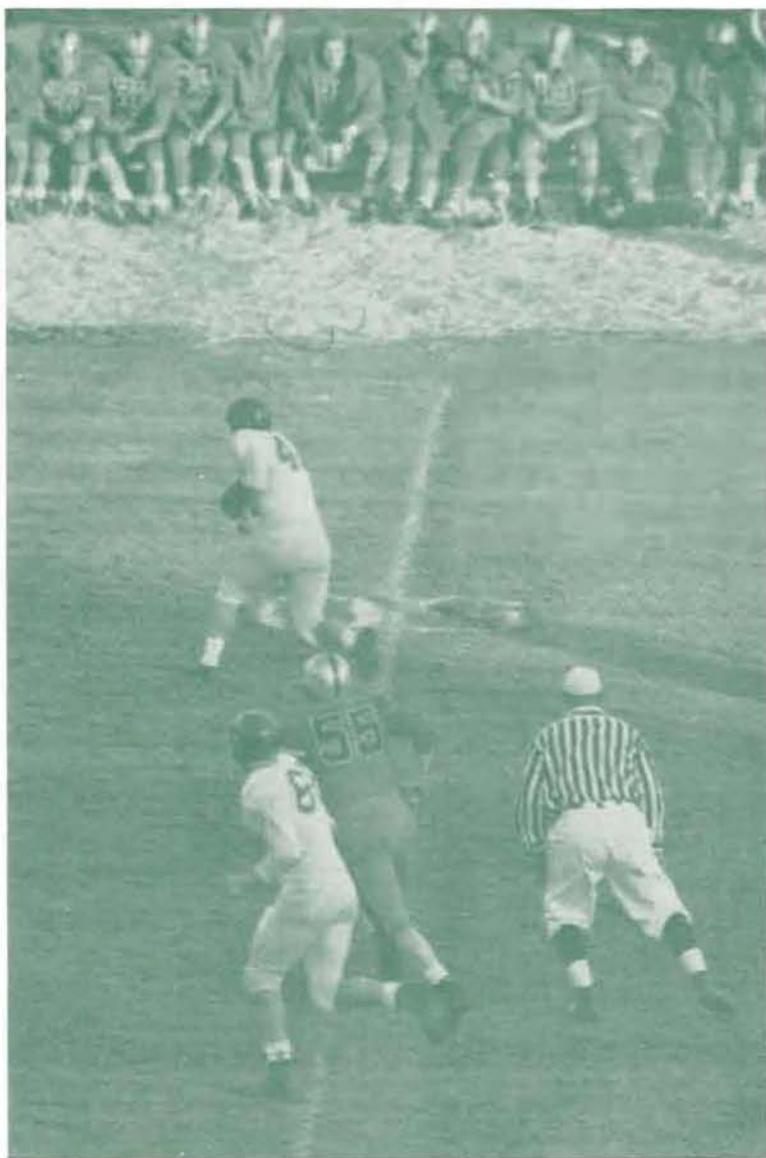

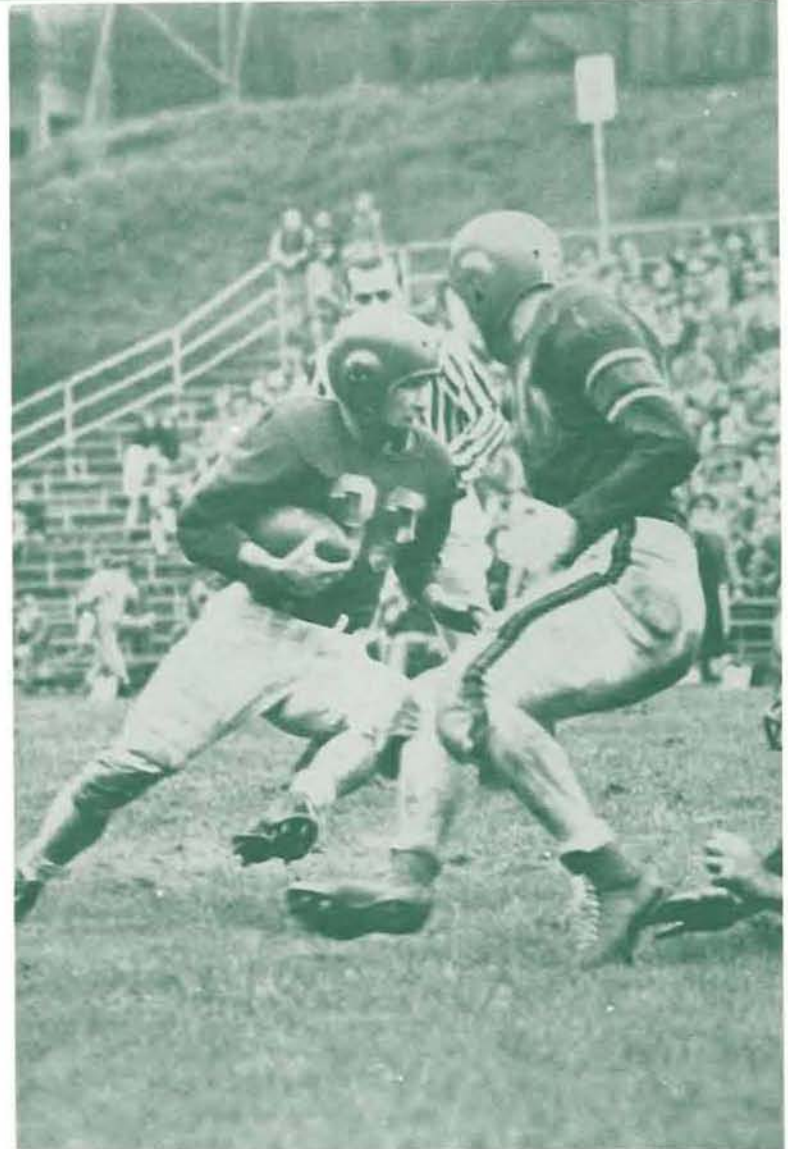

# Basketball

## Ducks Cop ND Second Place

**T**HE 1951 DUCK BASKETBALL squad enjoyed Oregon's most outstanding season since 1945 as they captured 10 victories in 13 home games and finished the season only one game away from first place in the Northern Division of the Pacific Coast Conference.

Coach John Warren's talented cagers lost only one Northern Division home game, thus duplicating one of the feats of Oregon's 1939 national champions, who also suffered only one league setback in the Ducks' home court.

The Ducks demonstrated their notable basketball talents on numerous occasions. They pounded the hoop with a .607 field goal average in the second half of their first battle with Santa Clara. They crushed Oregon State 66-47 at Corvallis and administered a 72-45 treatment to the Beavers in their season finale at McArthur Court.

They met Washington's highly-touted Huskies, who shortly afterwards took the Northern Division title, and they scored almost at ease in their fourth game with the

Seattle quintet. The Ducks shattered the Husky defenses for a first-half total of 52 points, an all-time Northern Division record. Oregon's 82 points for the game was a new Webfoot league record.

Only two teams, Washington and Idaho, outperformed the Ducks on the backboards, and the Ducks evened the score when they met the Huskies and Vandals in McArthur Court. All other Oregon opponents, including Wyoming and the Blue 'n Gold, were outclassed in the rebound department. Loscutoff, Peterson, Barclay, and Krause were the top backboard artists on the Webfoot squad.

The Duck picture also included brilliant individual performances. Forward Bob Peterson was leading the circuit in the race for the league scoring championship until he was held out of the final game.

Center Jim Loscutoff was one of the best backboard performers in the West. The tall junior always took more

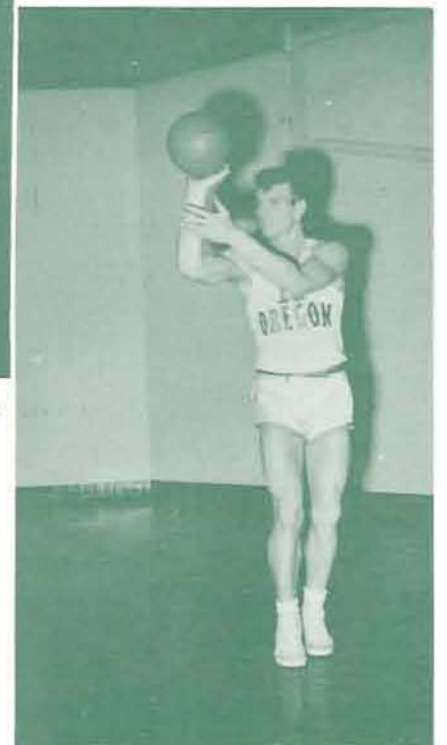

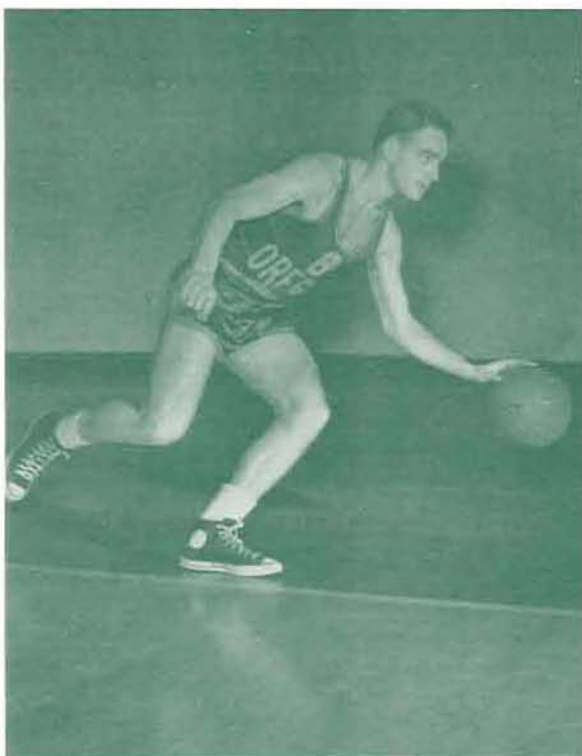

than his share of the rebounds. In the second Duck-Blue 'n Gold clash, Loscutoff saw action during only three-fourths of the regular playing time, but he took more rebounds than any other participant, including the Blue 'n Gold's Don Barksdale, America's top amateur hoop artist in 1949, who played during the entire 40 minutes.

Guard Mel Krause had one of the top field goal averages in the Northern Division, while Guard Jack Keller combined a brilliant offensive game with a sparkling defensive game to lead Oregon to many victories. Keller averaged only 1.8 personal fouls for each Northern Division game.

Forward Curt Barclay, a high-scoring sophomore, ranked high in the Northern Division scoring totals and compiled a .331 field goal average for the total season. Reserve Guard Ken Hunt also was an outstanding performer.

The Ducks provided a high-scoring, fast-moving, entertaining brand of basketball. The liberal supply of light entertainment for the fans included the view of Loscutoff reading the newspaper comic section while sitting on the bench, the dribbling antics of Guards Keller and Krause, and the miscellaneous hilarities provided by Bob Peterson.

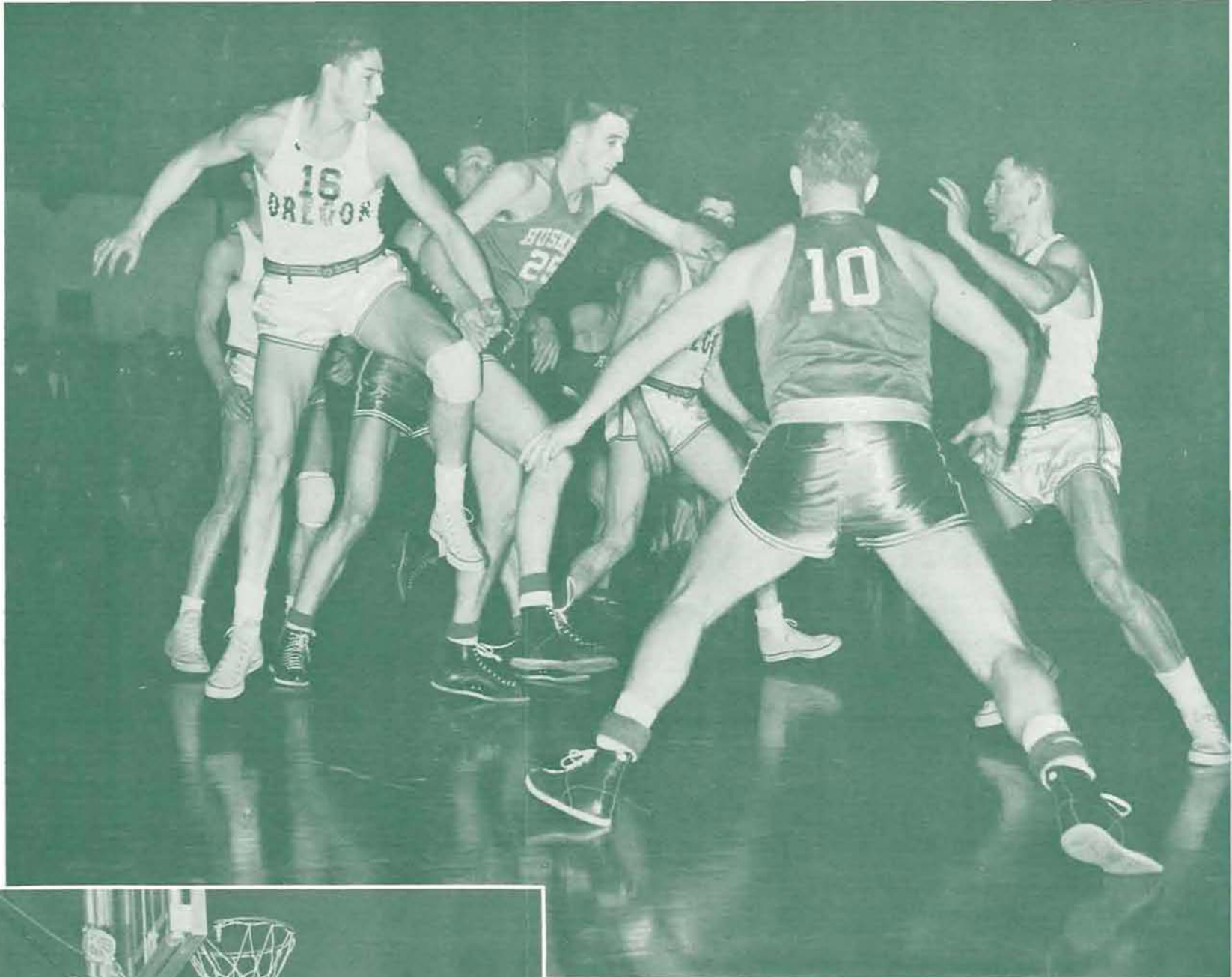
The Ducks had one of the qualities typical of champions—they always bounced back after a defeat. Opening the season with a devastating 59-39 loss to Utah, they came back on the following night, fired field goals through the hoops at a .358 average, and upset Utah State 66-64.

Suffering a tremendous 77-55 loss to UCLA, later Southern Division champions, the Ducks bounced back to rout the Bruins 72-54. Losing 73-49 to Washington, the Oregon quintet came back on the following night to lose to the Huskies by a single point. Receiving a 55-45 treatment from Washington State, the Ducks returned principal with interest by sweeping the remaining three games with the Cougars.

After Washington rewrote the record book while dropping the Oregon cagers 77-69, the Webfoots forced the record ledger into obsolescence while rolling to an amazing 82-75 victory over the Huskies.

Finally, the Ducks bounced back from a 41-39 setback at the hands of the Oregon State Beavers and slaughtered the OSC cagers 72-45, rolling up the greatest all-time Oregon margin over the Staters, taking the most one-sided Oregon win of the season, and celebrating Oregon State's "Golden Jubilee" 50th year of basketball by dropping the Beavers into the Northern Division cellar for the first time in hoop history.

Loscutoff led Coach Warren's Ducks in total season scoring with 318 points. Barclay closely followed with 306, while Keller was next with 260. Mel Krause was the top Oregon starter in the accuracy department with a .376 Northern Division field goal average and a .340 mark for the entire season. Barclay had a .331 total season percentage.



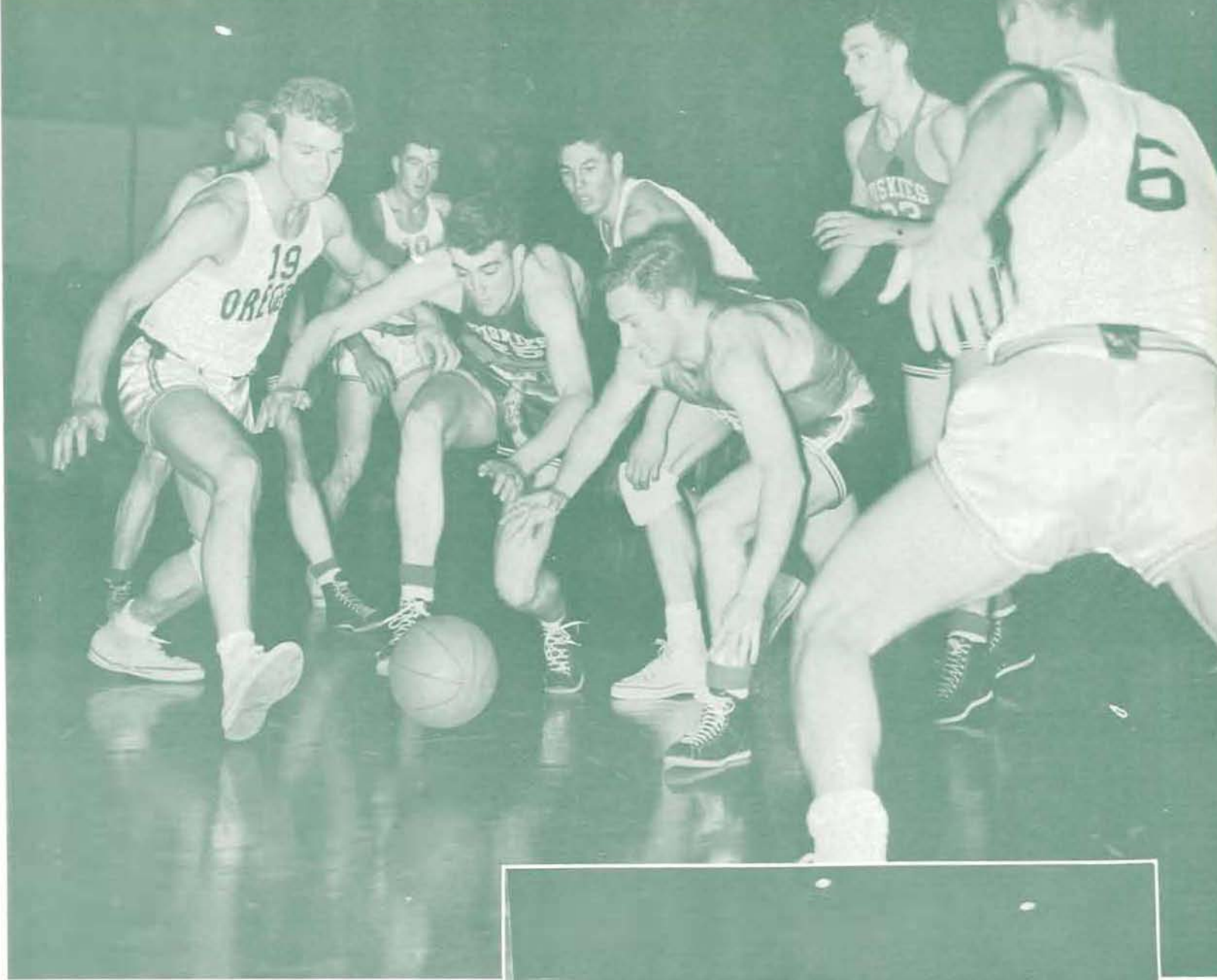

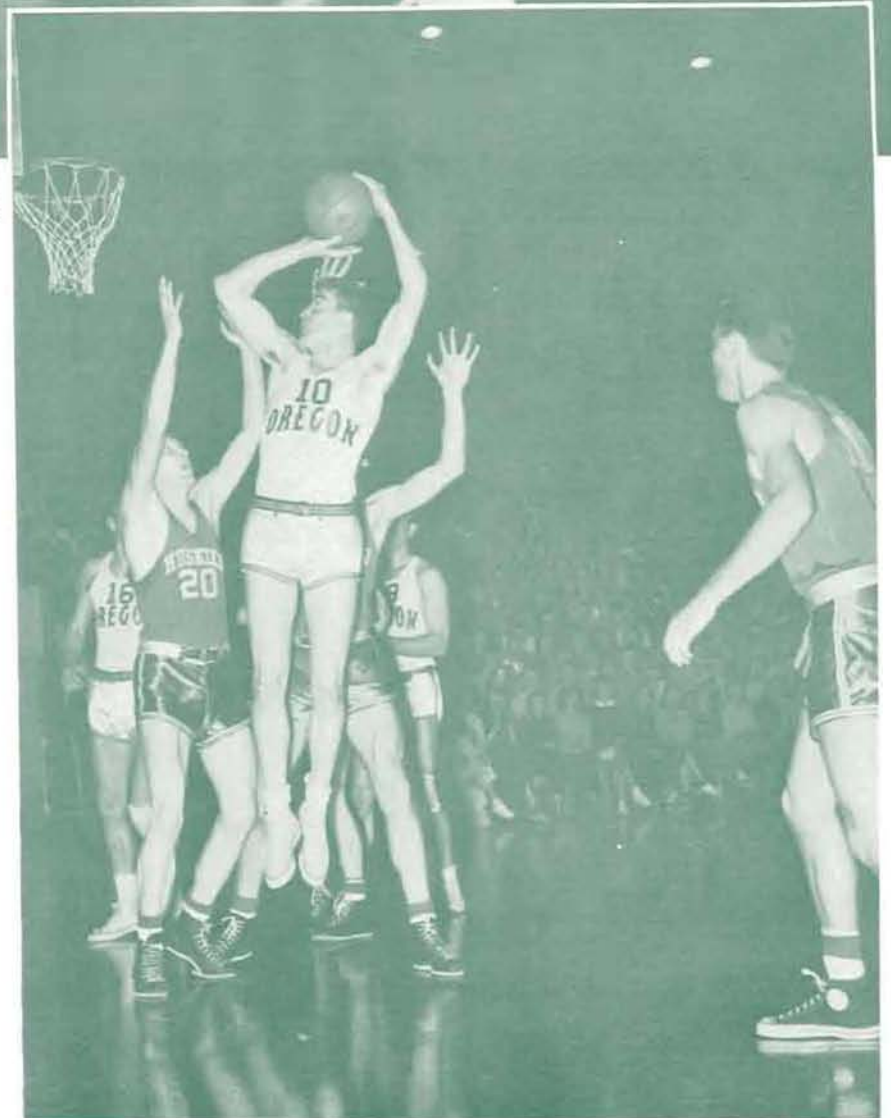

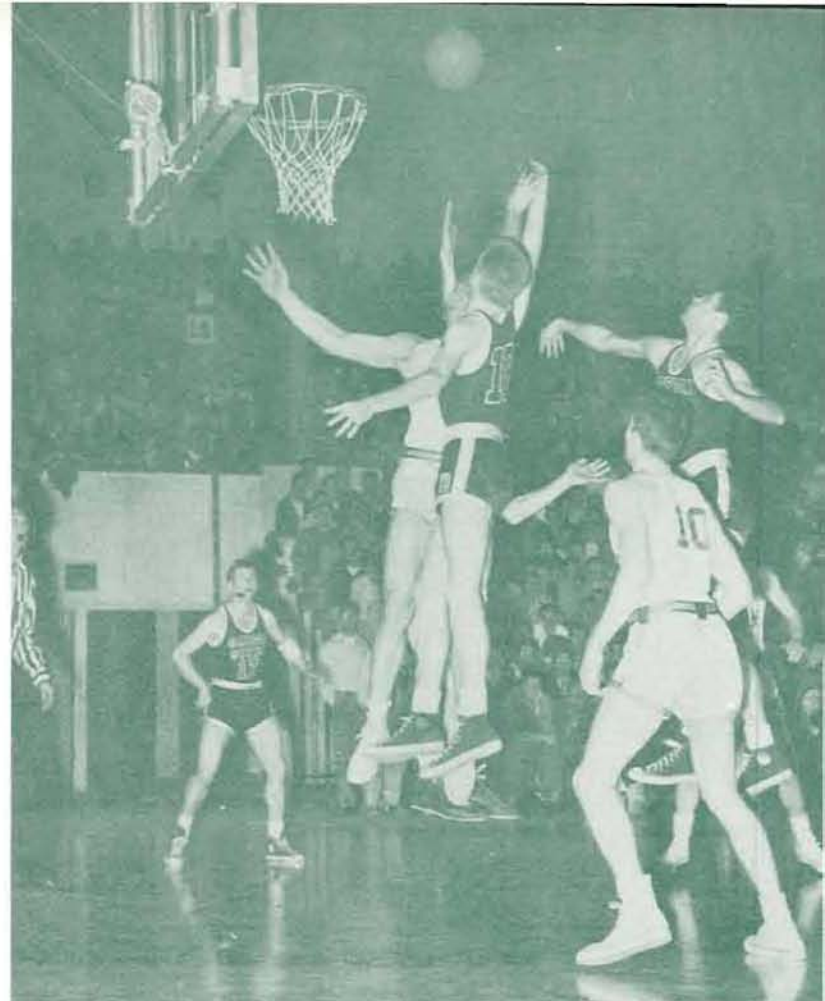

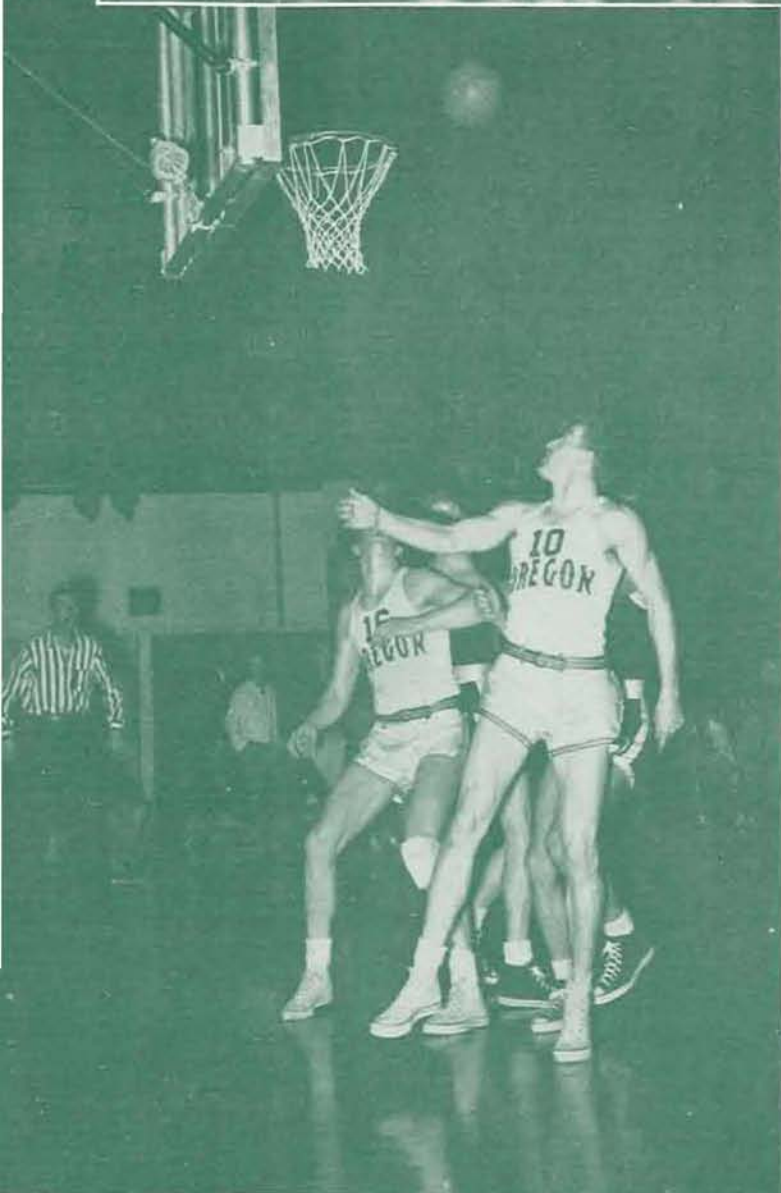

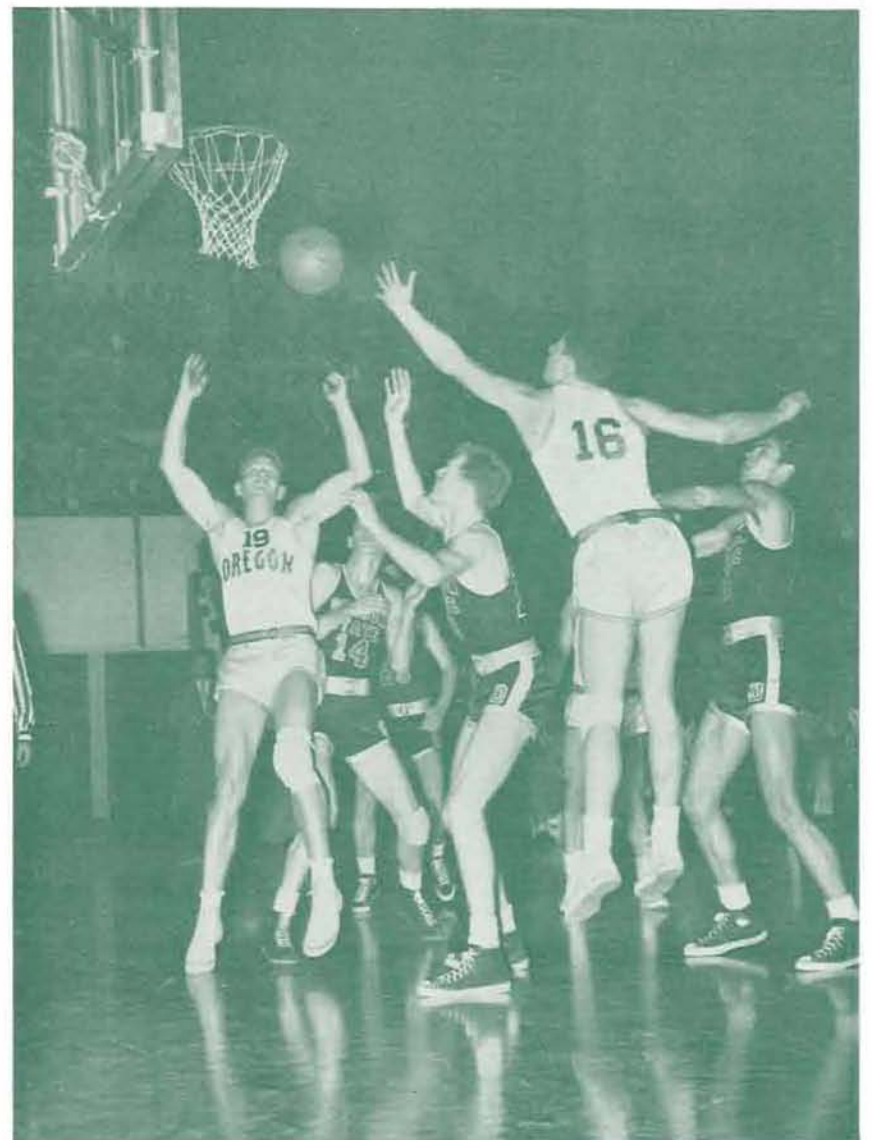

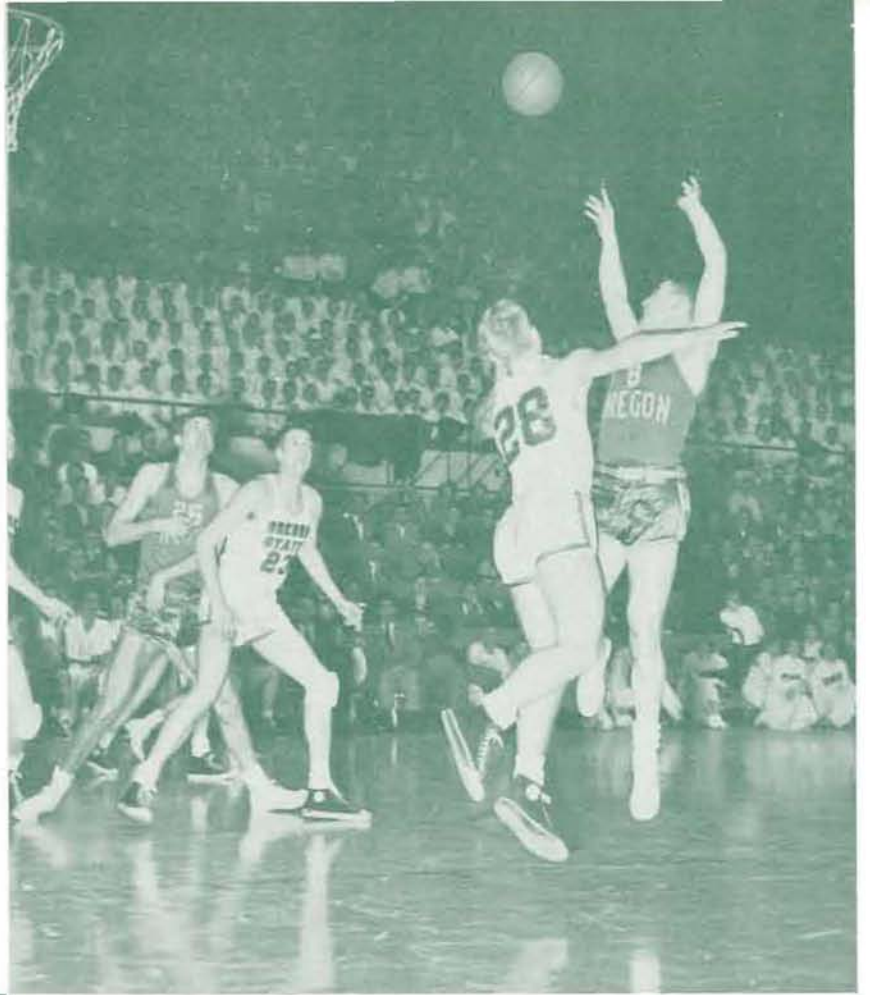

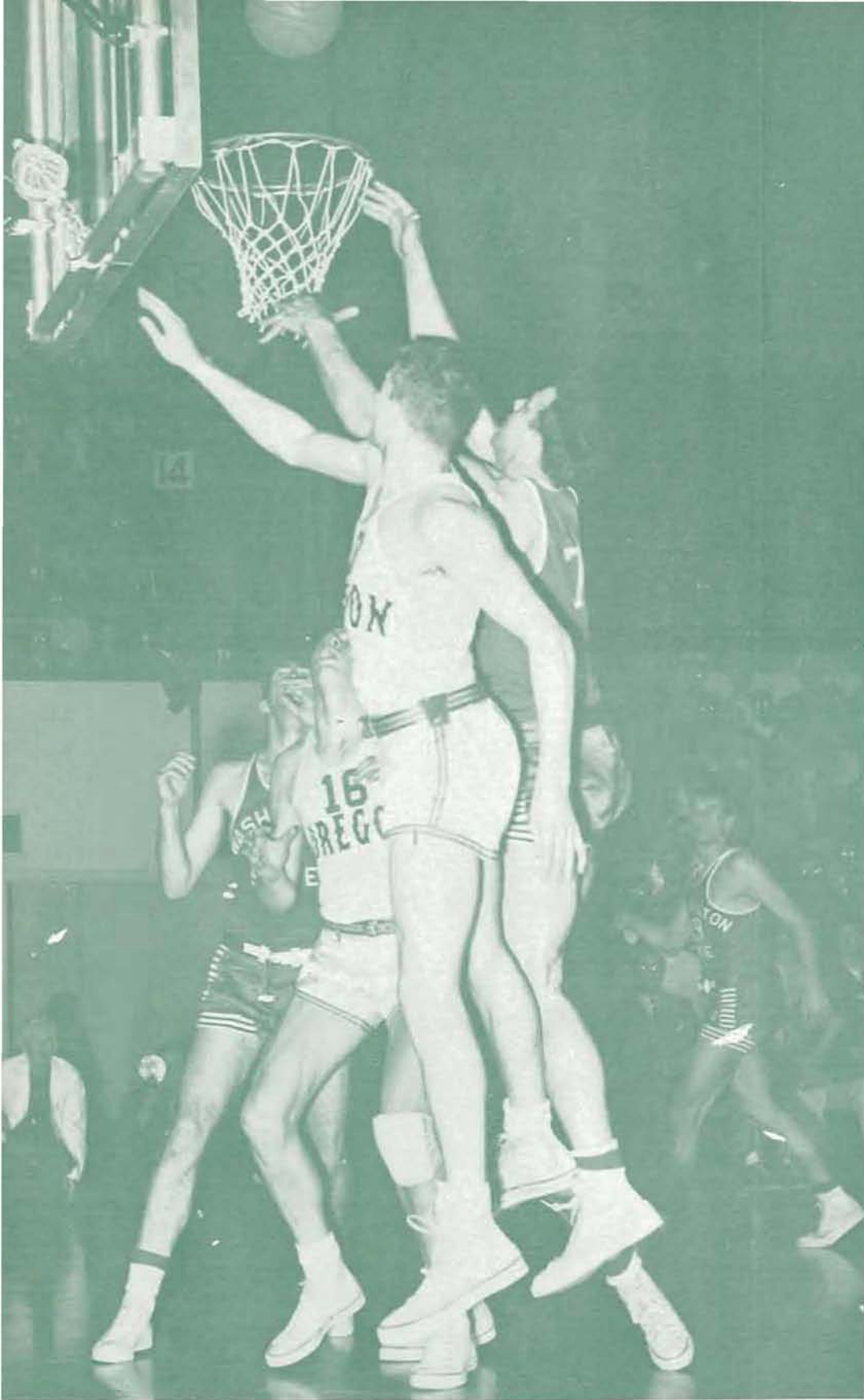

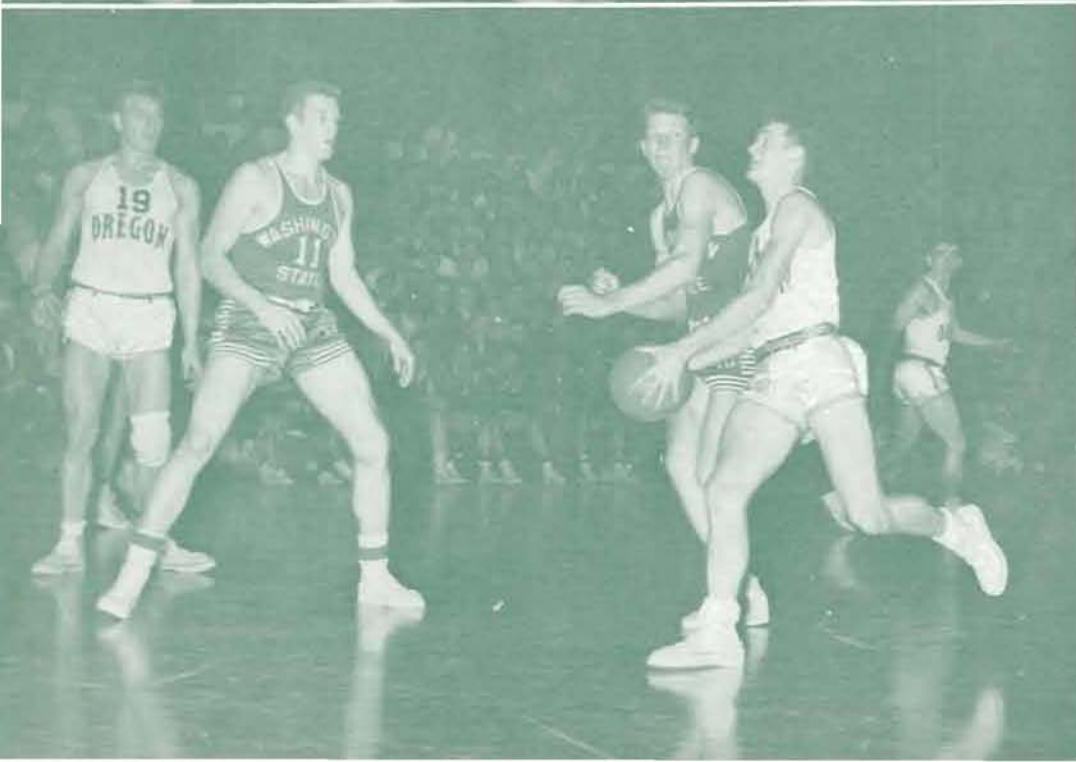

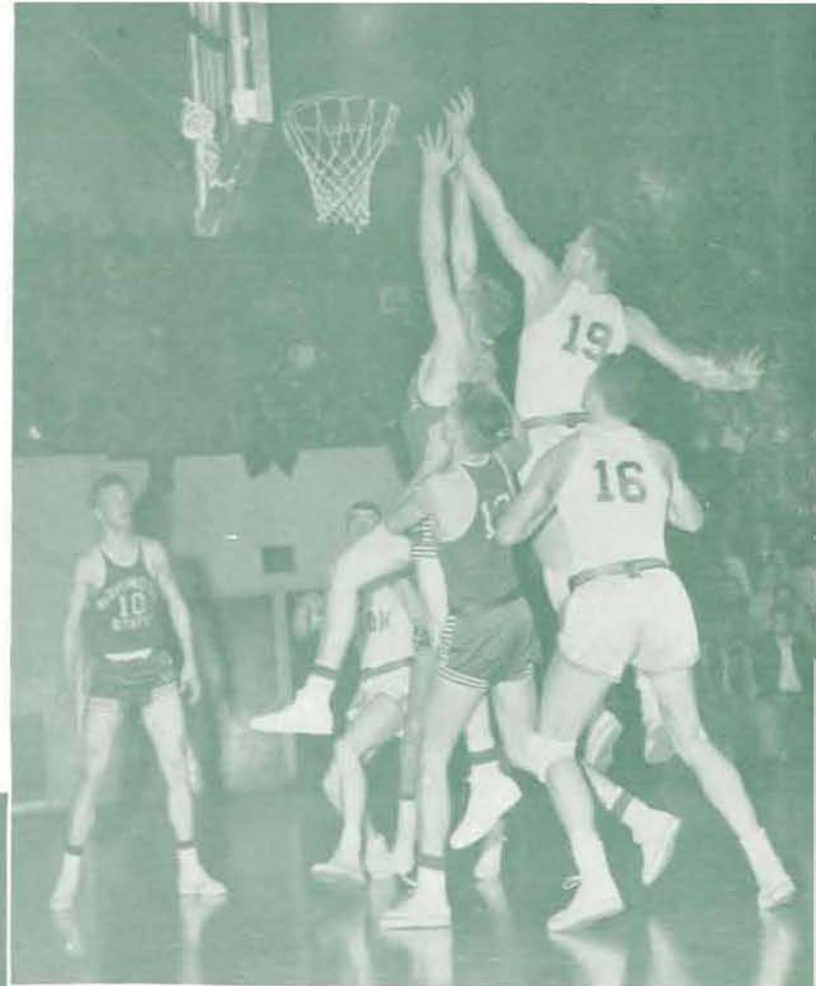

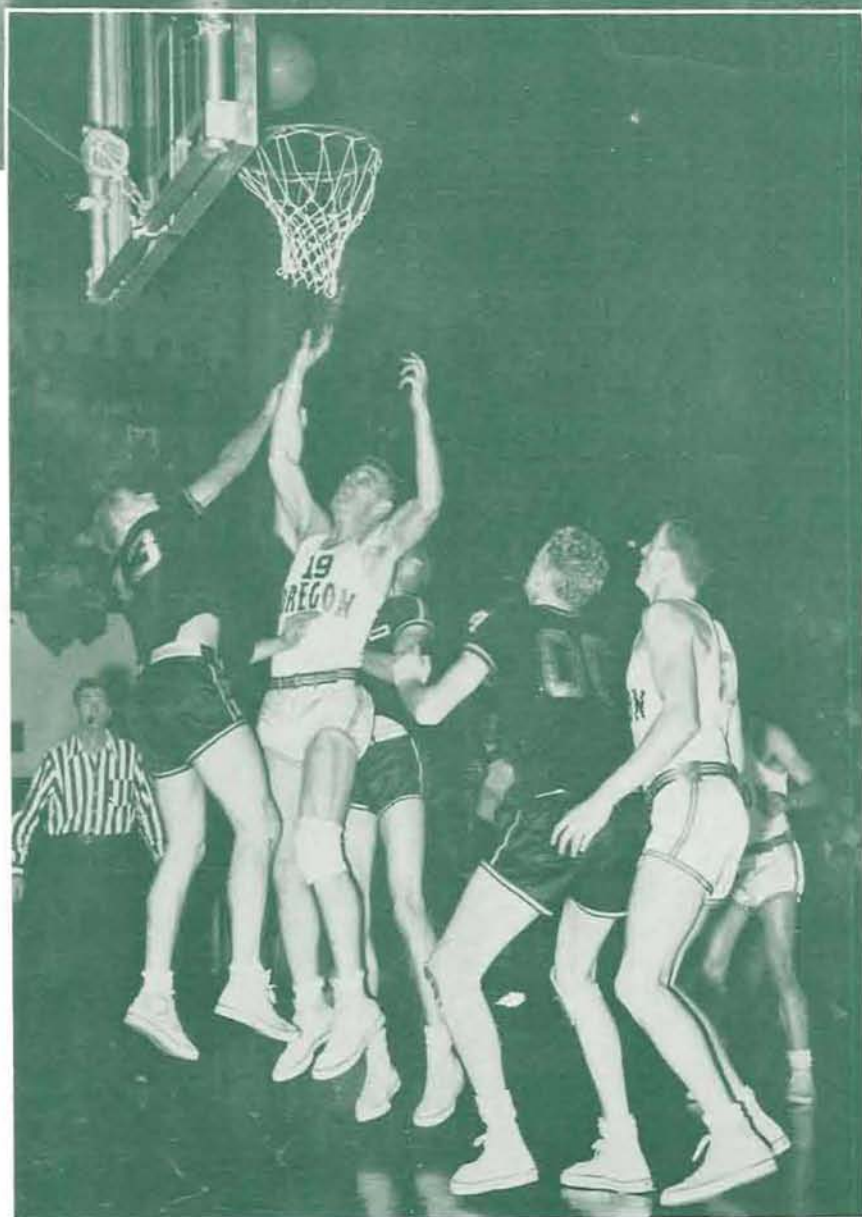

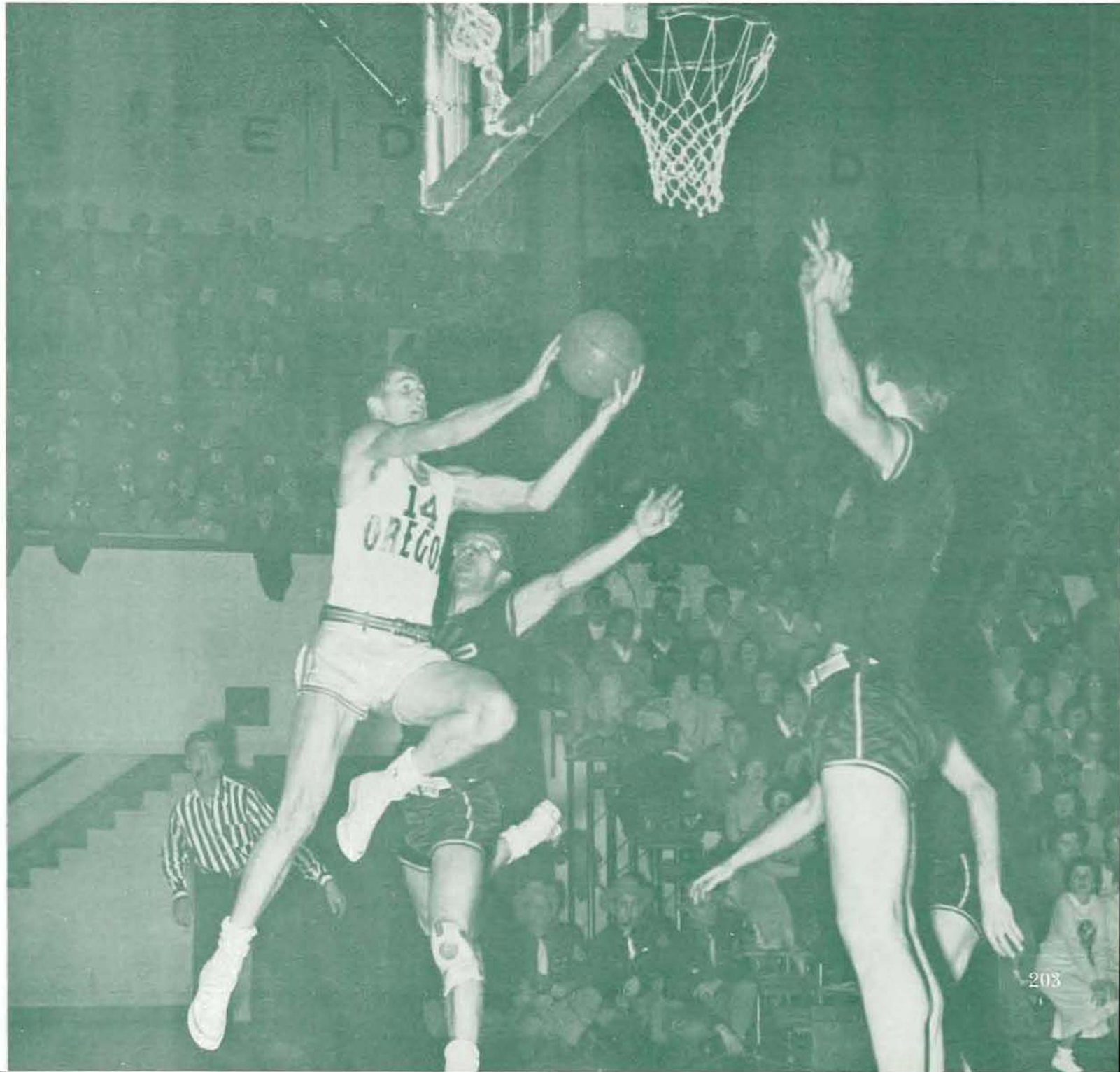

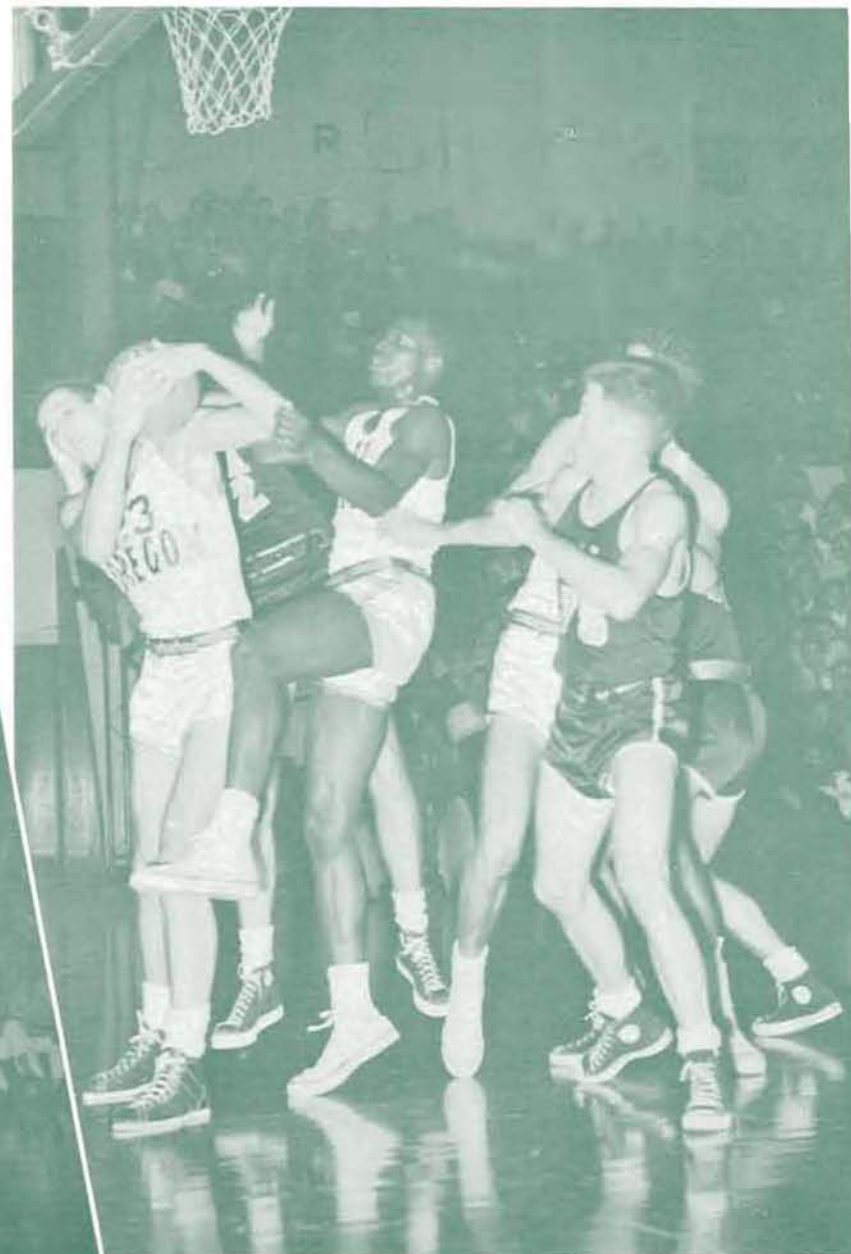

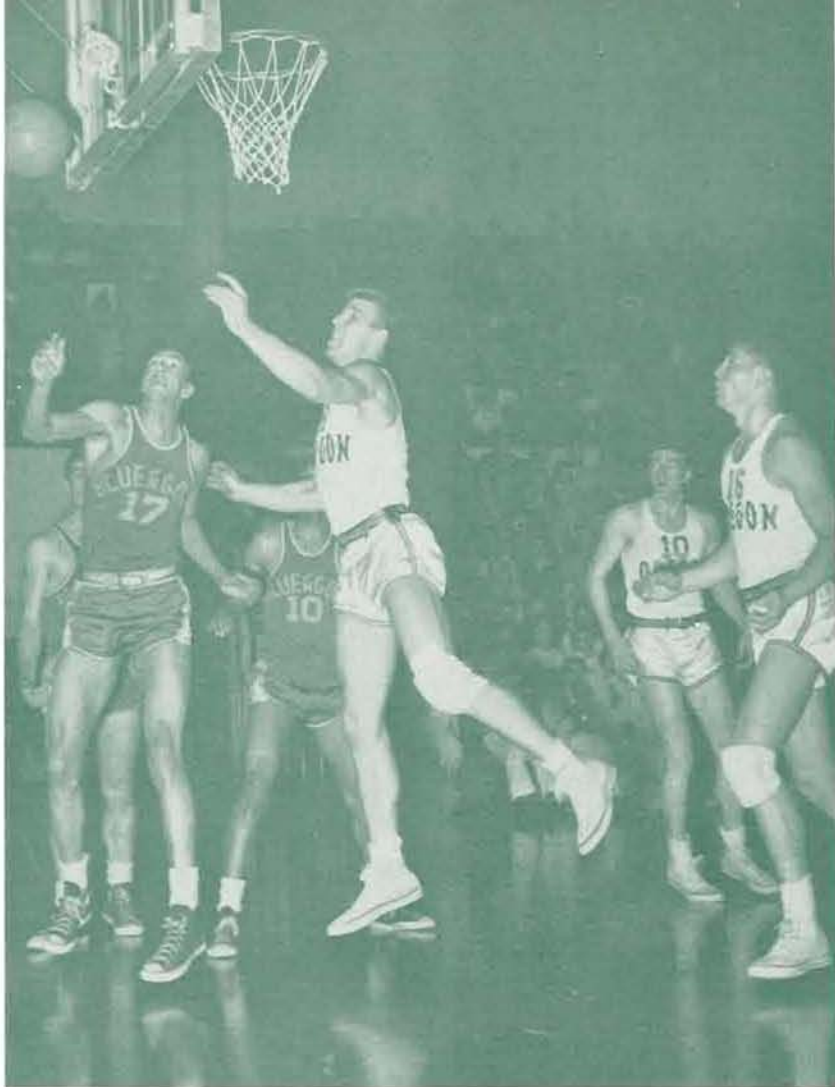

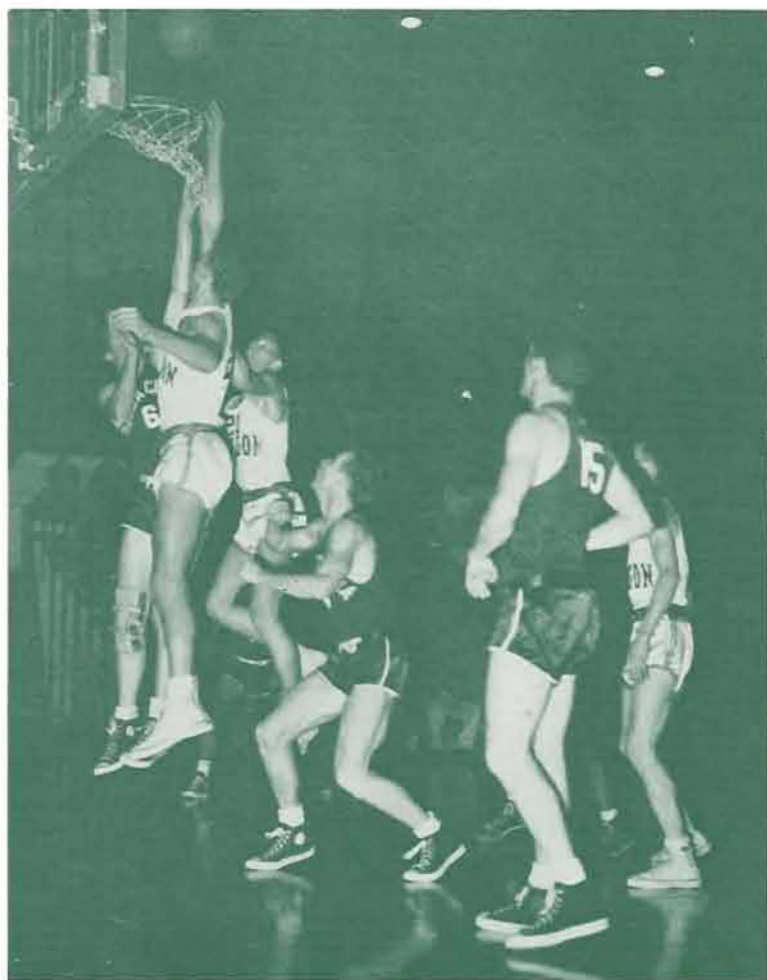

**T**HE OREGON VARSITY swimming squad shattered 17 dual meet records and seized second place honors in the Northern Division Meet.

Coach John Borchardt's Duck splashers opened the season with a 49-35 decision over the Oregon State Beavers at Eugene. A local meeting with the Idaho Vandals was next on the schedule, and the Ducks seized an easy 52-27 victory as they gained eight firsts in ten events.

Washington State's swimmers met the Ducks on the following afternoon and took a narrow 45-38 triumph. Oregon set a new Men's Pool Webfoot record in the 400-yard freestyle relay when Jim Allan, Louis Santos, Joe Nishimoto, and Pete Van Dijk finished the course with a time of 3:38.9.

The Ducks journeyed to Corvallis and defeated the Oregon State Beavers for the 21st consecutive Webfoot victory over OSC. The Oregon swimmers took an easy 55-29 victory and set five new Duck-Beaver meet records.

The Ducks closed the dual meet season with a 68-16 loss to the undefeated Washington Huskies. Pete Salmon of Washington highlighted the meet by churning 100 yards in 51.2 seconds, one of the outstanding performances by an American college swimmer during the season.

The powerful Huskies captured the coveted crown in the Northern Division Meet, scoring 166 points for an easy win. Oregon was second with 71, Washington State followed with 62, the Oregon State Beavers tallied 19, and Idaho finished in the basement with 17.

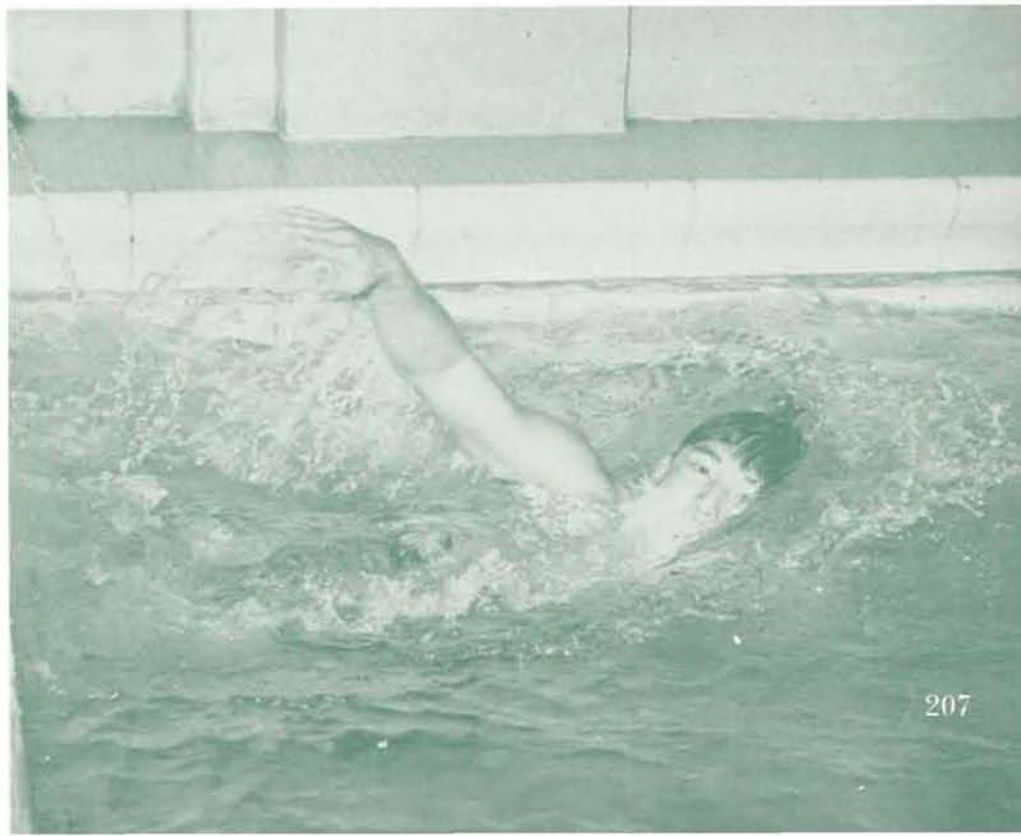
Oregon's Van Dijk seized the Northern Division 440-yard freestyle title, and Sophomore Gordon Edwards took runner-up honors in the same event. Stan Hargrave placed third in the 100-yard backstroke, Jim Allan took third place in the 150-yard individual medley, and Oregon also finished third in the 300-yard medley relay.

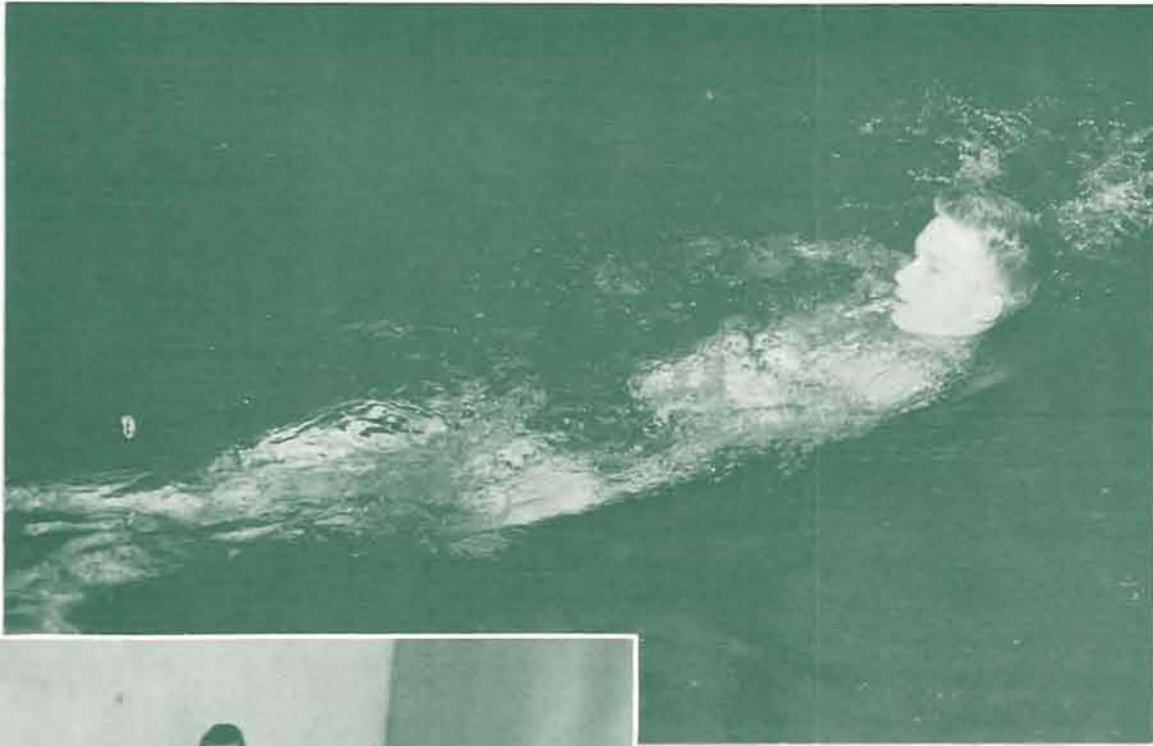

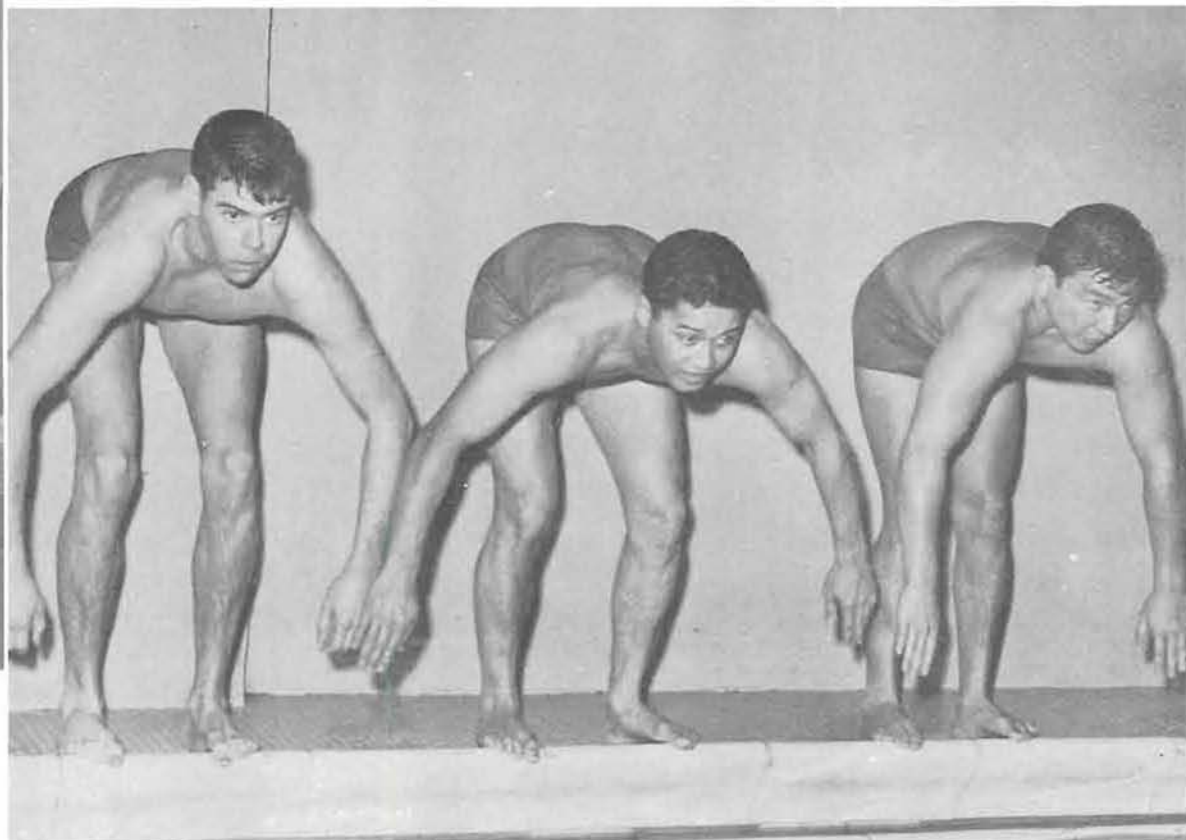

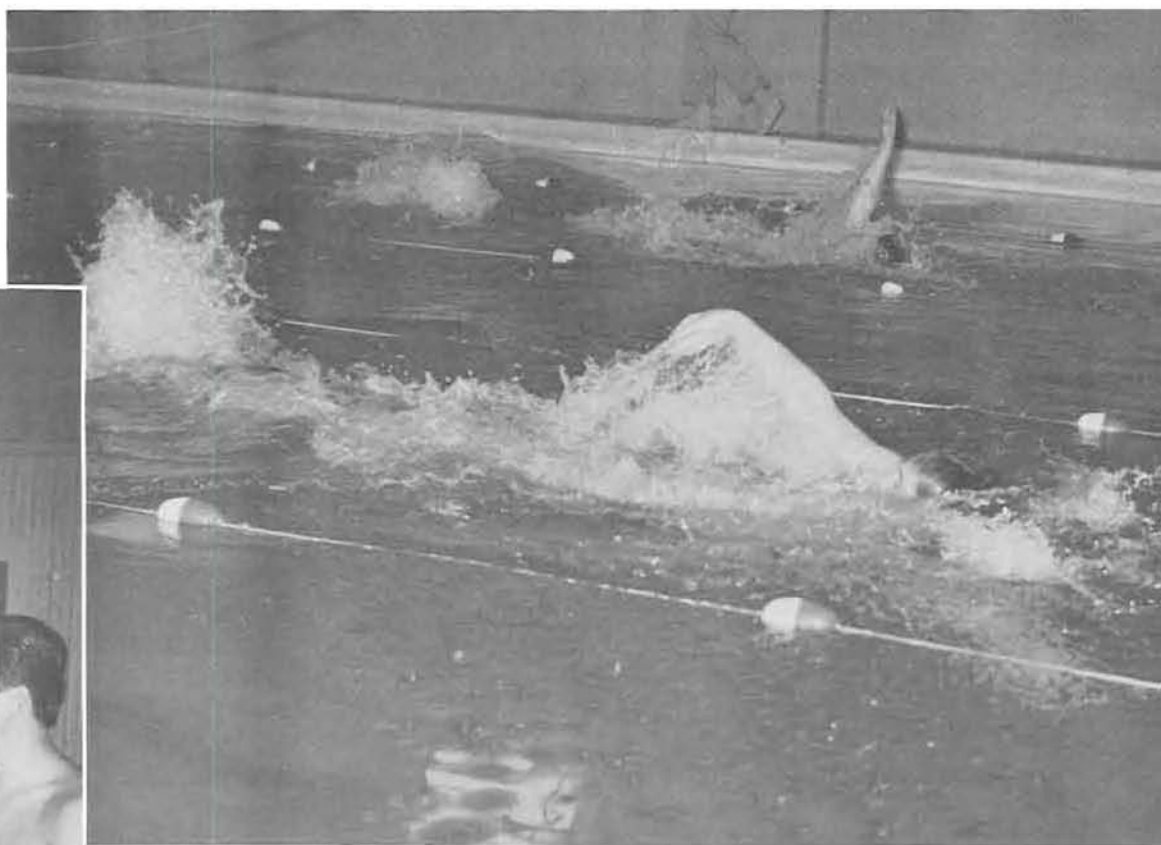

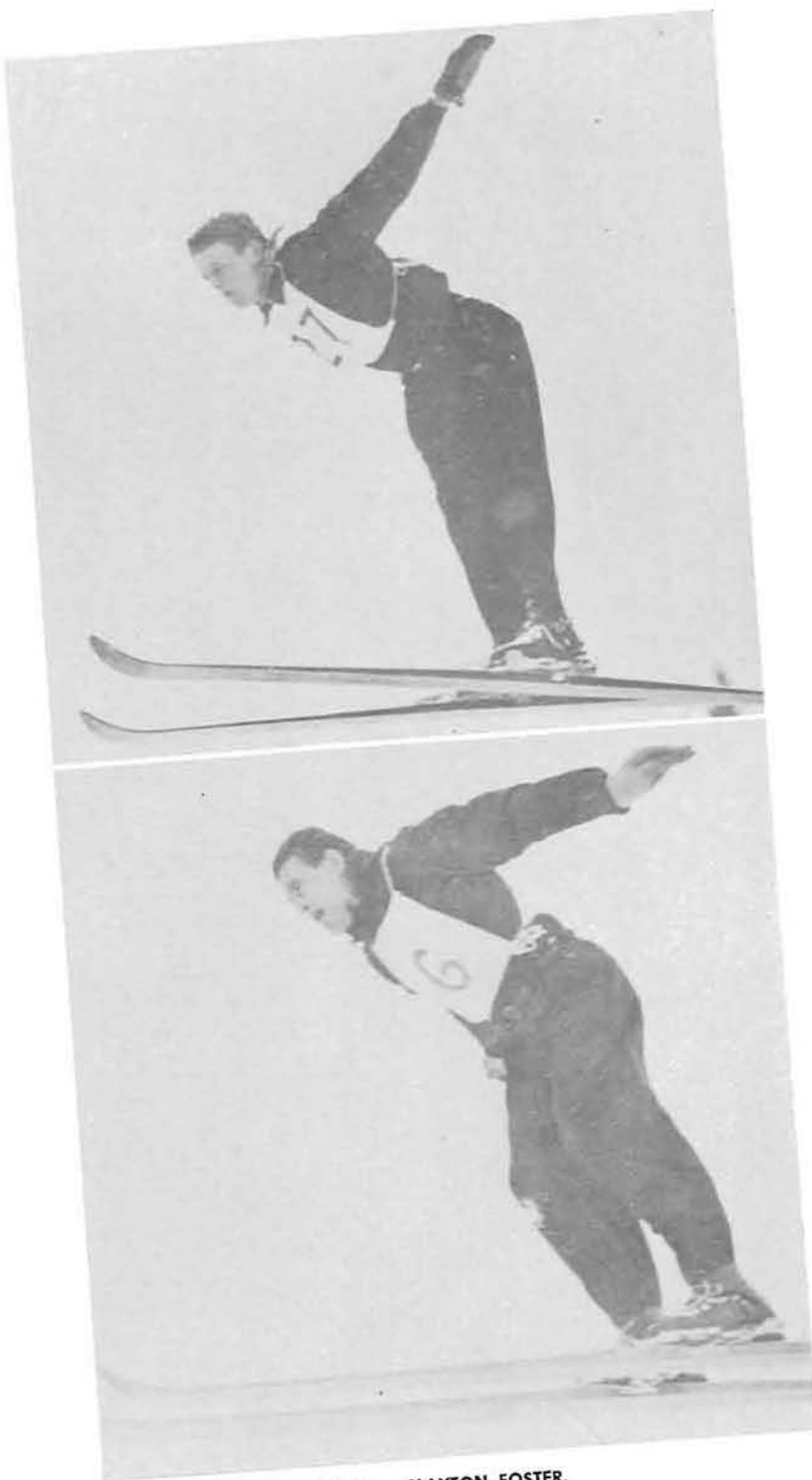

**T**HE POWERFUL 1950 OREGON golf squad seized six impressive triumphs in seven matches and captured the Northern Division dual meet title.

The Ducks missed an undefeated season by the margin of one stroke and later failed to take top honors in the Northern Division Meet by the same margin—one stroke.

Coach Sid Milligan's divot diggers opened the season with an easy 16½ to 10½ win over the Oregon State Beavers. The Ducks defeated the Beavers in five of six singles matches.

Oregon then invaded the Inland Empire country and promptly routed Idaho 22-5 and Washington State 19-8. The Ducks then encountered a non-conference foe, the College of Puget Sound, and snapped a 10-meet C.P.S. winning streak by drubbing the Washingtonians 20-10.

The Ducks cinched the Northern Division dual meet crown by crushing Washington 21½ to 5½ and then smashed the University of British Columbia 15½ to 2½.

Oregon closed the season with another encounter with the Oregon Staters, easy victims in their previous match. However, the Ducks lost an undefeated season when the Beavers took a narrow 14-13 win in a weird battle in which OSC's No. 6 man tied for low honors.

In the Northern Division Meet, the Beavers again edged the Ducks by one stroke. The Oregon State golfers apparently were more familiar with the tricky Corvallis course, where the meet took place.



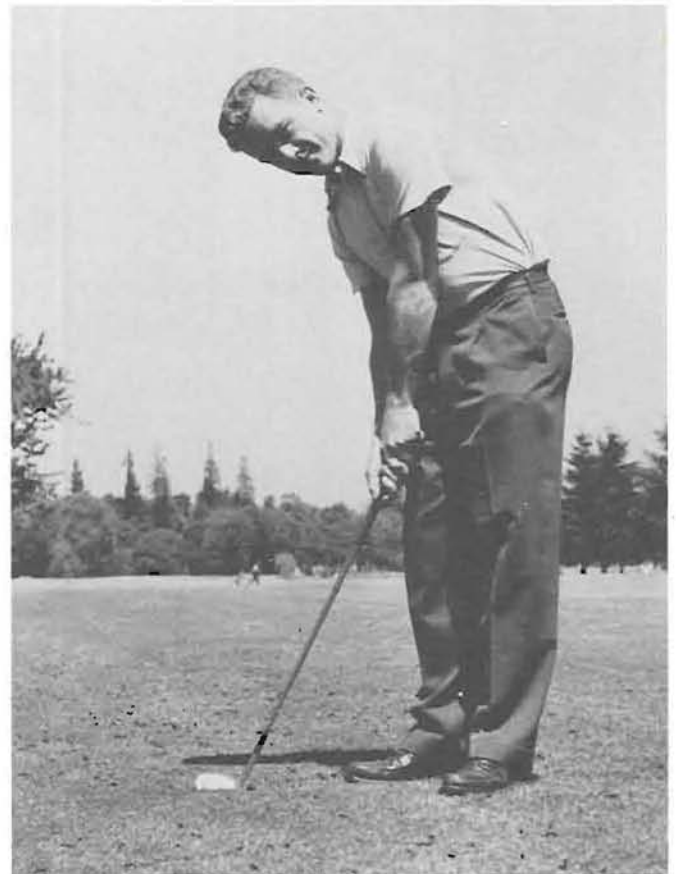

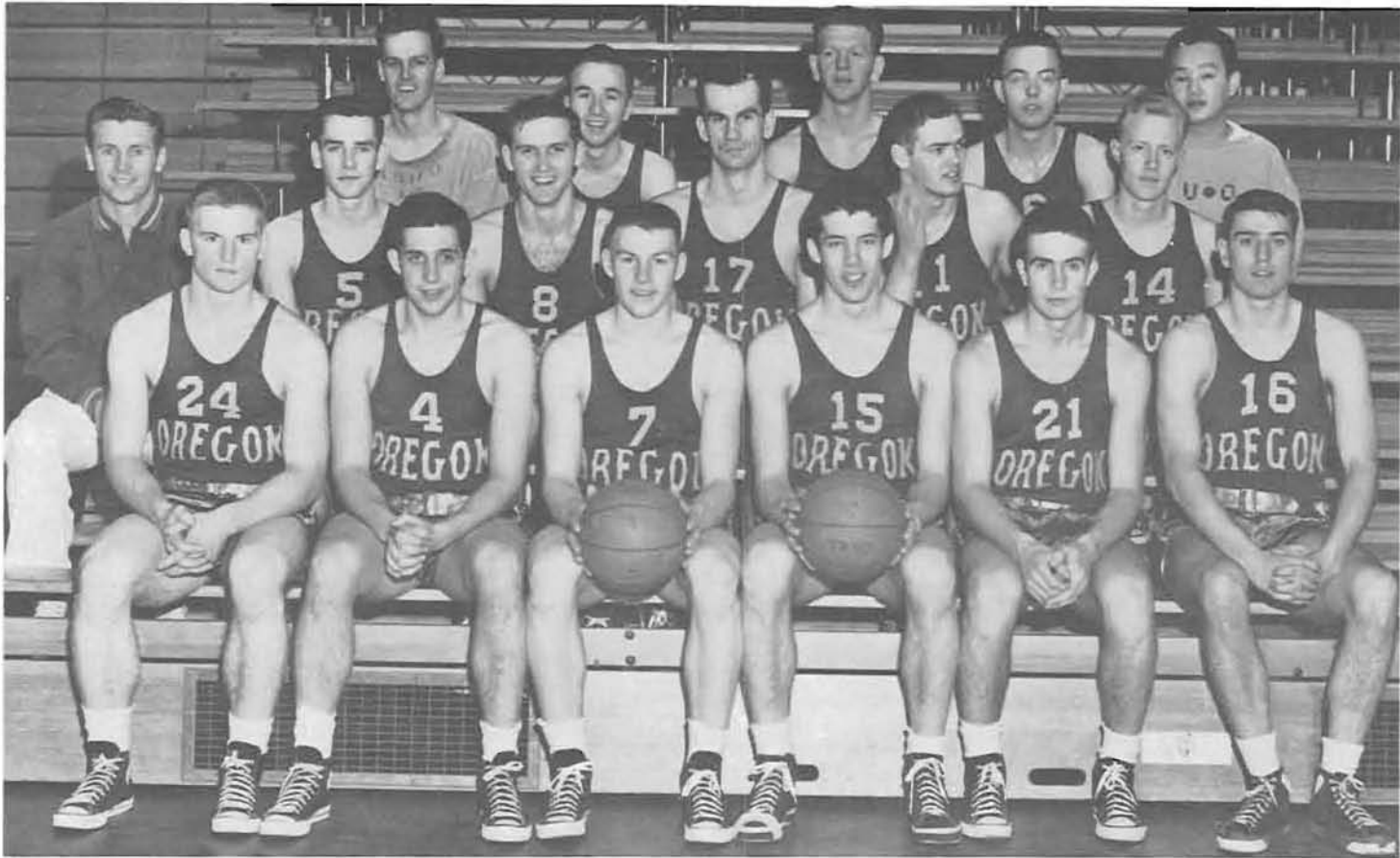

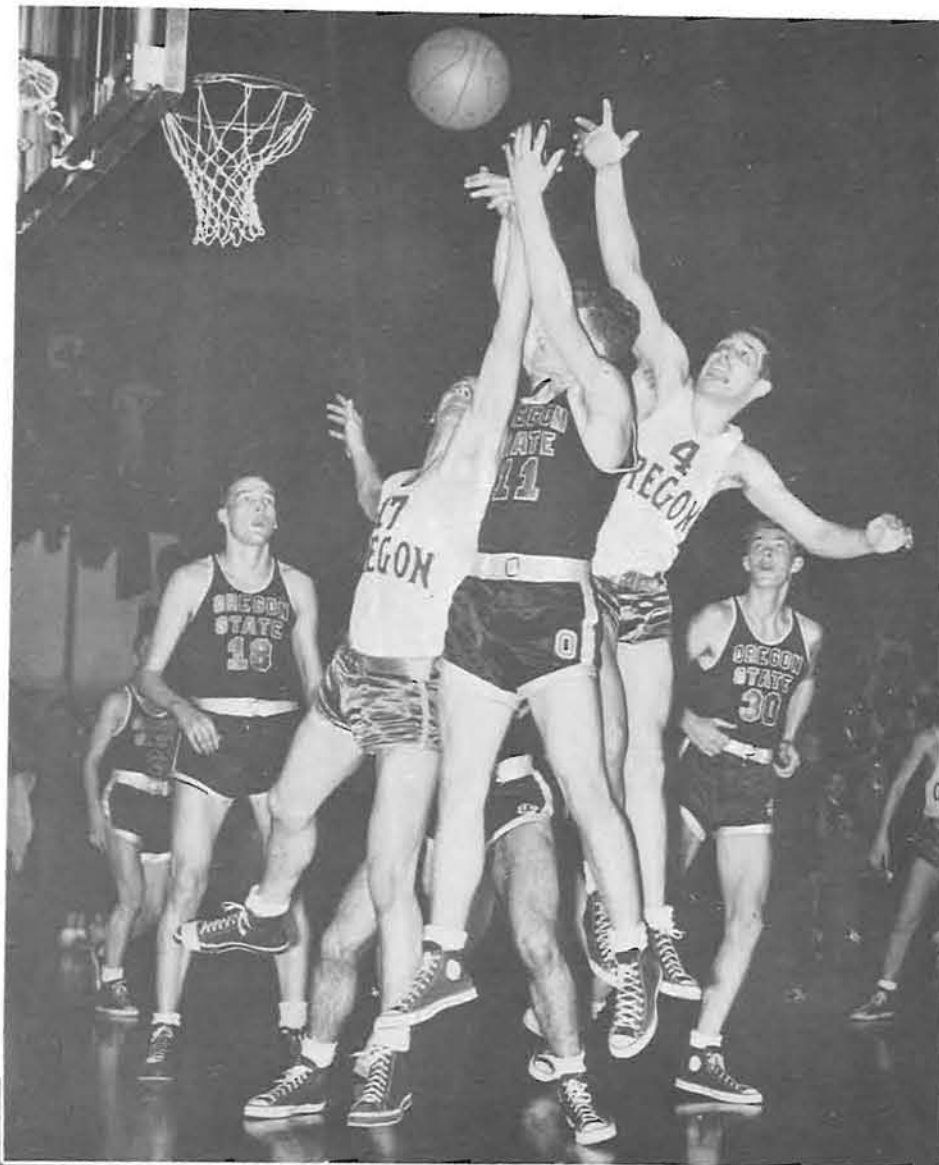

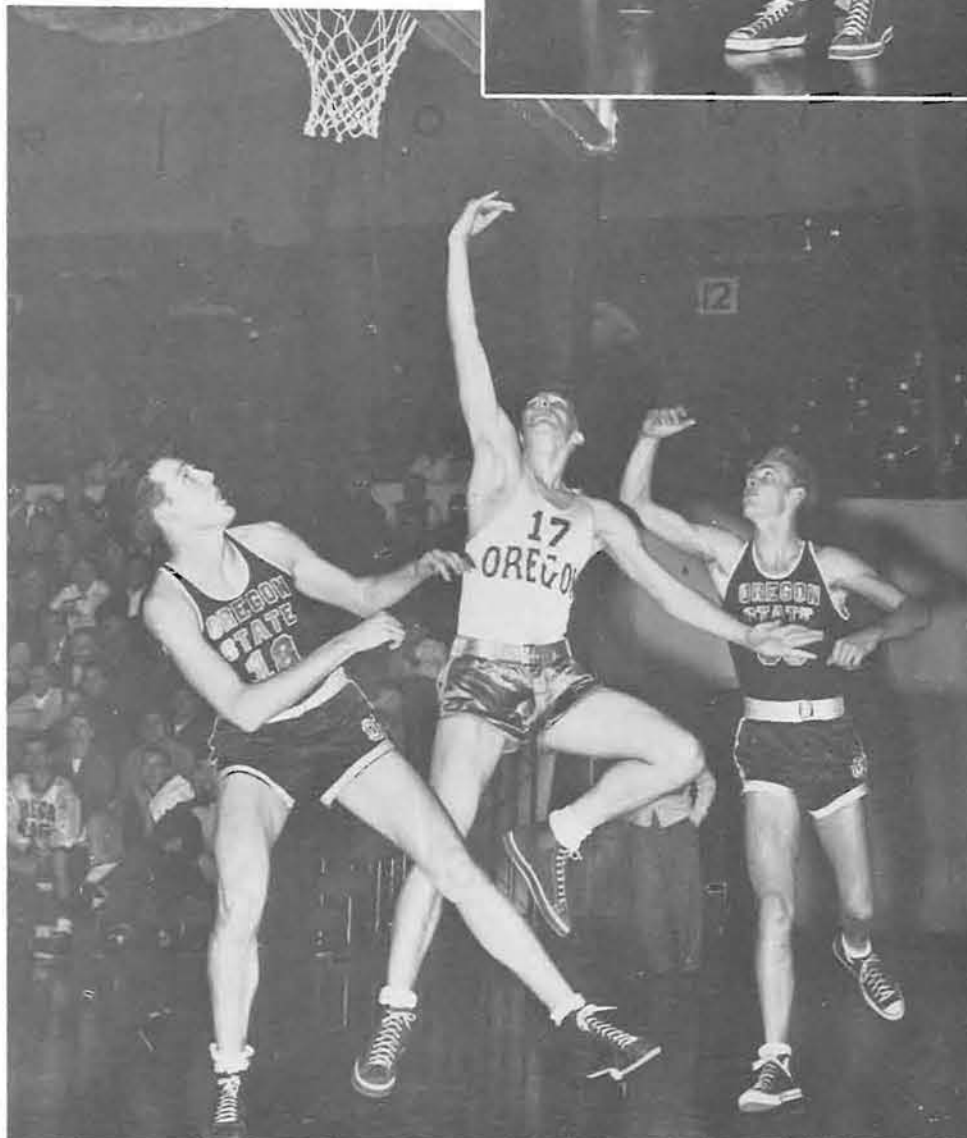

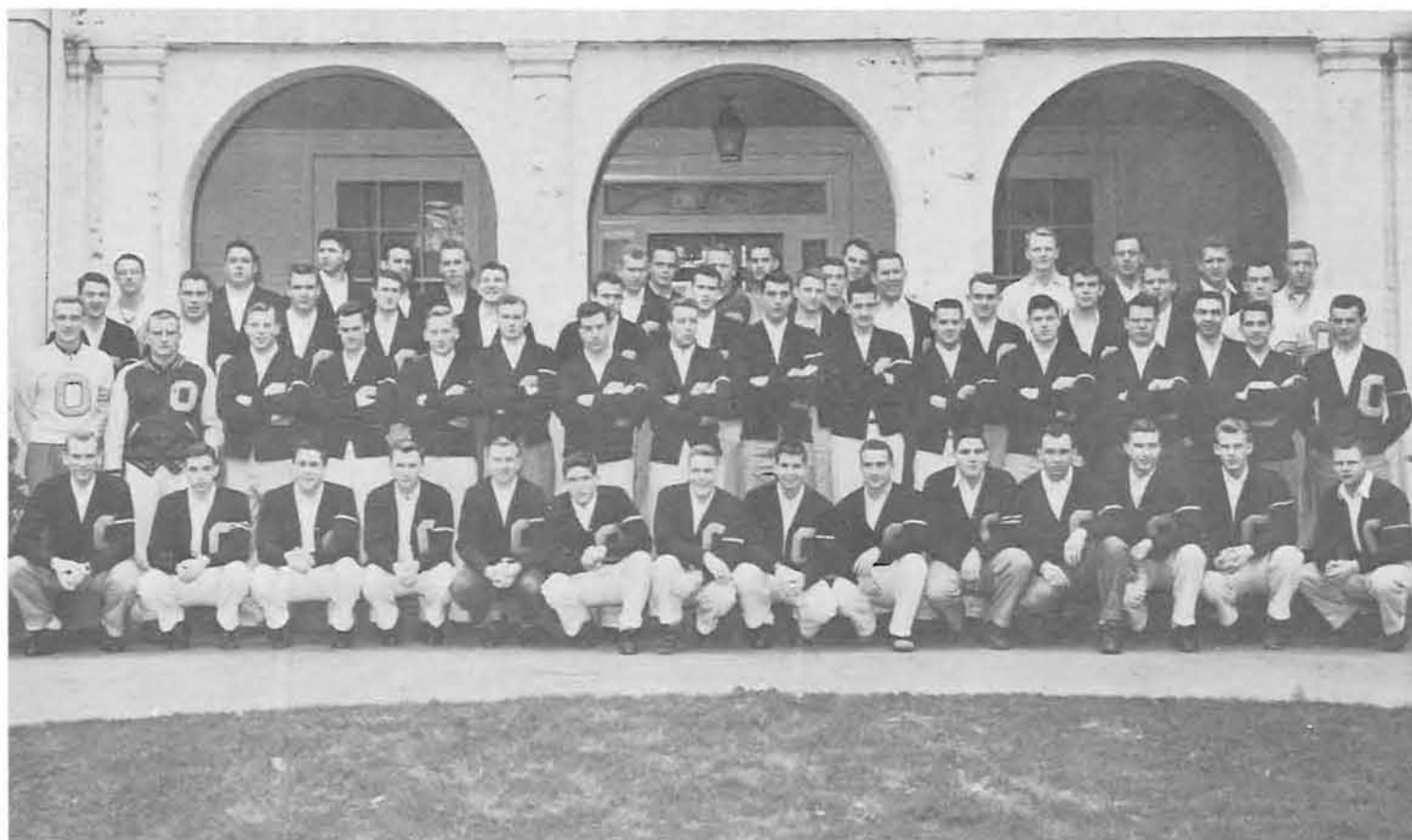

# College of Liberal Arts

THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS continued to benefit from the University's building program during 1950-1951—most notably from the construction of a new science building on lower University Street.

The new building would house science departments formerly located in McClure and Deady Halls, would provide space for proper study.

No major faculty changes were made during the year, with the exception of the appointment of Carlisle Moore to be assistant to Dean Eldon Johnson.

The College of Liberal Arts consists of eighteen departments. All of these offer major curricula for bachelor and graduate degrees, except the departments of Home Economics and Religion.

One of the college's chief problems was adjustment to the war situation. No changes in faculty and courses were indicated, although it was foreseen by some that adaptations to armed forces college programs might be made in the future.

President H. K. Newburn, speaking late in the winter of 1951, predicted that the college enrollment would decrease about ten percent, a considerably smaller figure than had been anticipated.

During the year, Villard Theater finished its first season on its new stage; station KWAX was approved by the Federal Communications Commission, and began broadcasting. Friendly Hall, seat of the Foreign Language and English Departments, was remodeled on the interior to provide better classroom and office facilities.

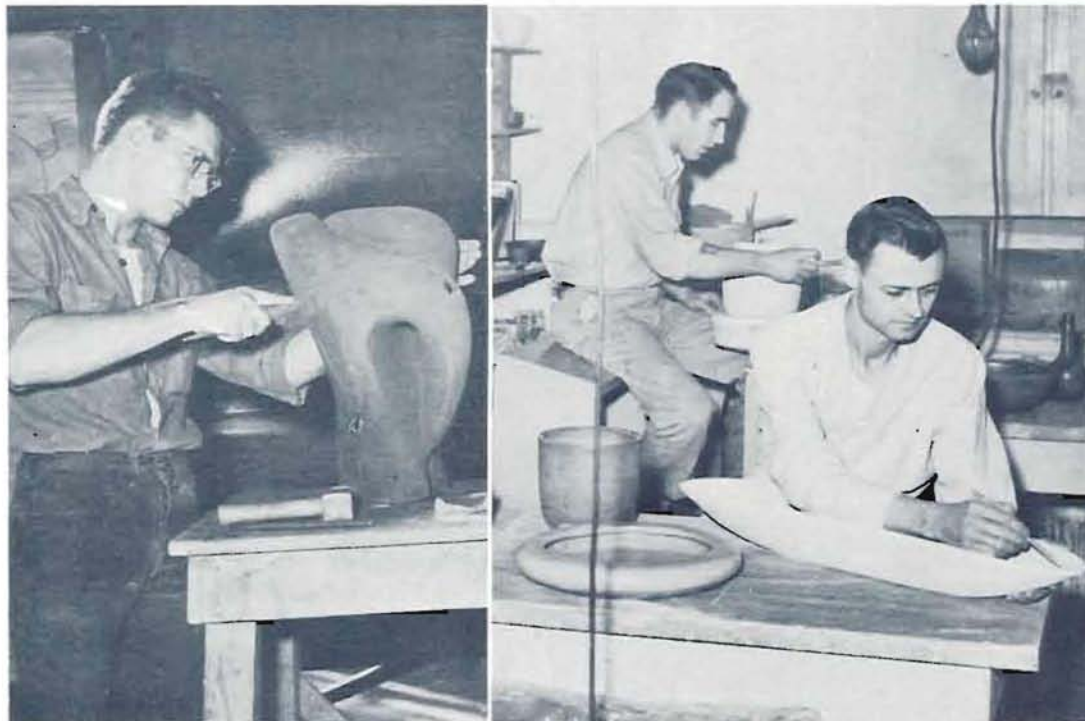

# of Business Administration



**T**HE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS Administration continued its program of practical as well as theoretical training during 1950-1951.

In enrollment, the school is perennially the largest on the Oregon campus with the exception of liberal arts. In order to accommodate the increasing number of business majors, the state legislature appropriated funds for the construction of a new social science building on the campus. The appropriation was made during the fall of 1950.

However, growing international unrest and a state of inflation caused the legislature to reconsider its plans. As a result, the construction of the new social science building has been indefinitely postponed. When built, it will occupy the mall between Commerce and Oregon Halls, and will be devoted to offices and classrooms for the School of Business Administration.

Victor P. Morris, dean of the school, effected a program which included training in a variety of areas. Specialized courses were offered in accounting, finance, investment, marketing, merchandising, advertising, selling, real estate, insurance, industrial management, traffic, transportation, foreign trade, and business education.

The school works closely with leaders in the field of business in the state. The School of Business Administration and its various honoraries carry on a program of lectures, conferences, and other cooperative projects with businessmen.

One prime example of this cooperation is the practice of placing students in Eugene and Portland stores on special "University" days. The students assume the duties of regular store employees.

Paramount goal of the school remained, as in years past, the education of business leaders for a growing state.

# Beta Gamma Sigma

**M**EMBERSHIP IN Beta Gamma Sigma, business administration honorary, depends chiefly on scholarship. Often called the "Phi Beta Kappa of the business school," the group chooses the upper ten percent of the senior class fall term, and the upper two percent of the junior class spring term.

An activity of the honorary is the awarding of the Beta Gamma Sigma plaque in Commerce Hall to the outstanding freshman in the field of business each year.

**P**HI CHI THETA IS unique in that its membership consists of an ever-increasing force in the world of business: women.

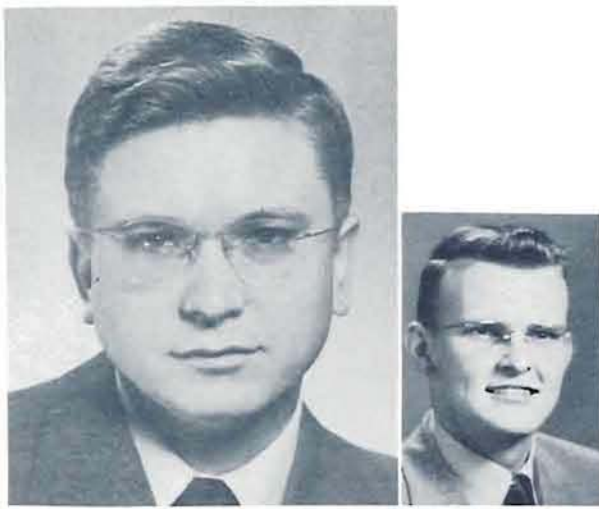
The national women's business honorary attempts to promote higher standards of education for women in business. Tappings for the honorary are held twice a year; members are chosen for outstanding scholarship and character.

Officers were N. D. Price, president; Clark King, treasurer; Stanley Steinberg, secretary; and Douglas Nicholson, vice-president.

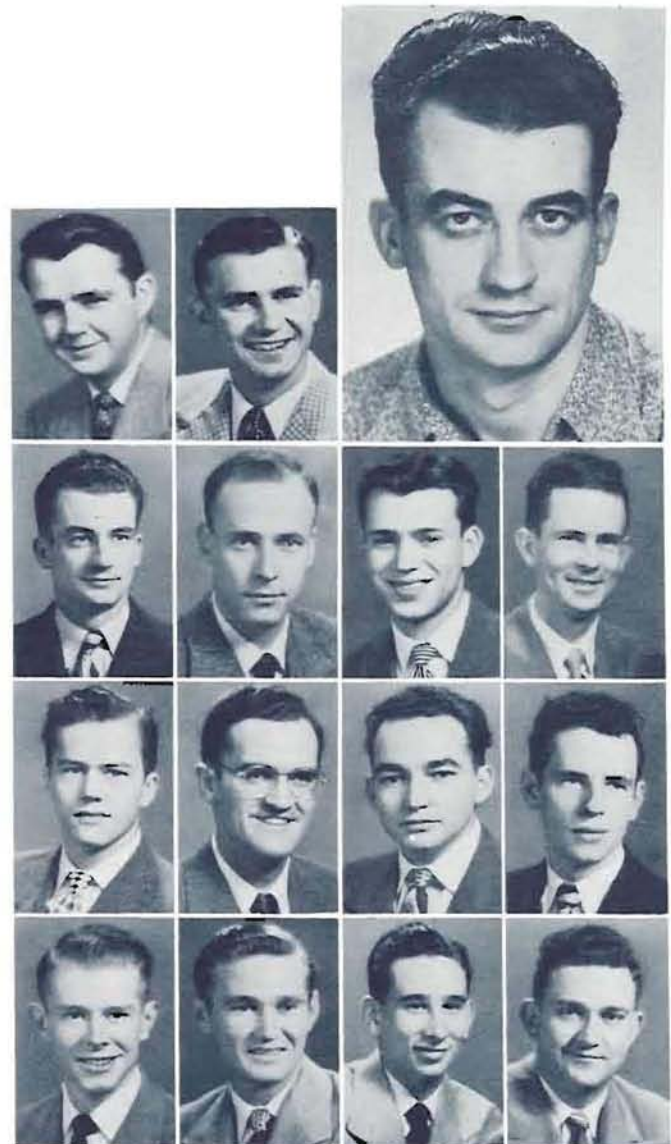

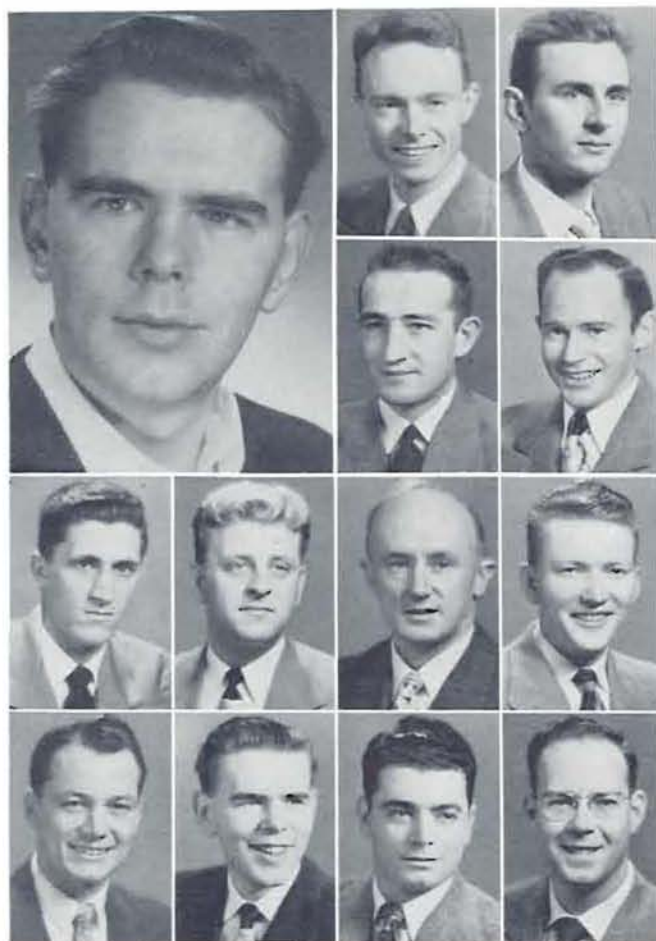

# Delta Nu Alpha

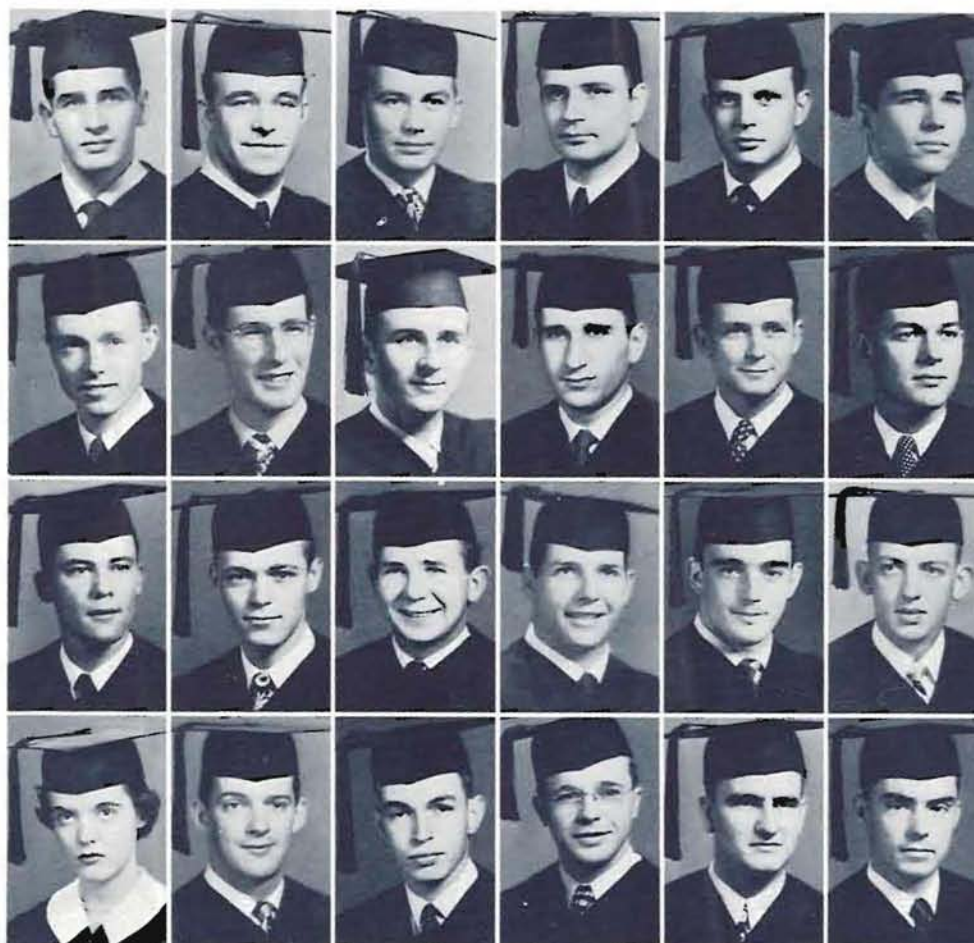
**A**S THE YEAR 1950-1951 neared an end, Delta Nu Alpha approached the second anniversary of its establishment on campus.

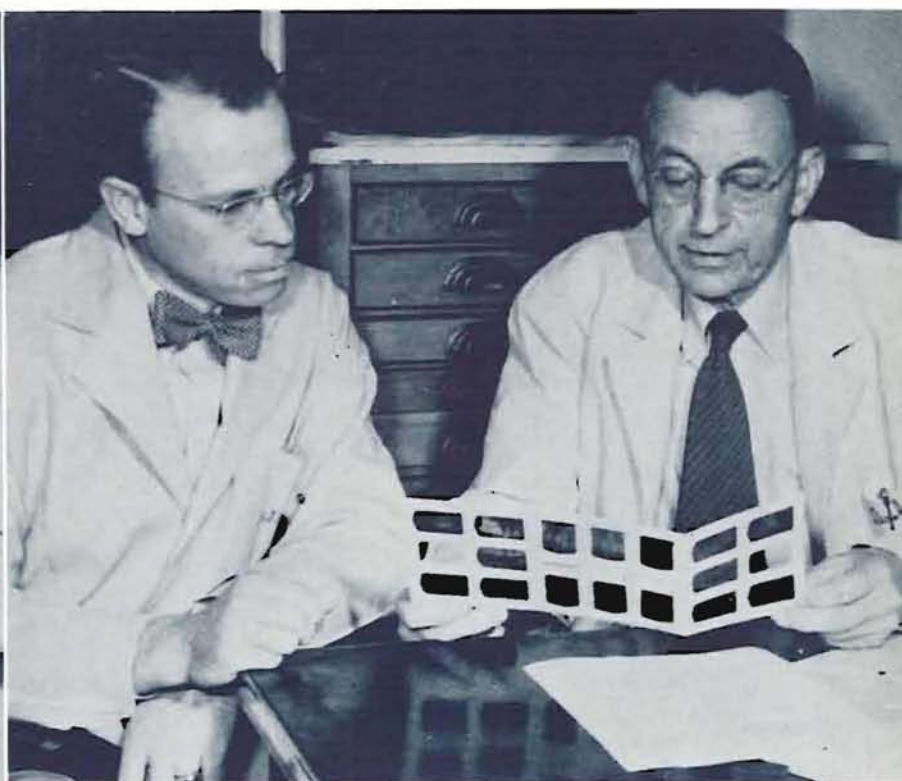

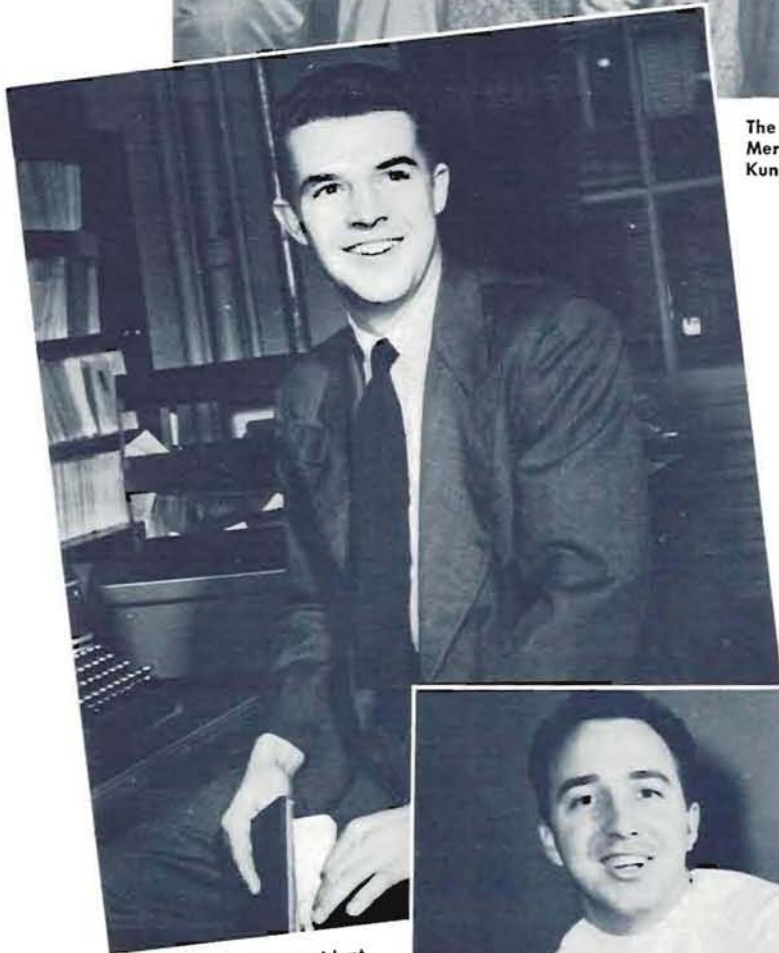

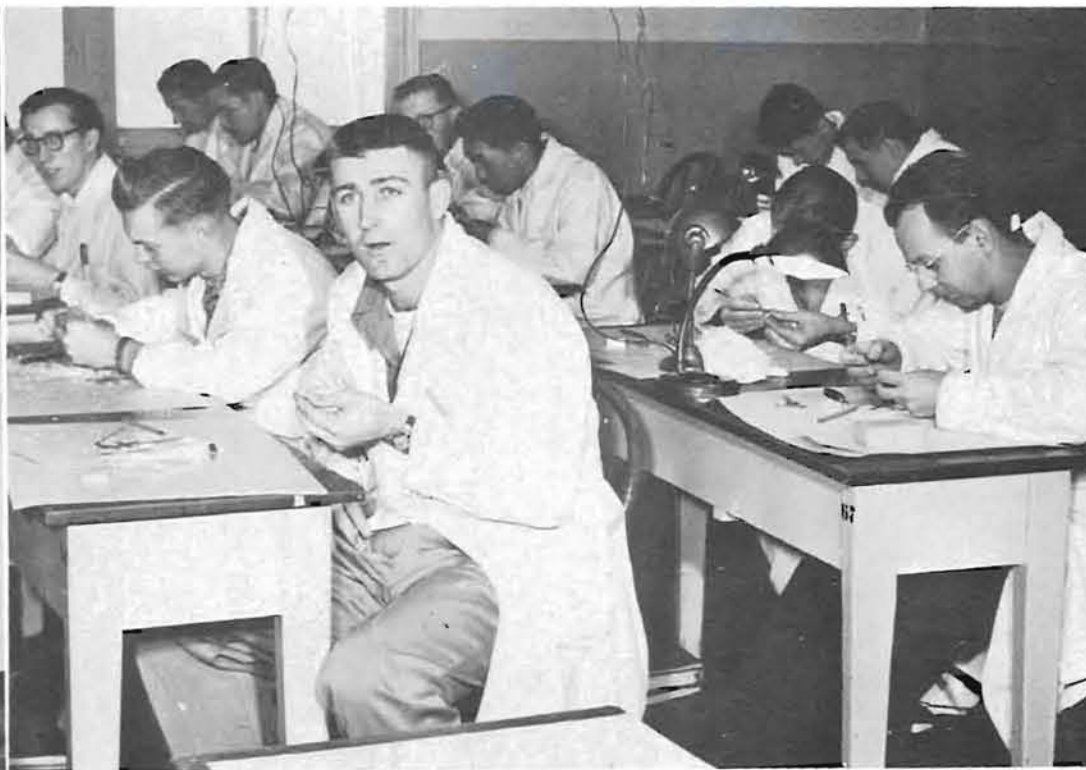

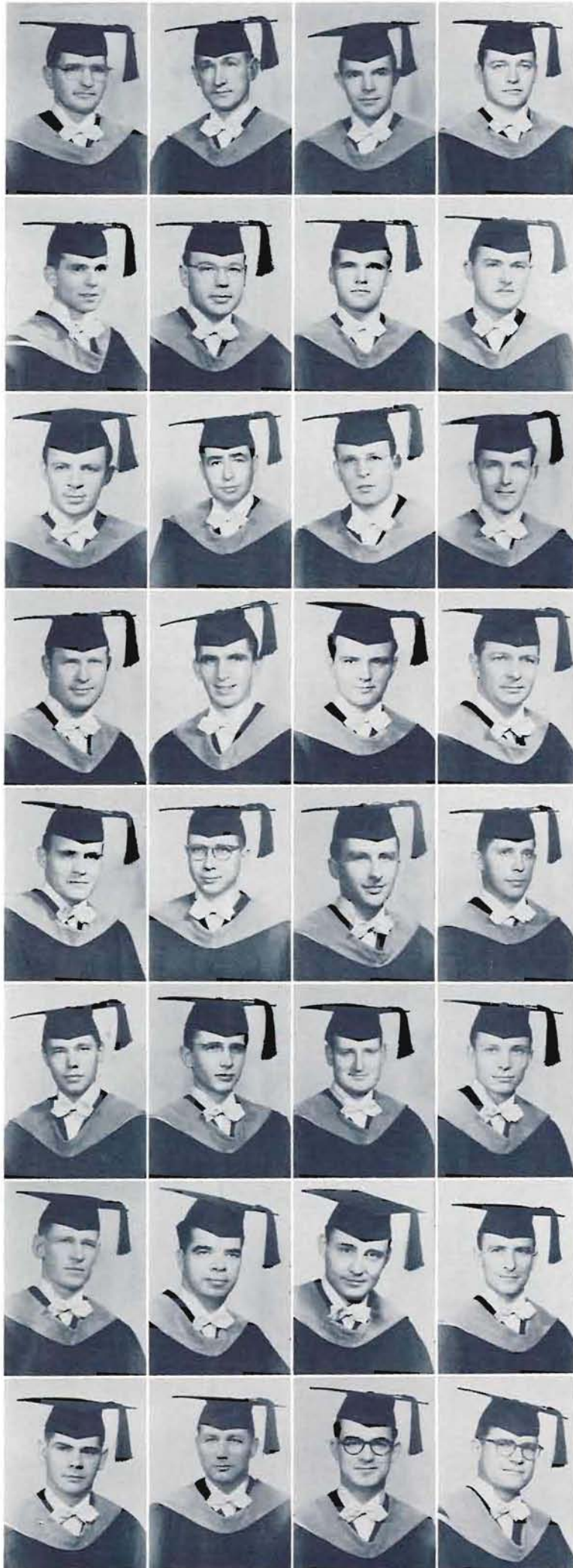

**W**ITH FACULTY CHANGES and additions, Oregon's School of Education is recognizing the still urgent need for more teachers in state high schools and primary schools.

The school works closely with educational authorities throughout the state of Oregon in the attempt to place competent teachers where they are needed.

Education as a career is taught to University students on two levels—theory and practice. The theory classes are taught in the School of Education building, are closely coordinated with psychology courses.

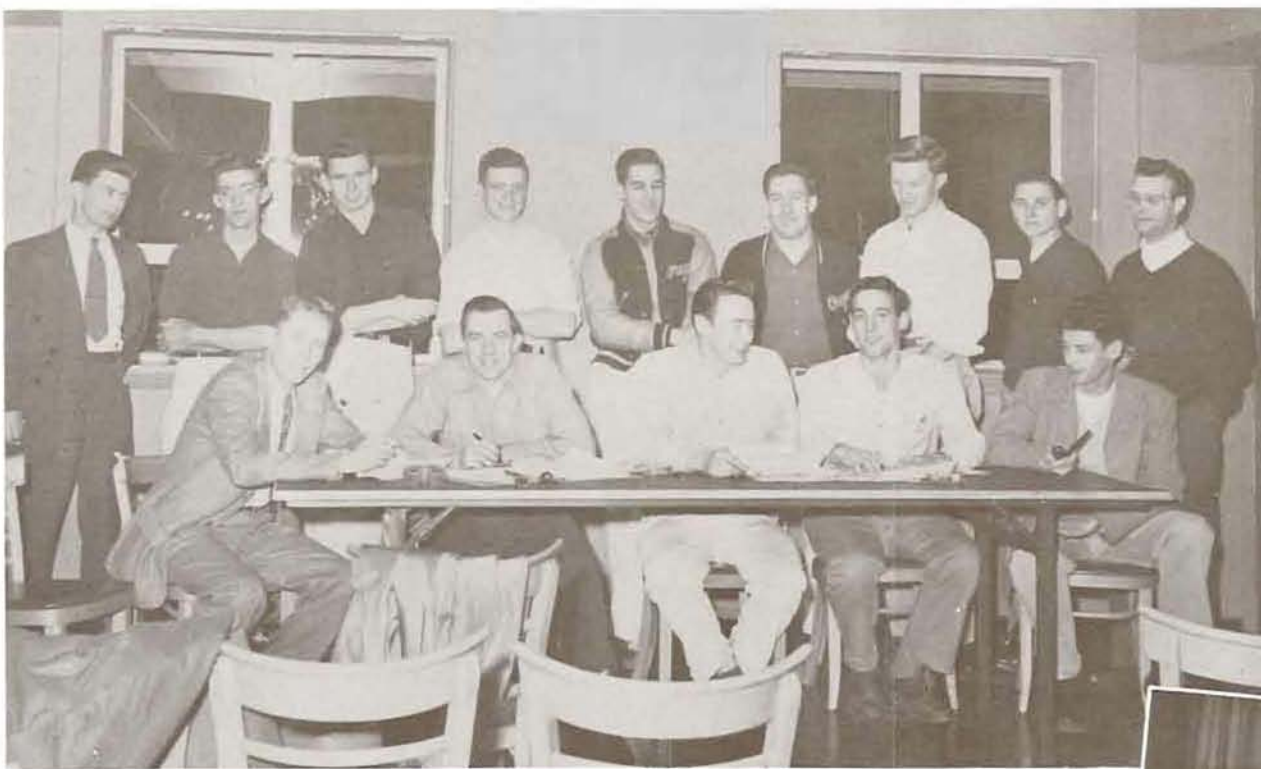

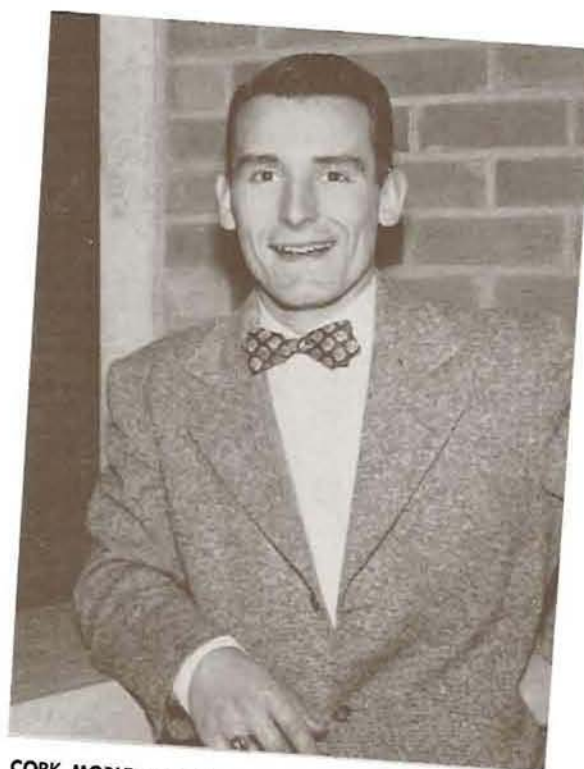
# Alpha Delta Sigma

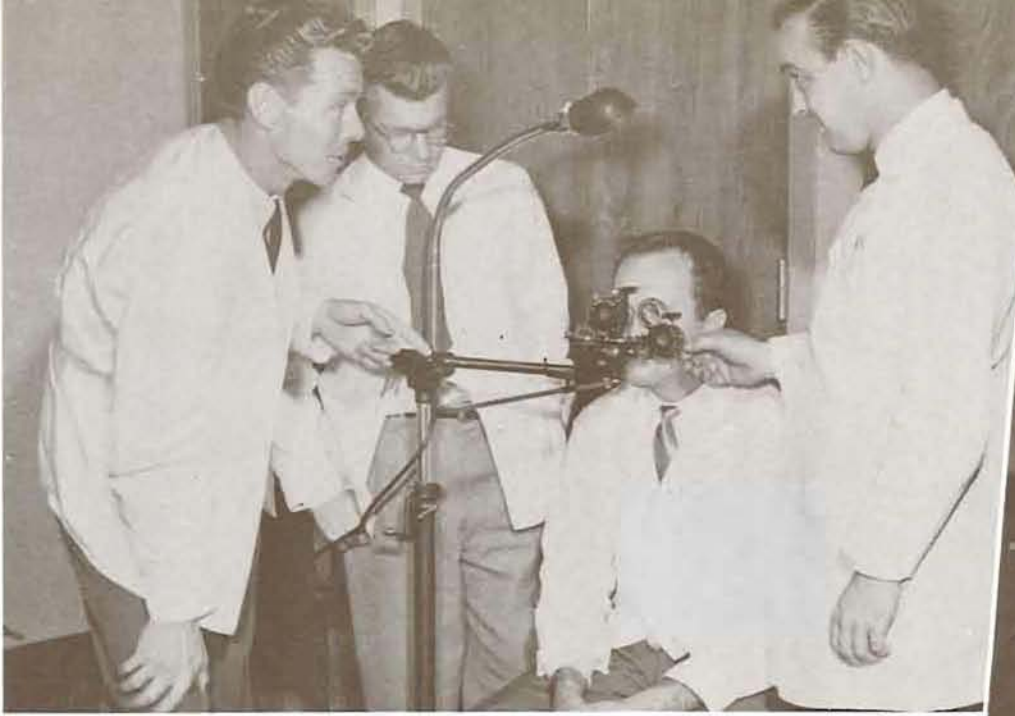

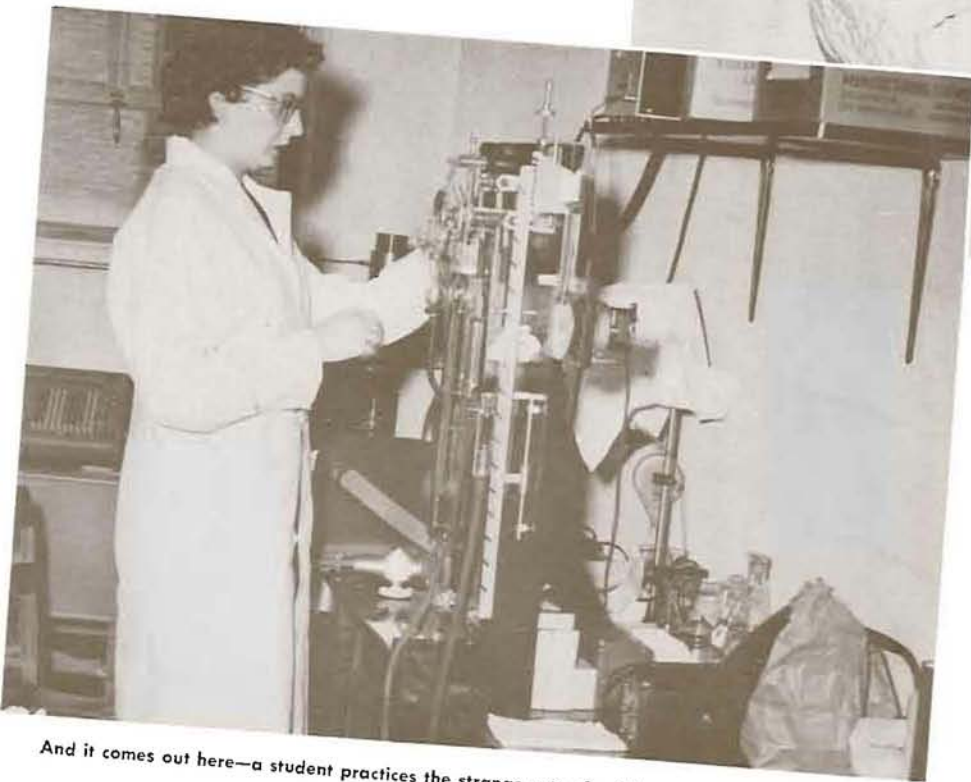

**T**HE SCHOOL OF MUSIC gives professional training to Webfoots who will enter the field of music as a career—some as teachers, some as performers, some as specialists in the many businesses which make use of music.

Members of the fraternity are chosen for character, scholarship, and interest in the University, as well as musical ability.

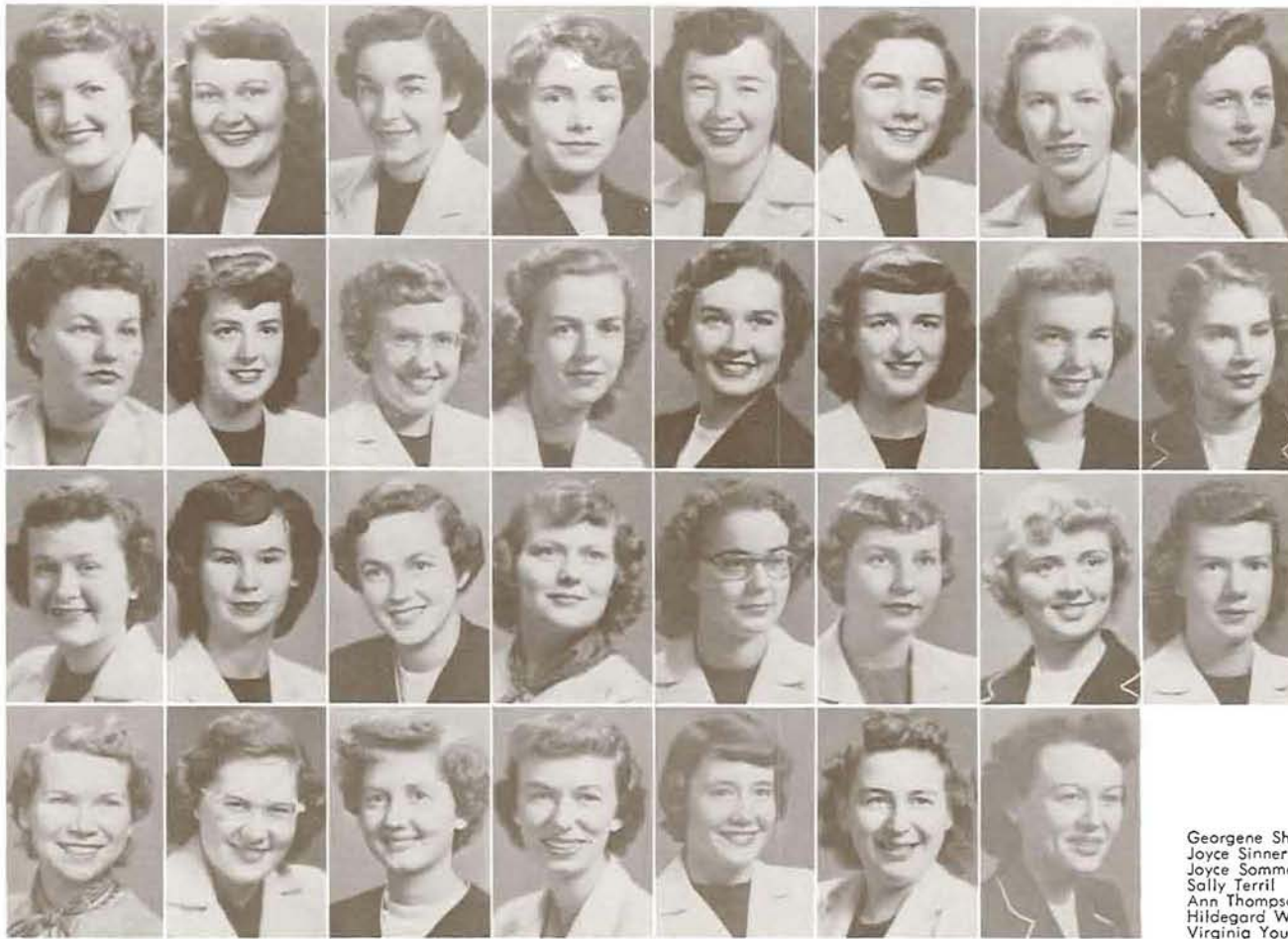

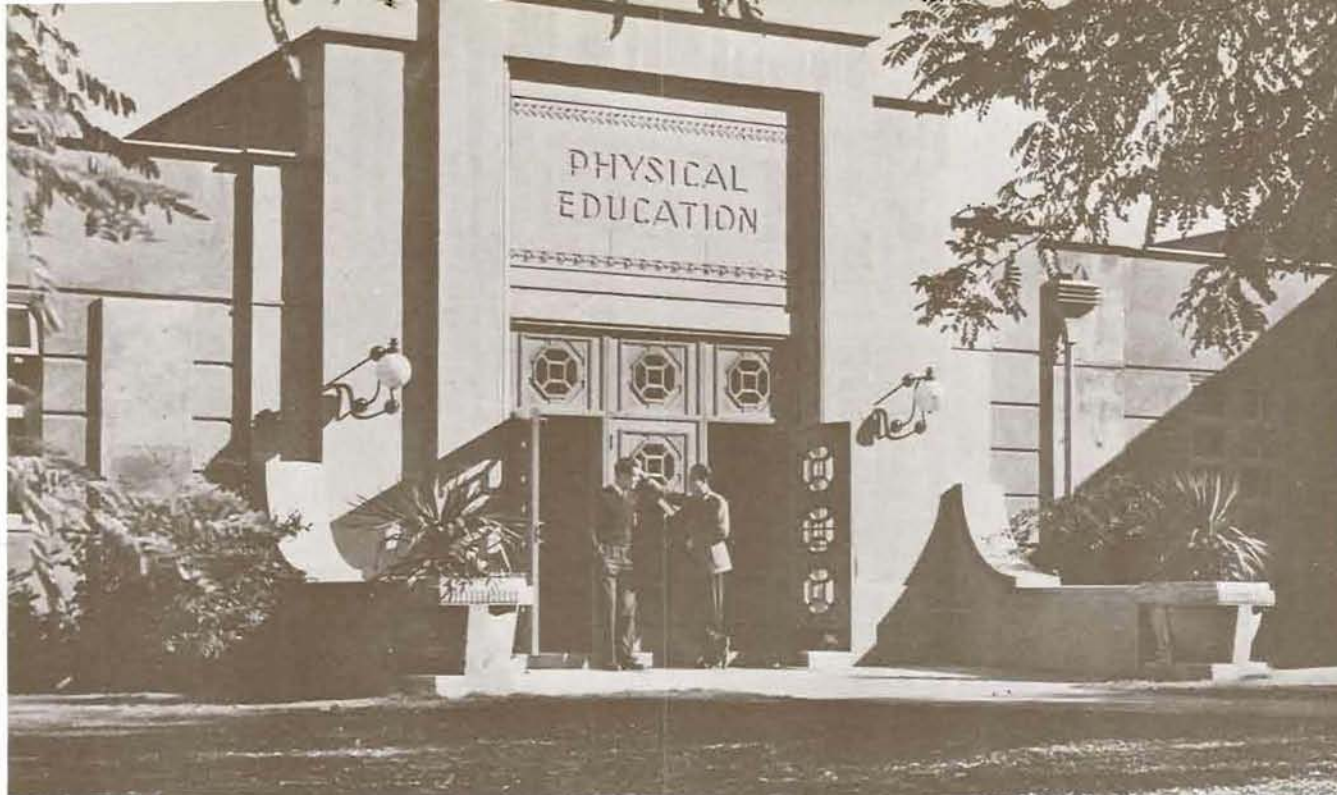

OREGON'S SCHOOL OF HEALTH and Physical Education continues its program of expanding and modernizing its curriculum.

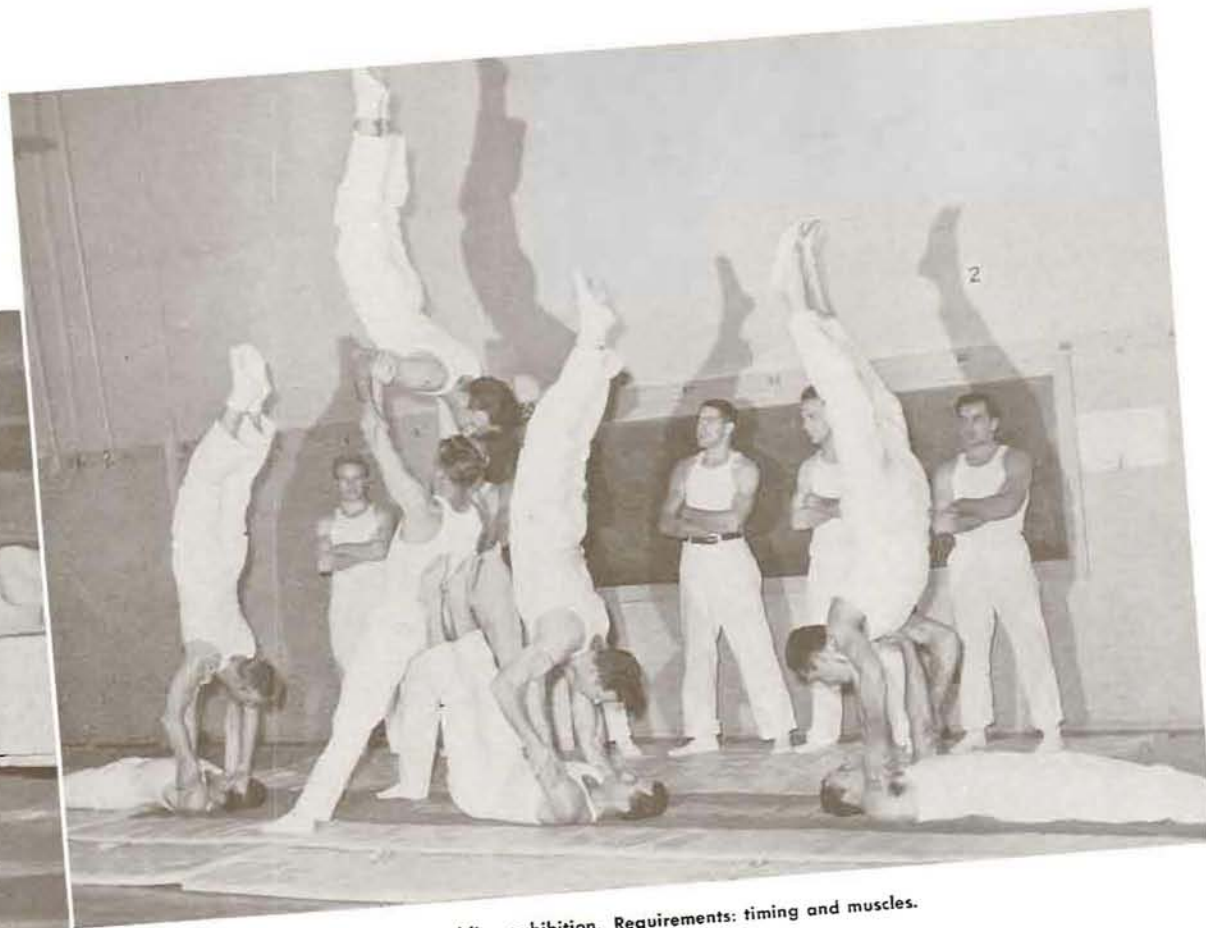

# Military and Air Science

AS THE INTERNATIONAL situation became increasingly grave, the Department of Military and Air Science and Tactics was faced with the problem of program expansion.

For the second year, the department was divided into two general courses of study: air corps and army. Separate drills were held each week, with air corps drilling on Tuesday and army drilling on Thursday.

At the end of each year, applicants from the sophomore class are chosen for enrollment in advanced ROTC. Because of the possibility of United States military participation in world affairs on a large scale, plans were made during 1950-1951 to admit a large number of students into the advanced program.

It was also made possible for freshmen and upper classmen to make reservations for advanced training, thereby gaining deferments from military conscription.

Colonel Frank R. Maerdian continued as head of the department, with Major Edwin L. Hibner heading the air science program. Facilities of the ROTC unit are used jointly by the infantry and air science divisions.

The Reserved Officers Training Corps sponsors a band in conjunction with the School of Music, and a rifle team.

Specialized courses are offered to student enrolled in the department. Army students may specialize in infantry or transportation, while air science students have a choice of administration or comptrollership.

## Deferred Living, World Crisis Main Organization Problems

**A** NEW POLICY FOR FRATERNITY and sorority rushing—the “deferred living plan”—brought many changes to both Greek and independent living groups during the year.

As a result of the plan, freshmen were allowed to rush and pledge Greek organizations, but were required to live in dormitories until they reached sophomore standing. To accommodate a bigger freshman population, dormitory advisory programs were changed, with particular attention given to study supervision. During winter term, French Hall was turned into an evening study hall for scholastically backward freshmen.

To adjust to the new program, fraternities and sororities had to increase pledging among members of the three other classes. This rushing activity became particularly pronounced during spring term, and continued through fall, 1950, and winter, 1951.

Carson Hall, new women's dormitory, had been completed the previous year, and during 1950-51 became a well established organization on the campus scene. Susan Campbell Hall, which had been used previously as a married students' dormitory, was converted to housing for undergraduate women.

The veterans' dormitories—pre-fabricated buildings which would be on the campus for a number of years—were im-

proved to make student occupancy more pleasant. The lounges were redecorated, and recreational facilities were increased.

Housing on the fraternity and sorority scene remained more or less static. Many houses which had planned to build found their plans foiled by high building costs and the prospects of a world war. Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity moved from their house on Pearl Street to one on the edge of the campus.

Fraternities in particular were faced with difficulties. As many men joined the armed services or were faced with the draft, house managers attempted to balance precarious budgets and make plans for the coming year. Two or three fraternities were forced to suspend operation of their dining rooms as a result of reduced membership.

In order to assist fraternities in meeting their problems successfully, a joint faculty-student-alumni committee was appointed by President H. K. Newburn. P. L. Kleinsorge was chairman of the committee, which interviewed student, faculty, and town leaders in its problem-solving quest.

In spite of the uncertainty of the future, living organizations maintained high scholastic and activity standards during the year, with new organizations such as Philadelphia House and Carson Hall taking part for the first time.

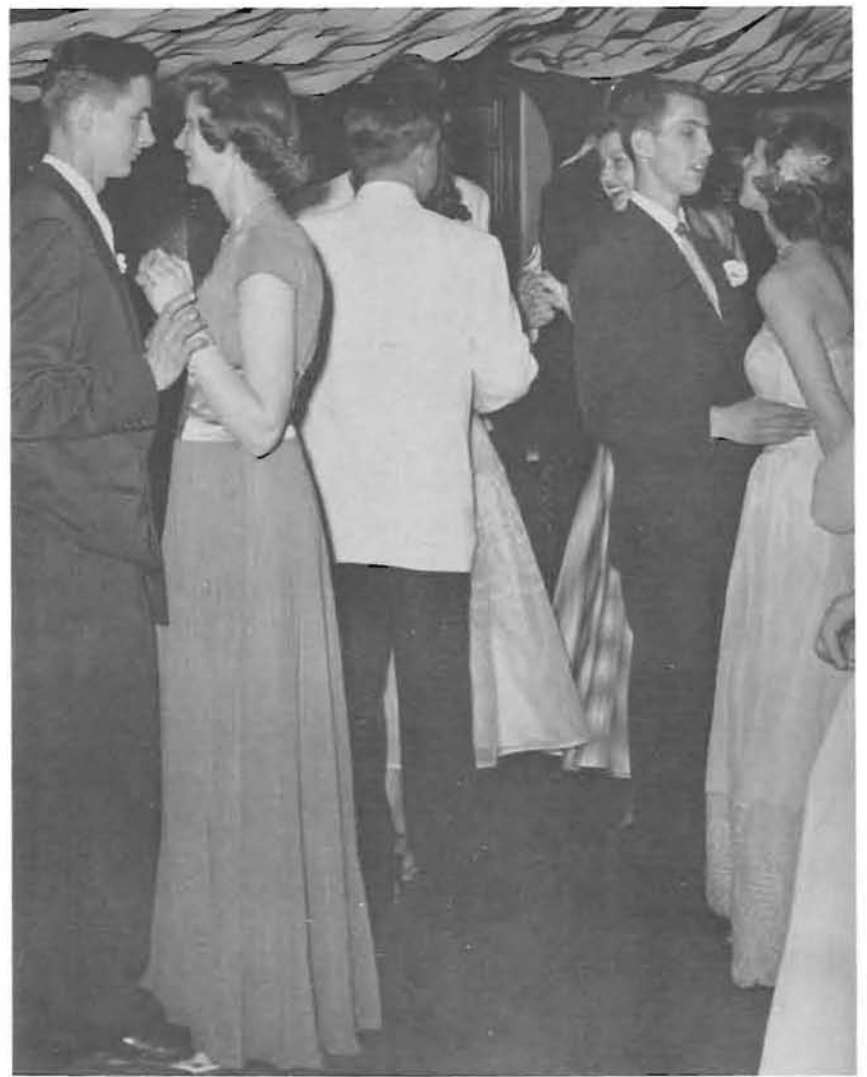

Intramural 'A' and 'B' teams conducted a successful season, with fewer forfeits registered than in several preceding years.

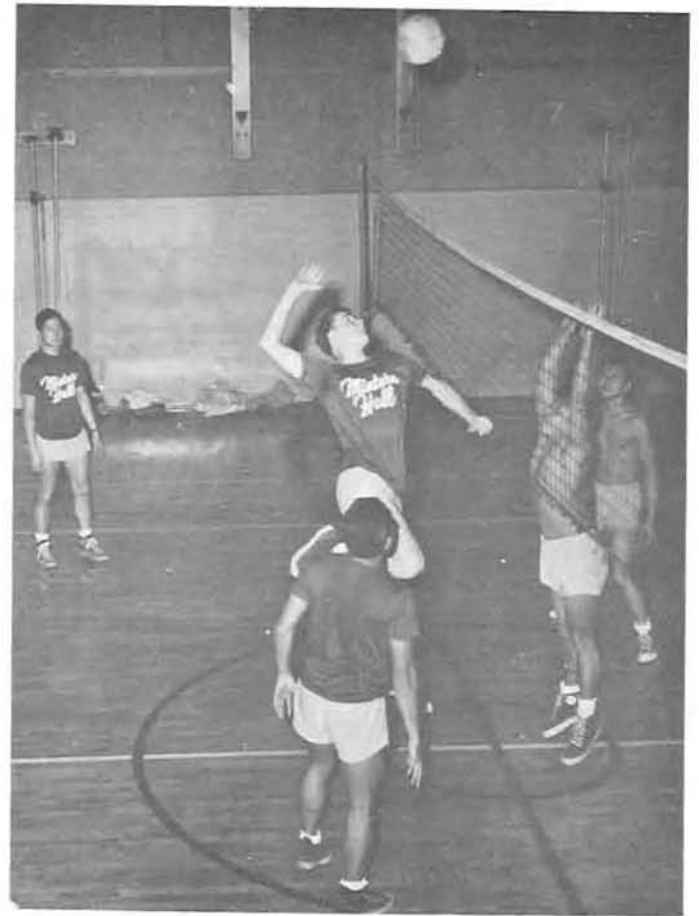

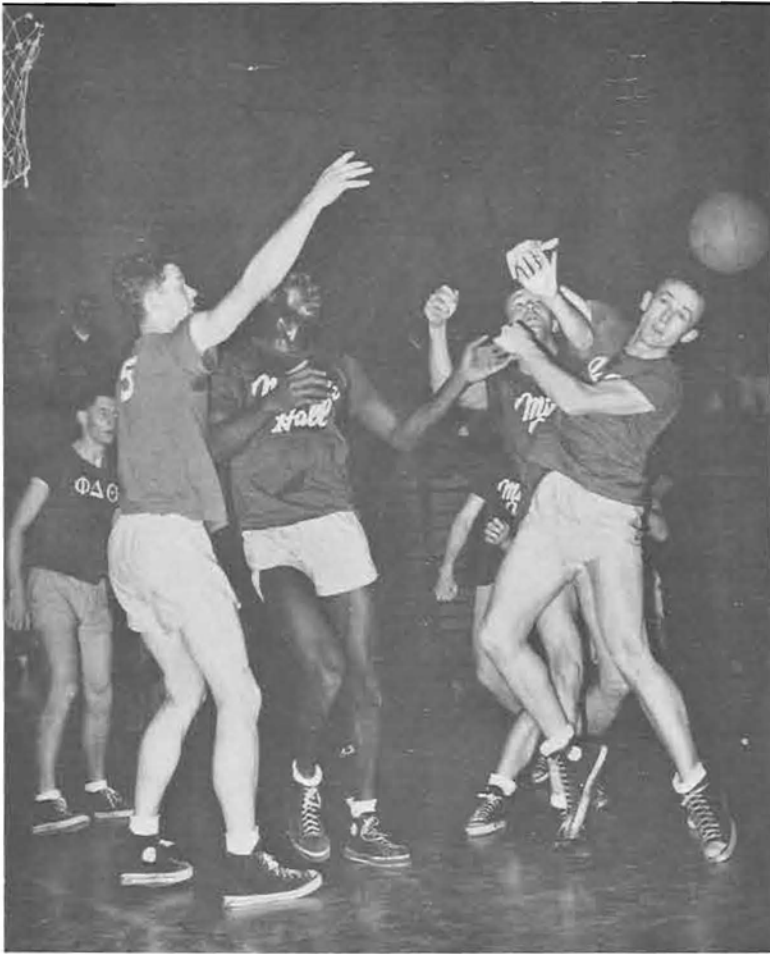

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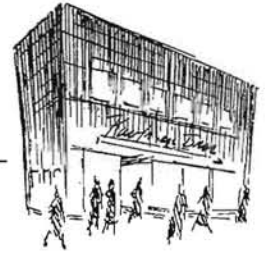
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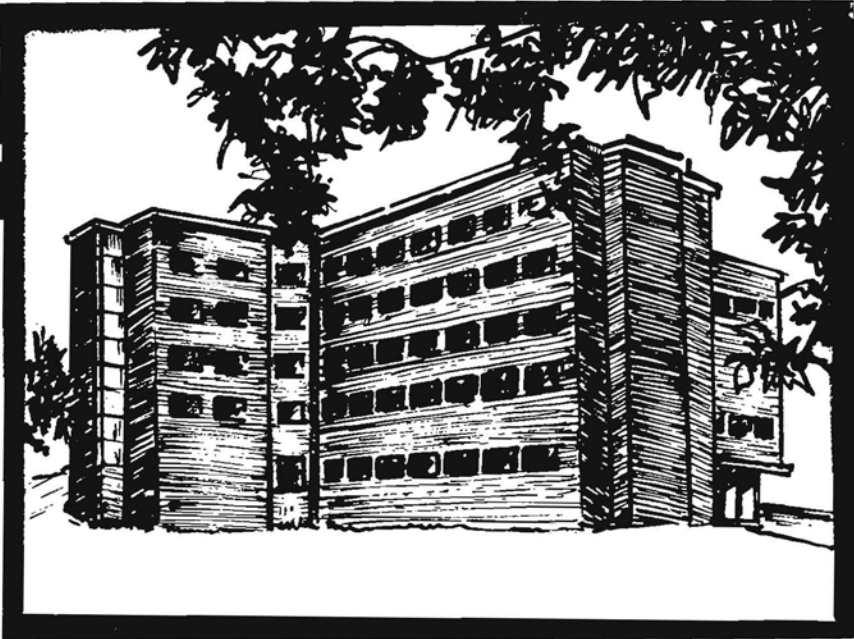
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## DEPARTMENT of ANTHROPOLOGY Field Trip

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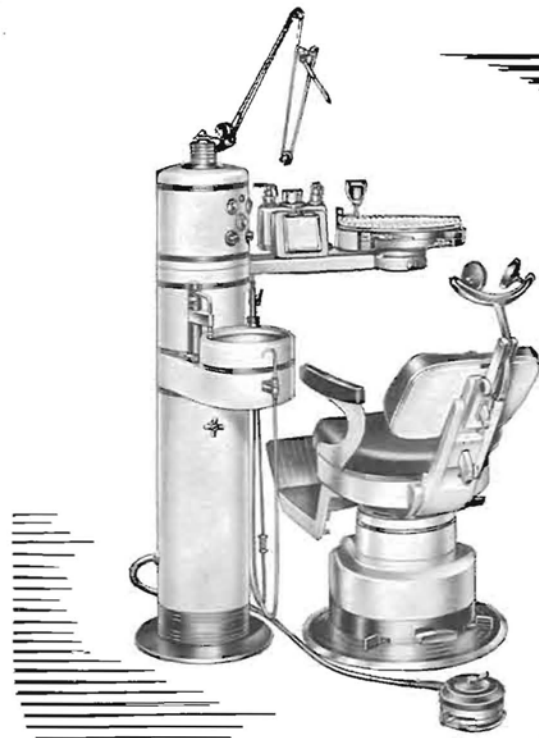
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
