## UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS

In order to remain in the University, a freshman must pass in at least five hours, and all other students must pass in at least seven hours. All students must pass in at least nine hours or be placed on probation.

The program filed by the student in the fall must be followed throughout the year and no credit is given for work done unless it is on the program filed in the Registrar's office.

Courses may be added during the first two weeks of any term, upon the payment of certain change of course fees.

Courses may be dropped at any time by direction of a student's adviser, provided that the program is not reduced to less than twelve hours. Also, the required subjects of English A, Military Science, and Physical Education may not be dropped.

Students are expected to carry fifteen or sixteen hours a week. No student can carry more or less than this number without the consent of his adviser. No student will be allowed under any circumstances to carry more than nineteen hours and no student can get credit for more than sixteen hours unless his grade is better than III. No student may carry less than twelve hours.



## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

All candidates for undergraduate degrees must fulfill the requirements listed below. In addition, each candidate must comply with the prescribed curriculum of his school or department.

*Credit.* Credit for work completed in the University is figured in term-hours, by which is meant the work covered in one recitation, or one laboratory period per week for one term, or equivalent. A term hour is assumed to represent three hours a week for twelve weeks of a student's time, which may be assigned to work in the class-room, laboratory, or outside preparation.

*Quantity of Work.* In order to be graduated, a student must have earned not less than 186 term-hours of credit in the University.

*Quality of Work.* Of the 186 hours required for graduation, at least 140 must have been earned with a grade above V.

The grading system used by the University, groups students in the following classes: All students who pass are assigned to one of the first five classifications.

I. Unusual excellence.

II. High quality. Classes I and II together constitute approximately the highest fourth or fifth of the class.

III. Satisfactory.

IV. Fair. Grades III and IV constitute from 55 to 65 percent of the class.

V. Passing. Approximately from 15 to 20 per cent of the class.

Inc., incomplete. Quality of work satisfactory, but unfinished for reasons acceptable to the instructor, and additional time granted.

*Group Requirements.* Each student must complete in the lower division (during the freshman and sophomore years) at least one year-course of not less than three hours each term in any three of the following four groups:

I. a. *English* (except prescribed work). b. *Languages.* Foreign language, ancient or modern.

II. *Social Science.* Including history, economics, political science, philosophy, sociology, education.

III. a. *Mathematics,* any three courses of lower division work. b. *Science,* including botany, chemistry, geology, physics, psychology and zoology. Each of these sciences shall include not less than one credit hour a week of laboratory time.

IV. *Arts and Technical Training.* a. *Arts.* Fine arts, normal art and household arts, each including not less than one credit hour a week of laboratory or practice time. b. *Architecture.* In the school of architecture and allied arts, year courses, totalling nine hours. c. *Music.* d. *Accounting.*

*Major Requirement.* Each student must satisfy the requirements of his major department by taking courses in that department as prescribed by his adviser amounting to not less than 36 term hours of which not less than 24 term hours shall be advanced courses of the type described as "upper division," or junior and senior work.

*Degree Requirements.* Two year-courses (or 24 term-hours) in a foreign language, in addition to that offered for entrance, are required for the degree of B.A., and 36 term-hours in either (1) mathematics and science, or (2) social sciences for the B.S.

*Residence.* At least 45 term-hours must be earned in residence at the University of Oregon. The remainder of the requisite work is sometimes done through the Extension Division by correspondence, subject to the rule which applies to all students that not more than 60 term-hours earned by correspondence may be applied toward a degree. The 45 term-hours immediately preceding graduation must be earned with the University of Oregon (except in the department of pre-engineering), although not necessarily in residence.

### *Required Subjects:*

*Physical Education.* All students must take physical education throughout the freshman and sophomore years.

*Military Training* must be taken by all men during the freshman and sophomore years.

*Personal Hygiene* must be taken by all women to the extent of three term-hours during the freshman year.

*English.* One year-course of written English as prescribed by the school or department. This course may not be taken in the freshman year.

*Restrictions.* Not more than one year (48 term-hours) of law, or of Portland medical work may be applied to any degree other than professional degrees. Not more than six hours of applied music may count toward any degree other than bachelor of music. (Note: This rule refers only to applied music, such as piano, voice, violin, organ, etc., not to theoretical music courses).

## GROUP REQUIREMENTS

Group requirements may be fulfilled by the courses noted below when such courses are taken for three terms to make a year of work in one subject. Certain of these courses are open only to students of sophomore or higher standing.

### GROUP I. FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND ENGLISH.

*Foreign Language.* One year-course of college work in any one of the following: German, Norwegian or Swedish, French, Spanish, Italian, Greek or Latin, provided it totals not less than nine hours.

*English.* Any year course in English totalling not less than nine hours, and 11-12 English Poetry with 20 Wordsworth. Written English, Written and Spoken English and Shakespeare are not open to freshmen.

### GROUP II. SOCIAL SCIENCES.

*Economics.* 3a,b Principles of Economics with 4 Economics of Business Organization, or any upper division course. Not open to freshmen.

*Education.* 51-52-53 Social Aspects of Teaching, Introduction to Education, and Educational Psychology. Not open to freshmen.

*History.* Any three or four year-course in history.

*Philosophy.* 1a,b,c Introduction to Reflective Thinking, or 51-52-53 Elementary Logic, Elementary Ethics, and Introduction to Philosophy (sophomore).

*Political Science.* 1-2-3 Modern Governments.

*Sociology.* 1a,b,c Social Origins, Primitive Society, and Psychological Foundations (sophomore).

### GROUP III. MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE.

*Mathematics.* Three terms of work in any lower division courses.

*Science.* One year-course in any one of the following departments: botany, chemistry, geology, physics (sophomore), psychology (sophomore), and zoology, provided it includes not less than one credit-hour a week of laboratory.

### GROUP IV. ARTS AND TECHNICAL TRAINING.

*Architecture and Allied Arts.* This group may be satisfied by nine credit hours of work in the school, provided that no one hour course be accepted unless it has been taken and passed for three consecutive terms.

*Business Administration.* 8a,b,c Constructive Accounting.

*Household Arts.* Any year-course totalling not less than nine term hours, and the following sequences: 31 Textiles with 11-12 Clothing; and 25 Elementary Food Economics with 15-16 Foods.

*Music.* Any year-course totalling not less than nine hours.

## PEDAGOGICAL COURSES FOR TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES

The Oregon laws provide that graduates from the universities and colleges of Oregon who have completed 15 semester or 22 term hours in education courses may be issued a teaching certificate upon application to the state superintendent of public instruction.

Certain pedagogical courses offered by departments outside of the School of Education may be taken to satisfy not more than six of the 22 term hours required for the state certificate, but these courses do not count toward a major in education.

## FEES AND DEPOSITS

*All fees to be paid each term in the third week after classes begin.  
Deposits (military and room) are payable once a year.  
The gymnasium suit fee is paid only once by each student.*

## UNDERGRADUATE FEES

Registration fee .....\$18.75 per term

This fee entitles the student to the use of the gymnasium, swimming pools, lockers, towels, etc.; to consultation, medical advice, infirmary or dispensary treatment (except that a small charge may be made for the medicine used); and to the use of the library and reading rooms, without any extra charge. This also entitles the student to membership in the Associated Students, which gives voting privileges, free admission to campus events, student concert series, and a subscription to the Emerald. Included in the fee is the \$5.00 per term assessment for the student body building program voted by the students last spring.

Laboratory, locker, syllabus and course fees ..... See schedule of courses

School or departmental fees—

School of Architecture and Allied Arts .....\$20.00 per term

School of Business Administration ..... 5.00 per term

School of Journalism ..... 3.00 per term

School of Law ..... 10.00 per term

These fees are to be paid by students majoring in the schools listed, instead of individual course fees in the school chosen.

Non-resident fee .....\$50.00 per term

Required of all students who are not residents of the state of Oregon; except that (a) ex-service men pay one-half of the non-resident fee or \$25.00 per term; and (b) law students are given a reduction to the amount of the law school tuition or departmental fee, making non-resident fee \$40.00 per term.

Military deposit .....\$5.00 per year

This deposit is made by every student subject to military training before equipment is issued. Provided the student returns all of the articles issued to him, in good condition, the deposit is returned at the end of the year.

Gymnasium suit deposit, men .....\$ 8.00

Women ..... 10.00

This deposit or fee is payable once during the four-year course, and entitles the student to the use of a gymnasium suit including laundry and repairs. If the student does not remain in college the full four years, a proportion of the deposit will be returned. This deposit is payable at any time, but must be paid before equipment is issued.

Diploma fee .....\$10.00

## GRADUATE FEES

Graduate fee ..... \$8.50 per term

Graduate students are exempt from the non-resident fee, but are held for course or major fees and penalty fees, except that graduate students are given until the second Friday of each term to register. The graduate fee includes the use of the gymnasium, swimming pools, lockers, etc., of the library and reading rooms, and of the health service, but does not entitle the student to membership in the Associated Students or an Emerald subscription.

## PENALTY FEES

Late registration fee ..... \$1.00  
 Cumulative fee ..... .25 per day

Students who do not file their Study-Programs in the Registrar's office before Monday, September 28, must pay a penalty fee of \$1.00 with a cumulative fee of 25 cents for each additional day of delay. This fee must be paid before the Study-Program can be filed.

Late payment fee ..... \$3.00  
 Cumulative fee ..... .25 per day for one week

Students who do not pay their fees within the time set by the Comptroller must pay a late payment fee of \$3.00 with a cumulative fee of 25 cents for each additional day of delay up to one week, after which time the student is automatically dropped from the University.

Change of course fee ..... \$1.00

A charge of \$1.00 will be made for each course dropped and each course added, except that on the first day of the winter and spring terms the Study-Program may be changed without the payment of any fee.
