 200 to 299 are courses at the sophomore level; 200 to 210 are group requirement courses (GRC).
 300 to 399 are upper division courses not acceptable for graduate credit.
 400 to 499 are upper division courses acceptable for graduate credit for unusual accomplishment.
 500 to 599 are courses at the graduate level.

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REGISTRATION FEES

Payable at the time of registration each term.

Undergraduate Fee. Undergraduate students who are residents of Oregon pay a flat registration fee of \$38.00 each term; non-residents pay the non-resident fee in addition (see Special Fees). The registration fee includes the Associated Students' fee of \$5.00 a term, a subscription to the student daily newspaper, the health service fee of \$3.50 a term, the building fee of \$5.00 a term levied by the A. S. U. O. to provide and maintain certain student building projects, and the class fee of \$0.50. The remainder of the registration fee, in the amount of \$24.00, entitles the students to register in any school or curriculum without additional charge, and provides free use of all institutional facilities and equipment maintained for the benefit of students.

Graduate Fee. Graduate students pay a registration fee of \$26.00 each term. This fee entitles the students to all the privileges enjoyed by undergraduates except the right to vote in A. S. U. O. elections; this amount does not include building and class fees. Before students are eligible for the graduate fee they must be enrolled in the graduate school or have received a bachelor's degree or have completed all requirements for the bachelor's degree sought.

Graduate Assistants' and Fellows' Fee. Graduate assistants and fellows pay a registration fee of \$16.00 per term. This entitles the students to the same privileges as regular graduate students, except for the following restrictions. To be eligible for this fee graduate students must devote essentially half-time to the institution served, be appointed with the approval of the Graduate School and be enrolled for not more than ten term hours of academic work.

Part-time Fee. Any student, either undergraduate or graduate, registering for six or less term hours is entitled to a reduced rate of \$3.00 per term hour. This fee extends the privileges of class attendance and free use of the library, but not any other institutional privileges.

Auditor's Fee. An auditor is a person who has obtained permission to attend classes without receiving academic credit. The fee of \$1.00 per term hour entitles him to attend classes but not to enjoy any other institutional privileges.

DEPOSITS

Every student who enrolls for academic credit is required to make a deposit of \$10.00 payable once each year at the time of registration. For regulations in regard to refunds, etc., see Annual Catalogue.

SPECIAL FEES

Payable under the special conditions indicated.

Late Registration Fee. Students registering after the scheduled registration dates of any term pay a late registration fee of \$1.00 for the first day and \$1.00 for each additional day until a maximum charge of \$5.00 is reached. See year calendar for dates.

Late Payment Fee. Students who fail to pay installments of their registration fees when due are charged an additional \$0.25 for each day delinquent.

Change of Program Fee. Any student who requests a change in his study program after it has been filed with the Registrar is charged \$1.00.

Reinstatement Fee. If for any reason a student has his registration cancelled during a term for failure to comply with institutional regulations, but is later allowed to continue his term's work, he is charged \$2.00.

Special Examination Fee. If a student is granted the privilege of taking any special examination he is charged \$2.00 for each such examination.

Transcript Fee. A fee of \$1.00 is charged for each transcript issued after the first, which is free of charge.

Graduation Fee. A graduation fee of \$10.00 is paid for each degree taken.

Non-resident Fee. Non-residents of Oregon pay \$50.00 a term in addition to the registration fee paid by resident students. This fee is payable on or before the end of the fourth week from the date of registration.

Fees for Music Lessons. Additional fees are charged for instruction in musical performance. The fees are listed below for Applied Music, which consists of private instruction. These fees may be reduced, by arrangement with the instructor, when lessons are given to several students at once as Group Instruction. Instructors and fees for one and for two half-hour lessons per week are as follows:

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UNDERGRADUATE REQUIREMENTS

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JUNIOR CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS

The following requirements must be satisfied before a student may receive a junior certificate and enter the Upper Division:

- ENTRANCE: clear of conditions.
 - CREDITS: 93 term hours minimum.
 - GRADE POINT AVERAGE: 1.00 minimum.
 - ENGLISH K: this course must be passed if the student does not pass the entrance English examination.
 - ENGLISH COMPOSITION: 6 term hours minimum.
 - PHYSICAL EDUCATION: 6 terms.
 - MILITARY SCIENCE: 6 terms for men.
 - PERSONAL HYGIENE: 3 term hours for women.
 - GROUP REQUIREMENTS: (Groups defined below)
- For a freshman or sophomore majoring in a Lower Division Group:
One 9-credit No. 100-110 course in each of three of the four Groups, and one 9-credit No. 200-210 course in one of these three. (Ordinarily two of the No. 100-110 courses are taken in the freshman year, one No. 100-110 course and the one No. 200-210 course in the sophomore year.)

For a freshman or sophomore majoring in a School:
One 9-credit No. 100-110 course in either Humanities or Social Sciences, and one such course in either Physical Sciences or Biological Sciences.

- Groups are defined as including the following instructional departments:
- Humanities:* Arts,* English, Germanic Languages, Greek, Latin, Music,* Romance Languages. (*Not included for a major in Fine Arts.)
 - Social Sciences:* Economics, Geography, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology.
 - Physical Sciences:* Chemistry, Geology, Mathematics, Physics.
 - Biological Sciences:* Botany, Psychology with laboratory, Zoology.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The following requirements must be satisfied before a student may receive a bachelor's degree and enter the Graduate School:

- JUNIOR CERTIFICATE: must be earned.
- CREDITS: 186 term hours minimum (including credits applied on the junior certificate).
- GRADE POINT AVERAGE: 1.00 minimum.
- UPPER DIVISION CREDITS: 45 term hours minimum.
- CREDITS IN MAJOR: 36 term hours minimum, including 24 upper division term hours.
- CREDITS AFTER JUNIOR CERTIFICATE: 45 term hours minimum.
- RESIDENCE: 45 (normally the last 45) term hours minimum in residence.
- RECOMMENDATION OF DEAN OF MAJOR SCHOOL OR COLLEGE: must be received.
- DEGREE SUBJECTS:
 - For Bachelor of Arts degree:
36 term hours in Arts and Letters, including two years (normally 24 term hours) in one foreign language subsequent to high school graduation.
 - For Bachelor of Science degree:
36 term hours in either Science or Social Science.
 - For Bachelor of Science in a school degree:
36 credits in major school.
 - Professional bachelor's degree:
Recommendation of dean of major school for the particular degree.

SCHOLARSHIP

PROBATION:

- A lower division student goes on probation if his grade point average for any term is below 0.50, and remains on probation until his GPA for a subsequent term is at least 0.75.
- An upper division student goes on probation if his grade point average for any term is below 1.00, and remains on probation until his GPA for a subsequent term is at least 1.00.
- A student on probation must withdraw from all student, extra-curricular, and organization activities.

DISQUALIFICATION:

- There is no rule providing automatic disqualification, this action resting with the scholarship committee.
- A student who has been suspended or expelled is denied all the privileges of the institution and of all organizations in any way connected with it.

MISCELLANEOUS

REGISTRAR'S OFFICE JURISDICTION:

- No registration, change of course, or withdrawal is valid until filed with and approved by the Registrar's office.

CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENTS:

- Each student is given class standing according to the number of term hours of credit earned toward graduation. He is a freshman until he has 36 term hours, a sophomore from then until he has a junior certificate, a junior from then until he has 129 term hours, a senior from then until he has a bachelor's degree.

MINIMUM AND MAXIMUM LOAD:

- Registration for less than 12 or more than 19 term hours in any term requires the approval of the dean of the major school. Registration for more than 19 term hours also requires a grade point average for the preceding term of at least 2.00.

MAXIMUM CREDIT:

- Not more than 17 term hours of credit may be earned in any term unless the student's grade point average for the term is at least 1.50. Not more than 19 term hours may be earned in any term unless the GPA for the term is at least 2.00.

REMOVAL OF INCOMPLETE:

- A mark of Incomplete (Inc) must be removed by the close of the first term in which the student registers, following the receipt of the mark.

JUNIOR CERTIFICATE WITH HONORS PRIVILEGES:

- This certificate is issued to each student who, upon satisfaction of the junior certificate requirements, has a grade point average of at least 1.75. The student is then entitled to enroll for special work leading to the bachelor's degree with honors.

APPLICATION FOR DEGREE:

- A candidate for any degree must file a written application with the Registrar's office, early in the academic year in which the degree is to be obtained.

RESTRICTIONS ON CREDITS TOWARD GRADUATION:

- Not more than 60 term hours of credit for correspondence work may be applied toward any degree. Not more than 48 term hours of Law or Medicine may be applied toward other than the appropriate professional degrees, and not more than 12 term hours of applied music may be applied toward other than the Bachelor of Music degree.

GRADUATE SCHOOL REQUIREMENTS

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ADMISSION:

- A graduate of any standard college or university is admitted to the Graduate School by the Registrar of the University, upon filing application for admission and an official transcript of the credits upon which his bachelor's degree is based.

PREPARATION:

- Preparation for the graduate major must be an undergraduate major in the same subject, or a fair equivalent. Preparation for the graduate minor must be at least one year-course of upper division work in addition to foundational courses in the subject.

REGISTRATION:

- A graduate student is allowed until Saturday noon of the first week of classes each term, to complete his registration for that term.

MAXIMUM LOAD:

- The maximum registration allowed graduate students is 16 term hours per term during the regular sessions (10 for graduate assistants), 9 term hours during each summer session, and 6 term hours during each post session.

CREDITS:

- The master's degree requires at least 45 term hours of credit in graduate work. This usually includes 30 term hours in the major and 15 in the minor subject; in place of a minor a student may earn additional credits in his major, supplemented by service courses approved by his adviser and the Graduate Council. No definite credit requirement is set up for the doctor's degree, since it is based primarily upon attainments and proven ability; the courses taken, however, are selected approximately sixty per cent from the major and forty per cent from the minor subject. A grade point average of 2.00 (a B average) is required for every graduate degree, based on all work taken toward the degree.

RESIDENCE:

- For the master's degree, at least three terms (or five summer sessions) of work must be completed in residence. Not more than 15 term hours of credit may be transferred from other institutions, and such credit must be approved by the major department and by the Graduate Council or the Dean of the Graduate School. For the doctor's degree, two years of full time residence work beyond the master's degree are required, of which one year (usually the last) must be spent on the campus of the University at Eugene.

TIME LIMIT:

- All work to count toward the master's degree, including the thesis and the final examination, must be completed within five years from the date of matriculation in the Graduate School.

GRADUATE COURSES:

- All courses numbered in the 500's (and 600's) carry graduate credit, as do those in the 400's which have been approved by the Graduate Council and in which graduate students complete additional assignments. At least one year-course in the 500's, normally of seminar or research nature and for approximately three term hours of credit per term, is required of each candidate for the master's degree in addition to the thesis.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS:

- The Master of Arts degree requires a reading knowledge of some foreign language, as shown by examination or by adequate undergraduate courses. The Master of Science and the Master of Fine Arts degrees do not have a language requirement, but for the latter a high measure of creative ability must be demonstrated. The Doctor of Philosophy degree requires formal examination on reading ability in French and German.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION:

- For the master's degree, this examination must be taken when the student has completed between 15 and 30 term hours of credit toward the degree. This examination is waived for students who received their bachelor's degree with honors, in the same subject, from the University of Oregon. For the doctor's degree, the preliminary examinations in both major and minor subjects must be taken not later than one academic year before the final examinations. Advancement to candidacy for the degree ordinarily follows the passing of the preliminary examination and proper recommendation by the student's major adviser.

THESIS:

- Every candidate for an advanced degree must file three bound copies of an acceptable thesis, and five copies of an abstract of it, not later than two weeks before the date of his final examination. Nine term hours of credit are earned on the thesis toward the Master of Arts and the Master of Science degrees, 15 term hours toward the Master of Fine Arts degree, and 15 or more term hours toward the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

FINAL EXAMINATION:

- A final oral examination of not less than two hours is required of every candidate for an advanced degree; a written examination may also be required of a candidate for the doctor's degree. For the master's degree, the examining committee consists of at least three members of the Graduate Faculty, including representatives of the candidate's major and minor departments. For the doctor's degree, the examining committee consists of the faculty members in general charge of the candidate's work, and any additional members they or the Graduate Council may wish to appoint. The Dean of the Graduate School is ex officio a member of all examining committees.

UNIVERSITY YEAR CALENDAR, 1932-33
