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- 2. The abstract should be a brief summary of the article. It should be accurate, succinct, quickly comprehensible, and informative. It must not exceed 150 words.
- 3. The text should introduce the article's purpose and include a brief review of the relevant literature, describe its methods and subjects, indicate its results, and offer a discussion in which is conclusions are stated. An author who would like to submit an article (other than a case study) that differs considerably from this structure should contact the Editor-in-Chief to discuss the proposed submission. The text may require several levels of headings. All should be typed in upper and lower case letters (e.g., The Neuropsychophysiology of Dissociations). The first level of headings should be centered, but not underlined. The second level should begin at the left margin and be underlined. The third level should be indented from the left margin and underlined. For more complex sub-heading formats, consult the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*.
