The Arts Management Minor is designed for students with an interest in participating in, leading, and managing arts organizations and activities across the arts sector. Students from diverse disciplines—including Theatre, Music, Dance, Art, Education, Sociology, Anthropology, History, Business, English and Family and Human Services—minor in Arts Management in order to expand their knowledge of the wide variety of management careers available in the arts sector. Steeped in a culturally democratic orientation, the UO Arts & Administration Program emphasizes the importance of participation by all citizens in community-based arts programs and believes in the value of arts leaders to promote the arts as integral to the everyday life of the community and to building a sense of the unique character of place.

The Arts Management Minor emphasizes the cultural, economic, social, and ethical environment in which the arts thrive. Coursework in arts administration focuses on arts philosophy, arts education, cultural programming, management, funding, and business development as core areas of competency paired with specialized courses in the visual arts, performing arts, and community arts management.

Participatory Learning Experiences in the form of practicums with local arts organizations provide students with hands-on learning opportunities that extend classroom learning into the community and provide students with important professional experiences and connections. Taking practicum courses to fulfill the total number of credits for the minor is strongly encouraged, but is not required.

Course requirements encourage students to see the relationships between arts and culture, ethnicity, politics, economics, education, class, gender, age, and occupation. Students graduating with an Arts Management Minor are prepared to work in a variety of settings within the arts sector and to successfully implement methodologies for arts program development and arts administration across a range of formal and informal, for-profit, nonprofit and public arts organizations within a community.

The Arts Management Minor requires 28 credits* with grades of C+ or better.

A minimum of 20 credits must come from AAD courses. Up to 8 upper-division credits may come from your major area, with specific approval by the Arts Management Minor advisor. All credits, except 409 Practicum, must be taken for a letter grade. At least 12 credits must be taken at the University of Oregon.
