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NEWS AND COMMENT

WHEN President Boyer announced his intention of staying on as president of the University of Oregon and of not accepting an attractive offer to become president of the University of Montana, he wiped out the last bit of uncertainty that has for so long been blocking a sound and constructive University program.

Dr. Boyer to Stay

Dr. Boyer should be complimented both on his quick decision in the matter and on his decision to stay. His alacrity in coming to a decision eliminated an unhealthy situation that unhappily arose just after the arrival of Chancellor Hunter and which, had Dr. Boyer permitted it to stand for any length of time, would have been a severe hindrance to Dr. Hunter in his new duties and a setback to a faculty primed to "dig in" on University problems with the new chancellor.

Secondly, in announcing his intention to stay on as president of the University, Dr. Boyer expressed, as could no other act have done, the confidence of the staff of the University in Dr. Hunter's ability and the promise he brings of real progress for the University.

At present the future of the University appears more secure and is viewed with more optimism than has been the case for several years. The reorganization of the state's higher educational system has reached a stage where experimentation and resultant uncertainty have been displaced by a scientific approach to the state's educational problems. Added to this is the fact that suspicion and factionalism have been wiped out and a spirit of cooperation and unified effort has taken their place.

Dr. Boyer's decision to stay at Oregon has added much to the speed with which this transition has taken place. He is to be complimented, as is also the

University of Oregon and the state of Oregon.

Happily, Dr. Boyer remains as Oregon's administrative head. He is a sound scholar, an idealist and yet a practical administrator. His type and his ability have and will continue to add much to the usefulness of the University of Oregon.

TO alumni returning to the campus for Homecoming a new spirit of optimism and enthusiasm on the campus will be apparent—a spirit so marked and so genuine that none will be able to overlook it.

New Spirit on Campus

Causes behind this spirit are many. Dr. Boyer's decision to stay at Oregon being only one of

many circumstances that have conspired to give to Oregon a "new deal" in hope and accomplishment.

Not the least of these circumstances has been the confidence that Dr. Hunter has engendered. With amazing energy and ease he has won the approval and friendship and confidence of the people of Oregon. His first month in Oregon has been an hectic one. But despite heavy demands on his time for public appearances, he has already shown an adaptability and an understanding of Oregon's problems that has won for him the confidence and loyalty of his associates and the Oregon citizenry.

Another factor in the new spirit of optimism has been the decided gain in enrollment this fall, with registration figures jumping from about 2500 up to almost 2800. Whether this gain is a result of the new and hopeful developments or whether it is a contributing factor to the new spirit is difficult to appraise.

And lastly, the fact that the physical plant of the University is growing, with construction already started on the new library and definite plans under way for a new gymnasium and infirmary, has added much to a spirit that presages a truly "greater Oregon."

HOMECOMING as planned this year will add another reason for the optimism that has permeated the campus this fall. First of all it brings back to the University city, after a lapse of four years, a real old-fashioned celebration with the "big game," the cross country race, the former student body presidents' and Emerald editors' luncheon, and the informal alumni luncheon.

But more important is the fact that it brings back to Eugene hundreds of former students and graduates who have not heretofore had an "excuse" for returning. Close association with its alumni is of vital importance to the well-being and progress of any institution.

Sign Contest Revived

The Homecoming program gets off to a booming start Friday evening with an old-fashioned noise parade and rally through the streets of Eugene. As of old, the Homecoming sign contest has been revived and the campus will be a pageant of football life and color. The traditional "Flaming 'O'" on Skinner's Butte will be ignited during the rally, which will be followed by an all-city-student-alumni rally dance to be held at McArthur court under the direction of the rally committee.

Alumni Meeting Saturday

Saturday morning another tradition is to be revived in the form of a breakfast honoring all former members of the student body and all former editors of the Emerald. This event will be held at 9 o'clock at the Anchorage.

At 10:30 the annual alumni meeting will get under way in Guild theatre of Johnson hall, with President Merle R. Chessman presiding. Nomination of officers for the coming year, a report on association affairs, and other matters of importance will be brought up and acted upon at this time. Vacancies on the Alumni Council are: president, vice-president and one director for the three-year term.

Lettermen's Section

Two events that again indicate that the Homecoming of old has returned are the cross-country race between O.S.C. and Oregon starting just before the kickoff and the fact that all lettermen are to meet at Gate 1 before the game and march around the field and to a special section just in back of the Oregon bench where they will be seated together. The wearing of "O" sweaters will admit all lettermen to this section.

Saturday evening at 6 o'clock all living organizations have arranged special dinners honoring their alumni. At 9 o'clock the annual Homecoming Dance at McArthur court begins. All members of the Alumni Association, upon registering in the lobby of Johnson hall and indicating their desire to attend the dance, will be given a free ticket to this event.

Sigma Chi Celebrate

One of the major events to be staged in connection with Homecoming will be the 25th anniversary of the installation of Sigma Chi fraternity on the Oregon campus. Events in connection with this affair, for which more than 100 alumni are expected, will include a banquet, a reserved section at the game,

and the attendance of all charter members of the local group and installation officers. John Lewis is president of the chapter, and Bert S. Gooding, Portland, president of the alumni group. James W. Mott, U. S. congressman, a member of the chapter, will be in attendance. There are 65 active members of the fraternity on the campus this year.

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PORTLAND

Founder's Day

More than 300 alumni of the University of Oregon gathered Friday evening, October 11, at the Woodcraft Temple, Portland, to celebrate the 59th anniversary of the founding of the University and to greet the new chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education and his wife, Dr. and Mrs. Frederick M. Hunter.

Alumni from Portland and vicinity joined with many out-of-town guests (in Portland for the Oregon-California game the following day). Because of the poor radio reception experienced last year at the first annual Founder's Day banquet and because many up-state alumni would either be in Portland or on their way, the state-wide celebration of last year was not attempted. Local annual alumni dinners are planned for various times during the fall and winter to take the place of the state-wide event.

Dr. Hunter Speaks

Chancellor Hunter spoke in justification of a college education both from the standpoint of economic worth to the state and as a cultural and intellec-

tual resource. He also voiced his approval of intercollegiate athletics as a vital part of a rounded University. Following the dinner a reception was held for the Hunters at which time alumni were afforded the opportunity of meeting Dr. and Mrs. Hunter personally. Dr. Hunter was introduced by Merle R. Chessman, '09, president of the state alumni association.

Boyer on Program

President C. V. Boyer, speaking on "The University," sounded the keynote of his administration when he stated that the University may never be the largest institution on the coast but that it can become the most distinguished. He stressed the importance of quality in work done by the school.

The Portland Alumni Association's annual award to an outstanding University graduate was given this year to United States Senator Frederick W. Steiwer, '06, for "Distinguished Service to Country, State and University." The award came as a complete surprise to Senator Steiwer, who attended the banquet believing that he was to be one of the program speakers.

Hugh E. Rosson, graduate manager, and Paul D. Hunt, president of the Portland Alumni Association, were also on the program. Lamar Tooze acted as toastmaster. The University band and the student rally committee appeared before the gathering and led the singing of "Mighty Oregon."

NEW YORK

Founder's Day

Virgil V. Johnson, '96, son of the first president of the University, was honor guest and principal speaker at the second annual Founder's Day dinner to be held by alumni of New York at the Town Hall Club on October 10.

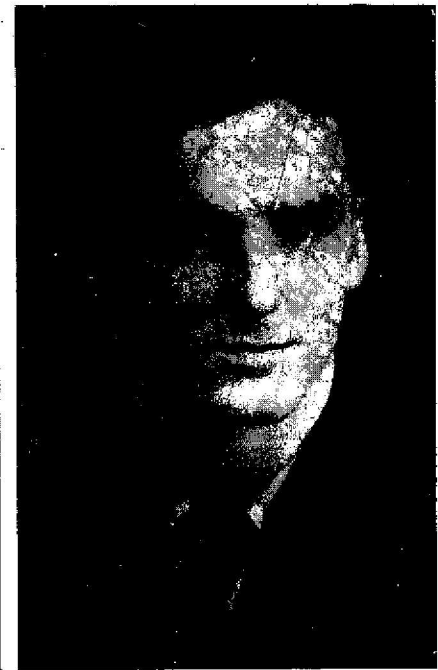

Regarding him, Walter W. R. May, manager of the chamber, said: "The Portland Chamber of Commerce relinquishes Mr. Say to the state highway travel department at a great sacrifice to our organization but when the state has embarked upon so helpful a program we feel we should lend our efforts to make it a success." Mrs. Say was Lillian Porter, ex-'19.

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Ray Named District Attorney

Following the recent resignation of W. H. Brooks, Lane county district attorney, Leonard L. Ray, '12, Eugene, was appointed to the post by Governor Charles H. Martin. Ray has twice before been Lane county district attorney, once in 1916 and again in 1928. He has been practicing law in Eugene for the past 21 years.

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Graduate Wins Honor

Robert Franklin Jackson, '29, one of Oregon's Rhodes scholarship winners, was graduated from Oxford last spring with a "first" in mathematics, which is the highest rating possible, and according to Mrs. Clara L. Fitch, secretary of the graduate division, is one of only a few "firsts" ever granted to a Rhodes scholar.

Mr. Jackson was married recently to Elizabeth Scruggs, '33. They are attending Harvard University this fall, where Mr. Jackson holds a teaching fellowship in physics.

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Lane Continues Work

Robert F. Lane, who received his B.S. in journalism in 1926 and who later received his M.S. in printing in January, 1932, the first printing major ever to be graduated from the University, is now in the Graduate Library school of the University of Chicago, where he is preparing a bibliography on printing which, according to Robert C. Hall, superintendent of the University Press, "is to be one of the most comprehensive ever attempted."

Mr. Hall believes that Lane is rapidly developing into an outstanding authority on printing and expects his research to contribute materially to the store of printing knowledge.

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Dr. Johnson Visits

Dr. Herbert S. Johnson, '87, son of the first president of the University, stopped in Eugene early this month to extend greetings and express compli-

ments to Chancellor Hunter, and to discuss with Frederic G. Dunn and Karl Onthank the early history of the University and the interesting career of his father.

He is still making his home in Boston, Massachusetts, where he is pastor of the Warren Avenue Baptist church, but has been filling (temporarily) during the past year the pulpit of the Temple Baptist church in Los Angeles. He expects to remain there until early 1936.

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Tse-tse Fighter

Returning recently after nine years a medical missionary in Vangsur-Kwili, Belgian Congo, Dr. Alex Christian Osterholm, M.D. '23, in Portland told of the 20-year fight of the Belgian gov-

ernment and missionaries against Africa's deadly tse-tse fly.

"We are making a great deal of progress in saving the lives of the natives," reported Dr. Osterholm. "I work with 100 miles of our station, and in 1934 I examined 5500 persons without finding a new case of sleeping sickness." While the dreaded disease that results from the tse-tse's bite can be cured if the victim is treated within ten days or two weeks, Dr. Osterholm said that too often superstition of the natives prevented them from having any of the white man's medicine.

In charge of a 90-bed hospital, the doctor, who conducts a class for training native nurses in addition to his other duties, is in the States with Mrs. Osterholm on a year's leave of absence.

HOME GAMES

Eugene Gives Support

With two conference games and one inter-sectional game being played in Eugene this football season, citizens of the University city have stirred themselves to unprecedented support of the football schedule in an attempt to demonstrate their appreciation of the "home games" schedule being played this year.

For the past few years only a few major football games have been played

on Hayward Field. The combination of a reduced student body budget and the lure of large "gates" from games played in the larger population centers has tended to draw the games away from Eugene and the campus.

This year, in answer to the appeal from Eugeneans, a full home game schedule was arranged. The city's answer has been a concerted effort to show appreciation by making these games "pay out." This effort has so far resulted in fairly good gate receipts and a remarkable display of cooperation between campus and town.

One of the chief activities in the Eugene "home games" drive has been the caravan junkets sent to various Willamette valley towns in the interest of Oregon football. Speakers representing the city of Eugene, the coaching staff, the graduate manager's office and the faculty met with citizens of Portland, Salem, Albany, Bend and Roseburg. In each case a large representation of the Oregon band accompanied the caravan and paraded the streets prior to the meetings.

The Portland meeting was held in connection with the weekly chamber of commerce forum luncheon. The Albany, Bend and Roseburg meetings were sponsored by service club organizations.

One of the largest gatherings was that held in Salem under the sponsorship of the Salem Rotary club. More than 200 attended this rally meeting. All Salem alumni were invited. The alumni participation was headed and directed by Willis Duniway, '32, who was assisted by Bob Needham, Reynolds Allen, William Hammond, John Marrs and Ed Cross.

CONSTRUCTION

Excavation Completed

Steam shovel work on the new University library was completed October 2, marking the completion of the first step in construction of this \$365,000 project. Actual work on the new library was begun September 17.

The setting of concrete form for foundations was begun at once together with the work of preparing equipment for the heavy cement work to follow.

An additional allotment of \$126,000 to complete the building as originally planned, has been forwarded to Washington, D. C., but as yet no official word has been received concerning its approval.

The need for the additional money is based on the fact that the lowest bid on the plans was in excess of the original PWA allotment by \$82,000. The bid, however, was let with nine alternatives and, if necessary, the omission of one entire wing. The low bid on immediate necessities was \$9,000 under the allotment.

The apparent discrepancy between the \$82,000 deficit and the request for \$126,000 is accounted for in the necessity of adding extra units to the University heating plant to take care of the added burden of heating the new building.

The actual PWA allotment for the library was \$350,000, 30 per cent of which was a government grant and 70 per cent a government loan. An additional \$15,000 was donated by the Alumni Holding Company.

Gym Plans Progress

Recently given approval by PWA officials in Washington, D. C., was the state board's application for a new physical education plant for the University. This structure, to cost \$351,000, will be located on the corner of Fifteenth and University streets and extend along University street to McArthur Court, displacing the present R.O. T.C. barracks.

Members of the staff of the School of Physical Education and Dean Ellis F. Lawrence of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts have given tentative approval to plans which provide facilities for class gym work, classrooms for academic work of physical education majors and space for the intramural sports program. Because of lack of funds, no swimming pool has been included in the present plans, although provision has been made for the addition of a natatorium unit at a later date.

These plans are laid out in such a way

as to insure ease of handling large classes and to avoid the congestion of having several classes forced to use the same exits.

Major features of the building as planned will be: 3 basketball courts, 12 handball courts, six squash boards (bordering the basketball floors), rooms for boxing and wrestling, rooms on the upper floors for students taking restricted work, office space for the staff of the School of Physical Education, assembly room and classrooms and complete apparatus for tumbling and other specialized athletics.

A feature, almost unique in gymnasium construction, will be the use of glass-enclosed cat-walks above the various rooms in order that spectators may look on in any of the rooms without either being in the way or disturbing the players.

In general appearance the building will resemble McArthur court. It will be constructed in two connected units, the administrative and the activity.

The ROTC barracks, to be displaced by the new gymnasium, will probably be moved to a position overlooking Hayward field, behind McArthur court, unless other quarters are found.

New Infirmary

Plans are also under way for construction of a new infirmary, estimated at \$120,000, of which \$54,000 has been allocated by PWA.

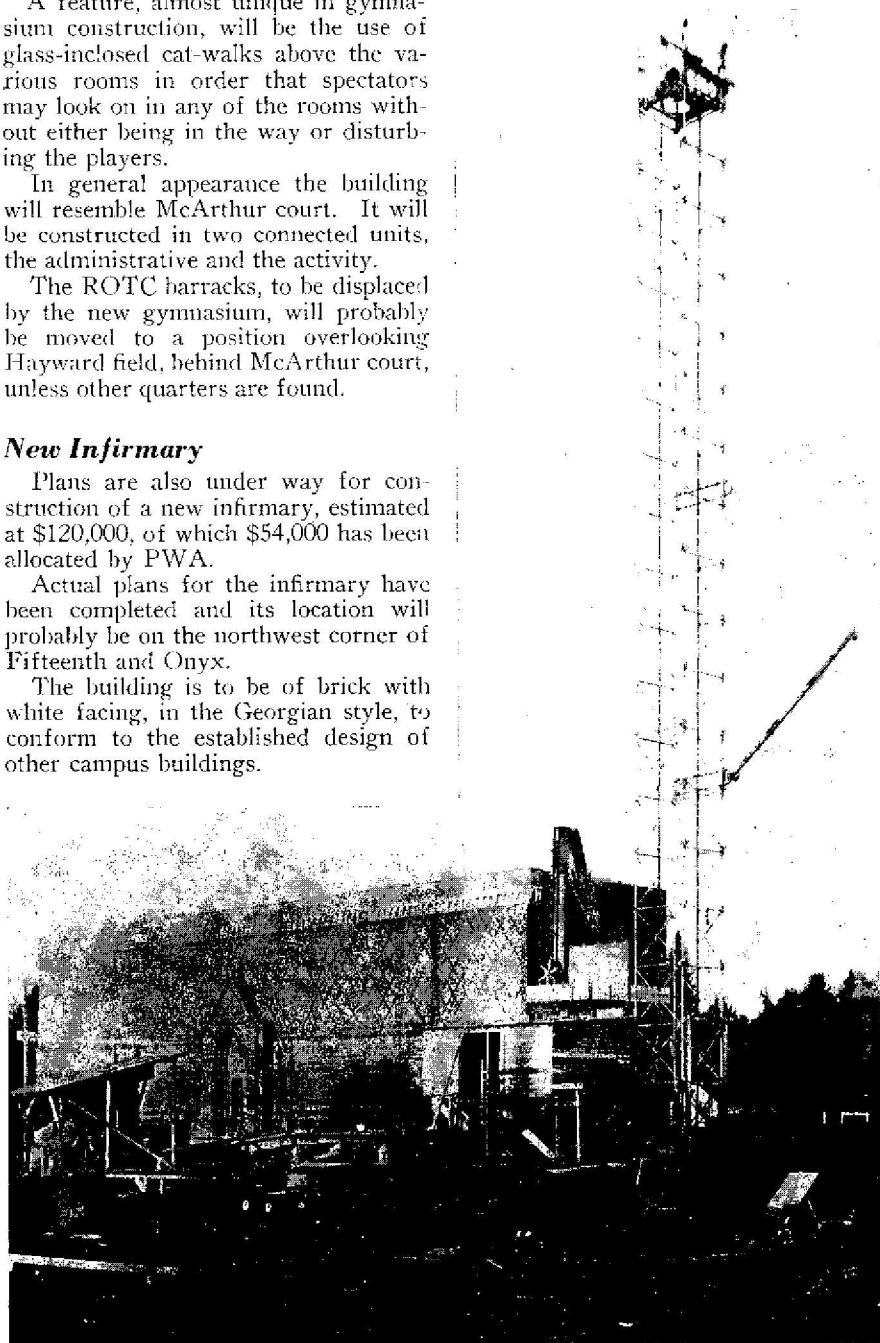
Actual plans for the infirmary have been completed and its location will probably be on the northwest corner of Fifteenth and Onyx.

The building is to be of brick with white facing, in the Georgian style, to conform to the established design of other campus buildings.

Dad's Day Big Success

The ninth annual "Dads' Day" weekend was held at the University of Oregon October 19-20 with more fathers wearing "Oregon Dad" arm-bands than have been seen in many years.

Officers named for the coming year were: Earle Wellington, Portland, re-elected president; Merle R. Chessman, Astoria, re-elected vice-president; Walter M. Cook of Portland, re-elected secretary, and Earl M. Pallett, Eugene, re-elected executive secretary. Three new members were elected to the execu-

tive committee. They were: Joseph R. Reisch, Roy O. Burnett and Loyal H. McCarthy, all of Portland.

Other members of the executive committee who will continue in office are Ralph S. Hamilton, Rev. John W. Beard, Ralph Morrison, C. W. Morden, W. M. Davis, Willard Bond, all of Portland, and Carl Haberlach, Tillamook.

A special section was reserved for the Dads, who turned out en masse for the Idaho game Saturday afternoon.

The main dining room of the John Straub Memorial Building was filled to capacity Saturday evening for the annual "Dads' Day" banquet. The principal speaker was Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter, who declared that over and above the value of the state institutions of higher education as cultural institutions where research and increased knowledge are turning uncalculable wealth out into the state each year, is the actual cash value of the institutions to the state. Dr. Hunter's basis for making this statement was the fact that college-trained persons throughout the country earn a minimum average of \$25 a month more per month than those who have not benefited from an advanced education. Thus 20,000 alumni living in the state produce an extra annual income of approximately \$5,000,000 a year. This figure capitalized, said Dr. Hunter, would place a minimum value of the state system at easily \$100,000,000. However, cash value to the state is only a start, declared the chan-

cellor; human values and cultural advancement are really the institutions' greatest donations to the state's "wealth."

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Actors Plan Circuit

Members of the Guild Hall Players are planning a presentation of Sheridan's "The Rivals" in Ashland late in December of this year. The play will be under the direction of Mrs. Otilie Turnbull Seybolt, head of the drama division, and includes a cast of veteran University players.

Alumni in other southern Oregon communities who would like to see the troupe brought to their home town are requested to write to Mrs. Seybolt, as the drama division is anxious to make as many appearances as possible on their junket into the southern part of the state.

The first University theatre production of the year, "The Queen's Husband," opens in Guild Hall on November 15.

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Friends of Library Organize

In an effort to adequately furnish the "browsing room" planned for the new University library now under construction, an organization has been formed to solicit support in the drive for funds for this purpose with Mrs. George T. Gerlinger acting as chairman.

The new group, to be known as "Friends of the Library," is acting under the sponsorship of the Alumni

Holding Company and the University library committee. Though organized so far only in Eugene and Portland, the group plans to expand throughout the state and hopes that by the time of completion of the building adequate funds will be on hand to furnish the room beautifully and comfortably.

The "browsing room" will be a home-like reading room as compared to the study rooms which will be in another part of the structure. The latest books and the familiar classics will be on hand in this room. It will be furnished with comfortable chairs, carpets and soft lights. Mrs. E. E. Harpham, Portland, has been selected as assistant chairman in the drive for funds.

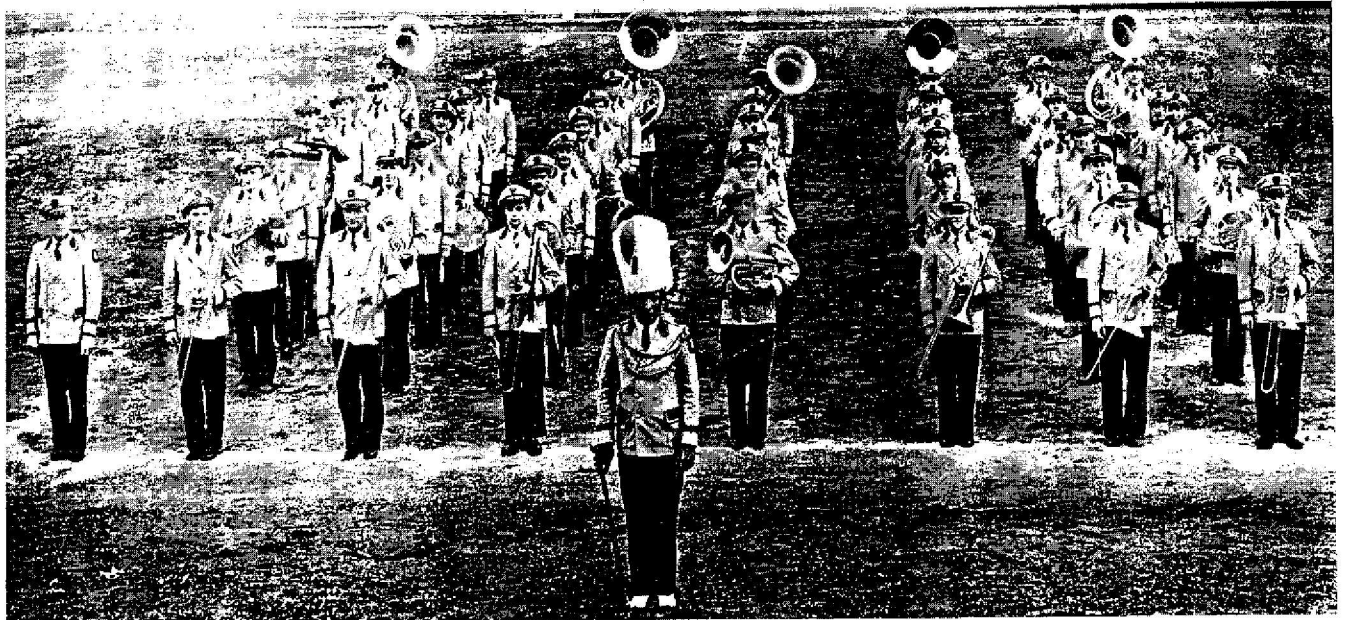
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Eight Fraternities Fined

Because of alleged violation of rushing rules during Freshman week eight campus fraternities were fined varying amounts ranging from \$45 to \$5 by the interfraternity council this month.

Fraternities fined and amounts were: Delta Tau Delta, \$5; Pi Kappa Alpha, \$5; Phi Gamma Delta, \$5; Phi Sigma Kappa, \$10; Sigma Alpha Epsilon, \$10; Sigma Chi, \$5; Theta Chi, \$15, and Sigma Nu, \$45. Nine fraternities were originally charged, but after an appeal session charges against Alpha Tau Omega were dropped and adjustments were made on the amount of fines on several of the others.

The incident stirred considerable excitement among fraternity men and

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Grade Ratings Given

A compilation of grade-point averages for houses and halls based on last spring's work showed Alpha Xi Delta leading with an average of 1.8246 and Sigma Hall second with 1.8225. Delta Upsilon led the fraternities with 1.5426 and Delta Delta Delta was in second place among the sororities with 1.6741.

Beginning this term, a new grading system will be inaugurated which raises all averages one point. Grades of A

will count 4 points; B, 3 points; C, 2 points; D, 1 point and F, no point. This system has been established by many coast universities and the change places Oregon on a numerical par with them.

An appropriation of \$21,489 has been made for the work, of which \$17,846 is being furnished by the WPA and the balance, \$3,643, is supplied by the University.

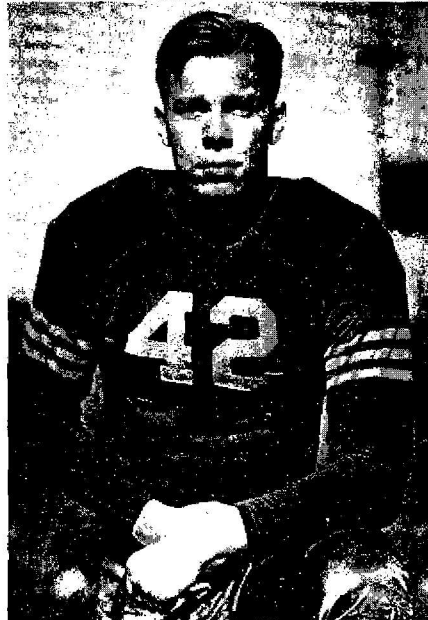

Cheshire Too Much

It was a fleet-footed, slippery half-back by the name of Charles Cheshire who wrote finis to any Webfoot hopes for top place position in coast football for 1935. And it was this same Mr. Cheshire who capitalized on the opportunity afforded by the Oregon-U.C. L.A. game on October 26 in Los Angeles to place himself in definite line for all-American honors and to perhaps draw his team along the paths of football glory to a coast championship and the coveted bid to the Rose Bowl.

Although Oregon out-scrimaged the



rampaging Uclans; though Oregon made more first downs than did the men from Westwood, it was Mr. Cheshire who scampered through the green-jerseyed tide from the north like a dolphin at play, and spelled defeat for the Webfoots in well rounded numbers, 33 to 6.

Despite the score, however, the Callisonmen looked good, even in the face of overwhelming defeat. They were the victims of an apparently unstoppable force that is carrying U.C.L.A.'s Mr. Cheshire to national football honors. Oregon fought throughout the game and along in the last quarter actually outplayed the victory-bent Uclans and managed to gain a lone score, useful mainly as a buoyant to pride.

Lopez Proves Surprise

Big surprise to Webfoot fans was the uncovering of a new offensive star in the person of Ray Lopez who, up to the time he entered the fray in Los Angeles Coliseum, was considered a third-rate halfback. But Lopez got his chance and came through with flying colors, showing the fans that Mr. Cheshire wasn't the only man on the field that day who could rip an opposing line to shreds and lope merrily through a broken field for long and flashy gains. It was Lopez, too, who was able to advance the ball into scoring position and over the line for Oregon's lone tally. Altogether, in 18 times with the ball, he averaged 10.5 yards.

Though Oregon was several times in scoring territory, the strong defensive machinery of Bill Spaulding's 1935 leviathan proved too faultless for successful penetration. That, combined with the sparkling perfection of the triple-threater Mr. Cheshire, who dashed off once for 81 yards, again on a pass for 42 yards, and ten other times for an average of 15.5 per try, proved to be Oregon's undoing once again in Los Angeles Coliseum.

Thus Oregon finds itself among the second raters on the coast with two losses to one win, having lost a tough one to California, 6 to 0, and winning one from Idaho, 14 to 0.

Two "Big Games" Left

But the Webfoots are far from down and out. Their two arch-enemies,

Washington and Oregon State are yet to be met. In these two annual tussles the dope means little, fight and pure doggedness count for much. Fourteen days elapse between the sad Los Angeles affair and the big Homecoming game in Eugene against the rivals from Corvallis. Then comes a breather from conference competition against the scrappy Portland University team which will not be easy but which will have its advantages since the Pilots play Phelan-type of football. This game, to be played in Portland, will serve as a stiffener for the "Battle of Puget Sound," which comes off on November 23.

The annual post-season fracas with the St. Mary's Gaels will wind up the season for the green-jerseyed footballists and here again the Ducks have a chance to regain lost glory. Revenge for last year's crushing one-touchdown loss to the Gaels and the regaining of the Governor's trophy, now in possession of the Madigan-men, will provide a burning desire for victory on the part of the Webfoot gridmen.

Lettermen Carry Brunt

Outstanding work by last-year lettermen who have carried the brunt of the playing burden, has figured prominently in the games thus far. Ross Carter, Stan Riordan, Del Bjork, Budd Jones, John Reischman, and Frank Michek are the six veterans who have come through with flying colors to supply the punch necessary to put the Webfoots in a higher bracket than pre-season dopsters anticipated.

Line Combination Strong

Riordan, especially, has played a stellar role in the Webfoot grid show. The Pasadena youth, brilliant left end and the best punter on the coast this season, has booted the pigskin for an average of 39.2 yards in his first four games. His lengthy spirals have been an effective offensive as well as defensive weapon in the Duck attack. On more than one occasion he has been called back to pull his teammates out of dangerous situations and come through with amazing pinch punts. His consistency in out-punting his rivals has resulted in a large net gain for the the Webfoots.

Jones, end; Carter, guard; and Bjork, tackle, are the bulwarks in a strong Oregon line. This trio of footballers plays on the right side of the Duck forward wall and together form the most powerful line combination on the coast. Substantial gains through

their portion have been few and far between.

Reischman, blocker superb and brainy quarterback, and fullback Michek, the unstoppable "Scappoose Limited" have teamed with Bob Braddock, hard-charging right halfback, and Bud Goodin, sophomore star left half, to form a backfield combination equal in all-around strength to any on the coast. Reischman is the field general; Michek the battering ram line-plunger and pile-driving defensive line-backer; Braddock the blocker and plunger, and Bud Goodin the triple-threat.

California Defeat Felt

The early-season 6 to 0 defeat at the hands of California was a real setback to the hopeful Webfoots, both actually and psychologically. The game, played on a rain-soaked Multnomah Stadium, was fought on almost even terms and, except for a "break" coming in the fourth quarter, might have ended in a scoreless tie.

The Bear's lone score came early in the fourth quarter after the Webfoots had staved off a fierce attack just before the gun ended the third quarter. With the ball in Oregon's possession as the fourth quarter started, Riordan attempted to kick out of danger, but Harry Lutz, Bear tackle, boomed through to block the kick which was recovered by Anderson on Oregon's two-yard marker. It took Ken Cotton, 202-pound Bear fullback, two ramming plays against a stubborn Webfoot line to place the ball barely across the goal and score.

The line play of both teams and much good kicking despite the field conditions, featured the game.

Idaho Real Threat

Despite the fact that Idaho made three more first downs than did Oregon and gained 34 more yards from scrimmage and passes, the Webfoots were able to chalk up a 14 to 0 win over the Vandals in Eugene on October 19 by virtue of superior line play, stellar punting on the part of Stan Riordan and more power and drive in the pinches. Three reserves, Romey dePittard, Bobby King and Dale Lasse'le all turned in impressive ground-gaining records; but Riordan's punting, which averaged 49.5 yards a kick was the feature of the contest. Oregon had difficulty in stopping a superior passing attack on the part of the Vandals who constantly threatened the Webfoot lead by this means of offensive.

Utah Proves Tough

An unbroken 80-yard march early in the game straight down the field on power plays was responsible for Oregon's lone score over Utah on Hayward Field October 5.

Although Oregon had a decided edge over the Rocky Mountain conference team in the first half, the last half was turned into a defensive battle for the Webfoots with the men from Salt Lake constantly threatening the Oregon goal. Braddock proved to be Oregon's best ground-gainer with 81 yards in 14 tries for an average of nearly 6 yards a try.

Oregon 18, Gonzaga 0

With a touchdown in the first five minutes of play, and two more in the last quarter, Oregon was able to pile up 18 points against Gonzaga to win the first game of the season in Multnomah Stadium on September 28.

Riordan blocked a Gonzaga punt on the first play following the kickoff and Bjork recovered on the Gonzaga 5. Goodin plunged through for the first counter on the next play.

Then for most of two quarters the game became sluggish with many penalties imposed on an erratic Oregon team. Not until the latter part of the third period did Oregon again begin to "click."

At this point Callison took Jones, Riordan, Michek, Bjork and Carter out of the game. But the reserves carried on the offensive with brilliance, and Bobby King, the first time he carried the ball for Oregon, romped off his own left tackle for ten yards and the final score. All three tries for points after touchdowns failed.

Frosh Lose to Rooks

Oregon's 1935 freshman football eleven, over-enthusiastically written up as a "wonder" team, tasted defeat at the hands of the less publicized Oregon State Rooks on Hayward Field Friday evening, October 25. Though the Frosh settled down to play the fiery Rook squad more or less on their own terms during the latter part of the game, poor team play and a few bad breaks accounted for the defeat in the earlier quarters.

Leading lights on John Warren's squad have been Jimmy Nicholson, Salem triple-threat halfback; John Yerby, stocky end from Portland; Nello Giovanini, guard from Klamath Falls; Merle Peters, twice all-city tackle in Portland; Bobby Anet, shifty Astorian at quarterback; Jean LaCau, giant fullback and all-city last fall in San Francisco; Dave Gammon, all-city halfback at Benson Tech in Portland; Fred Buraker and Tom Blackman, both halfbacks from Washington; Cliff Morris, 228 pound tackle from Reedsport; Bob Hinman, end from Medford, and Hank Nilsen, end, from Astoria.

The Ducklings eked out a 13-12 victory over Southern Oregon Normal in their opening game at Medford and a week later upset a heavier Oregon Normal school eleven before a capacity crowd at Astoria.

Games still on tap include the second "little civil war" contest with the Oregon State rooks, slated for Friday night, November 8, at Corvallis, and the annual tussle with the University of Washington Babes on Saturday, November 2, on Hayward field.

Death Saddens Campus

Walter M. Back, a junior in physical education and for two years a member of the varsity football squad, died at the Emanuel Hospital in Portland on October 13 following an operation for the removal of an infectious growth from the calf of his right leg.

Back, who was a transfer from Palo Alto Junior College, had been counted

on by coaches to fill the left halfback position on this year's football team, but early in the season his leg began to give him trouble and the operation was decided upon. The injury was the result of a bruise, whether from football or not doctors were unable to determine.

Alumni will remember Back as a brilliant ball-carrier in two games last season, against Utah at Salt Lake and against Louisiana State at Baton Rouge. Coach Callison and his aides had counted strongly on Back's stellar ability as a ball-carrier for this year.

News of Back's death saddened the entire campus as the blonde-haired football player was well known and widely admired. Many members of the football squad, the student body and Phi Delta Theta, Back's fraternity, attended the funeral October 15 in Portland. Back's home was in Palo Alto. He is survived by a mother and a younger brother.

A new coach, six holdover lettermen from a potentially-strong 1935 team, and a host of sparkling transfers from junior college ranks, make up Oregon's new deal in basketball, which got under way Monday, October 28.

The new coach is Howard Hobson, former Webfoot star and for the past three years highly successful mentor of the powerful Southern Oregon Normal

school teams. He replaces Bill Reinhart, now at George Washington University.

The six lettermen who will form the nucleus of the 1936 Oregon varsity are Willard Jones, all-conference center; Budd Jones, two-year veteran guard; Sam Liebowitz, brilliant guard; Rollie Rourke and John Lewis, forwards, and Bill Harcombe, center. Glen Sanford, letterman eligible for another year, has chosen business and marriage in preference to his final season.

Members of Hobson's powerhouse Southern Oregon Normal quintet which defeated Oregon three out of four games last fall and went on to receive national recognition at the Denver A.A.U. hoop tourney, are among the newcomers who have turned out for initial workouts.

They are Wardlow Howell, 6 foot 6 inch center; Ray Jewell, 6 foot 7 inch center; Cliff (Chief) McLean, speed-burning guard; Bill Courtney, guard; Jack Breuer, 6 foot 6 inch center; Wayne Scott, sharpshooting forward; Od Hughes, forward and brother of Bernie, ex-grid star; Bob Braddock, varsity griddler and a forward, and Chuck Patterson, 6 foot 2 inch forward.

Others who will rate in the struggle for first team berths are Dave Silver, Jack Stafford, Vernon Moore and Dale Lasselle, all sophomores; Bobby King, lightning fast all-conference guard from Glendale Junior College, and Ken Purdy, ball-handler de luxe from Long Beach Junior College.

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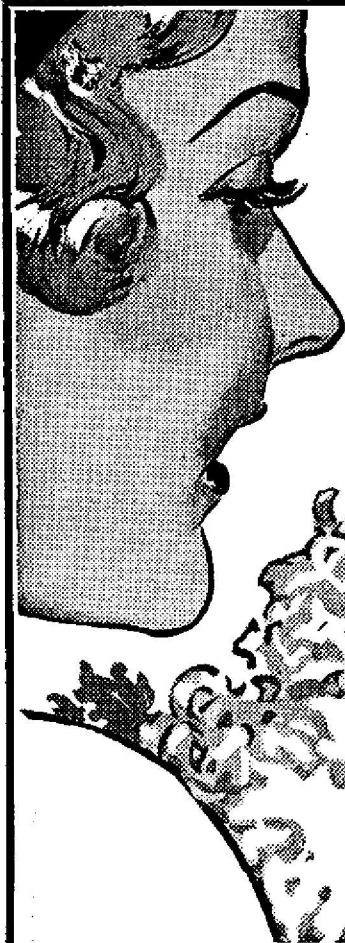
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
