NEWS AND COMMENT

By The Editor

(Editor's note: The following article discussing the proposed tax limitation measure is by Dean James H. Gilbert, '03, a noted authority on taxation.)

DEFEAT of the twenty-mill limitation in 1934 was traceable largely to the popular concern about its effect on education. It must not be assumed that the proposed tax limitation measure of 1936 is less dangerous to public education.

Limitation Tax Danger to Education

The reductions called for are not comprehended in the graded annual reductions of four per cent. In 33 counties property assessment must decline—in 9 counties as much as 30 per cent. Even assuming a normal levy for school purposes in 1935 it means an immediate cut in school budgets of 30 per cent in a single year before the graded annual reductions become effective.

In Crook County where the county unit system has cut expenses to the bare minimum, a total reduction of 33 per cent must be made before 1942. It must be recalled also that both elementary and high school districts carry considerable debts. As in the case of cities, interest and sinking fund obligations are a first claim. All cuts must come out of operating budgets. The operating budgets of Crook County schools must come down 42 per cent by 1942.

In Eugene, a typical city district, a 40 per cent reduction in operating expense will be necessary by 1942. With salaries down to the minimum and equipment impaired to the depression level, such reductions are impossible and fatal to educational efficiency.

Higher education also will suffer. Since 1931 the sole support of instruction in University, College, and Normal Schools comes from a fixed millage on property valuations. Since that year \$474,000 annually has been lost from higher education budgets by shrinkage


of millage receipts. With the fall term of 1936 enrollments are back to the peak and the demands upon the system for public services of various kinds enormously increased.

In the light of these demands from within and without, it does not seem reasonable to adopt an amendment which will strike \$106,000,000 from assessed valuations and cause another loss of \$175,000 annually in millage receipts.

In addition to other objections, the limitation amendment is wholly inconsistent with reasonable standards in public education. Friends of education should ask the question—"What price tax reduction?"

Although feeling extreme regret at seeing him leave, alumni officials and his many friends extend best wishes for a successful future.

FACULTY SHIFTS

Howe Acting Dean

Personnel changes in the faculty have been fairly numerous this year, with President Boyer announcing several additions, while various members have accepted positions with better pay elsewhere.

Chief among the shifts was the announcement of the appointment of Herbert Crombie Howe, chairman of the department of English, as acting dean of the college of arts and letters. Dean Howe has been on the faculty since 1901, and has built up a wide reputation as a teacher, as well as taking an active part in University activities, where he serves as athletic representative.

Williamson Leaves

Among those who have announced their departure since the last issue of Old Oregon are Dr. George Williamson, who has accepted an invitation as visiting professor at the University of Chicago on a year's leave of absence. He will get double the salary there that he received here, and will teach only half as many classes.

Others leaving include: Dr. Harold J. Noble of the history department, who has accepted a fellowship at the University of California. His place will be filled by Dr. Clarence G. Osborn, who received his Ph.D. from Stanford; Dr. M. B. Hesdorffer, assistant physician of the health service, who goes to Montana to direct the service there; Roy G. Bryson, for eight years teacher of voice, who resigns to accept a position as supervisor of music in the schools at Longview, Washington, while Hal Young, well known for his concert work, will be an addition to the music faculty; James A. Carrell, assistant professor of speech, who has built up a reputation as an authority on remedial teaching in this field, leaves to accept a similar position at a much higher salary at Ohio State University; Miss Mabel A. Wood is on a year's leave and is at Yenching University, Peiping, China.

New Appointments

New appointments include: Dr. Frank Geis Black as assistant professor of English, who has been at Harvard; Bertram Emil Jessup, '27, takes a similar position. Dr. Elizabeth Montgomery and Dr. Luther L. Mays will take over the remedial teaching of atypical children clinic work left vacant by Dr. DeBusk's death; Dr. Wendell S. Brooks

will take the work of Professor F. L. Stetson, who has a year's leave; Dr. LeRoy Detling, '21, has been appointed assistant professor of botany.

Dr. DeBusk Dies

Missing in the faculty ranks this fall is Dr. Burchard W. DeBusk, widely known for his clinics for atypical students, who died in Eugene on July 29 after a short illness. Dr. DeBusk, on the University faculty since 1915, has been nationally recognized for his contribution to the advancement of educative methods for handicapped persons.

Not only did he help students to remedy their difficulties, but trained educators to carry on his work. This summer Dr. DeBusk conducted a class of 65

specialists from all sections of this country, training them in remedial work.

On the campus Dr. DeBusk taught courses in education and educational psychology, and a unique course on "how to study." Here he aided university students in finding individual difficulties, and with his work and advice, trained these failing students in successful ways to study.

Surviving Dr. DeBusk are his widow, Mrs. Matella DeBusk; one son, Dr. Roger DeBusk, '30, assistant manager of the Wisconsin general hospital in Madison, Wisconsin, and one daughter, Miss Elizabeth Ann DeBusk, junior at the University.

Part of Dr. DeBusk's work here will be carried on by Dr. Elizabeth Briggs Montgomery, Ph.D. '35, who was trained four years in his clinical methods. During the past year she has been in Portland as administration assistant under Dean Alfred Powers. Dr. Luther L. Mays will work with Dr. Montgomery.

¶ Daniel D. Gage, associate professor of business administration, received his degree as doctor of philosophy from the University of Michigan this summer. His final thesis was regarded as outstanding and will be published soon.

ENROLLMENT

May Break Record

Figures released as Old Oregon went to press showed 2632 had registered the first two days. Based on records of other years enrollment should hit 3000.

Possibility that enrollment this year will break the all-time fall term record of 3095, set in 1930, was announced by Registrar C. L. Constance as hundreds of new and old students flocked into Eugene for Freshman week, September 21 to 26.

Based on an expected eight per cent increase, and also the fact that last year's graduating class was the smallest in years, Constance believes the mark will jump over 3000. Last fall term it was at 2741.

Improvements Helpful

Cited as reasons for the increase were improved conditions, the million dollar building program at the University, and advancements like the new advisory system and the program of progressive research. Also during the past two years work has been more available to students. Last year alone NYA helped 585.

Recent statistics released by Dr. Earl M. Pallett show that actual attendance for all of last year, both regular and summer session, totaled 4197. The summer school figures in the report are for 1935. The statistics show the trend of economic conditions, in that for 1930-31 a total of 3359 registered, while in 1933-34 the total was under 2500.

Different Fee Payment


Greeting the students upon return this fall are the three new buildings, the University Hospital, library, and the physical education plant. The hospital is ready for immediate use, but the latter two will not be used until the first of the year.

Different this year will be the form of the fee payment for athletic and educational extra-curricular activities. The total still stays at \$15, but the ticket has been pro-rated and will sell at \$7 fall term, \$5 winter term, and \$3 spring term.

than eight per cent as it jumped from 202 to 219. The regular session had a total of 697 students, a gain from the figure of 619 a year ago.

¶ The University loan fund, established more than 30 years ago by William Ladd, A. S. Roberts, and the class of 1904, has grown to a total of \$68,692.14. The fund last year extended aid to hundreds of students who otherwise would have had to drop school. Loans made totaled 2342, of which 107 were regular long-time grants, while 2235 were for emergencies and usually repaid within a few weeks.

¶ Alpha Xi Delta led all living organizations in scholarship for the year 1935-36 with a GPA of 2.7488. Alpha Hall, 1934-35 leader, was second with 2.7306. Women were safely above the men in the standings with an average of 2.4773, while the latter had 2.2986.

George A. Dorris Dies

Funeral services were held in Eugene Friday, September 18, for George A. Dorris, ex-'80, who died the previous Wednesday at the Sacred Heart Hospital at the age of 78 years.

Mr. Dorris was recognized as one of the state's leading and most progressive farmers. He had achieved national recognition for his pioneer filbert plantings, which started this branch of the orchard business in the United States.

Mr. Dorris' father, Ben F. Dorris, had been one of the members of the University's first board of regents and his family followed his interest in the institution. Not only George, but all of his brothers and sisters who survive him attended the University. They are: Edward P. Dorris, ex-'92, Susan M. Dorris, '90, Mrs. Kate Dorris McAllister, ex-'87, Mrs. Cecile Dorris Eaton, ex-'88, Mrs. Mary Dorris Condon, '83, and Mrs. Alice Dorris Boardman, '82.

Ben F. Dorris, '15, a nephew, will carry on the Dorris ranch business.

Re-education New Aim

Dr. H. H. Dixon, professor of psychiatry, in a speech before the Portland Junior C. of C. maintained that modern psychiatrists are not so much inclined to blame heredity for mental diseases as they once were.

Dr. Dixon said that environment is now considered more important and under modern treatment persons suffering from mental diseases are treated with environmental changes and re-educated along lines which will help them to adjust themselves to their surroundings.

Oregon alumni will live again the gridiron triumphs of Hugo Bezdek's wonder team of 1916 on October 30 and 31, the weekend when the present-day Webfoots play Washington in Portland.

Johnny Beckett, Baz Williams, Shy Huntington, Johnny Parsons, Bart Spellman—they'll all be there when the Rose Bowl team of 1916 holds its reunion just twenty years after. The heroes of two decades past will gather in Portland in their first assembly since the final gun on New Year's day of 1917, when they trounced Pennsylvania's great machine at Pasadena.

It was Shy Huntington's idea to convene the boys who won the conference championship just before the war. Shy, who called signals for the Rose Bowl crew and was himself Oregon coach for several years, is now in business in Eugene. A year ago Huntington mentioned the holding of a reunion of the boys of '16 to Roland W. Geary, Portland, student manager of the championship team. Mr. Geary's response was so enthusiastic that invitations were prepared and mailed to every living member of the 1916 squad. Most of the men are coming.

Special Bench Planned

Plans call for the 1916 team to sit just behind the 1936 squad on a specially constructed bench at the Washington game. Half-time ceremonies will be in order, and the old timers may show the youngsters how they ran signals way back when. After the game a big banquet will wind up the reunion.

Record Breaker Back

George Varoff, University of Oregon student, emblazoned his name in headlines all over the athletic world last Fourth of July by soaring to a new world's record in the pole vault. The 22-year-old Hawaiian-born Russian vaulted 14 feet 6½ inches, more than an inch higher than the best previous mark.

Now the good news is that Varoff is returning to Oregon. He was ineligible for varsity competition under Bill Hayward last spring, but this year the world record holder will be the nucleus of Colonel Bill's track and field squad.

After establishing an unchallenged world mark, Varoff then surprisingly failed to qualify for the American

Olympic team, although none of the three Southern California stars who edged him off the boat to Germany could match his height.

VARSITY FOOTBALL**Team Is Strong**

Varsity football at Oregon is looking up.

Despite predictions to the contrary by self-styled experts, Coach Prince Gary Callison has a University of Oregon grid crew which shapes up stronger than at this time a year ago.

The Ducks opened their season, under the floodlights at Eugene, with a 14 to 0 victory over a fast University of Portland eleven. With Callison holding his charges under cover not much could be told of their true strength. A game with USC October 3 will be the first of eight tough ones.

Thirteen lettermen of last season are missing, and the missing list includes Stan Riordan, Ross Carter, and Frank Michek. To replace the men not returning, however, is a bevy of sophomores more promising than any second-year group here in several years. And in spite of the loss of the unlucky 13, there are still lettermen on the roster—12 of them.

Returning to aid Head Man Callison in coaching the Webfoots are Gene Shields, line coach, and Colonel Bill Hayward, veteran trainer. New face in Oregon coaching circles is Dick Reed an end here in the late '20's, now end coach.

Bjork Possible All-American

Outstanding player in the Webfoot entourage as the season gets under way is apparently Captain Del Bjork, 205-pound left tackle from Astoria. A two-year letterman, Bjork is all-American timber.

Tackle on the other side of the first string line is in the capable hands of Kenyon Skinner, 225-pound junior, a regular last year. Guard positions belong at present to Tony Amato, squat little veteran from last season's string, and Joe Huston, reserve a year ago. Bill Estes is a third letterman guard. Regular center duty will, as last year, be divided between Ed Farrar and Vernon Moore.

Ends Tough Problem

The ends are question marks of Oregon's team. Coach Reed is working daily with the terminal candidates and the half-dozen promising aspirants may develop sufficiently. Lief Jacobsen, understudy to Budd Jones at right end last year, is the only veteran. John Engstrom has been moved from tackle to the other wing, and four sophomores counted upon are John Yerby and Bob Hinman on the left side of the line and Hank Nilsen and Bud Robertson on the right.

Capable players are two deep in Oregon's line, but in the backfield they're three deep. Starting behind-the-line quartet will probably be Don Kennedy, quarter; Dale Lasselle, left half; Bob Braddock, right half, and Bud Goodin, fullback. Kennedy, who has added more than 20 pounds since last season, is the


