The symposium method of debate as originated on the Oregon campus was adopted at the Pacific collegiate forensic conference held on the University of Nevada campus during April. The symposium plan does away with the pro and con debate and divides the topic into several speeches with each speaker covering all of the facts within his assignment. The listener is then left to make his own decision.

Professor W. A. Dahlberg of the speech department accompanied Oregon debaters to the meeting in Reno and was elected vice-president of the conference.

Oregon debaters making the trip were Zane Kemler, Pendleton; Kessler Cannon, Toledo; and Marshall Nelson, The Dalles.

## Dr. Noble Returns

Dr. Harold Noble, on leave of absence for the past two years, will return from the Orient to assume his duties as associate professor of History when school opens next fall. Dr. Noble's position has been filled by Dr. Arthur J. Marder, who leaves the faculty upon Dr. Noble's return.

## William Jackson Roberts

William Jackson Roberts, B.A. '86 and M.A. '93, died April 6 in Tacoma, Washington, where he had made his home since 1914. Mr. Roberts was for many years professor of civil engineering at Washington State College. He was a brother of A. S. Roberts, ex-'87, and of Anna Roberts Stephenson, '96.

S. Stephenson Smith, professor of English, is now in Washington, D. C., attending the annual conference of the American Association of University Professors. Mr. Smith represents the Northwest and is a member of the board of directors.

## Additions to Museum

The University's Natural History Museum continues to grow. Latest additions include a huge mastodon, a long-necked camel, a wild boar and oreodon of Oregon's prehistoric age. The four beasts were sculptured from Brownsville sandstone as part of a WPA art project—information for which was supplied by Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the department of geography and geology. The art project also includes life-sized plaster casts of the Neanderthal man of 25,000 years ago and the later Cro-magnon man of 15,000 years ago. Dr. L. S. Cressman, head of the department of anthropology and director of the museum is in charge of this project.

Another interesting display is a pine lodge pole with marks on it as proof that the Oregon country was inhabited as early as the 14th century. Through dendrochronology (the reading of tree rings) the pole has been dated as between 1331 and 1370. Calculations were made by F. P. Keene, entomologist of the forest insects laboratories of the bureau of entomology, department of agriculture.

A thirteen-piece collection including a tarpon, a blue-finned sailfish, and other unusual specimens have been lent the museum by Campbell Church of Eugene.

## Volume From France

A volume of hitherto unpublished correspondence between George Washington and Admiral D'Estaing, commander of the French fleet sent to America to assist during the Revolutionary war, was received by President Donald M. Erb from Senator Andre Honnorat, president of the Cite Universitaire in Paris.

Inserted between the pages of the volume are facsimiles of George Washington's original letters, written on yellowed paper and stamped with the colonies' seal. Most of the letters are dated from July to October, 1778.

## Caravan Visits Campus

A caravan of 20 automobiles brought members of the Geological Society of the Oregon Country to the campus during the early part of April. The group visited the new Natural History Museum and went on several geology field trips in the Eugene area.

## DeBusk Memorial Clinic

The DeBusk Memorial Clinical school for exceptional children, those of normal intelligence with special disabilities in school, will be again conducted in connection with the summer session from June 20 to July 29. The school was started ten years ago by the late Dr. B. W. DeBusk as an experimental and practical training ground for student teachers and grew into a permanent organization.

The clinic is one of the few on the coast and attracts children from Washington and California. It will be directed by Dr. Elizabeth Montgomery, student of Dr. DeBusk. She will be assisted this year by Dr. S. C. Gribble, professor of education at Washington University at St. Louis, and Miss Lillian Rayner of the Los Angeles public school system.

## Edison Marshall Contest

Winner of the Edison Marshall short story contest for this year was George Stephenson, junior from Eugene. His story, "Boy in the Wind," won the first award of \$50. Second prize of \$25 went to Walter Wood, Boise, Idaho; and honorable mention was given to Martha Stewart of Eugene.

W. F. G. Thacher, professor of English and director of the contest, has announced that next year the contest will be renamed the Marshall-Case-Haycox contest in honor of Edison Marshall, ex-'17; Robert Ormond Case, '20; and Ernest Haycox, '23. All three of these men have gained wide prominence in the field of fiction writing. The first prize award will be boosted to \$100.

## 4 Accepted for Cadetship

Four Oregon students have successfully passed the tests for flying cadetships and one-year training at Randolph Field, the army flying school. The students appointed will leave about July 1 to report to the school and at the conclusion of a year's training be released as qualified pilots.

The Oregon students chosen were Robert Beard, Dale Lasselle, Arthur Murphy, and Ronald Grunseth.

## Summer School Faculty

Dr. Hans von Hentig, former dean of law at the University of Kiel in Germany, will be one of the many visiting instructors at the University of Oregon summer session beginning June 20 until July 29, according to Dr. Dan Clark, assistant director of summer session and general extension. Dr. von Hentig will teach a course in sociology besides several law classes.

Dr. Louis R. Burnett, head of physical education in the city schools of Baltimore, will teach physical education.

A campus visitor recently was Ralph H. Lyman, former dean of the University of Oregon School of Music. Mr. Lyman was here with the Pomona College glee club, which he has directed since he left the University in 1917.

## Mrs. Spaulding in Recital

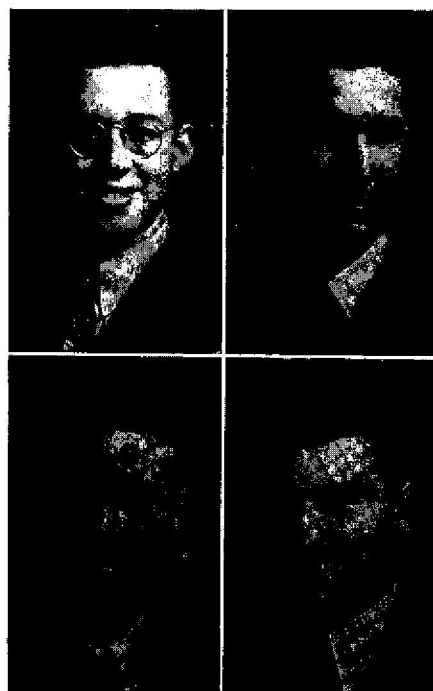
## Nash Wins Hilton Prize

## Summer School Courses

Dr. Hans von Hentig, eminent European penologist from the University of Kiel in Germany, will be among the visiting professors on the University campus during the 1938 summer session.

A new course will be offered in speech pathology, with the cooperation of the speech clinic of the school of education. The class will become a regular course next year.

One of the consistently popular courses is that in athletic coaching, to be taught this summer by Oregon's new mentor, "Tex" Oliver. The class is given for high school coaches.

Art fellowships will be awarded to supervisors and teachers in the West for the ninth year, under the Carnegie grant. In the past years Harvard and the University of Oregon have been the only schools in the nation to offer these Carnegie fellowships.

# Supplementary Funds Sought by Board

Supplementary funds totaling \$595,000 will be required to operate with reasonable efficiency the several institutions of the Oregon State System of Higher Education during the 1939-1940 biennium, Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter told members of the Legislative Interim Commission on State and Local Revenues at a recent meeting in Salem.

The need for these supplementary funds in addition to the regular millage and continuing appropriations for higher education is occasioned by the following situations:

1. Appropriations for the present biennium provided funds to restore salaries for only 18 months of the current biennium and, as a result, restoration for staff members of higher educational institutions was deferred to July 1, 1937, while salaries for other state divisions were restored on March 1, 1937. To provide restoration for the full 24 months of the next biennium will require an additional sum of \$195,000.

2. For the replacement of obsolete instructional equipment and for repairs to buildings which have been deferred for a period of seven years, since 1930, a sum of \$200,000 for the biennium is required.

3. To care for increased enrollment, which has mounted almost 60 per cent since the year 1933, a supplemental appropriation of \$200,000 is necessary.

The Chancellor pointed out that enrollment is now at the highest point in history. It is 10% higher than the previous peak, in the biennium 1929-30, while state appropriations for higher education have decreased 15 per cent since the biennium 1929-1930. If the needed supplementary funds, amounting to \$595,000, are made available for the next biennium, total state appropriations for higher education will still be less by \$332,417, or 5.5 per cent, than the appropriations for the biennium 1929-1930.

The budget for the current fiscal year, ending June 30, 1938, shows the following distribution of state funds by functions:

It is to be noted that the major proportion of the funds go into instructional costs (principally salaries) with a maximum of direct benefits to the students. Administrative costs, including the expenses of the president's offices of the five institutions and the Chancellor's and Board's offices, amount to only 2.7 per cent of the total budget. Since 1930-31 the cost of administrative and service divisions has been reduced approximately \$70,000 per year, or 25 per cent. Additional savings through the elimination of unnecessary duplication have amounted to \$55,000 per year. It is only through these economies that it has been possible to maintain reasonably efficient standards of instruction in the face of constantly mounting enrollment and the lagging of funds for operation.

Evidence of the need for additional teaching staff is found in the fact that the present teaching force is about equal to the staff employed when there were 8,000 students on the campuses of the several institutions, whereas at the present time, there are approximately 10,000. As a result, teaching loads are excessive in many departments and the shortage of funds makes it necessary to assign graduate assistants and teaching fellows to classes that should be taught by experienced staff members.

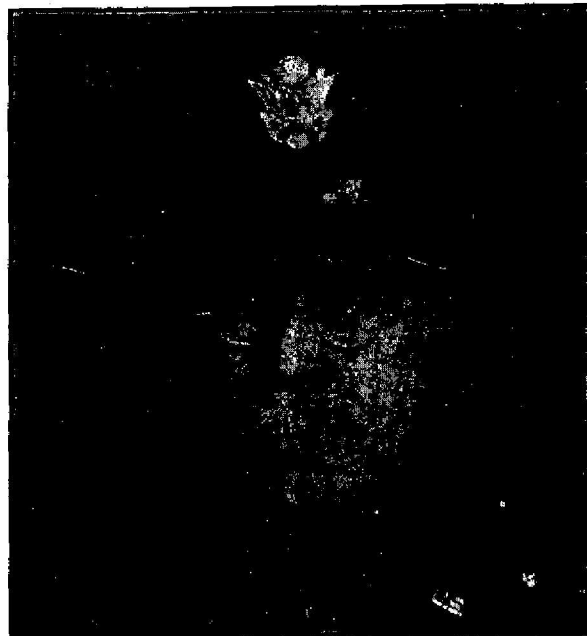
In a report to the State Board of Higher Education, Dr. Hunter indicated that it would be unwise to attempt to

raise part of the needed funds by an increase in student fees. Students in Oregon schools are now paying a higher resident fee than is charged in any Western state institution. The average for the Western state institutions is \$54.16 per year, as compared with Oregon's fee of \$85.50. Dr. Hunter also emphasized the fact that 70 per cent of the students in the State System are wholly or partially self-supporting, and about 15 per cent of the entire student body have received loans from the institutional loan funds. These facts indicate that Oregon's institutions are attended by students who are struggling against economic difficulties to secure an education and any increase in fees would cause much hardship and, in many instances, abandonment of higher educational training.

## Colonel Murphy Retires

Colonel E. V. D. Murphy, for four years chief of the University ROTC unit, has announced that he will retire at the end of this school year. Colonel Murphy is 64 years of age and has been active in army service for 40 years.

He will be succeeded by Colonel Robert M. Lyon. Colonel Lyon is now in Hawaii and will report here some time next year. He was in the English department of the U. S. Military Academy for twelve years.

# Ducks Sweep Three Way Relay Meet

Bill Hayward's varsity track team showed considerable strength in its running events and revealed the capabilities of its men in the relays held on Hayward field October 16 when the Webfoot cindermen defeated the Beaver and University of Portland track men. Oregon took firsts in all but one event, the high jump.

The score was: Oregon, 38; Oregon State, 19, and Portland, 10.

Two meet records were broken by the Webfoots in their clean-up. One was the 880-yard relay team of Jim Buck, Dean Ellis, Jimmy Schriver, and Mack Robinson which cut nine tenths of a second off the old mark of 1:28.2 to finish in 1:27.3. In the mile relay the Webfoots, Buck, Schriver, Storli, and Robinson, negotiated the distance in 3:21.1. The old mark was 3:23.4.

Mack Robinson, 1936 Berlin Olympics star, was the hero of the meet. In the 440-yard relay he put on a thrilling performance when in the final 110-yard leg of the race he overcame a six-yard lead to win by inches. In the 880-yard relay he overcame a three-yard lead to win the anchor lap by several strides, and in the mile relay he ran his quarter in 49.6.

Kirman Storli, sophomore, made another burning finish in the two-mile race in his half mile when he overcame a 50-yard lead and finished first by inches.

The Oregon team of Harry Weston, Jim Eacutt, Bob Goodfellow, and Bob Hochuli won the shuttel high hurdle relay, and Bob Mitchell, Crawford Lyle, John Davidson, and Don Barker won the four mile relay by a strong 140 yards.

Clyde Walker, former state high school shot put champion, returning to compete under the Oregon colors after a year's layoff, tossed the 16-pound ball 44 feet, 8 inches to win the shot put relay which the Oregon team of Captain Leonard "Dutch" Holland, Walker, Bill Rach, and Willard Harris won by a combined distance of 169 feet, 6½ inches.

Robinson showed his superior broad-jumping ability at the Hill Military academy indoor relays at the Portland Livestock pavilion two weeks earlier by leaping the distance of 24 feet 1 inch. He also gave Oregon a substantial lead in mile relay that evening but the team lost to Oregon State.

George Varoff tied with Cornelius Warmerdam for second place in the

pole vault at a height of 14 feet. Earl Meadows of Southern California won the vault at a height of 14 feet 3 inches.

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## Varsity Golf

The Webfoot golf team defeated the Washington divoteers 18 to 9 on the Eugene Country Club course in their first conference match of the season. Ben Hughes, sophomore number four man won medal honors with a card of 73, one over par. Shelby Golden, Hughes, Kirk Eldridges, and Lou Cook won singles matches.

On April 22 and 23, the six-man Webfoots will invade College of Puget Sound and University of Washington. The team will be chosen from number one Dwight "Doc" Near, coach-captain Walt Cline, Bill Watson, Shelby Golden, Ben Hughes, Kirk Eldridge, and Lou Cook.

A couple of weeks ago the varsity won from the Frosh divoteers 20 to 7. Ruth Tustin, of Los Angeles, who is trying for a position on the Duckling team, shot an 86. Later the Frosh defeated Eugene, University and Albany high schools by chalking up 27 points while Eugene high, in second place, scored 23.

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## Spring Football

"Tex" Oliver, Oregon's new football coach, is well into his task of teaching Oregon teams a new brand of football. Among the changes he has made is the introduction of the metronome to develop a sense of rhythm in the men in their shifts.

At the present time some of the outstanding men on the squad seem to be Ted Gebhardt, Hank Nilsen, Paul Rowe, and Steve Anderson, backs; Rod Speetzen, John Yerby, Len Robertson, Merle Peters, Elroy Jensen, Nello Giovanini, Cece Walden and Jim Cadenassa, linemen. All but Cadenassa are lettermen.

A game between the current Webfoot gridders and a team of ex-Webfoot all-stars is being planned for the latter part of spring term. Tony Amato, captain of last fall's Oregon team and Stan Riordan, ace punter of two years ago, are assembling and drawing up the strategy for the all-stars. This will be the first Webfoot vs. ex-Webfoot grid game since 1933 and 1934 when Mike Mikulak, present

backfield coach, led his "has-beens" against the Ducks and won both times.

Those men who will probably play are: Vern Moore, Amato, Riordan, Don Kennedy, Chan Berry, Del Bjork, Ross Carter, Dale Lasselle, Chuck Bracher, Jerry Donnell, Romey DePittard, Joe Huston, and Ned Simpson. Also Pete Barbur, former player for UCLA who is now attending Oregon, will play as may Irving Schulz, captain of the 1931 team.

The Oregon-Oregon State game will be played in Portland November 26 next year instead of in Corvallis as planned previously. The Webfoots will have a busy schedule of seven full weekends next year. The longest journey will be from Eugene to Stanford, then from Stanford to New York City to play Fordham on October 22, and then back to Portland to play Southern California in the Multnomah stadium the following weekend.

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## Ducks Take Tennis Match

In three successive matches the Webfoot tennis team defeated Oregon Normal school, Gonzaga University, and Willamette net teams by 7 to 0 scores.

Paul Washke's crew is considered a strong contender for the northern division title now held by Oregon State.

The first match had was held on the Igloo and the new men's gym floors because of the rain. Larry Crane, Les Werschkul, Ellsworth Ellis, Bill Zimmerman, and Karl Mann won their singles matches in the games.

The Frosh tennis team lost to Grant high school 3 to 4 in their opener.

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## Rifle Team

The Oregon rifle team nosed out the Washington shooters to win second place in the second stage of the ninth corps area intercollegiate shooting contest. At the present time WSC leads with 3884 points, Oregon follows with 3857, and Washington is third with 3830. The team winning in the ninth corps area will compete in the finals for the national championship.

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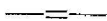

C.; either Wayne University or Detroit University in Detroit; Bradley Tech, Peoria, Illinois; Doc Spears' University of Toledo team in Ohio; Creighton at Omaha, and Stanford at San Francisco.

Bob Anet, dynamic guard on the Webfoot championship basketball team, was named honorary captain of the 1938 team at a banquet given the traveling squad by Coach and Mrs. Howard Hobson. Anet acted as floor captain in the recent season.

At the dinner an all opponent team was chosen of Belko, Idaho, and Chase, W. S. C., forwards; Kosich, W. S. C., center; and Al Hooper, W. S. C., and Ziegenfuss, Washington, guards.



## Varsity Baseball

The Webfoot varsity baseball team, the northern division champions in 1937, started this year's pre-season schedule by winning seven out of eight games.

The Oregon team will run up against great difficulty in retaining its championship this year, with Oregon State and Idaho looming as the strongest threats.

Four newcomers to the 1938 team were released from spring football practice, and consequently three hard-hitting outfielders, Jimmy Nicholson, John Yerby, and Bob Smith, are working out on the diamond, and Cece Walden, sturdy guard on the grid team, will try for the catcher's job.

The pitching staff of the team was greatly weakened when Bill Marshall, letterman hurler, was declared ineligible under the three-year rule. Bob Creighton, John Linde, Paul Thunemann, LeRoy Mattingly, and Bob Hardy, have handled mound assignments during the pre-season games.

Most significant in these pre-season activities of Coach Howard Hobson's crew of diamond men were their three victories (5-3, 9-5, and 6-0) over the Willamette University Bearcats. More difficult were the first wins taken from the Portland Pilots, 5-4, and the Linfield Wildcats, 10-9.

In the second games Oregon beat Linfield 12-6 and dropped one 5-2 to the Pilots.

The single loss to Portland came in the second game of the season after the Ducks had won a ninth-inning homer in the opener on Howe diamond the day before.

Bob Creighton, right-hand hurler who transferred from Marin Junior College, won the opening game in which the Webfoots defeated the Pilots 5 to 4, when he allowed but one run in the last five innings in which he worked on the mound but also, in the last of the ninth, when he was the first man up, he broke a 4 to 4 tie by poling out a homer which won the game.

Rain hampered this game. A recess of 25 minutes was held after the third inning.

On April 15 Oregon again defeated Willamette, 6 to 0, at Eugene. Bob Creighton on the mound only allowed two hits with his curve ball. Only four Bearcats reached first and there were no walks. In the first inning rangy Quinn smacked a home run to drive in Mullen and Coleman.

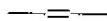

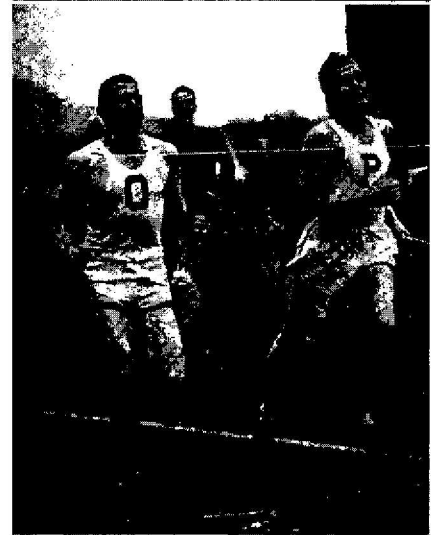

Then the Ducklings defeated Lebanon high 15 to 0 and 4 to 1 in a double header. In the first game Bob Rieder of Lincoln high and Pete Igoe of Eugene high divided the mound duties to pitch a no hit, no run game.

Later the Frosh defeated Lebanon again, this time 15 to 1 and 11 to 2. Bob Rieder allowed three hits. The Warren men took Lincoln 7 to 6 in Portland when Herb Hamer banged a ninth inning single which scored Igoe. Then Jefferson came down to Eugene and nicked Lanny Allegretto to win 7 to 2, but in the next game Rieder allowed but 5 hits and the Ducklings won 8 to 3.

Other players who played in these games were Jim Rathbun, catcher from Washington high (Portland); Elmer Mallory, shortstop from Junction City; Jack Shimshak, infielder from Grant high; and Jack Yoshitomi, right fielder from Milwaukie.

### Ski Team

The University of Oregon ski team won the Oregon intercollegiate ski championship by earning a 300 to 282 victory over Reed college on the slopes of Mt. Hood. Oregon men who placed were Walt Wood, Pat Dolin, Ralph Lafferty, and Jim Mackie.

Dear School Mates:

Just a little communication of a little event which will prove to you the value of an Oregon training, and the great advantage of being a Webfoot.

On Sunday, March 12 I was forced to take a trip from Bakersfield to Santa Barbara. Since we had a little "Oregon Mist" in California for a few weeks, most of the roads were under water.

I had to cross from San Fernando to Ventura Boulevard via Sepulveda Boulevard. The road for a distance of about three miles was completely under water, with only some railroad tracks sticking out near the highway as a guide.
