Dear Elmer:

You will be glad to learn, in case you do not receive an official letter from the secretary, that the Honolulu University of Oregon Alumni Association held its meeting at Lau Yee Chai's Chinese restaurant in Waikiki, Friday, February 10th. Eddie Vail led the assembled group of about 40 in a lusty Oregon Varsity-Varsity, with Bill Sievers as songmaster leading off with "As I Sit and Dream at Evening." I want to say that if the other alumni clubs sing this song any better than the Honolulu crowd they will have to go some.

Then followed a delicious repast of various Chinese foods. I won't attempt to name them from memory and since I haven't the menu card by me, just skip the details. Anyway, we finished up with candied kumquats, candied squash and thin shreds of delicious candied coconut. Tea was served in the usual Chinese manner in small tea bowls.

This place, by the way, is typically Chinese with a wide, down-sloping pagoda-like roof whose curved eave points are supported by ornamented pillars in front of which sit a pair of carved stone dogs. The somewhat ornate exterior is matched by the exquisite wall decorations of the interior which contains a small rock mountain in the center of a goldfish and frog pond from which are extracted now and again, large croakers, the legs of which we may deduce find their way into Lau Yee Chai's skillets. A small, tiled dance floor provides a place for the modern "jitterbuggers" while the corridors and dining rooms are adequately furnished with tables, chairs and screens for dinner parties.

After our dinner plates had been cleared away, various introductions and talks were made under the able direction of Marshall Wright, president. Since Mrs. Lomax and I were the latest arrivals from the alma mater's campus, we collectively recounted for the edification of most of the members present, news of the splendid building program which is being consummated at the University, of President Erb, the Dad's Club, and other current items which had been gleaned from the Emerald and the Eugene Guard. Many questions were asked about Dean Gilbert, Mr. Douglass, Dr. Schmidt and other faculty members known to the various alumni present, and of plans for the future.

Of particular importance was the appointment of a committee to work out a plan so that Hawaiian high school students who desired to further their education in the mainland might know more of the University of Oregon. It was pointed out that at present they know only the California institutions or those farther east. Mrs. Restarick suggested that the Oregoniana be sent to the principal Honolulu high schools, and if possible to some of the other larger high schools of the Territory such as at Hilo, and pointed out she knew that the lone copy of one of the California university yearbooks, was thumbled black and ragged from use. Correspondence with Marshall Wright will facilitate the consummation of this plan.

Another opportunity open to the alumni association lies in giving information

to University of Hawaii students who might desire to do part of their undergraduate work on the mainland or to engage in graduate work there.

You should be hearing from this alumni group shortly on the within mentioned matters—I hope. Judging from the serious discussion which ensued I believe the committee will actually function.

## Portland Alumni Honor Hayward

More than 500 Oregon alumni turned out in Portland on March 30 for the annual banquet meeting of the Portland Alumni association held in the Portland hotel.

The meeting, originally scheduled for March 16, was postponed because of a conflict with the dates of the play-offs with California for the Pacific Coast basketball championships which were held in Eugene on that day.

The main purpose of the meeting was to honor Colonel "Bill" Hayward, who starts his 36th year as track coach at the University of Oregon. Because the Oregon team was returning from the play-offs with Ohio State that day, they were honored guests at the dinner.

Chester A. Fee, '16, member of Colonel Bill's famous "two-man track team" of Fee and "Moose" Muirhead, ex-'18, reviewed Bill's long career with the University and expressed the love and affection that all Oregon alumni feel for "Bill." He said, "As long as there is a University of Oregon there will be the legend of Bill Hayward." Mr. Fee then presented Bill with a silver plaque listing the names of the all-time Bill Hayward track team. It gave the events and the best times his athletes had ever made. In the center of the plaque was an Olympic shield in full color with an inset picture of Hayward etched into the metal.

Deeply touched by the presentation, Hayward spoke to the group of his past with the University of Oregon. He told them "I am an old man—in experience only," and then proceeded to outline his plans for the future with the University.

### Hunter Speaks

Principal speaker of the evening was Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter of the State Board of Higher Education, who explained that he was "pinch-hitting" for President Donald M. Erb, who was confined to his home by illness. Dr. Hunter praised Bill Hayward as Oregon's "incomparable sportsman and leader of men." Dr. Hunter also reviewed the cultural accomplishments of the University in the past year.

Joining in to praise Bill was Edgar W. Smith, ex-'09, who is now a member of the State Board of Higher

Education, and Don Lash, famous Olympic runner, who came West to pay tribute to the great track coach.

Roland Davis, '28, president of the Portland Alumni association, gave a report of the activities of the group through the past year and called for the report of the nominating committee. Ward Cook, '27, gave the report of the nominating committee in the absence of Dr. Blair Holcomb, ex-'17, chairman of the committee. Ann Wentworth Staley, '28, also served on the committee.

### Davis Reelected

The meeting cast an unanimous ballot for the slate of officers proposed by the committee: Roland Davis, '28, president; Dr. Merle Margason, '20, M.D. '23, vice-president; Alice Douglas Burns, '28, secretary; and Kelsey Slocum, ex-'32, treasurer.

The entire day of March 30 was University of Oregon day in Portland. The returning Oregon National Basketball Champions were greeted by a crowd of 1500 admirers at the Union


Station and were the center of a rally held there. They were interviewed over radio station KOIN and escorted to the center of town. In the afternoon a parade was held in Portland in their honor and the group paraded through the streets, where the event was broadcast over radio station KEX. Parts of the banquet were also broadcast over station KEX.

Oregon alumni working on the various committees for the day's events included:



# Dr. Osgood's Research Praised

In a paper which he presented to the American College of Physicians when that group met in New Orleans in March, Dr. Edwin E. Osgood, B.A. '22, M.A. '23, M.D. '24, reported that he had developed a process for growing human bone marrow in a test-tube.

Dr. Osgood developed this technique in collaboration with George J. Bracher, '31, M.D. '34, at the University of Oregon Medical school in Portland, where Dr. Osgood is a member of the faculty.

With the bone-marrow grown in the laboratory, Dr. Osgood is able to determine the exact radiation needed to check the growth of leukemia—commonly known as blood cancer. An individual culture can be made for each case to determine the radiation needed to check the growth. This will minimize the danger of over-radiation.

This valuable discovery was declared by many of the physicians present at the meeting as the basis of a new approach to the treatment of malignant diseases.

Dr. Osgood is assistant professor of Medicine and Biochemistry and is director of the laboratories of the Medical school.

## William A. Dill, '08

William Adelbert Dill, '08, 57, a graduate of Oregon and former resident of Eugene, died February 8, 1939, at his home in Lawrence, Kansas, after a heart attack. He had been ill since January 21.

Mr. Dill had served as associate professor of journalism and director of publicity at Kansas university since 1921. He was graduated with a BA degree from Oregon in 1908 and received his master of arts degree from Kansas university in 1928.

Professor Dill's death ended a long newspaper career. He was successively news editor of the Eugene Morning Register, editor of the Lane County News at Springfield, copyreader of the Portland Oregonian, journalism instructor at Kansas, and night manager in the Chicago AP office.

## Bishop Sings on Campus

George Bishop, '33, returned to the campus in February to be featured soloist with the Eugene Gleemen in their annual concert. Mr. Bishop is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. After leaving the University he went to Chicago for special musical study and has gained a wide reputation as a tenor.

## Women Show Men Up

Campus women passed the men up in recent grade averages announced by the registrar's office. The average male on the campus had only a 2.220 average to show for his fairer companion's 2.438.

Girls in cooperative living organizations topped the averages with 2.665. Following in order were: non-organization women, 2.472; men's cooperatives, 2.445; dormitory women, 2.427; sorority women, 2.391; non-organization men, 2.262; dormitory men, 2.260; and fraternity men, 2.147.

## Edgar Bohlman

Edgar Bohlman, '26, is now exhibiting his art works in the Sterner galleries in New York city. Mr. Bohlman is a graduate of the art school and did his painting work under Maude Kerns. His particular fields of interest have been theater design and costuming and he has done much work for the Theater Arts Guild. Mr. Bohlman is a member of Chi Psi lodge.

## Allen Named Editor

S. Eugene Allen, '36, has been elected editor of the Oregon Labor Press, official A. F. of L. news organ for the state of Oregon. Allen is a graduate of the school of business administration. While in college he worked on the Ore-


gon Daily Emerald and directed a school program which was broadcast locally. Mrs. Allen is the former Doris Gettmann, '36.

## Enrollment Hits New High

For the sixth consecutive term enrollment at the University of Oregon set a new all-time high when more than 3000 students registered for the spring term this year. Highest previous spring term enrollment has never reached 2900.

Laurence E. Tomlinson, ex-'30, who received his bachelor's degree in library science at George Washington university last February, is the author of "Gutenberg and the Invention of Printing," which has just been published. One of the radio series "The Road to Freedom," sponsored by the Washington Evening Star, was based on Gutenberg's life as presented by Tomlinson. Mr. Tomlinson is a member of the University of Oregon chapter of Phi Delta Theta.

to return to Eugene and were met with huge rally groups at both Salem and Albany. In Salem, Governor Charles A. Sprague expressed the appreciation of the people of the state for the splendid showing of the team.

In Eugene the biggest rally in the history of the city greeted the returning champions. The University, the town business houses, and the Eugene city schools were all closed and 15,000 loyal fans crowded the depot and yards of the railroad to greet the boys. The gang was paraded through town to the campus, where a student rally was held. Classes were dismissed for the rest of the day and a rally dance was held all afternoon in the open-air tennis courts in back of law school.

In the evening the Monday Morning Quarterbacks, University boosters in Eugene, honored the champions with a banquet in John Straub hall. Honoring the team were Willard L. Marks and Charles A. Brand, members of the State Board of Higher Education, and President Donald M. Erb.

## Marks Praises Team

Marks praised the team as a group that wasn't content to be "just a good team, or a better team, but had to be the best." Dr. Erb told the group that the school could well be proud of its basketball team. He said that in a day when intercollegiate athletics are under a great deal of criticism for "over-emphasis" that they could well be defended when a team such as the Webfoots could set "a standard of excellence" for the entire student body of the University to measure up to.

Coach Howard Hobson spoke at length on the record of his team for the past three years and then introduced each of the boys, who spoke briefly to the group.

# Oregon Basketeers National Champs

The University of Oregon Webfeet wound up a three-year record by winning the first National Intercollegiate Basketball championship by taking a strong Ohio State team by a 46 to 33 score. The Ohio State team had previously won the right to represent the Eastern section of the country by winning a play-off series similar to those won by Oregon when the Ducks defeated Texas 56 to 41 and Oklahoma 55 to 37.

Captain Bobby Anet was the pacesetter for the Oregon boys in their hotly contested game with Ohio State, and filled the dual role of scorer and "feeder" as well as being a powerhouse of defense. John Dick scored 13 points to make a total of 62 points in the five championship games (two California, Texas, Oklahoma, and Ohio State). The mighty Texas team was held to only one field goal in the first twelve minutes of play at Treasure Island when the Oregon Webfeet met with them in the first of two elimination games to determine which team would represent the West in the NCAA finals

in Evanston, Ill. The Oregon boys had a slim 19 to 16 lead at half-time but put on the heat in the second half to win by a fifteen-point margin—56 to 41. Big "Slim" Wintermute canned 14 points to lead in the scoring honors. Johansen and John Dick made particularly good showings in this game.

## Oregon 55, Oklahoma 37

After trouncing Texas, the Oregon squad met the University of Oklahoma at Treasure Island. The Oklahoma team had previously won from Utah State to earn the chance to meet Oregon. It was Oregon's fourth championship game in four days and the Ducks were slow in starting. After taking an early lead, the Ducks twice fell behind the Oklahoma boys. With four and a half minutes left to play in the first half the score stood Oklahoma 14, Oregon 11. Under pressure, the Oregon team scored seven points in the four minutes to take the half-time lead of Oregon 21, Oklahoma 14. The Oklahoma team never got within scoring distance again.

Following this game, Phog Allen, famous Kansas coach, announced the all-regional team. Laddie Gale, "Slim" Wintermute, and John Dick from Oregon were named on the first squad and Wally Johansen was named on the second squad.



Wintermute missed another gift throw, then Hull came back a moment later for Ohio State to make it 8-7. Laddie Gale came back five seconds later with a quick field goal to give his mates another three-point lead 10-7.

Ohio State called time out at the five-minute mark.

Captain Hull fouled Dick, who converted. Sattler fouled Gale in the act of shooting. Gale converted the first, missed the second. Ohio State took the ball off the backboard and Lynch hit another long shot from midfloor.

Wally Johansen scored from midfloor with 10 minutes left to play in the first half. Score 14 to 7. Johansen scored again on a pass from Bobby Anet; 16 to 7. Johansen broke up an Ohio State play and went down the floor, but Oregon's pass was intercepted at the Ducks' break down the floor. Mickelson replaced Sattler at center for Ohio State. Anet took tossup at end of time out. Anet drove in and scored for Oregon, 18 to 11. Captain Hull scored on the next Ohio State break to make it 18 to 13. John Dick fouled Bob Lynch in melee, but Lynch missed. Mickelson fouled Dick. Dick converted, making it 19 to 13.

Boughner replaced Dawson. John Dick scored on a beautiful one-hander. Ohio State came back with Baker scoring, 21 to 16.

Captain Hull broke the ice starting the second with a short basket for two points. Hull scored again, but on the following break down the floor Slim Wintermute scored to make it 25 to 20. 






GALE, forward


JOHANSEN, guard
