The Cover

For many years, Kenneth Shumaker has greeted each freshman with an objective English examination. One out of every five to take the exam stays a term or so with Ken to take remedial work in written English. The now-famous "English K" course helps the entering freshman to increase his vocabulary, speed up his reading, and put his grammar on sound footing.

Back in 1922 Shumaker received his B.A. degree from the University of Iowa. He accepted a post as graduate assistant in the English department under Professor Howe. He accepted because Oregon "was just about as far from Iowa as I could get."

Shortly after his arrival in Eugene, Shumaker began to notice that some of the freshman students—apparently normal in every respect—just couldn't read a page from a book and get anything out of it.

The problem of "what made the students tick" teased him until he began doing research work in this field. The search for the answer led him from literature into psychology, mathematics, and biology. He confesses that he doesn't know what makes them "tick" yet—probably never will.

But many grateful students receiving their diplomas remember Ken Shumaker and what he has done for them. Typical example of the help given in his work is the student—now an Oregon alumnus—who just couldn't seem to read. With the aid of that impressive looking instrument sitting on his desk (it's a tele-binocular), Shumaker discovered that the boy was "changing eyes" as he read. The average person is dominated by either his right or his left eye and does the major portion of his reading with that eye.

This freshman was both left and right eye. He would read a sentence or so with the left eye then change over and read a while with the right eye. Any sense of continuity was entirely broken by this trait.

With the aid of glasses, eye exercises and a competent oculist, the boy was straightened out and proved himself a capable student.

Shumaker probably flunks more students than any other professor on the campus, but they are still his friends. He says the biggest kick of all is seeing some so-called "dumb-bunny" student straightened out then turn around and graduate with honors.

Ken Shumaker received his Master of Arts degree from the University of Oregon in 1932. At the present time he is participating in the Language Arts Investigation under the sponsorship of the General Education Board of the Rockefeller foundation.

Board Seeks Supplementary Funds

Supplementary funds amounting to \$664,355 for the biennium of 1939-40 are needed by the State System of Higher Education to maintain the present services of the system according to Willard L. Marks, president of the board. Specific division of the funds was briefly explained by Mr. Marks in his letter of transmittal that accompanied the biennial report of the state system for 1937-38.

1. Obsolete instructional equipment has greatly hampered much of the educational work of the system. The building and physical equipment of the system has been greatly neglected for the past seven years because of lack of funds. The system will need \$100,000 per year for the biennium to make necessary repairs and replacements which have been postponed during this time.

2. Enrollment at the University has increased 57 per cent since 1933-34 and 11 per cent since 1929-30; the system as a whole has had a 61 per cent increase. To care for this greatly increased burden and provide just the services now rendered will require at least \$100,000 per year for the next two years. This will not allow for the expansion of instruction or services, but will merely provide funds necessary to maintain the present standards.

3. Salary restoration for the state divisions took effect in March, 1937, but had to be postponed in the State System of Higher Education until July, 1937. Even so, the funds appropriated for the present biennium will not permit the continuance of the restoration for the six-month period from January 1, 1939, to July 1, 1939; \$195,000 is needed for this.

4. Federal Cooperative Extension appropriations for field work in agriculture for the state have been cut so that a yearly appropriation of \$34,678 will be needed. This will prevent the loss of expert service to the agricultural sections of the state and the work of the home economics division.

Mr. Marks, long an active supporter of higher education in the state, is directing the task of presenting these urgent needs to the people of the state and the legislature which is now in

session. In December, Mr. Marks sent a letter to the Governor pointing out the needs for additional funds to maintain the institutions.

Administrative Cost Low

He showed that the amount requested for the biennium 1939-40 is actually five per cent less than the 1929-30 appropriations for the separate institutions although enrollment is greatly increased. These savings have been effected through the economies possible under a unified administration. In this same period, the appropriations for the other divisions of the state government have actually increased about 25 per cent. Since the unification, the annual savings in administration have been \$70,000—a 25 per cent reduction.

The expenditures for the system for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938, by functions (see charts on page 8 and page 12).

It can be seen that the major portion of the funds goes directly into instructional work. Administrative expenses are only 2.7 per cent of the total budget. Other expenditures of the system have been pared to meet the existing conditions.

Teaching Load Heavy

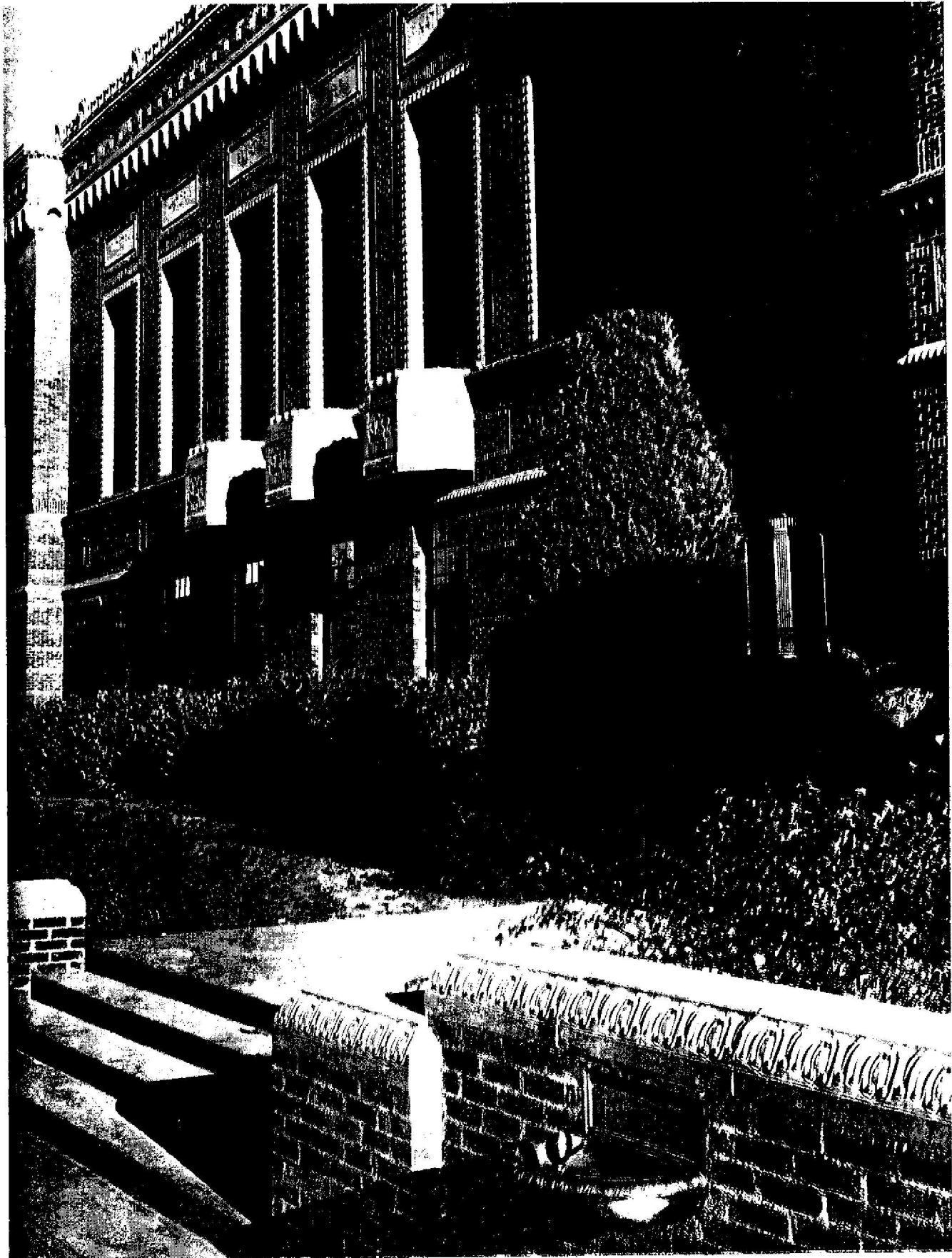
Evidences of the need for additional teaching staff are to be found in the fact that the present teaching staff is approximately the same as the staff employed when there were 8,000 enrolled in all of the schools, whereas at the present time the enrollments have passed 10,000. The result has been excessive teaching loads in many departments, and the shortage of funds has made it necessary to assign graduate assistants and teaching fellows to classes that should be taught by experienced staff members.

A survey made last spring indicates that it would be very unwise to attempt to raise part of the needed funds by an increase in student fees. Students in Oregon schools are now paying a higher resident fee than is charged in any Western state institution. The average for the Western state institutions is \$54.16 per year, as compared with Oregon's fee of \$85.50.

The survey also revealed that 70 per cent of the students in the state system are wholly or partially self-supporting, and about 15 per cent of the entire student body have received loans from the institutional loan funds. At the University alone students earned more than \$200,000 last year. These facts indicate that Oregon's institutions are attended by students who are struggling against economic difficulties to secure an education and any increase in fees would cause much hardship and, in many instances, abandonment of higher educational training.

Edgar W. Smith Named to State Board

Edgar W. Smith, ex-'09, has been named to the State Board of Higher Education to fill the unexpired term of Walter E. Pearson, who became state treasurer. Mr. Smith's appointment has been confirmed by the state senate and he will serve until March 2, 1946.

Mr. Smith was born in Pendleton, Ore., and received his high school education there. He then enrolled in the University, but completed his work at Cornell university. While attending Oregon, Mr. Smith was a charter member of the campus chapter of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

Mr. Smith has served as president of the Portland Alumni group and has been a member of the executive committee of the Oregon Dads. Mrs. Smith is the former Irene Simington, ex-'10. Their son, Edgar, is a member of the class of 1933. Another son, John, is now a sophomore in the University.

After finishing college, Mr. Smith became a wheat rancher, then entered insurance work and was state manager for a large company. He then went to Astoria, where he built the Astoria Flouring company mills and was president of the concern. He also has been assistant manager of the Farmers' National Grain Corporation.

Mr. Smith has been chairman of the state milk control board for several years. He announced his resignation from that group shortly before his confirmation by the senate.

Mr. Smith is a Mason and a Shriner and a member of the University club in Portland.

David Graham Dies

David M. Graham, '05, died of a heart attack at his Eugene home on December 14, 1938. "Dave" Graham was for many years a loyal supporter of the University and a fast friend of many students.

Mr. Graham, who was 58 years old at the time of his death, was born in Washington county on May 17, 1880, and attended high school in Portland.

He was active in student affairs during his undergraduate days and served as treasurer of his freshman class, president of the sophomore class and football in his junior and senior years. He was a charter member of the Oregon chapter of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

Following his graduation in 1905, Mr. Graham was instructor of economics for one year at the University. He then entered the retail shoe business in Eugene and at the time of his death was owner of Graham's Shoe Store. He served as vice-president of the Pacific Northwest Shoe Retailers and was past-president of the Eugene Kiwanis club.

Mr. Graham is survived by his widow, Mildred Bagley Graham, '12; a son, William, now a sophomore in the University; and a daughter, Linden.

Construction Work

Construction work on Oregon's new \$165,000 Humanities building is now under way. Excavation work is nearly completed and actual building construction is scheduled to start shortly.

Original plans for the building called for a \$110,000 plant, but added facilities made it necessary to apply for more money. Result was a \$91,000 WPA loan and a \$74,000 PWA grant.

The Humanities building is another step toward the completion of the long-planned University mall with the new library at the hand and the sides formed by the Murray-Warner museum and Condon hall and the new Humanities building. The new building is to be on 13th street, facing Condon hall. The two buildings will be very similar.

Ground floor of the building will be given over to the University Cooperative bookstore. The \$66,000 loan will be partially retired with revenue from the rent paid by the Coop. The second floor will house liberal arts with lecture rooms, offices, and classrooms for English. The third floor will be turned

over into a specially designed home economics laboratory. There will be a complete suite of rooms, including bedrooms, kitchens, and bath. This will be used for practical demonstration work in home economics.

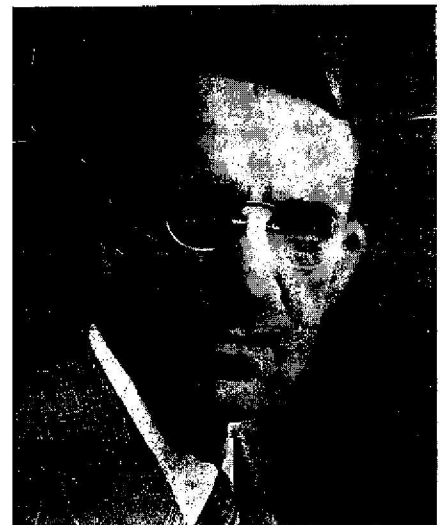
Another construction project now under way is the reconstruction work going on at Hayward field. A grant of \$18,300 and athletic board funds of \$22,400 have made it possible to enlarge the seating capacity of the field to 17,500. The west grandstands are to be entirely rebuilt and repainted and modern plumbing arrangements made. A new press-box with the front glassed in and direct telephone communication system; a separate radio room and a coach observing room are included in the plans.

The east grandstands are to be extended 45 feet south to eliminate the old bleacher section.

First Citizen

Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, former president and present dean of arts and letters at the University, was named "Eugene's First Citizen for 1938" by the Eugene Realty Board. A large banquet was given in his honor during the early part of January.

Dr. Boyer came to the University in 1926 from Illinois to head the English department. He was appointed to the presidency in 1934 and resigned March 1, 1938. He is now dean and director of the college of arts and letters and head of the English department.

Winter Enrollment Up 5.3 Per Cent

Registering a 5.3 per cent gain over winter term of 1938, winter term enrollment at the University showed increases for the fifth consecutive year. As always, the Sophomore class showed heaviest registration with 1145 members. The Junior class was low with 339 registered. The professional group showed a loss of five per cent for the only decline.

The school of Arts and Letters gained 16 per cent and the Education school was up 14 per cent followed by Physical Education with 11 per cent jump. Journalism and law showed the only losses. Journalism, because of stricter entrance standards, dropped 12 per cent and Law four per cent.

There are 19 men on the campus to every 11 women, the breakdown indicates. Complete figures below.

Jay Upton

Jay H. Upton, '02, died December 30, 1938, as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident on the Mount Hood highway.

Mr. Upton was born in Colfax, Washington territory, on April 28, 1879. His family moved very shortly to Portland, where he received a greater part of his education. At the outbreak of the Spanish-American war in April, 1898, Mr. Upton enlisted in Company H, 2d Oregon volunteer infantry, and was sent to the Philippines immediately.

Following the war, Mr. Upton enrolled in the University of Oregon law school, then in Portland, and received his Bachelor of Laws degree in 1902. He practiced in Portland until 1912,

when he moved to Prineville. He stayed there until 1923 when he moved to Bend, where he had made his home since.

Mr. Upton was active in Republican party work in Oregon. He served in the state house of representatives from 1912 to 1914 and in the senate from 1921 to 1934. He was president of the senate in 1923 and 1924. He was unsuccessful in the primary contest for governor in 1926. In 1934 he was nominated for congress, but lost in the general election.

He is survived by his widow, the former Maude Joyce Cannon.

Broadcasts Continue

Regular broadcasts from the University campus have been made over the state-owned radio station, KOAC, for the past school year. Direct wire broadcasts are made from the studios in the music building. All schools on the campus cooperate in the venture and are presenting programs. The music school is particularly active and student artists may be heard every day.

Physical Education Head

Miss Janet Woodruff, assistant professor of physical education, has been named president of the Oregon State Association for Health, Recreation and Physical Education. Earl Vossen, '35, was elected vice-president at the same time.

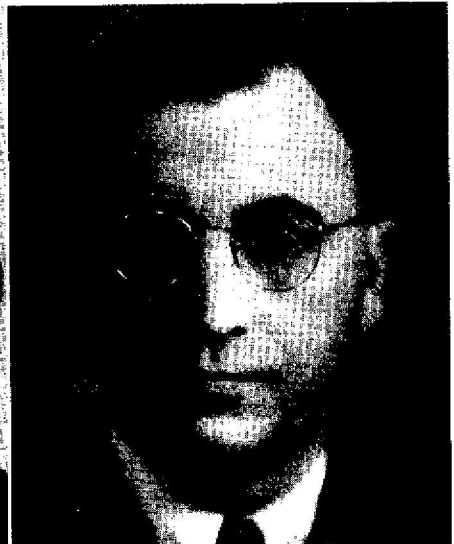

Duck Basketeers Win Six, Lose One

The Oregon Ducks made a clean sweep of their road trip to the Inland Empire by defeating Washington State, 56 to 44; 57 to 31. Then they went to Moscow to take the Idaho Vandals, 39 to 30 and 35 to 31. Gale found himself to score 57 points in the four games for a game average of 14 $\frac{1}{4}$ points.

With 7000 miles of railroad track behind them, the Oregon Ducks split their opening series with the Washington State Cougars, 46-35, 34-39, then traveled 42 miles north to take the Oregon State Beavers, 31-26.

The opening game was really decided in the opening minutes of play when Bobby Anet, Slim Wintermute and Laddie Gale ganged up to slip in seven points before the Cougars connected. Half-time score stood at 23 to 12 for Oregon.

"Slim" Wintermute was off to the races to score 18 points during the course of the game. High scoring Laddie Gale was held to five points by the effective blanketing of John Kosich of the Cougar gang.

The second game score, Oregon 34, Washington State 39, raised the cry of "The long road trip did it!" Others are inclined to think that it was just a good, old fashioned "off" night for the Webfoots. "Hobby" Hobson, according to one sports columnist, blamed the loss to worry. Washington State had assumed the lead at half-time, 14 to 10, and the boys started worrying about catching up instead of going out after the points in the usual manner. The Cougars pulled a fast one on the Webfoots and sent "Bud" Olson, their sensational Sophomore, into the keyhole—the Cougars garnered eight field goals from keyhole plays.

Bob Hardy, back into varsity play after "sitting out" the 1938 season because of a broken ankle, led the Oregon scoring with eight points. Laddie Gale was again held to five points.

The Ducks and the Beavers played a tight zone-defense game when they met in the Beavers cracker-box gym with the usual ring-around-the-rosy play waiting for chances to shoot. The half-time gun stopped the boys with the Webfoots ahead on an 11-10 score.

After four and a half minutes of second half play, the Oregon boys had run up a 21 to 11 lead. A spurt by the Beavers brought the score back to 28 to 26 for the Oregon boys.

The game followed the accepted course of the "civil wars" with three or four players on the floor most of the time. Forty fouls were called—21 on the Orange and 19 for the Lemon Yellow.

Gale found himself after a slow start in the two opening games and led Oregon scoring with 12 points. Wintermute collected eight points.

A road trip to the Inland Empire to meet Washington State and Idaho faces the Webfeet next.

Scoring for the first three conference games ran: Wintermute, 33; Gale, 22; Johansen, 19; Hardy, 13.

Seven wins and three defeats were brought home by the Webfeet at the conclusion of their 22-day barnstorming trip which included the season's opener at famed Madison Square Garden in New York city. It was the tough one to lose—Oregon 36, College City 38. Bradley Tech of Peoria and Stanford at Palo Alto were the only other defeats. The Bradleys completely routed Oregon, 52 to 39, while the Cardinals barely squeezed a 50 to 46 victory from the weary Ducks, who were on their last lap home.

Three Oregon players were named on last year's northern division all-star team and two on the all-Pacific coast. Laddie Gale, forward, and Wally Johansen, guard, earned spots on both mythical selections, while Slim Wintermute, center, was voted the Northwest's outstanding center.

Gale, the coast's high scorer last season, was picked by Stanford's Hank Luisetti as one of the five outstanding players he had opposed in his three years of play. Others were John Ball, U.C.L.A.; Chuck Wagner, University

of Washington; Shields, Temple, and Mersener, Long Island University.

Four players will start their fourth season together this winter. They are Laddie Gale, Slim Wintermute, Wally Johansen and Bob Anet. In their three seasons of play Oregon has won 73 games and lost only 18. As freshmen they won 24, lost one; as sophomores, they won 22, lost nine, and last season won 25, lost eight.

Stanford University players, following the 1938 play-off series for the coast championship, voted Oregon the toughest opponent met all year. Coach John Bunn went further to state, "Stanford played the best games in three years to win. Oregon was by far the outstanding northern division team faced in that time.

In the 1937-38 season Oregon scored 1652 points, or 50.6 per game, against 1226, or 36.9 per game, for opponents.

The 1937-38 freshman team, undefeated in regular competition, from which come several outstanding varsity candidates, was regarded as one of the finest in Oregon history and comparable to the 1936 yearling crew which now forms the varsity.

All of Oregon's eight defeats the past season came on long road trips. The Webfoots won 24 home games. Their longest winning streak was 14 at the start of the season.

In the past two years Oregon has not lost a basketball series to any northwest opponent. Of nine series played six were won and three tied.

Although preferring to confine his activities to working the ball, Anet scored 178 points last season. He was by all odds the most colorful and popular player in the conference. A senior.

ANDREWS, GEORGE (Porky), is one of few Canadians ever to win a place on a coast basketball squad. As regular guard on the freshman team last winter Andrews showed ability

DICK, JOHN, broke into the varsity lineup last season as a sophomore when Silver and Hardy, regulars, were put out with injuries; previously Coach Hobson had intended to hold him out of action for the year and he had no varsity playing experience when he stepped in. He proved an excellent all-around performer, especially around the backboard. Stands six feet four, is a good defensive player and very adept with a whirling pivot shot. Home: The Dalles. A junior.

GALE, LAUREN (Laddie), was a unanimous choice for Pacific coast all-star team as running mate to Hank Luisetti of Stanford at forward. Should be the West's outstanding offensive player this year. Gale, standing six feet four, is extremely fast and a clever ball handler. Shoots from seemingly impossible angles with either hand. Last season he established new northern division scoring record of 249 points, tallied 408 points in entire season. Has huge hands which enable him to palm the ball while shooting. A senior.

HARDY, ROBERT (Bob), won a regular position last year after transferring to Oregon from Southern Oregon Normal, only to lose out early in the season with a broken ankle. 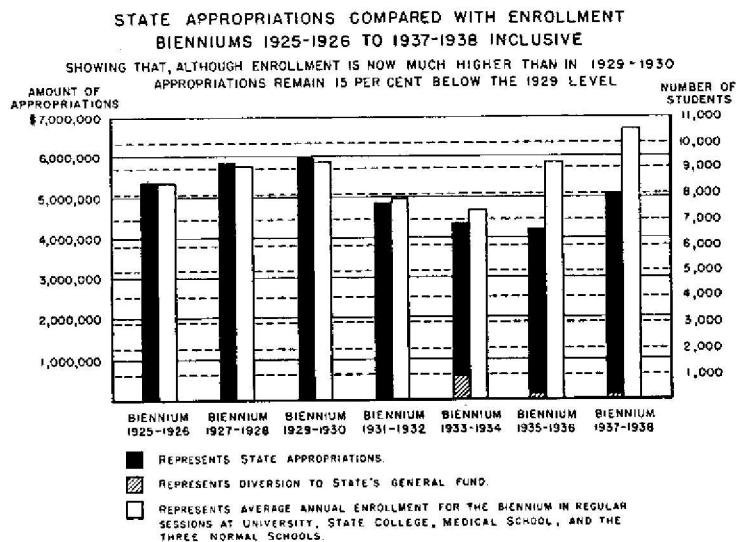
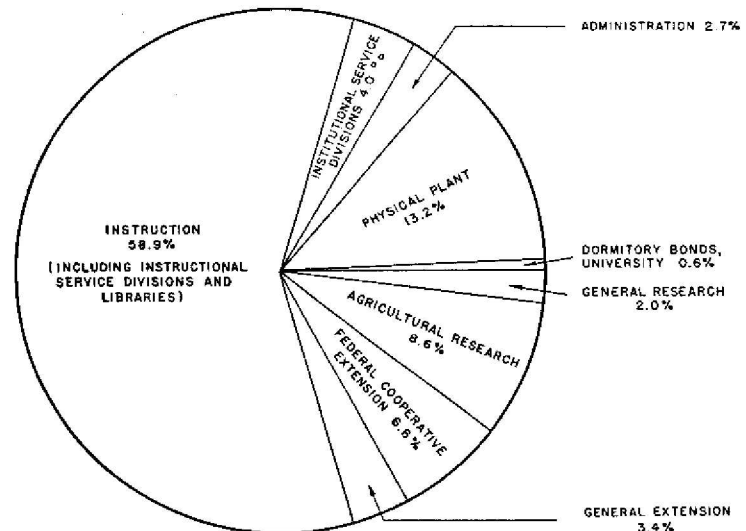

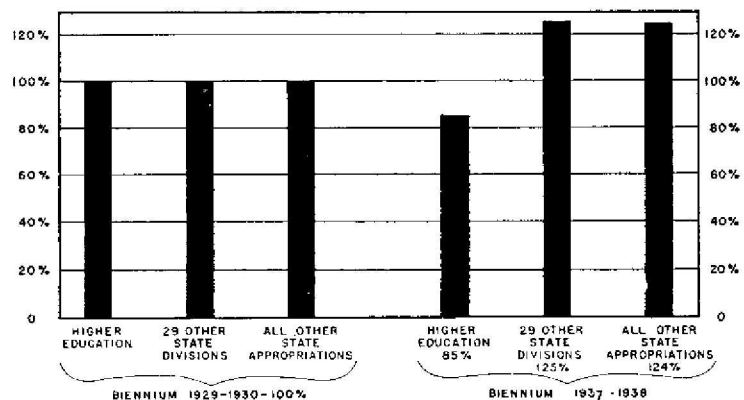
