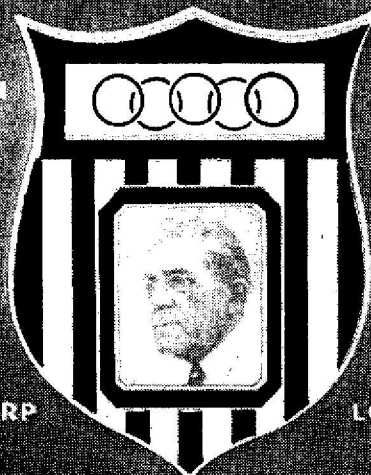

Villard Book Published

"Fighting Years," the dynamic autobiography of Oswald Garrison Villard, LL.D. '35, has just been received on the University campus. Mr. Villard is the son of Henry Villard after whom Villard hall is named.

Like his father, Mr. Villard has been a staunch friend of the University and has materially aided the progress of the school whenever possible. Alumni and friends of the University will find particular satisfaction in the mention of the University in Mr. Villard's autobiography:

"The university (of Washington) had reason to be grateful to my father for he personally carried it for a couple of years when the legislature refused to appropriate the small budget of this struggling school; curiously enough, the university has long since forgotten this, whereas the University of Oregon always remembers with every evidence of gratitude my father's similarly generous gifts to what has now become a great University at Eugene."

Mr. Villard takes his readers through his life as the son of a great railroad builder and the grandson of William Lloyd Garrison, the great abolitionist. He covers his career at Harvard as undergraduate and instructor through his owner-editorship of the New York Post during the war and his subsequent editorship of the Nation.

He covers his fight where he forced a lieutenant-governor of the state of New York to resign because of corrupt practises in office, and through the turbulent times when he published the "Secret Treaties" in 1917 against the wishes of the Allies.

It was through Mr. Villard's help that a holographic document in the handwriting of Abraham Lincoln was purchased for presentation to the University in 1938.

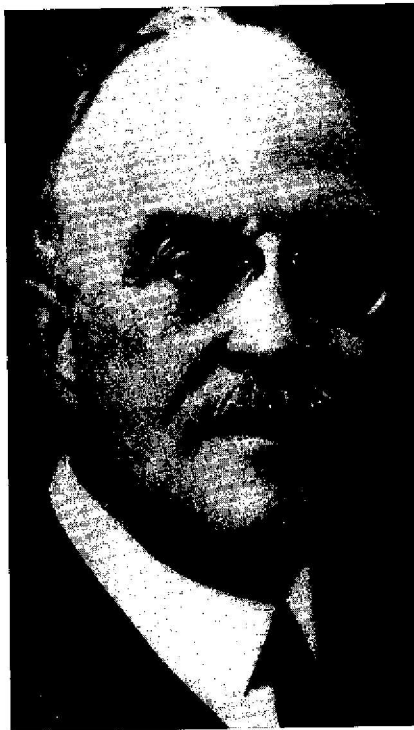
In awarding Mr. Villard the honorary Doctor of Laws in 1935, the University cited: "In recognition of his outstanding contribution to the knowledge of history and the affairs of state; his tireless promotion of higher ideals for American public life; and his courageous championship of democracy and a free press as instruments for the upbuilding of a better social order."

Board Members Are Campus Guests

For the first time in several years, the members of the board of the Oregon State System of Higher Education met on the University of Oregon campus on April 24 and 25, for their regular April meeting to consider the budget problems of the entire system.

On April 25, the board and members of the executive council (heads of the institutions serving the system) were honor guests at a student assembly.

Dr. Erb introduced the administrative officers of the system including Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor; C. D. Byrne, secretary to the board; Dr. George Peavy, president of Oregon State college; Julius A. Churchill, M.A. '20, president of the Oregon College of Education; Charles Howard, M.A. '23, president of the Eastern Oregon College of Education; and Dr. Walter Redford, president of the Southern Oregon College of Education. Dr. Erb also introduced Walter Pearson, former member of the state board and now treasurer of the state of Oregon. Mr. Pearson has continued to show his interest in the welfare of higher education in the state even though his service with the state board has terminated.

Dr. Erb then introduced the members of the state board:

Willard Marks, president of the board from Albany; C. A. Brand, Roseburg; F. E. Callister, Albany; Herman Oliver, John Day; E. C. Pease, The Dalles; Robert Ruhl, Medford; E. C. Sammons, Portland; Edgar W. Smith, ex-'09, Portland; and Beatrice Walton Sackett of Mashfield. Dr. Erb pointed out that three members of the state board have had children attending the University of Oregon. Willard Mark's daughter, Marian, is now a freshman attending the University; Edgar W. Smith, ex-'09, is the father of Edgar L. Smith, '33; and Jack Smith, now enrolled as a sophomore. Hague Callister, B.A. '35, M.A. '36, is the son of F. E. Callister.

Mrs. Sackett Speaks

Mrs. Sackett addressed the assembly and conveyed the greetings of the board to the student body and faculty of the

University. She expressed the gratitude of the board for the opportunity to visit the campus and meet the students and faculty. She explained that it was only through these visits to the several institutions that the meetings and committee work of the board takes on reality.

Mrs. Walton said that the state board was not some impersonal, infallible group but just nine human beings trying "within the limits of their abilities to do everything they can for the state and the young men and women of the state." She said that their efforts can only be reflected through the training of the schools and its effect on the students—the students in turn passing on this benefit to the state as they enter into citizenship in the state.

Mrs. Sackett expressed her personal satisfaction in her work especially as it concerned the University and its curriculum of liberal arts. "The human and social values of a liberal education

rather than the vocational techniques are needed very much in times of stress."

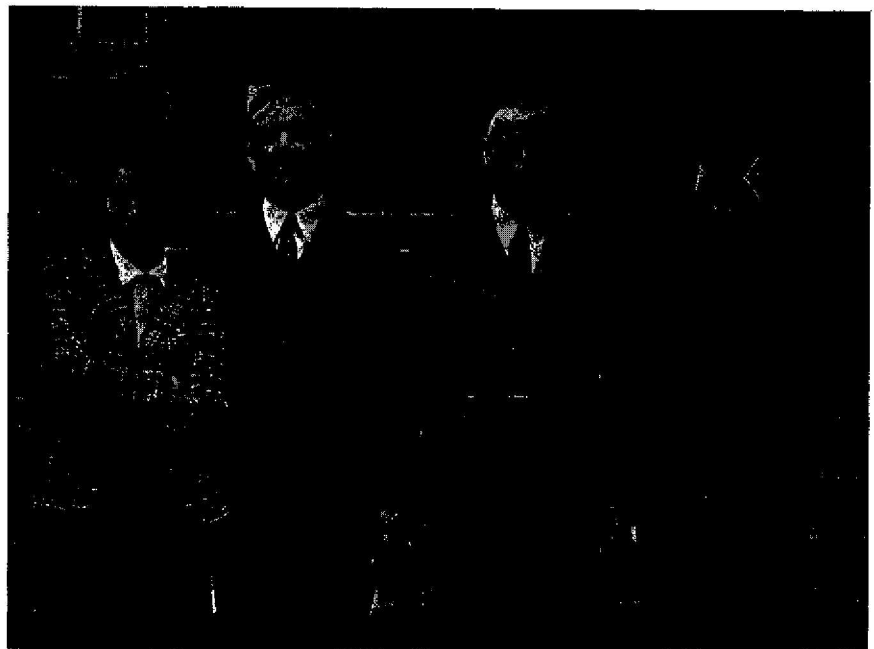
She further explained that the stress of the past years and the new working programs of the people which have provided the American people with more and more leisure have shown that leisure becomes a sterile thing when people haven't the intellect or culture to enjoy it.

The assembly was opened with two numbers by the Polyphonic choir which sang under the direction of John Stark Evans. During the assembly, the University symphony under the direction of Rex Underwood played the overture from "Oberon" and the University band directed by John Stehn furnished music.

Business meetings of the state board were occupied with five major actions.

1. Approved the budget of \$3,163,399 for the next academic year for the

Alfred Schroff

Alfred H. Schroff, connected with the University of Oregon for more than 25 years, died in his sleep on April 16, at the age of 76. At his own request, there were no public services and private rites were held in Portland.

Paintings of the Oregon country by Alfred H. Schroff made his name and works known in hundreds of homes on the Pacific coast. Among the older people on the University of Oregon campus, he was known as "Larry," a man of unusual gentleness and sincerity. To hundreds of students, in and out of the art department, he was Professor Schroff, a teacher of much learning and dignity.

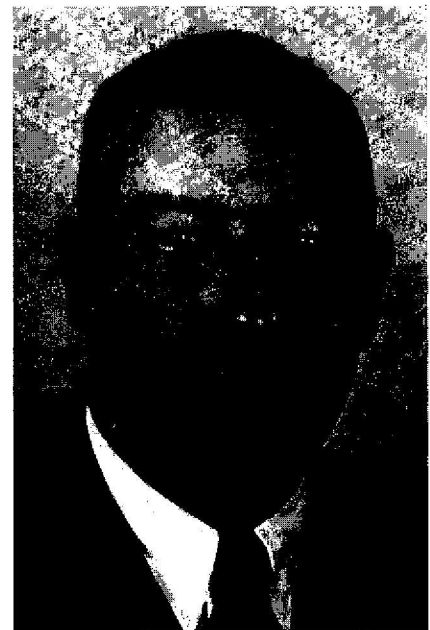
"Larry" Schroff was born in Springfield, Mass., in 1863, educated in Boston and as a young man studied art in Europe. He was very versatile. Painting was his forte but he also worked in water colors and in etching and lithographs and in stained glass.

He had achieved fame among New England artists before he came west. He was the designer of the stained glass windows of the Mother Church of Christian Science in Boston and he was for many years director of the Art Museum at Portland, Maine.

When he came to the University of Oregon as head of the art department in 1916, Mr. Schroff set out to know

and intrepert the Oregon country. For years, up to the time of his death, he travelled to all parts of the mountains and the Coast and the desert country, painting and sketching as he went. His travels took him north to Alaska and south into Mexico.

In 1924 his Oregon work was recognized by a fellowship in the Fontainebleau academy near Paris. His work also received innumerable decorations and awards in this country and in Europe.

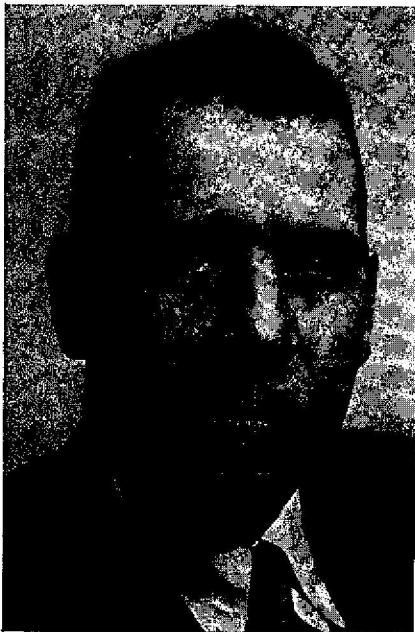
Mr. Schroff was married in 1908 to Louise Barrows who survives him.

Newspaper History

The inside story of Oregon newspapers may at last be told in "History of Oregon Newspapers," written by George S. Turnbull, is published this spring as planned. The book is the result of many years' study on the part of the author and takes the entire picture of Oregon journalism from the day of William G. T'Vault's little Spectator was pulled off of a Washington hand press in Oregon City, the first newspaper published west of the Missouri river, to the present day race for news.

Professor Turnbull, who started his newspapering career at the age of eleven by inking forms on a Washington handpress for the Marysville, Wash., Globe, has been a printer, legman, reporter, copyreader, and city editor during his active newspaper career.

Professor Turnbull treats in light narrative fashion the era of personal

journalism when Tom Dryer of the Oregonian and Asahel Bush of the Salem Statesman threw invectives at one another. On one occasion Bush wrote, "We cannot get down to the depth he has sunk to answer him, for we will not sully our columns with vulgarity and slang. When he rises, we will endeavor to pay our respects. And he must inevitably rise again, for it is an unvarying law that filth rises as it rots."

The book is to be published by Binford and Mort of Portland. It is notable that two of the firm, Thomas Binford, '37, and Ormond Binford, ex-'38, should be former students of the journalism school on the campus.

State Board

University and colleges of the state system. The appropriation was allotted to the several schools of the system: University of Oregon, \$916,847; Oregon State college, \$1,283,779; University of Oregon medical school, \$329,297; Oregon College of Education, \$176,189; Southern Oregon College of Education, \$84,701; Eastern Oregon College of Education, \$72,276; other activities, including federal co-operative extension, experiment stations, extension division, general research and centralized activities, \$300,307. Supplemental allocations of \$34,786 to care for increased teaching loads and \$34,048 for equipment replacements were also made.

2. Established a department of religion at the University. The board authorized the appointment of a full-time professor to operate the department under the school of social sciences. Classes in this department are expected to start next September.

3. Recommended that the proposed division of agricultural and industrial marketing be administered by another agency than the state board.

4. Approved the recommendations of the presidents of the several state institutions for personnel changes. Effecting the University of Oregon was: the promotion of A. F. Moursund, Jr., to the position of head of the department of mathematics succeeding E. E. DeCou, who has reached retirement age. The retirement of Dr. F. G. G. Schmidt, head of the department of German, was also acted upon. Dr. Schmidt is the oldest faculty member in point of service in the University.

5. Appointed C. A. Howard, president of the Eastern Oregon College of Education, to the position of president of the Oregon College of Education and director of elementary teacher

training. He will succeed J. A. Churchill who is retiring.

Dr. C. A. Howard received his M.A. degree from the University of Oregon in 1923 and has been an interested alumnus of the institution. He was superintendent of public instruction for the state for ten years preceding his appointment last year as head of the Eastern Oregon College of Education. Prior to that time he was superintendent of schools in Marshfield and principal of the Eugene high school. Dr. Churchill was accorded a rising vote of thanks by the board for his fifty years of service to Oregon education. Dr. Churchill assumes the position of president emeritus of the institution.

Queen Maxine Glad

Miss Maxine Glad, Eugene, has been named Queen to preside over the traditional Junior Weekend ceremonies for this year. Her princesses will be: Alyce Rogers, Eugene; Patsy Taylor, Portland; Helen Gillam, Portland; and Margaret Williams, Portland.

Miss Glad will have the double honor of presiding over a fete which she created. In competition with other campus people prior to her election as queen, Miss Glad submitted the winning theme for the weekend. Her "Alice in Wonderland" motif will be carried out in the Junior Prom and the Canoe Fete.

The dates of the weekend are May 12, 13, 14.

Baseball Leads Spring Sports

Oregon's varsity baseballers opened their 1939 conference season by dividing a two-game series with Oregon State's co-champion Beavers.

Celebrating the advent of baseball's centennial year, the Ducks and Beavers met first at Corvallis, Friday, April 21, the Ducks falling before a 20-hit Orange barrage, 22 to 11. Saturday, in the headline feature of Eugene's own opening day, Coach Hobby Hobson's tossers evened the score by taking the Beavers, 5 to 1.

Saturday's game was a three-hour nightmare of base hits, errors, and parading pitchers. Oregon used four moundsmen—Bob Creighton, Pete Igoe, Jack Jasper, and Al Linn—in an attempt to checkmate the booming bats of the Corvallis boys.

The Ducks themselves drove two Oregon State chuckers—Clayton Shaw and Arnold Fenger—to cover in collecting their 13 hits. Coach Hobby's tossers made 9 misplays, however, to three bobbles by the Beavers.

Oregon got off to a three-run lead in the first inning on Bush Smith's home run with two mates aboard, but the Beavers came right back with five of their own in the second half of the frame. The Ducks led again in the third when Bob Hardy, hitting for Jack Shimshak, lofted another home run with two aboard. A home run by Arland Schwab, Orange second-sacker, put Oregon State ahead once again, and this time, Ralph Coleman's club stayed there.

In marked contrast to Friday's free-hitting affair, Saturday's game was a pitchers' battle between Oregon's southpaw star, Bob Hardy, and Ralph Takami, Beaver veteran.

Center fielder Jim Nicholson smacked Takami's first pitch of the game to the center field fence for a home run, and before the first inning was over, the Ducks had tallied four runs, with Bush Smith driving in the winning runs with a long triple to right.

Hardy pitched four-hit ball, and Takami, who allowed no runs after the second inning, and struck out 10 Duck batsmen, scattered nine blows.

Sparkling play by Oregon's infield combination, Gale Smith, first base; Ford Mullen, second base; Elmer Mallory, shortstop; and Wimpy Quinn, third base, featured the second Oregon State game. This combination drew plaudits from the crowd when it missed a triple play by a hair.

Winner in 9 of 11 pre-conference games, Oregon's nine was paced in hitting by Gale Smith, classy first baseman.

Smith hit the ball at a .450 clip, getting 18 blows in 40 trips to the plate.

Other leading hitters were: Elmer Mallory, .424; Cece Walden, .412; Wellington Quinn, .395; Bob Hardy, .375; Warren Smith, .333; Ford Mullen, .306; Jack Shimshak, .304.

Included in the Duck victory string were three wins over Willamette, two over Portland, and two over Pacific.

Varsity Track

Near-record performances by a trio of Colonel Bill Hayward's aces, highlighted the Oregon track and field team's overwhelming 95 to 36 victory over the University of Portland on Hayward field Saturday, April 22.

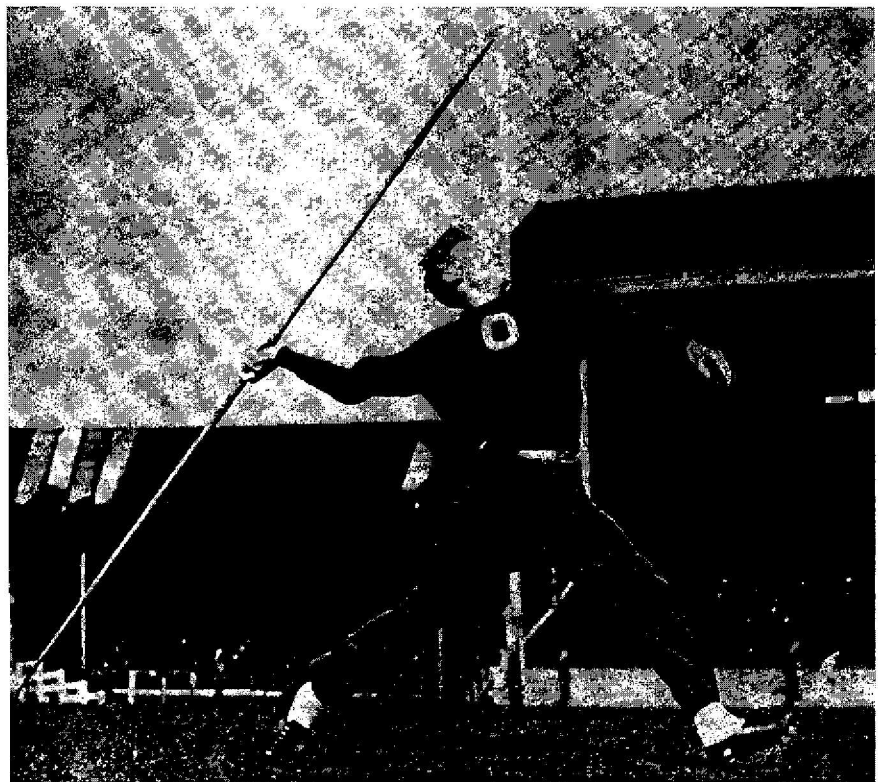
Boyd Brown, javelin thrower, uncorked the second longest heave, 231 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ inch, ever recorded by an American college trackman. His great throw was only a few feet under Bob People's best mark this year of 234 feet $1\frac{1}{8}$ inches.

Oregon's great vaulting duo—Captain George Varoff and Rod Hansen, cleared 14 feet 4 inches and just missed when the bar was raised to 14 feet 8 inches. Hansen, starting his second year on the Oregon varsity, had never before gone over the 14-foot mark. His performance in the Portland meet caused Colonel Hayward to predict that the slender, dark-haired Olympia athlete would land a berth on the American Olympic team.

The height was also the best attained by "The Count" Varoff this year, and was only $3\frac{3}{8}$ inches less than his former world's record.

Other outstanding performances were turned in by Kirman Storli, who captured both the 440 and 880-yard runs; Bob Diez, colored sprinter, who won the century in 10 seconds flat and the 220 in 22.8; Lloyd Dod, winner of the high hurdles; and Don Barker, easy winner of the two-mile gallop.

Only firsts taken by Portland were recorded by Joe Enzler, star weightman, who won both the shotput and discus, and Pat Lydon, who ran a 4:24.2 mile to whip Oregon's Bob Mitchell.

Boyd Brown

In the spring of 1937, a husky, young and redheaded freshman walked up to Coach Bill Hayward and asked if he could go out for track.

"Sure, sure," said Coach Hayward characteristically. "What do you do, and where are you from?"

"I'm from Hubbard, Oregon," said the prospective trackman, "and I'd like to throw the shot."

"What experience have you had?"

"None. They don't have much track at Hubbard."

Hayward looked his man over, smiled, and then noticed that the right thumb of his hopeful, Boyd Brown by name, was missing.

"Hold on a minute," Hayward said. "You can't throw the shot without the thumb."

"How about the discus then," came back Brown, but again Bill Hayward shook his head, for in the discus the thumb is essential in gripping and guiding the platter.

Heeding the veteran mentor's advice to try some other event, Brown turned to the javelin. Hayward was still skeptical, because the thumb is as essential to the javelin thrower as to the shot putter and discus tosser. But the trainer and coach of champions like determination and grit, so he did not say what he was thinking. He merely said, "We'll work something out. I'm sure you can do it," and added a few more words of encouragement.

Ever a master at coping with new and difficult situations and problems, Colonel Bill watched Brown grip the spear between his middle and index

fingers, and began giving him tips on how to balance the javelin, run with it, and throw.

And that was the beginning for Oregon's great javelin thrower of 1939. As a freshman, Brown threw the spear only 140 feet, but last year hit 188 in his first meet and wound up with 204 feet 7 inches to gain fourth in the coast meet. His 198 was good enough for second in the northern division meet.

All this as a sophomore, and Brown had still to blossom as one of America's best. Early this spring he was consistently bettering 200 feet with the spear, but not approaching any record-breaking feats. Then Coach Hayward designed and built by hand a special javelin, presented it to Brown, and the big fellow, to show his appreciation, amazed his coach and Oregon track followers by tossing it 215 feet, then 227 feet 9 inches.

And April 22 in the Portland university meet, the towhead heaved the spear 231 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ inch. His mighty effort was the second longest ever made by an American.

Bob Peoples, USC star, established an unofficial American record last month when he threw the shaft 234 feet $1\frac{7}{8}$ inches. His throw broke the record of 231 feet $7\frac{1}{4}$ inches, held by Laurence Bell of Miami (Ohio) College.

Longest previous throw by an Oregon athlete was Bob Parke's 220 feet $11\frac{3}{8}$ inches, an NCAA record established in 1934.

The season is young, Brown is still a junior, and Coach Hayward feels that his boy who defies all laws of

mechanics will go on to greater achievements.

Nevertheless it still amazes Hayward. "I can't figure it out," he will tell you. "If I didn't see it I wouldn't believe it."



Varsity Tennis

Oregon's varsity tennis team wound up pre-conference play with a 4 to 3 decision over Willamette's Bearcats at Salem Saturday, April 22.

The Willamette win was the fourth straight this season. Only loss on the Webfoot slate was to the Leader Tennis Shop of Portland in the opening match of the season, played indoors in the men's gym.

The Webfoot racquet wielders hold victories over Linfield, Willamette twice, and the Super Varsity.

Leonard Clark, Rex Applegate, and Dick Williams, Oregon's No. 2, 4, and 5 men respectively, won their matches with Willamette's aces. Applegate and Williams provided the margin of victory by also winning in the doubles.

Les Werschkul, Oregon's No. 1 man, lost his singles match to Gilmore of Willamette.

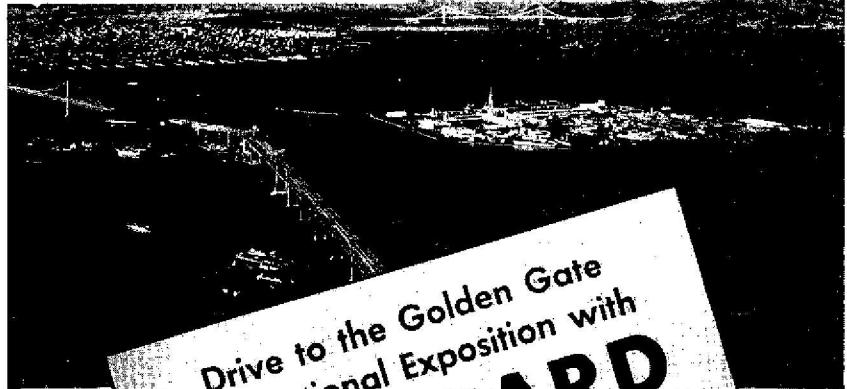

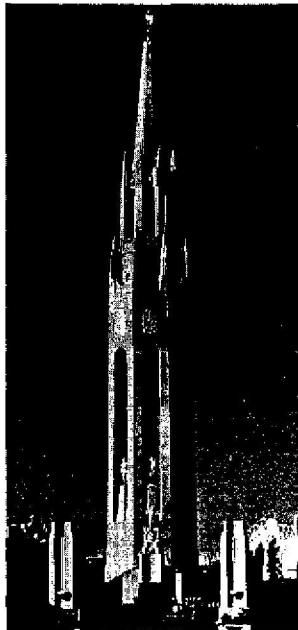


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● A striking view of the 400-foot Tower of the Sun. Inside is installed a carillon of 44 bells, brought from England.
