Dear Folks:

I wish to change my address from U. S. Naval Hospital, Philadelphia, to U. S. Naval Hospital, Guam, M. I. I will be there some time in December.

Your first "Old Oregon" of the summer with the lovely cover of the campus is certainly a welcome book. It is interesting to read the articles from all over the world; so I might write about the trip

from here around through the canal, up the west coast, past Honolulu to Guam if you might think it interesting.

Guam is an interesting place in spite of its small size. S. took it over in the Spanish-American war. It is a military base with local native troops as well as the U. S. Navy settlements which is one of the big sources of income for the people.

Police School

The University will be the scene of the second annual school for police officers held by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, William O. Hall, '37, director of the bureau of municipal research, has announced. The bureau, the League of Oregon Cities, of which Hall is executive secretary, and the Oregon Association of Police Officers will cooperate with the FBI in offering the work.

The school, which will have an enrollment of more than fifty police officers, will be held on October 16 to October 21. Courses will include relationships between state, federal and local police; traffic problems; public relations; evidence; criminal investigation; first aid; laboratory methods, records, photography and crime scene search.

Included on the program will be L. L. Ray, '12, district attorney for Lane county; dean of the school of law, Wayne L. Morse; and dean of the school of journalism, Eric W. Allen. Earl Snell, secretary of state, will also be on the faculty.

S. S. Smith on Leave

S. Stephenson Smith, professor of English at the University of Oregon for 14 years, has requested the state board of higher education for a year's leave to serve as educational counselor for the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers. Professor Smith will launch a lecture tour in Washington and Montana, for the association. His tour will be extended throughout the nation and he will make a first-hand study for the society of regional and campus creative work in the fine arts.

Webfeet Tie U.S.C., Beat Stanford

Oregon fans look forward to the most successful football season in the history of the "big green team from Eugene" when in answer to the rail-birds' mournful comments about the 1939 "Suicide Schedule" the mighty Trojans of Southern California were battled to a 7 to 7 deadlock and the Stanford Indians were pitifully outplayed to a 10 to 0 victory for the Ducks.

Conceded only a cellar chance for the season the fighting Webfeet played bang-up ball in their first two games and showed the result of many hours of fine drilling under "Tex" Oliver, who is starting his second year as the Oregon mentor. The Southern California game was a keen disappointment to the team and coaching staff who went down with every intention of bringing back the first Oregon victory since 1915.

The Webfeet usually show at the poorest advantage in Los Angeles, where the excessive heat of Southern California quickly tires the Ducks, who are used to the brisk snap of the Oregon autumn. In explaining the splendid showing of this year, "Tex" told members of the Eugene Monday Morning Quarterback club that he held the boys in the dressing room until eight minutes before game time, then told them to "walk, not run," out on the field. The Ducks were told to walk out of huddles and in every way to conserve their strength.

Facing the fact that Southern California had reserves three deep and the Oregon team was woefully short on replacements, Oliver sent in his entire second team early in the first period when USC shot in a fresh team to try to wear the Oregon boys down.

Nine plays and 58 yards brought the Oregon touchdown. Little Jay Graybeal started the fireworks and turned the job over to Southpaw Bob Smith, who finished it with a perfect pass into the arms of John Berry as he stood just over the line, surrounded by Trojans. Ralph Anderson came in and converted.

Southern California's great array of backs, including Grenville Lansdell, Jack Banta, Bob Peoples and a few

more, piled up yardage, but the Webfeet's gallant forward wall held tight as soon as the ball reached within scoring distance.

With minutes fading, Doyle Nave came in. Troy moved from midfield as Peoples and Joe Shell began holding his perfect passes. With the ball on the 11, Nave found Peoples over in one corner. The ball went home and Oklahoma Bob jerked and wiggled past two Oregon backs for the score. Phil Gaspar added the tying point.

Again Doyle began throwing the ball and Troy started toward midfield, but Berry, one of the best men on the field, intercepted one hurl and Oregon kept the ball until the final seconds.

Southern California had a big edge in statistics, but that was all.

Oregon 10, Stanford 0

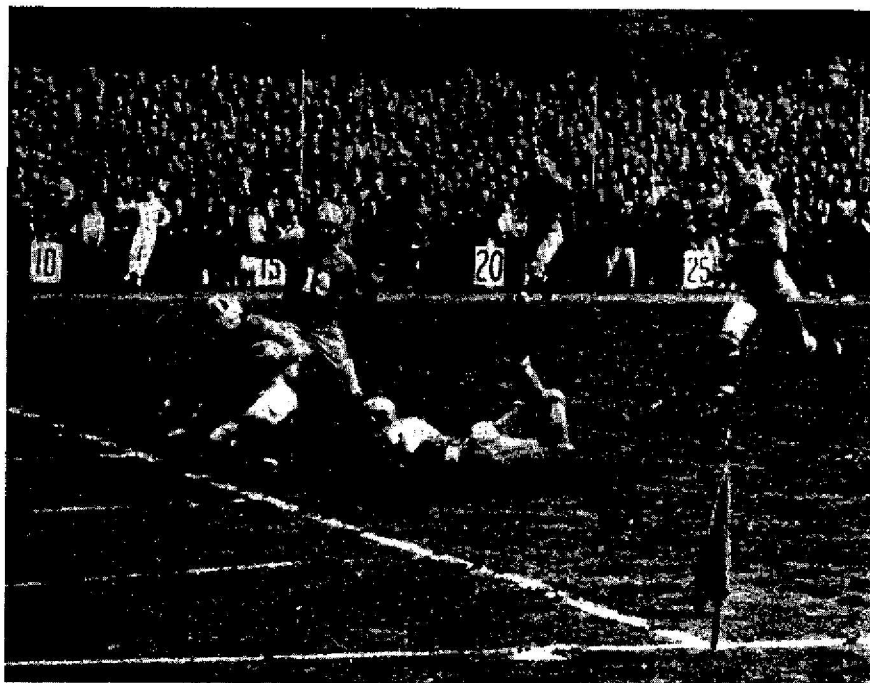
"Jackrabbit" Jay Graybeal was the hero of the twenty thousand rooting fans who saw Oregon shellack the Stanford Indians in Portland on Octo-

ber 7. Graybeal scored every one of the Oregon points.

With seconds left to play in the first half, the Jackrabbit caught a 25-yard pass from left-handed Bob Smith on the Stanford 15 and raced out of the grasp of three Cardinal tacklers to roll across the goal line for the score. He then converted for the extra point.

Midway in the third period after two surprise passes set it up, Graybeal—who never before in college had tried to kick a field goal—calmly lined up on the 15 and booted a perfect kick through the crossbars for another three points to drag the total to 10 for Oregon and 0 for Stanford.

Stanford, smarting under the defeat administered the week before by the Oregon State Beavers, put on the heat right from the start, and after five minutes of play had worked the ball up to the Oregon 18 after a surprise pass and two line smashes by Standlee. The Cardinals attempted to pass again, but the hard rushing by the Oregon line and backfield forced them to try

a field goal from the 25. Grove's kick was no good and the Stanford team got that close to the goal line only once during the remainder of the game.

Oregon's touchdown started from the Stanford 40 when Smith took the ball and flipped a pass to Graybeal, who was standing on the Stanford 15. Graybeal then eluded the three Stanford line backers to roll across for the score.

Frosh Football

"Honest John" Warren is busily engaged in putting nearly sixty fighting frosh through their paces in preparation of the "Little Civil War" against the Oregon State Rooks in Portland on the night of October 13. The jinx of Friday the Thirteenth holds no fears for Oregon rooters who point to the best Frosh prospects in several seasons.

Practice has been going since September 25 and several posts on the squad are the scenes of hot fights. The tackle berths seem to be the strongest while the ends are weaker than the rest of the squads.

Don Shephard from White Bear, Minnesota, has been the standout ball-carrier to date. The 198-pound half-back has led the field in competition for the left wing. Others out for the position include Louis Baum, Pittsburg; Howard Robertson, Eugene; Ernie Stassens, Beaverton; Bob Withers, Grant high in Portland; and Bob Oliver, Franklin high in Portland.

Neil Baumgardner and George Olson, both from Jefferson high school in Portland, are staging a tough struggle for the quarterback post with Wayne (Butch) Nelson of Salem coming right along.

Fullback leaders are Roy Eli, Portland, brother of Oregon State's Ben Eli; Bill Sweikert, Vallejo, California; and George Vukovich, Globe, Arizona. Three centers, Nick Dallas, Heppner; Jim Fisher, Raymond, Washington; and Arnold Iverson, Petaluma, California, are about on equal footing with Dallas holding a bit of an edge on the other two.

John (Olaf) Stromberg, Seattle, and Steve Bodner, Eugene, are the class of the guard crop. Vernon Greedy, Kirkland, Washington, and Lorraine Tallman, Forest Grove, are also guard prospects.

The left tackle prospects are very good with big Dick Ashcom of Johnstown, Pennsylvania, leading the pack. He is followed closely by Johnny Bjork of Astoria, brother of big Del Bjork who captained the Webfeet several years ago. Left tackles are Ray Marlow, Benson Tech in Portland, and

Rank Zach of Klamath Falls. Chuck Elliot, ex-Eugene high school flash and state high school shot-put record holder, is also a tackle candidate but has been out of the practice sessions because of illness.

The end position has remained weak, but Ralph Davis and Dick Stanton, both of Jefferson high in Portland, have been showing much improvement during the practice periods. Raymond Gennette of San Francisco also seems to show well in the end berth.

War Affects Many Oregon Alums

Many Oregon people were effected directly or indirectly by the flare-up of war in Europe.

Miss Cosby L. Gilstrap, '18, was aboard the ill-fated steamer Athenia which was sunk off the Irish coast during the opening days of the conflict. Miss Gilstrap and her mother were returning from a summer's vacation in Europe.

Miss Gilstrap was slightly hurt by the explosion which followed the torpedoing of the boat and during the rush to get into the lifeboats, Miss Gilstrap was washed into the sea. She was fortunately wearing a lifebelt at the time and members of the boat crew were able to save her.

The boat that she was in was later picked up by the United States freighter Flint and landed at Nova Scotia. Miss Gilstrap is librarian at the Alhambra, California, high school and is a member of Delta Delta Delta.

Mrs. Cleome Carroll Wadsworth, '18, continued her remarkable experiences. Mr. Wadsworth was vice consul at the Free City of Danzig for two years, and the Wadsworths left there in the early part of May and were consequently out of the danger zone. The Wadsworths have had a fortunate record because just previous to the outbreak of the hostilities in Shanghai, China, Mr. Wadsworth was transferred from his post as vice consul there. Mrs. Wadsworth is the sister of Mrs. Camille Carroll Bovard, '06, and a member of Kappa Alpha Theta.

In Warsaw

Miss Iris Saunders, '28, has been serving as secretary to Anthony J. D. Biddle, Jr., Ambassador to Poland for the United States, and was in the raid conducted against Warsaw. No news has reached OLD OREGON about Miss Saunders. Miss Saunders is a member of Mu Phi Epsilon and in 1934 served as clerk in the diplomatic section of the American consul-general's office in Geneva, Switzerland.

On German Soil

Many University people remember Miss Signe Rasmussen, '38, who married Werner Asendorf, ex-'38, German exchange student at the University. Dean Eric W. Allen of the journalism school recently received a short wire from Berlin reading: "Still going strong. Professional and personal greetings. Thirty. Pinkley und Asendorfs." Pinkley is Virgil Pinkley, formerly in

charge of the Salem office of the United Press and now working for them in Europe. Mrs. Asendorf was a member of Alpha Omicron Pi and Mr. Asendorf lived at the Beta Theta Pi fraternity during his exchange here and was later initiated into that group, which tagged him with the nickname of "Uncle Otto."

Wallace Hayden, '28, instructor of architecture at the University, and Jack Stafford, ex-'38, son of Mrs. Mary Straub Stafford, '01, were on an architectural tour of Europe when the war broke out. On September 1 they were able to leave from Norway and arrived in New York city, missing only a few weeks of their trip. While in the east they attended the American Institute of Architects as delegates from the University of Oregon.

Miss Florence Mildred Jones, '28, had spent the past fifteen months in study and research in London, England, but decided to return home. She sailed from England on the S. S. Stendam on September 26. Miss Jones was instructor of English at the University for several years and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

Vacations Cut Short

Miss Bessie Ruth Smith, '18, who is now teaching in the Franklin high

school in Portland, cut her vacation trip short and returned home by way of Canada late in August. Lloyd Hoffman, '40, spent the summer in Europe and left for the United States just prior to the first fighting.

Not in the European scene, but already having had his taste of fighting, is John N. Hamlin, ex-'19. Mr. Hamlin is in the American foreign service and was stationed in Seville during the Spanish civil war. He is now in Washington, D. C., where he is with the division of European affairs, department of state.

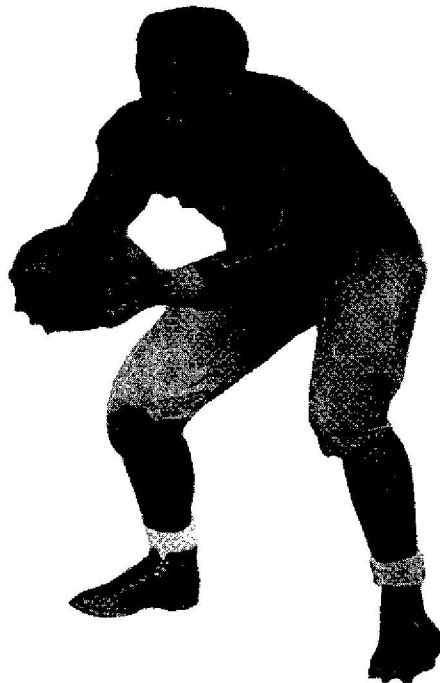
Other Oregon alums in the foreign service are Russell M. Brooks, consul at Johannesburg, British South Africa, and Ivan B. White, '29.

"Choppie" Parke

William "Choppie" Parke, '33, one of Oregon's great halfbacks, died in Long Beach, California, on August 29, at the age of thirty-one. Parke had been in fine health until August 25, when he contracted infantile paralysis and passed away four days later.

"Choppie" played football for Oregon in 1928, 1930, and 1931. Since leaving the University he had been coach and director of physical education at the Montezuma school for boys.

Parks is survived by his widow and a baby daughter, and his brother, Bobby Parke, '35, former national collegiate javelin champion and star quarterback for Oregon. "Choppie" was a member of Beta Theta Pi.

Journalism Prof

James L. C. Ford, for many years newspaper man in New York city, has arrived at the University of Oregon to take over classes in the school of journalism. He will replace Charles M. Hulten, who has been granted a leave of absence for a year to study for his doctorate at Stanford university.

Mr. Ford, who received his master of arts degree from the University of Wisconsin last June, was a staff member of the United Press in New York from 1931 to 1937 and for a time served as cable editor.

Before joining the press association, Mr. Ford represented the Chicago Tribune in New York and worked in an editorial capacity for a magazine. He graduated from Lawrence college in Wisconsin in 1928.

Enrollment Jumps Eight Per Cent

For the fourth consecutive term enrollment at the University established an all-time high. On the sixth day of classes enrollment reached 3505 students, an increase of eight per cent over the same day last year.

New students reached a total of 1495—a phenomenal gain of 10 per cent over last year. Old students total 2010 or a two per cent gain.

Of the regular classes the freshman enrollment showed the greatest gain with 19 per cent more first year people registering. The total this year is 1261 compared with 1073 last year. The junior class showed the only loss—dropping 20 students or seven per cent. The graduate student enrollment dropped nine students or five per cent. However, graduates enrolled at an earlier time last year and when registration is completed it is expected that the total will equal last year's.

Arts & Letters Lead

In the schools the largest gain was made by the College of Arts and Letters which jumped 23 per cent. This was followed closely by Architecture and Allied Arts, which jumped 23 per cent, and Physical Education with a 15 per cent increase. Both Education and Music showed losses with the Education school going down 15 per cent and the Music school three per cent. Social Science held its own with 418 people registering both last year and this.

The non-major departments of both Home Economics and Science showed fine gains. Home Economics picked up 16 per cent and Science gained 15 per cent.

Men continued to outnumber the women with about seven men on the campus to every four women. The women, however, showed a nine per cent gain with the men showing only an eight per cent gain.

Author Visits Campus

The juvenile field provides a fascinating and highly profitable work for those who like to write, Mrs. Lucille Saunders McDonald, ex-'19, former University of Oregon student and now a successful author, told friends during a recent campus visit.

Mrs. McDonald, who since leaving the University in 1919 has worked on newspapers and served as correspondent in various parts of the world,

now makes her home in New York City. Her volume, "Dick in the Spice Cupboard," written last year has been well received and this year she will soon publish a new book, "Giants with Four Arms." The history of spices is described in the first book while the second deals with wind power. Other books under preparation include "The Llama that Wouldn't Get Up," and another on precious stones.

Before taking up writing for the juvenile field Mrs. McDonald wrote for the New York Times, various press associations and syndicates from all parts of the world. Travelling with her

husband, Harold D. McDonald, ex-'25, a sales executive for a large tractor firm, she has had excellent opportunities for observations in such countries as Turkey, Hungary, Egypt, various sections of South America, Africa and other places.

Before her marriage Mrs. McDonald was a member of the United Press staff in Buenos Aires, and also worked on a number of newspapers. She is returning to her home in New York after visiting friends in Oregon and Washington. While in Eugene she was the guest of Miss Adelaide Lake, '20, prominent Oregon newspaperwoman.

Oregon Folks Listed

Of the 5000 men and women listed in the latest edition of "Who's Who in Oregon" who are college and university trained, 692 received all or part of

their higher education at the University of Oregon, a recent survey made by Dean James H. Gilbert shows.

More than half, or 1532 of the two-thirds, went to Oregon institutions. The University of Oregon alone supplied more leaders to the state than did Harvard, Yale, Columbia, Stanford, California and Washington combined.

Airplane Class

The University of Oregon extended its campus to include the Eugene airport this term when announcement was made of the award to the University of the training course offered by the Civil Aeronautics authority. The state of Oregon has been allowed 100 students to be trained at five centers. Of this number, the University has been allowed forty students indicating a confidence in the work to be offered here.

The course is open to regularly-enrolled full-time students who are qualified. The University—at its option—may allow four girls to enroll in the course. One hundred and seventy-seven students applied for admittance to the course and seven of these were women.

The course will carry two hours credit and will be set up under the administration of the University. Carlton Spencer, '13, professor of law and

a major in the U. S. army reserve corps, has been named director of civilian pilot training.

The students will receive two terms of classroom work on the campus under direction of regular faculty members—they will also receive twenty hours of dual instruction in the air from instructors named by the government. Upon completion of the course, the students will be granted private pilots' certificates of competency.

The only cost to the students will be forty dollars for the course which will cover their physical examinations and complete insurance coverage.

At the Eugene airport a new hangar is being erected to accommodate the equipment which the government will send here for the course. The field has been adjudged adequate for the instructional purposes.

Champs Continue

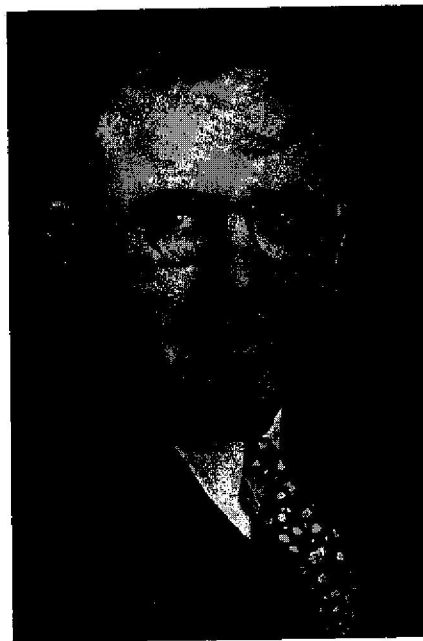
Oregon's national collegiate basketball champions will campaign through the 1940 season for the national A. A. U. pennant to nail up alongside of the N. C. A. A. gonfalon. At least four of the first-string members of the 1939 University of Oregon quintet will play under the banner of Rubenstein's Oregons, according to a joint announcement made recently by Bobby Anet, Laddie Gale, Slim Wintermute and Wally Johansen.

The players, all of whom will return to the University this season to complete their school work, are just as serious about their coming campaign as they were last year. And like their vow to take the national collegiate crown, they have also announced their intention of coping the Denver classic.

Max Rubenstein, Oregon varsity hoopster from 1931 to 1933 under Bill Reinhart, will manage the team. He announced that negotiations have already been opened between all northern division, Pacific Coast conference teams for series next winter.

Rush week on the campus officially closed September 26, with fraternities and sororities pledging a total of 405 students. The fraternities led with 274 while sororities pledged 231 women.

Delta Gamma led the list of sororities with 25, followed by Kappa Alpha Theta with 22. The fraternity group was led by the Sigma Chis, who pledged 29. Alpha Tau Omega followed with 25 and the Delta Upsilon were next with 23.

State Department Aides

The staff of the state department in Washington, D. C., now includes three research experts in history who have been recruited from the University of Oregon, according to Dr. James H. Gilbert, '03, dean of the college of social science.

The latest of the trio to go to the nation's capital in this service is John Gilbert Reid, who during the past year has served on the faculty of the history department. Mr. Reid spent part of his life in the Orient, where he became adept at the Chinese language, and also amassed a thorough knowledge of conditions in that part of the world.

The other two, both of whom are alumni of the University, are George Vern Blue, '22, and Carlton Savage, '21. Dr. Blue, one of the most brilliant scholars ever graduated from here, specializes in European history, and for a time was a professor of this subject here. Mr. Savage is also an expert in the statistical field.

Although no figures are available, it is believed that no other state university has contributed as many men to this important government department as the University of Oregon.

Will Post Grades

Campus living organizations will once more be rated scholastically according to a ruling by the faculty in their October meeting, abolishing a year-old rule which made grade records open only to University staff members and the students' parents or

guardians except on written permission of the student.

The repeal of the old law will make possible the inspection of grades by interested people, and the publication of scholastic standings of the different organizations on the campus.

Co-op Dividends

Members of the University of Oregon co-operative students board, governing body of the University-owned co-op store, have adopted a plan

whereby members of the University student body will share in the profits of the store.

Under the new plan, a dividend will be declared at the end of the school year with each student's dividends in proportion to money spent in the Co-op during the year.

According to Chuck Skinner, president of the co-op board, prices at the store will not be raised by adoption of this plan.

The store, now located on the first floor of new Chapman hall, sells student supplies.

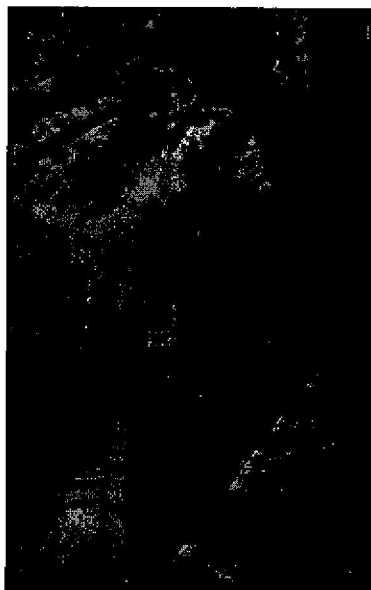

Hoop Slate

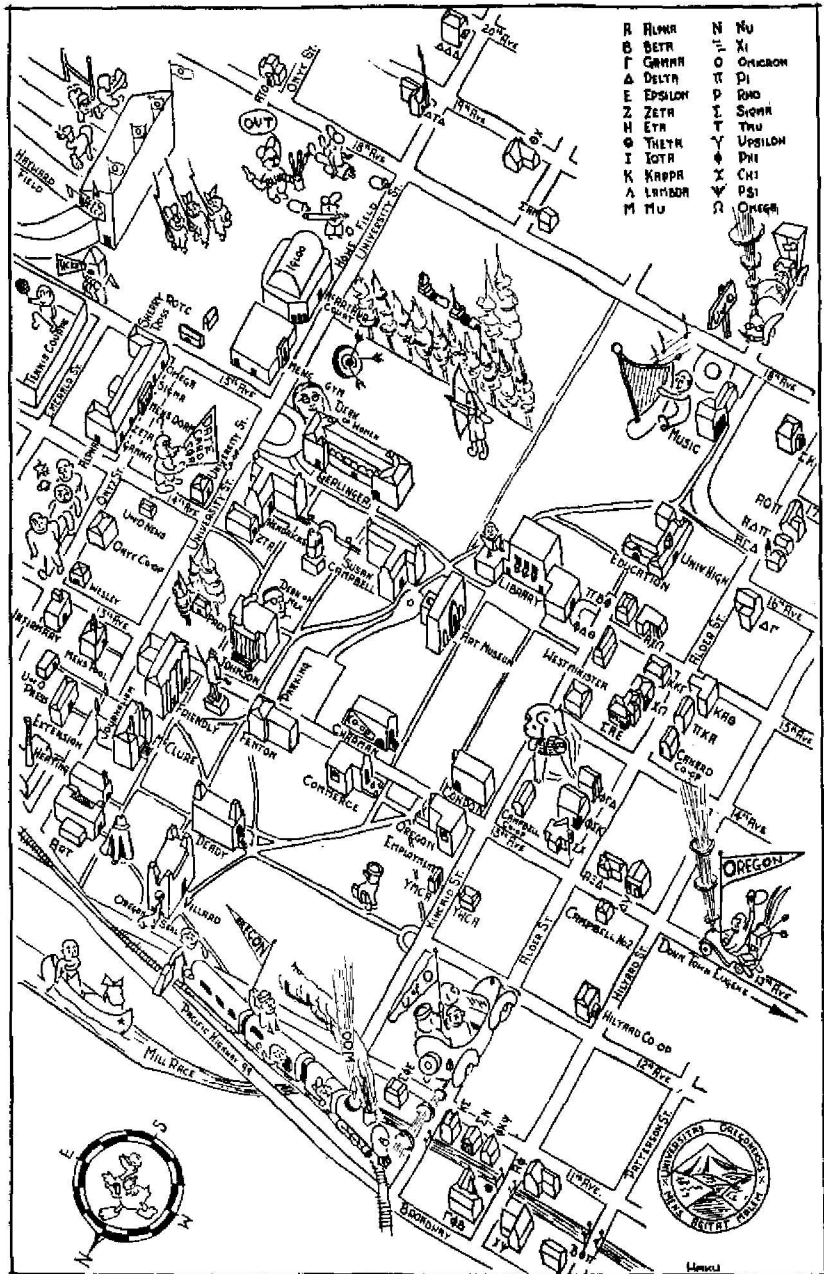
An eighth and final game has been added to the eastern barnstorming schedule for Oregon's defending national basketball champions next December.
