The Cover

For many alumni the closest to personal contact they will have with their Alma Mater this year will be to sit in a service club meeting, a grange meeting, or some other gathering where the University of Oregon Symposium group will provide the program.

The cover picture is of Assistant Professor W. A. Dahlberg and Ken Erickson, a member of the symposium group. Microphone training is an integral part of the speech group work.

Last year the symposium groups appeared before seventy-five audiences throughout the state. And their engagements for this year include many more. W. A. Dahlberg handles the men's group which has this year chosen the subject "American Values." The purpose of this discussion is the investigation of phases of the American scene to discover the truth or falsity of charges such as: "The Americans are Queer," "Americans are Bored and Unhappy."

The girls' group works with the subject, "Youth Tell Their Story." The group defines certain problems which confront the youth of today. Possible solutions to the difficulties are suggested. Mr. Donald Hargis is director of this group.

The symposium groups serve a double purpose: first, they enable the student to appear before real audiences and to experience actual life situations, a necessary adjunct to theoretical speech training; second, the citizens and taxpayers of the state can share with the University the information that this group uncovers in its investigations.

This is the seventh year of the symposium tours. Any group throughout the state interested in having one of these groups appear before its meetings should write to W. A. Dahlberg or Donald Hargis, speech department, University of Oregon. Assistant Professor John Casteel, director of the speech division, coordinates the work of the two groups.

Portland Alums Plan Two Events

Two University functions scheduled for the coming month in Portland will draw the attention of University of Oregon Alumni. The annual meeting of the Portland Alumni club is planned for Thursday night, March 16, at the Portland hotel. The University of Oregon Symphony orchestra of sixty-five pieces will appear in concert at the Portland civic auditorium on the afternoon of Sunday, April 2. The Portland Alumni association and the Portland chapters of the University of Oregon Mothers and the University of Oregon Dads are cooperating to present the symphony.

Kelsey Slocum is acting as general chairman for the association meeting, which will be in banquet form. Special guest of the evening will be Bill Hayward, who enters his thirty-sixth year as trainer and track coach at the University.

Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the University, will give a report of the progress of the University during the past year. Dr. Erb was first introduced to Oregon alumni as president at the 1938 meeting, which was held on March 17, 1938. His report will cover the intervening year.

Roland Davis, '28, president of the Portland Alumni, will present the busi-

ness report of the association. Following this, officers will be elected.

If the team is not otherwise engaged, Howard Hobson and his flashing Web-foot basketball team will be present to share the spotlight.

Committee appointments include: Kelsey Slocum, '32, general chairman; Robert C. Bishop, '32; Bert S. Gooding, ex-'26; Mrs. Helen Carson Plumb, '22; Harold L. Davidson, LL.B. '30; and Hugh L. Biggs, '27, general committee.

Hal E. Short, ex-'33, publicity; Anton F. Peterson, '31, program; Mrs. Georgia Lou Keane, ex-'33, patrons and patronesses; Donald J. McCormick, '30, and Ray "Butch" Morse, ex-'34, chairman, arrangements.

Theodore Jensen, ex-'33, will act as chairman of the attendance and ticket sales committee. His co-workers will be: Craig Povey, ex-'37; Don Kennedy, '38; William Barendrick, ex-'32; Glen Hieber, LL.B. '35; and Brian Minnaugh, '32.

Symphony Appearance

The University symphony appearance will be the first one in Portland for that group since 1930 when they played a week's engagement at the Paramount theater. The Portland appearance will climax the 1939 season for the group.

The orchestra is the outstanding college symphony group in the Northwest and has been asked to appear before the Northwest Music Supervisor's conference in Tacoma in April. Five times in the past three years the University symphony has been featured in coast-wide broadcasts.

The proceeds of the concert will go into the music fund of the University. The Eugene Symphony association which presented three concerts this year in Eugene has established a scholarship fund from the proceeds of the Eugene appearances. The scholarships are given to orchestra members to enable them to further their music studies.

Under the direction of Hugh Rosson, former graduate manager of the University and now director of the safety division of the state motor vehicle department, in Salem, 100 Dads living in Marion county have organized into a unit of the state-wide Dads organization. 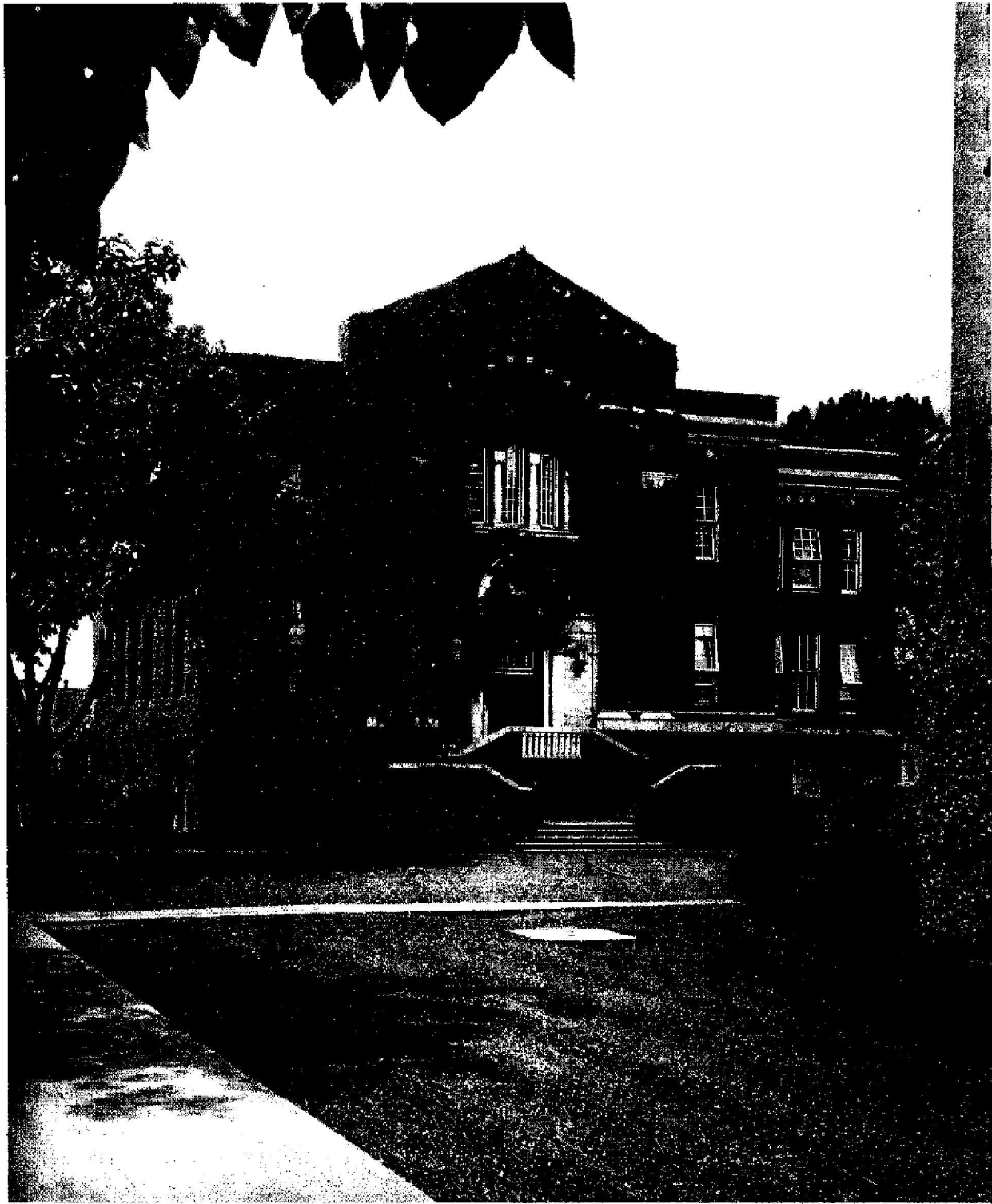

Senator Frederick W. Steiwer, '06, Dies

Senator Frederick Steiwer, '06, died in Washington, D. C., on February 3, at the age of fifty-five. Senator Steiwer was buried with full military honors in Arlington national cemetery.

The senator, born on a 2000 acre ranch in the Willamette valley near Salem, was elected to the senate in 1926 while a resident of Umatilla county. He won the reelection in 1932 and announced at Eugene on October 23, 1937, he would not be a candidate for reelection. He resigned at Washington the following January.

He entered Oregon State college at the age of 15, graduating in mechanical engineering and then transferring to the University of Oregon to study law.

His parents were John Steiwer and Ada May Steiwer, daughter of Oregon pioneer secretary of state, Samuel E. May. His mother died in 1909.

Senator Steiwer was an outstanding collegiate football player and debater. He retained his boyhood love for fishing and hunting all his life and usually arranged long strips into Oregon's out-of-doors whenever he returned from his duties at the capital.

Following his graduation from the University law school, the senator was employed in a Eugene bank. He worked in a Portland law office and was admitted to the bar in 1909. He began independent practice at Pendleton, where he married Fredia Roesch, member of a pioneer family, in 1911.

He was deputy and then district attorney for Umatilla county prior to his election to the state senate in 1916. He resigned the state post to join the army with his brother, Karl, and served with the American forces in France. His second child, a son, was

born at Pendleton while the senator was stationed at the San Francisco Presidio.

In 1926 Steiwer defeated seven primary candidates including the incumbent republican, Senator Robert N. Stanfield, for the senate nomination and sailed through the general election when Stanfield ran as an independent.

The senator, who owned a ranch in the Pendleton area, was associated with the founding of the world-famous Pendleton Round-Up.

Steiwer became ill in 1936 en route to Washington after the presidential elections and was in a Denver hospital for several weeks. His work as keynote speaker and temporary chairman of the national republican convention were said to have contributed to his physical decline.

In 1936 Senator Steiwer was named as the "most outstanding alumni of the state." He was guest of honor at the banquet given at that time when he was presented with the symbolic scroll.

Corley Replaces Cole

Vaughn Corley, assistant coach of New Mexico State college since 1933, has been named to succeed Bill Cole as Oregon line coach, Earl M. Pallett, chairman of the athletic board, has announced.

The appointment has been approved by the athletic board, President Donald M. Erb and Chancellor F. M. Hunter, but is still subject to confirmation by the State Board of Higher Education, it was stated.

Coach Oliver personally commended the ability of Corley. "My teams played against New Mexico State five years, and I know that his lines were well coached," Oliver said.

Corley, according to Coach Oliver, applied for the Oregon job at the time Bill Cole was chosen.

The new Oregon football assistant is a graduate of Texas Tech, where he was, in the words of Tex Oliver, a "great player." He coached from 1929 to 1933 at Las Cruces, New Mexico, high school, before going to New Mexico State as assistant to Coach G. H. Hines.

Corley is due to take over his new duties March 1, in time for spring practice. His appointment is for a one-year term.

Huge Bill Cole, who succeeded Gene Shields at the beginning of last season, will return to his Santa Ana orange ranch sometime in April.

M. Harris Ellsworth, '22, was named president of the Oregon Press conference which met on the campus recently. Mr. Ellsworth is publisher of the Roseburg News-Review and owner of radio station KRNR.

Dr. Schmidt, German Head, to Retire

Dr. Schmidt to Retire

Forty-two continuous years of teaching at the University of Oregon will come to an end at the close of this school year for Dr. Friederich Georg Gottlob Schmidt, who has been a professor of German at the University since 1897 and head of the department since 1905.

Dr. Schmidt, widely known for his scholarly studies and writing in the Germanic languages field, celebrated his seventieth birthday last November 17. He is now eligible for a life annuity under a system operated at the University.

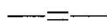
Dr. Schmidt has asked for retirement so that he may devote his time to travel and further study.

During his forty-two year tenure here, Dr. Schmidt has developed the German department into one of the most comprehensive and thorough in this section of the country. Rigorous training in the fundamentals of the language, as well as specialized teaching in courses such as "physiological phonetics" and Old High German and Old Saxon have been taught by Dr. Schmidt.

Born in Untermagerbein, Bavaria, in 1868, Dr. Schmidt attended the University of Erlangen in Germany from 1888 to 1890. He came to the United States in 1890 and after teaching in Maryland and Seattle, Wash., he entered Johns Hopkins in 1893, where he received his degree of doctor of philosophy.

He taught at Cornell college in Iowa. The following year he came to the University as head of the department

of modern languages. He held this position until 1905, when he took over the direction of the German department.

"It meant that we, our orator, the students, the University of Oregon had won. The impulse of enthusiasm was irresistible. It was an equalizing, elevating, democratic enthusiasm. The Sophs got mixed up with the Seniors, the Freshmen looked not down upon the Subs (preparatory school students) and the Junior molecule was tetotally swallowed up in the victory, and everybody lost his identity in the college yell."

The first February graduating class in the history of the University is announced. Members of the class are Miss Nieta Harding, Olen Arnspiger, and William Barker.

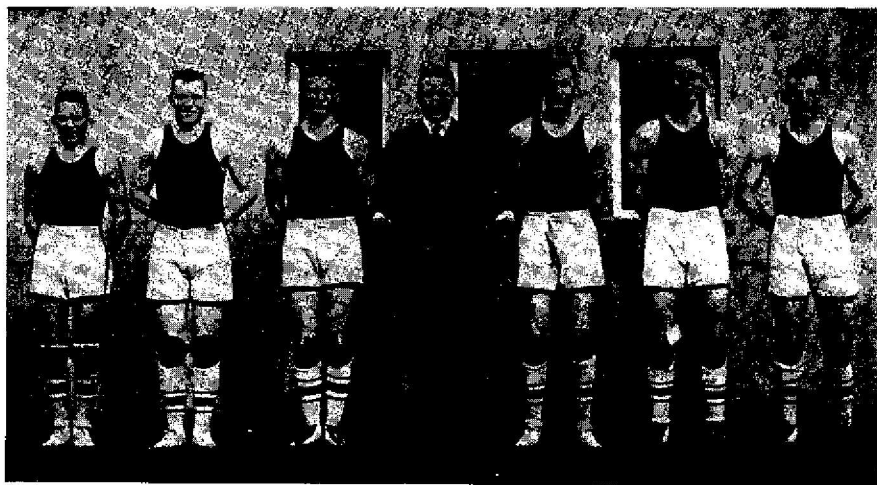

Dr. Homer I. Rainey, who taught in the department of education at the University from 1923 to 1927 has been named president of the University of Texas. He left the University to become president of Franklin college in Indiana. He left Franklin college to head Bucknell university in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Rainey was one of the most popular professors while at Oregon. He was a good singer and a good mixer who proved to be a "regular fellow" with the students. He was at one time

a professional baseball pitcher and maintained a strong interest in sports.

Dean Wayne L. Morse of the law school has been named a member of a board of arbiters for west coast maritime activities. The appointment was announced by Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins.

Dean Morse will serve on the board set up under the collective agreement between Waterfront Employers' association of the Pacific coast and the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's union.

The Oregon Ducks seemed bound on their way to their second consecutive northern division championship as they hung up their twelfth victory in fourteen conference games by handing the Oregon State Beavers a sound 48-37 thumping. The game was sweet revenge for the 50-31 setback the near-cellar Beavers had given the Ducks the week before.

The defeat at Corvallis ended Oregon's winning streak of ten games. The walls of McArthur Court were jammed for the final civil-war battle of the season for it was not only the final home appearance (barring Pacific Coast play-offs which will be held in the North this year) of the 1939 Ducks, but a win for Oregon left them with but one more victory needed to clinch the northern division crown.

Fastest and most furiously fought game of the season was the first of the Eugene games between the University of Oregon and the University of Washington. Six thousand spectators jammed McArthur Court to see the heretofore undefeated Huskies battle it out with Oregon for the league leadership.

After a galloping first-half in which both teams ran themselves ragged with the fast-break type of ball advocated by Hobson and Edmundson, the Oregons faced the second half on the short end of a 27-24 score. The Webfoots had crept up from a 22-14 advantage the Huskies held for a short time.

The first four minutes and ten seconds of the second half found the spectators unable to keep up with the play, as 21 points were scored in that time. The Oregon boys collected 13 of these against 8 for Washington.

From then on it was all Oregon and the final score was Oregon 57, Washington 49. Gale led the scoring with 16 points, followed closely by Dick and Wintermute, who collected 14 points apiece.

The team enters the final series of two games with Washington at Seattle, needing only one win to cop the title. Conference standings are:

DUCK TALK

Oregon's tall basketball "siege gun," Lauren (Laddie) Gale, is another Webfoot who can't seem to make the records stick.

Last year, the big forward from Oakridge, topped all Pacific coast scorers with 408 points for the season, set a 20-game conference top of 249 points, and in doing so erased ex-OSC Wally Palmberg's 16-game conference total of 187 points.

In 16 games last year, Gale made 189 points in 14 games and 193 in 16 to break Palmberg's mark.

But on a technicality, many basketball experts of the northwest refuse to accept his record. They declare that because Montana, a team which managed to beat the championship Ducks once, was included in the conference and the schedule lengthened to 20 games, his mark shouldn't stand.

Coach Howard Hobson isn't of that opinion. In fact, Coach Hobson vehemently points out that the addition of Montana just made the going that much tougher because of more games and a long road trip into a high-altitude territory at Butte, Montana. The high altitude always bothers visiting athletes.

As for Gale himself, he isn't worried. He's hot on the pace that will take him to an "official" 16-game record. At the conclusion of the Idaho series in Eugene, February 10 and 11, Gale had boosted his total to 149 points, just 39 short of a new mark. In his remaining four games, he will have to average 10 points to surpass it.

Big Slim Wintermute, rated by conference clubs as the "nearest thing to basketball perfection," trails Gale in the scoring column. With four games to go, Wintermute has 128 points, and must shoot at a 15¼-points-per-game pace to also beat the record.

Both Gale and Wintermute are far ahead of the field, and can hardly be boosted out of their 1-2 positions.

Roy Williamson, Washington sharpshooter, is the nearest challenger to Oregon supremacy in the scoring standings. In the first 10 games he has scored 93 points.

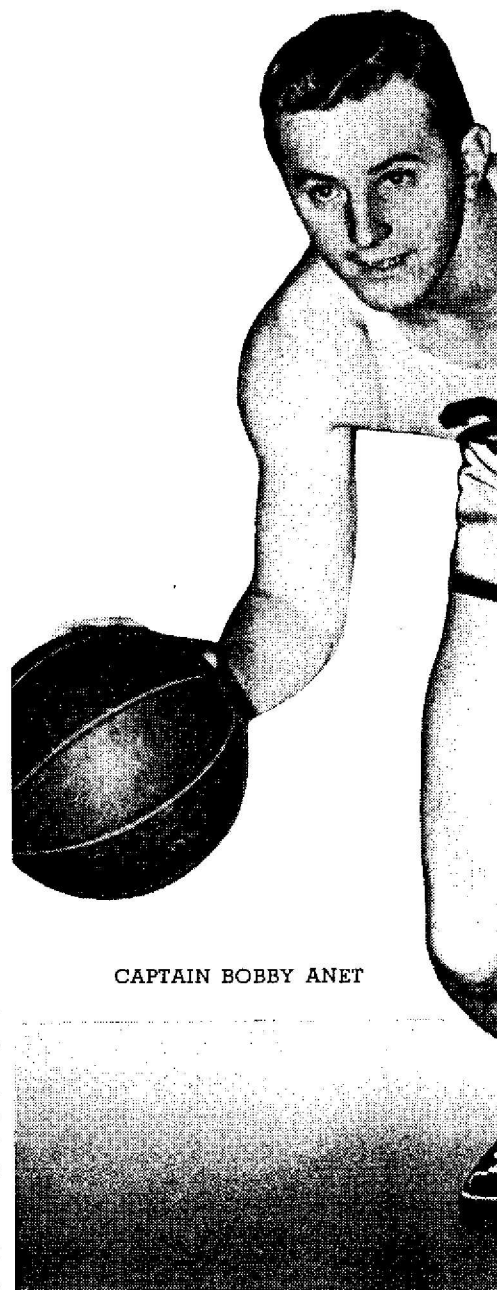
There is one basketball subject which Coach Howard Hobson would just rather not talk about.

That subject is "championship," especially when it concerns his Ducks, who lead the northern division title chase at the three-quarter post with 11

wins and only one setback. Washington, in second place, has 7 wins and 3 defeats.

Coach Hobson has seen other ball clubs fold up in the "home stretch." And not until the Ducks are actually "in" mathematically does he want any part of that pennant.

But nevertheless, Athletic Manager Anse Cornell has been besieged with

ticket reservations from fans who are confident that the Ducks will be in the playoffs come March 11, 12, and 13.

The playoffs will be in the northwest

with the northern division winners the hosts.

George Varoff, crack pole vaulter, and Kirman Storli, northern division half-mile champion, will represent Oregon at the Golden Gate World's fair invitational track meet and Pacific coast indoor championships which will be held February 25 and March 4 on San Francisco's Treasure Island.

Varoff, whose indoor record of 14 feet 4 7/8 inches was broken February 11 by Cornelius Warmerdam at the Boston Gardens, will be trying to regain his laurels in his first competition of the year. In workouts this month, Varoff has bettered 13 feet 6 inches.

Storli will run in a special 600-yard invitational race.



Oregon's remarkable swimming due—Jack Dallas and Sherman Wetmore—will soon have to be looking for new worlds to conquer.

In their first varsity campaign, the two Long Beach, Cal., mermen have established new coast records with about as much concern as Bobby Jones would show playing a Sunday duffer.

But while this matter of record-breaking has "all been in a day's swim" to Wetmore and Dallas in nearly two years of splashing at the University, it was not until Saturday, February 11, that one of their marks was entered in the coast official files.

Last year, new records fairly dripped from the efforts of Backstroker Wetmore and Breaststroker Dallas. But because they were freshmen, the marks didn't count. And this year, the two boys have "shoved off" four times, cracking records every time. Technicalities and exhibitions deprived Coach Ned John's aces of records the first three times, but the fourth paid dividends.

Swimming against the best natators of the University of Washington, Wetmore was clocked in 1:39.8 seconds for the 150 yard backstroke. The old coast mark, held by Park of USC, was 1:40.1.

Dallas was even more impressive. He clipped 10.1 seconds off the 200-yard breast stroke mark held by Towne of Stanford. Dallas' time was 3:26.6.

Then, just to make their afternoon complete, Wetmore and Dallas teamed with Pierce Mallory, free-styler, to set a new coast mark of 3:03.2, five seconds faster than the old time, in the 300-yard medley relay event.

Although the Webfoots cracked three marks, they lost the meet to the Huskies by a 43-to-32 count when Washington's Bockman beat Oregon's Tom Starluck by inches in the finish of the free-style relay.

When Jack Dallas came up from Long Beach to do his swimming for the University of Oregon, he introduced a new "butterfly" stroke to northwest swimmers.

Previously, swimmers in the northern division, all used the orthodox breast stroke—an underwater "frog" stroke.

Dallas' success with the "butterfly," which is an overhand breast stroke, caused breast stokers in the north to adopt this style.

Dallas, himself, tutored Ralph Laferty, Oregon's 1937 champion, as well as other Oregon swimmers.

But one thing other northwest swimmers haven't been able to find out, from Dallas or anyone else, is how to keep up with Jack Dallas.

Raj Edits Indian Home

In 1935, a serious Indian youth who already possessed a B.S. in agricultural science from the University of Minne-

sota presented his thesis for a Master of Arts degree in journalism. Kummur Sri Mohan V. Raj proposed in his thesis to return to India and establish an English language farm and home magazine for the natives "to assist in the regeneration of the masses of India, to introduce improved scientific methods of agriculture and to innovate in the management of homes by presenting material in a simple, popular, and appealing manner."

This seemed like a pretty large order because it meant that "Raj" was going to be bucking the "vested interests" who must come through with the advertising to make his struggling magazine a going concern. But he has done it.

The second anniversary edition of *The Indian Home* has been received by the school of journalism. The edition contains 64 pages of interesting material and has a four-color cover. The editor has stuck to his purpose and has a now firmly established magazine.

Known simply as Mohan V. Raj, the young Indian was a popular campus figure. He was a member of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, and acted as Oregon correspondent to its magazine. He also served as night editor on the *Emerald* for some time.

Alumna Writes Best Story

"Address Unknown," a short story that sold out the entire issue of a magazine within several days, is the work of Katherine Kressman Taylor, '24. The story deals with the friendship of two partners in a San Francisco art firm, one German and the other Jewish.

The whole story is an exchange of letters between the two men when the German partner goes to Nazi Germany. The German had been engaged to his partner's sister, but he renounces her in Germany when she is hounded by storm troopers as non-Aryan. "The vengeance upon him is stark and beautiful in its simplicity."

The piece first appeared in *Story* magazine and was reprinted in *Readers Digest* (which is, incidentally, edited by a former Oregon Woman, Lila Bell Acheson Wallace, '17, and her husband, De Witt Wallace). The story has now appeared in book form.

Katherine Kressman attended the school of journalism at the University and did her major work in short story writing. She is a native of Portland, Ore., and now lives in Congers, New York. She is the mother of three children and considers them her first thought and her writing secondary. "Address Unknown" is not a first story, but she spends a good deal of her time writing poetry.
