

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT ON LESBIAN LANDS:

CHALLENGING GENDER NORMS

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Introduction

Women throughout history have stood in the face of inequality, usually due to gender stereotyping and biases. This research goes into the women's experiences at WomanShare, a lesbian land community in Southern Oregon, to understand how their diverse skills, commitment to education, and mentorship dynamics contribute to their success in communal living and foster a culture of empowerment. By working together to learn, teach, and carry out roles that were traditionally held by men, women at WomanShare were able to create a space of individuality and feminism. The research draws on primary sources, including interviews and writings from community members, portraits, and academic sources that contextualize the feminist movements of the 1960s and 1970s.

Research

Same-sex communities, such as WomanShare, provided women with a safe space to fulfill roles and learn skills that have historically been occupied by men and, thus, intentionally fight back against gender


biases.





Legacies + Outcomes

- * Women are still paid less than men for the same jobs, but it has decreased by 50%
- ★ WomanShare acted as a place for women to escape gender norms and stereotypes
- ★ Women fill more managerial and leadership roles
- ★ Lesbian lands helped women find their potential and learn skills that could translate into real-world occupations (like gardening, carpentry, etc)


Building Capabilities

- ★ "Our goals for ourselves were to make a family, to learn to live together...We wanted to learn new skills, and then teach what we learned" (Burmeister, 2013, pg. 61).
- ★ "Affinity groups came out of potluck go-arounds when an individual would bring up a life situation that she thought other members might have in common" (McCourt, 2000, pg. 29)."
- "Workshops offer opportunities for members who conduct workshops professionally to try out new formats" (McCourt, 2000, pg. 28)
- * "With help from other lesbians in the growing community, she built a small hexagon-shaped cabin. She also built an outdoor bed to entertain the potential lover she longed for." (Kleiner, 2003, pg. 31).

Strength in Occupations

- ★ "Women working together can do more... faster" (Building Diary, WomanShare Records, Coll 269, Box 4, Folder 5)
- * "Though I work every day among men / I am learning this trade from women" (Women Working: Poems and Pictures, Carol Newhouse Photographs and Papers, Coll 431, Box 1, Folder 3)
- ★ When I have tried to learn a skill from men I have often felt inadequate, stupid...I felt incompetent because I couldn't understand the terms being thrown around...I felt like I had to act like I knew more than I really did so that I wouldn't get men's ridicule. I never felt like I could ask a man to teach me something simple (Building Diary, WomanShare Records, Coll 269, Box 4, Folder 5)

WomanShare is organized as a non-profit corporation, a group of three to eight women who work as the caretaking collective and also carry out the projects of the organization. Along with the caretaking collective, former residents and other community members take an active role in providing direction and support for projects.
