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Stepping Into the Path of "Luck" - Taking Charge of Your Career

Some people are lucky. Others work hard to make things happen. I believe that working hard makes you luckier.

In the case of finding your "ideal" job or internship, make sure others see your hard work and effort to increase the likelihood that their "eyes and ears" can help you identify opportunities that match your interest.

Consider the opportunities you may have to make valuable connections over winter break. Many students spend their holiday break in the location where they hope to work in the upcoming summer or after graduation.

Even if you don't see job announcements with employers of interest, take the initiative to contact them to request an informational interview. In brief, an informational interview allows students to ask questions of professionals to gain

insight and advice. One main benefit is that students have the opportunity to learn about employers' expectations for top candidates; another is that students will make themselves known to these targeted employers.

Once an employer meets a student and learns about their background, strengths and personality, that employer is more likely to remember that student when they need to hire or when they hear a colleague is hiring. Students in this case no longer need their resume to stand out among a pile.

If you have the opportunity to make a connection with a company of interest, even before you learn about a job of interest, take the extra step and see how quickly professionals start coming to you when they need to hire student talent!

Investing in Our Future: Pacific Crest Securities Business Trip

One of the west coast's leading investment banks, Pacific Crest Securities, hosted Lundquist College of Business MBA students recently in a session that included presentations from company executives representing each of the firm's functional areas as well as a round-table discussion with CEO Scott Sanbo.

Organized by LCB Career Services and open to all firstyear and second-year MBA students, the trip was both a unique experiential learning opportunity and a valuable chance for future job-seekers to make a connection with

one of the most prestigious firms in the Portland area.

The two hour visit to Pacific Crest's forty-first floor headquarters atop Portland's tallest office building featured candid behind-the-scenes discussions from Dave Rubin (MBA '02) and Steve Weinstein (MBA '95). These sessions were eye-opening for the students in attendance and shed a lot of light on the inner workings of the investment sector.

A highlight of the visit was the chance to hear from the firm's Chief Executive, Scott Sanbo, who delivered the kind of top-line insights about the realities of doing business today that are applicable to all industries. For example, in terms of competing in many industries, Mr. Sanbo made it clear that success is often a result of being known for something. By establishing a reputation for expertise in the technology sector, he explained, Pacific Crest has been able to withstand competition from much bigger banks because they became known as the technology experts.

At the end of the session, the students were allowed to enter the trading floor to observe the last few minutes of action before the markets closed. Being part of the exciting environment on the floor and seeing trades being made was the perfect end to a memorable session.

Build Your Own Video Games: GarageGames Business Trip

Undergraduate business students had the chance to check out the video game industry on November 10, when GarageGames hosted an LCB business trip. GarageGames is an entrepreneurial company founded by a band of former big company game programmers. The company produces a variety of software tools to help individual game developers make their own games as well as create its own commercial games such as Marble Blast Ultra.

President Mark Frohnmayer showed students around the warehouse that serves as the Garage. Third Party Development Manager Tim Aste and Director of Marketing Eric Fritz answered student questions on what it's like to start a business from scratch and work under crunch time schedules. The students also got a sneak peak at one of GarageGames's newest products, Torque X, which will allow developers to make video games on the Xbox 360 console.

GarageGames has an intensive internship program. Cur-

After assessing the market, she used her research to make educational tools for the credit services team and recommended credit card products and services to her division.

Alix Gierke with Intel Human Resources shared how she proactively sought out HR professionals for insight and experiential opportunities after being encouraged to do so from an Oregon alumna she met at a similar alumni panel event when she was a first-year student in the program. "I got so much out of attending company site visits and speakers panels," she said. "That also motivated me to seek out professionals in my field of interest to gain even more advice and direction," she added.

Q. How do you make your resume stand out?

Make your bulleted statements meaningful and tangible—quantify your accomplishments, when possible, using numbers and percentages. Don't use a generic resume—cater to the qualifications of the job. Pay attention to what the company is really looking for.

Find Jobs and Internships Using UO-Joblink

Looking for that experience to make your resume shine? Look no further than UO-Joblink. Hundreds of recruiters from around the country come to campus every year to interview students for full-time and internship positions. UO-Joblink allows you to connect with them plus find many other exciting part-time, full-time, and internship positions. Here's how to use it to your benefit:

Getting Started

Go to uocareer.uoregon.edu and find the login screen in the lower left corner:



If it's your first time on UO-Joblink, activate your account by typing in your e-mail address and clicking the "activate" button. You will be sent an e-mail with a password for signing in.

Finding Jobs and Internships

Once you've logged in, click on "Postings" and then "Postings for UO Students" at the top of the screen:




To search for jobs and internships you are interested in, use the search box:



Submitting a Resume for a Campus Interview

Most campus interviews require that you submit a resume through UO-Joblink. <u>CRITICAL</u>: All resumes submitted to UO-JobLink <u>must be approved</u> by a Career Center counselor <u>before</u> they can be used in the system. These resumes should be submitted at least a week in advance to ensure they are uploaded in time for an interview. Once approved, DO NOT DELETE THAT RESUME; simply add additional resumes to your account.

To post your resume on UO-Joblink, click on the "Documents" button. At the bottom of the Documents page, click the "Add New" Button. You will be taken to the New Document page, where you can submit your resume at the bottom of the screen:



To submit a resume, fill in the following blanks:

- <u>Label</u>: Write a title for your resume, such as *Meg Thompson Accounting Resume CIP*
- <u>Document Type</u>: Select "Resume"
- <u>File</u>: Browse for your resume on your computer to upload it

When you are finished, click "Submit," and it will be sent to a Career Counselor for review. Once uploaded, employers can view your resume (if you set your Profile-Privacy settings to allow your resume to be searchable by employers) or you can send it to them.








