

The Local and Regional Documents Archive (LRDA) provides a centralized, fully searchable repository and archive of significant documents produced by local governments and regional offices of U.S. federal government agencies within the state or Oregon. Using any standard web browser on a networked computer, researchers, community organizers, developers, administrators, businesspeople and others can use the LRDA to immediately access full-text PDF versions of more than 2,200 documents, including local planning documents, city development codes, sub-area plans, documents required by the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), land management planning documents, resource management plans and environmental opinions. Additional documents are being added to the database as they become available.

Researchers and students in the areas of public policy and management, architecture and environmental studies will find the resource especially useful.

Ted Smith, coordinator of the LRDA project and assistant head of the Document Center at the UO Libraries, notes that accessing some of these materials formerly required many hours of time. "Now," Smith says, "users can search the database, locate relevant documents and view them on screen or download them for printing within a matter of minutes."

LRDA complements another resource developed by the UO Libraries, Data for Local Communities, an online gathering place for statistical, spatial and descriptive information about the cities, counties and other civil, economic and natural regions of Oregon

LRDA's website was designed by the Interactive Media group in the library's Center for Media and Educational Technologies. UO Professor Charles Dowd will give a Faculty Artist Series recital honoring contemporary composer Elliott Carter. The Pulitzer Prize-winning composer wrote "Eight Pieces for Four Timpani" (one player), six of them in 1949 and two in 1966. To celebrate Carter's 100th birthday year, Dowd will play all eight: Saeta, Moto Perpetuo, Adagio, Recitative, Improvisation, Canto, Canaries and March. The eight pieces are full of complex rhythms, metric modulation, extended techniques, glissandi and tempo modulation.
